The presentation also covers the Title 1 requirements, Parents' Right-to-Know, the District Title I Parent and Family Engagement Plan, and opportunities for parents to be involved in their child's education and as a volunteer at the school. A handout is provided for all attendees with a written summary of the information covered in the meeting. The school holds a Title 1 parent meeting to present Title 1 requirement, Parent's Right-to-Know, the school Title 1 Parent and family Engagement Plan, and Title 1 set aside family funds.

In addition to the Parent Information Meeting held annually, Appalachian School holds a "Meet the Teacher" day prior to the opening of school, encourages parents to be involved in PTSO, Athletic Booster Organizations, fundraisers, and to volunteer to serve as Classroom Adult Academic Volunteer. Meetings are offered at a varied of time to accommodate working parents. Teachers offer flexibly with conference's for parents who cannot come to the school.

Appalachian High School's CIP team consists of 1 parent from outside the school, two student and 6 employees. Parents are encouraged to make suggestions and are included in all meetings regarding planning, revising and approving the CIP. An annual Parent Survey is conducted each spring; the results and all comments are summarized by the LEA Parent Involvement Specialist and given to the school's principal for reference while planning the school's CIP. All parents are encouraged to submit their suggestions via email or in writing to the school's principal or vice principal.

Appalachian High School uses a portion of the Title I Parent Involvement funds to pay half the salary of a Parent Liaison. The Parent Liaison is responsible for organizing all parent volunteers' schedules, schedules all parent/teacher

conferences during Parent Visitation Day, works with the PTSO, assists the school's nurse in calling parents regarding health issues, assists in preparing student registration packets for "Meet the Teacher Day", and other jobs as necessary.

A Parent Information Brochure is provided by the district, which includes the Parents' Right-to-Know, LEA's Parent Involvement Plan, programs provided through the Parent Involvement Program, information regarding Alabama State Academic Standards and a link to the website where parents can access the "course of studies" for Alabama school, and other information about the Blount County School's parenting program which is provided in English and Spanish. The school's student handbook and all flyers advertising parent meetings throughout the schoolyear are provided in English and Spanish. The county's Migrant/ESL Home/School Liaison provides the translations as needed. School-Parent Compacts are provided in English and Spanish. A parent can request parent/teacher conferences by contacting the school's Parent Liaison, who will schedule the meeting during the teacher's prep time or another time convenient for both participants. Information is also posted to the "Parent Involvement" link on the www.blountboe.net website (where feasible information is posted in both English and Spanish). Appalachian High School also has a link from the www.blountboe.net website. When appropriate, public service announcements about parent events are posted on social media, as well as, Teacher blackboard communication, an automated messaging system, sends voice messages and emails to parents regarding upcoming events and important information for students and parents. School-Parent Compacts are developed by a committee and participating parents as part of the Parent Liaison PAC. The compacts are distributed during the first nine weeks of school. Compacts are included in all new student registration packets in English and Spanish. Teachers and parents are encouraged to revisit the compacts each time they have a parent/teacher conference. Since Appalachian School includes students grades K-12, two separate compacts have been developed: one for students grades K-6th and another for grades 7-12th (both in English and Spanish). The school acknowledges its role in providing a safe and appropriate

atmosphere for learning with highly qualified teachers and paraprofessionals, as well as, adequate instruction, and encouragement for all students to meet their potential as students. Parents are asked to be a participant in their child's education: by providing necessary school supplies, monitoring their child's attendance and after school activities, assisting and encouraging their child to complete homework assignments, attending Title 1 meetings, information callouts, and participating in at least one parent/teacher conference each year. The students are asked to be engaged in school activities during the school day, to ask questions when they do not understand the information being presented, to complete homework assignments, and to perform to the best of their ability in all subjects. During the first semester of the school year, a "reader friendly" English/Spanish copy of the Parent Involvement section of the CIP will be distributed to all parents. An annual parent survey, in English and Spanish, which includes comment sections, is conducted by the LEA's Parent Involvement Specialist digitally and on paper. Appalachian's CIP Committee works diligently to ensure that all parent materials and training are closely aligned with our schools' identified goals. The district meets with each principal, parent liaison and/or assistant principal at the beginning of each school year to review an overview of the school's parent involvement plan and policies. Meetings, training sessions, and events provided by the LEA's Parent Involvement Program are discussed, as well as, opportunities for parental involvement. The school's compacts are also reviewed.

Our Meet the Teacher Night has been successful in bringing parents into the school and fosters a close relationship between teachers and parents for the shared goal of student achievement. Student and parent orientations for incoming kindergarten students and seniors are held each year.

At the present time, Appalachian has approximately 78 EL students (EL1 or EL2). Information on school meetings, parent notices, etc., is sent to EL parents in Spanish. Parents of 46 students indicated on Powerschool Registration that they required translations. All Hispanic families receive the annual parent survey, provided by the District, in English and Spanish. The Migrant/ELL Home Liaison is available to translate any written communication between the home and school. Information on the parent involvement link of the www.blountboe.net website is posted in both English and Spanish. The Home Liaison also attends IEP, parent/teacher conferences and disciplinary meeting upon request from either the school or the parent. The Home Liaison translates at parent meetings when needed.

Appalachian makes every effort to work with parents in meeting their requests as related to their involvement in their children's education. Grades, as well as ACT and ACAP scores will be explained when a parent requests information. Newsletters are sent home with students in grades K - 6. Progress reports are given every 4 1/2 weeks to all students. Information is also updated frequently on our school's website and social media pages. The LEA Parent Involvement Program provides age-appropriate newsletters.

Translators and sign-language interpreters are on staff with the Blount County Board of Education to ensure that all parents are able to understand the information being presented. All schools and facilities are handicap accessible. Reports and information, including student progress notes and report cards, are available in Spanish, or other languages (as needed). Special accommodations are continuously made to communicate with parents by phone and home visits as needed. A Migrant Liaison is on staff at the Blount County Resource Center, with a direct phone line, offering a wide variety of supports which also include the following: - Translating and support at all events including I.E.P. meetings and school functions - Translation of all written materials including Parent compacts, student handbook, newsletters, progress notes, report cards, etc. - Home visits to encourage school attendance and respond to needs that may not be expressed at the local school (tutoring needs, clothing, hygiene, food, medical, immunizations, dental, vision, financial aide, school supplies, etc.) - Pre-K support and enrollment and Headstart programs (multiple locations)- Outreach and identification of migrant families (posters, flyers, school notifications, dedicated direct phone line, booths at local events to inform parents of EL and migrant students of support services, etc.) - Professional Development for teachers to better serve students - Grade monitoring for all migrant and EL students with support provided for at-risk (drop out, failing, poverty) students - Information provided to parents about student options for College and Career Readiness (Career Tech, ACT testing support, and dual enrollment).
