HIGH SCHOOLS CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Progress is underway at Thomas Worthington High School (TWHS) and Worthington Kilbourne High School (WKHS). Each project is unique, but both represent significant investments in the future of our students and the broader Worthington community.





WORTHINGTON KILBOURNE HIGH SCHOOL: ENHANCING LEARNING SPACES

Renovations at WKHS are underway, with 20 classrooms and a new hallway under construction to improve functionality and flow. Despite the work, classes started on time on August 14th, with students avoiding construction areas. Once these classrooms are complete, work will begin on the next set, ensuring upgrades throughout the school.

WORTHINGTON SCHOOL DISTRICT SUMMER PROJECT UPDATE

This summer, significant improvements were made across various schools and facilities. Here's a quick update on key projects:

- WEC Roofing and Granby Heating/Cooling Controls were upgraded.
- Sutter Park received new classroom heating and cooling systems.
- Playground Replaced at Liberty Elementary.
- **Safety Improvements** included new crosswalks and handicap curb cuts at KMS and McCord.
- **Exterior Signs** were replaced at Worthington Estates, Wilson Hill, and Brookside Elementary Schools.
- McCord Stadium received new goalposts and updated restrooms.
- Evening Street Gym Floor was replaced.
- Classroom Spaces at Liberty and Worthington Hills were modified.
- **New Generators** were installed at Granby, Liberty, and Sutter Park.
- Pedestrian Bridge Replacement at Worthington Park is in progress.

These projects reflect the district's commitment to enhancing facilities and supporting the community's needs.



NEW FOR 2024-2025: ENHANCING EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Worthington Schools is excited to announce several key initiatives aimed at improving education and supporting our community. These updates focus on enhancing the student experience and addressing the evolving needs of staff and families.

EMBEDDING THE PORTRAIT OF A LEARNER

After collaborating with the community to create the Portrait of a Learner last year, the district is now integrating this vision into classrooms. Teachers are embedding the skills and values outlined in the Portrait to help students apply them in meaningful ways.

STRENGTHENING SPECIAL EDUCATION

Following a special education audit, the district is implementing changes to improve outcomes for students with disabilities and better support staff. While this process will take time, the goal is to create a more inclusive and effective learning environment for all.

REEVALUATING CELL PHONE POLICIES

Worthington Schools is reviewing its cell phone policy in response to new legislation from Governor DeWine. The district is engaging students, parents, and staff through surveys to create a policy that supports student focus and learning while aligning with the law.

ELIMINATION OF CLASSROOM FEES

To ease financial burdens, the Board has voted to eliminate classroom consumable fees starting this year. Fees for extracurriculars, instrument rentals, and parking will remain, but this change will provide meaningful relief for families.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

We are pleased to report that Worthington Schools ended the 2023-2024 school year \$2.7 million under budget, reflecting a 1.5% savings. Due to voter support of the 2022 incremental operating levy, our financial outlook remains strong for the coming years.

As the state budget process begins this winter, we are optimistic that full implementation of the Fair School Funding Formula, with adjustments for inflation, could allow us to maintain our operations beyond 2026 before additional funding is needed.

Phase 1 of the high school construction is nearly complete, with ample contingency funds remaining. We are in a solid position to begin Phase 2 this fall.

We remain committed to responsible financial stewardship, ensuring a stable future for Worthington Schools.
