ARTS

- Music: Hotchkiss Philharmonic Orchestra, Hotchkiss Student Orchestra, Jazz Ensemble, several chamber ensembles, private music lessons, Hotchkiss Chorus, Gospel Choir, a cappella groups, the Hotchkiss in Madrid summer music festival, and an annual concert at Carnegie Hall
- Visual arts, photography, film, and related media: Equipped art studios for painting, architecture, ceramics, photography, and digital media. The Esther Eastman Music Center includes 13 practice rooms, 3 ensemble spaces, 10 classrooms, a professional recording studio, and the state-of-the-art, 715-seat Katherine M. Elfers Hall which features a 308 Fazoli Concert Grand Piano.

The Tremaine Art Gallery is a public, museum-quality exhibition space that hosts 6 shows per year.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

80+ student clubs, affinity groups, publications, community service organizations, and performance groups

- The oldest is St. Luke's Society, a service organization founded in 1892.
- Student publications include: *The Record, ink., The Narrative*, The Hotchkiss Review, No Limits, and Analogue Photo Magaine.
- Activities include award-winning Speech and Debate and Math Teams; Affinity groups and student clubs include: Black & Hispanic Student Alliance, Asian Cultural Club, Hillel, Gender & Sexuality Alliance; Political Union, Entrepreneurship Club, Science Olympiad, Blue & White Society, Student Environmental Action, Bring Change to Mind, Student-Faculty Council, and many other student-led groups.

ATHLETICS AND CO-CURRICULARS

The Forrest E. Mars Jr. Athletic Center (212,000 square feet) contains a field house, a 10-lane swimming pool and separate diving well, 2 ice hockey rinks (NHL and Olympic-size), 8 international-size squash courts, basketball courts, wrestling room, fitness center, and strength and conditioning facilities.

Additional facilities include: An award-winning 9-hole golf course; 15 outdoor and 3 indoor tennis courts; paddle tennis courts; climbing walls; multiple fields for soccer, field hockey, lacrosse, baseball, and Ultimate Frisbee, including 2 artificial turf fields; the 6-lane Hemingway Track; Sprole Field and Stadium; and sailing and rowing on Lake Wononscopomuc.
