Hello Families,

Every year our students review the different drills we use in our building. We have Fire Drills, Tornado Drills, and Safety Drills. We use different ways to communicate what is happening in the building. Students hear the fire alarm when we practice exiting the building for the Fire Drill. I get on the intercom for Tornado and Safety drills. One drill we practice is the difference between a Hold, a Secure, and a Lockdown. A Hold is when we need to keep the hallway clear and is often used if there is a medical emergency or a student is having a tricky moment. We do this so we can help maintain the dignity of the individual involved. A Secure is used if something is happening outside of the building in the surrounding community. This is often determined by the APD. They will let us know if we need to keep students in the building. Students continue in their regular routine; they just don't go outside. Finally, is a Lockdown. A Lockdown is used only when there is an immediate threat to students.

Hola Familias,

Cada año nuestros estudiantes repasan los diferentes simulacros que usamos en nuestro edificio. Tenemos simulacros de incendio, simulacros de tornado y simulacros de seguridad. Utilizamos diferentes maneras de comunicarlo que está sucediendo en el edificio. Los estudiantes escuchan la alarma de incendio cuando practicamos salir del edificio para el simulacro de incendio. Para los simulacros de tornado y seguridad yo hablo por intercomunicador. Un ejercicio que practicamos es la diferencia entre un "Hold", un "Secure" y un "Lockdown". Un "Hold" es cuando tenemos que mantener los pasillos libres y se utiliza a menudo si hay una emergencia médica o un estudiante está teniendo un momento difícil. Hacemos esto para ayudar a mantener la dignidad de la persona involucrada. Se utiliza un "Secure" si algo está sucediendo fuera del edificio en la comunidad circundante (cerca de la escuela). Esto suele determinarlo la APD (Departamento de Policia de Appleton). Ellos nos harán saber si necesitamos mantener a los estudiantes en el edificio. Los estudiantes continúan en su rutina regular; simplemente no salen. Por último, es un "Lockdown", un "Lockdown" se utiliza solamente cuando hay una amenaza inmediata a los estudiantes.

Heart Safe School Designation Letter to School Community

Dear Community,

Horizons Elementary School is pleased to inform you that we have joined a community effort to implement a sustainable and comprehensive CPR and AED program. This decision is the result of our wish to make our buildings safe for our students, visitors and employees.

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) occurs when the heart suddenly and unexpectedly stops beating, cutting off blood flow to the brain and other vital organs. SCA is fatal if not treated immediately. Having access to an AED as well as having a written plan and a team of CPR/AED-trained staff ready to act in an emergency can save the life of someone suffering a SCA during those critical first few minutes. Through our cooperative efforts with **Project ADAM** and **Children's Hospital of Wisconsin**, we have joined hundreds of schools throughout the state of Wisconsin and beyond in preparing our school for a life-threatening emergency. This program enables us to offer any person who may experience a Sudden Cardiac Arrest during regular school hours, the best chance for survival.

Horizons currently has an AED in the building. The AED is stored in a wall cabinet. When the cabinet door is opened, a loud alarm will sound. This alerts everyone that there is a potential emergency. Our school has a maintenance plan in place for the units. The AEDs are designed to work effectively unless they are tampered with. Additionally, the AED will not shock a person unless it detects a shockable rhythm (ventricular fibrillation).

Staff has been trained to assist with an emergency during regular school hours. After school hours and during the summer, this is a Public Access Defibrillation (PAD) program. If you suspect someone is experiencing a Sudden Cardiac Arrest, please feel free to use the equipment at our school. Good Samaritan laws protect the layperson in a life-saving attempt, although we recommend becoming trained in CPR/AED use as an investment in your health and the health of others. Our local Emergency Medical Services and AASD Medical Director are aware of our procedures for the program.

"Project ADAM is a national, non-profit organization committed to saving lives through advocacy, education, preparedness and collaboration to prevent sudden cardiac death. Our affiliate programs improve the cardiac chain of survival in schools and communities in memory of Adam Lemel, a 17-year-old Whitefish Bay, WI, high school student who collapsed and died while playing basketball at school."

General program information:

- The registration fee of \$35 per child must be paid online when you complete your registration process.
 This is a Non-Refundable fee.
- Depending on your free/reduced status, there are monthly fees to both the before and after school
 program. Please see the bottom of this letter for the monthly rates, these are per child.
- Before school runs 6:30am until school starts and after school runs from dismissal until 6:00pm.
- When registering, please use a laptop or computer. A phone is not advised.

New Families:

- The registration process does take about 30 minutes per child as our system requires you to enter children's health history, emergency contacts and immunization records. Please plan accordingly. You are able to save the information and come back at a later time, if needed.
