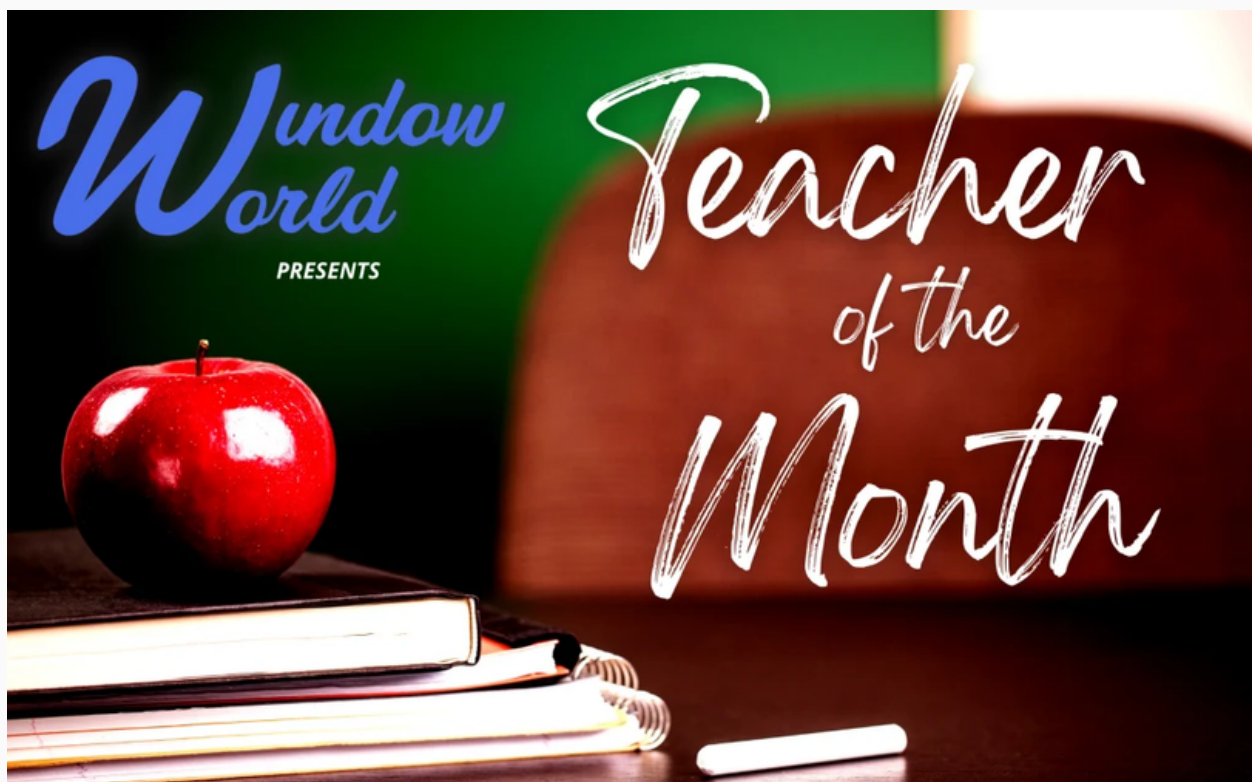

Dress Code Expectations



DRESS CODE - Our dress code has been developed to help students prepare for the world of work/college. The dress code has been developed with modesty and appropriateness in mind. According to the Horry County School District Policy, student dress must conform to the following regulations:

1. Attire must comply with requirements for health and safety. (This prohibits the wearing of chains and studded clothing or accessories.)
2. Hats/Headwear, sunglasses, headphones/earplugs, sweatbands, combs/picks, hoodies, headscarves, headgear, head coverings, and sunglasses are prohibited inside school buildings.
3. The possession of all bandanas is prohibited at ECHS.
4. Shoes must be worn at all times. No bedroom shoes/slippers are allowed at any time.
5. Pants & shirt must overlap at all times. Clothing should be worn so that undergarments are not visible.
6. Attire must not display any sexual behavior, sexual innuendos, or ethnic derogatoriness.
7. Items such as spiked jewelry (including body piercings), padlocks, chains, and metal heel plates are not allowed.
8. Attire must NOT evidence membership or affiliation with a "gang".
9. No vulgar, obscene or otherwise inappropriate symbols, language, pictures, or wording will be permitted on clothing or accessories. Clothing or accessories (ex. Bookbags, jewelry, hats, etc) that display weapons, alcohol, tobacco, or other drug symbols are not permitted. Clothing must not display any information about, representations of, or advertisements for alcoholic beverage(s), tobacco, controlled drugs, illegal drugs, or paraphernalia associated with the foregoing. Clothing which is controversial or disruptive is not allowed.
10. Attire must not be immodest, obscene, profane, lewd, vulgar, indecent, or offensive.
 - a. Shorts, skirts, and dresses, even with leggings, jeggings, etc. must NOT be shorter than the length of a dollar bill from the very top of the knee upward at all times. Slits/holes in clothing must also be no shorter than shorter than the length of a dollar bill from the very top of the knee upward. Leggings/jeggings must be covered with a top that meets the length of the dollar bill from the top of the knee requirement.
 - b. See-through clothing, bare midriff tops, backless blouses, shirts/tops with low necklines, halter-tops, spaghetti-strap tops, muscle shirts, and tank tops are prohibited. All shirts must cover the undergarments. It is never appropriate to show undergarments.
 - c. Gym shorts, cutoffs, bathing suits and short shorts are not appropriate at school.
 - d. Appropriate undergarments should be worn and should be covered by outer clothing.
 - e. No pajamas or pajama bottoms/pants are allowed.

** The ECH community asks that students follow the spirit of the policy and not just the letter of the restrictions. Questionable clothing will be handled on a case-by-case basis at the discretion of the administration and teachers.*

Consequences of breaking the dress code:

1st Offense: Student will be asked to come to the office and requested to change the inappropriate clothing, reverse the offending garment, or call parents. The student will not be allowed to return to class until the situation is corrected.

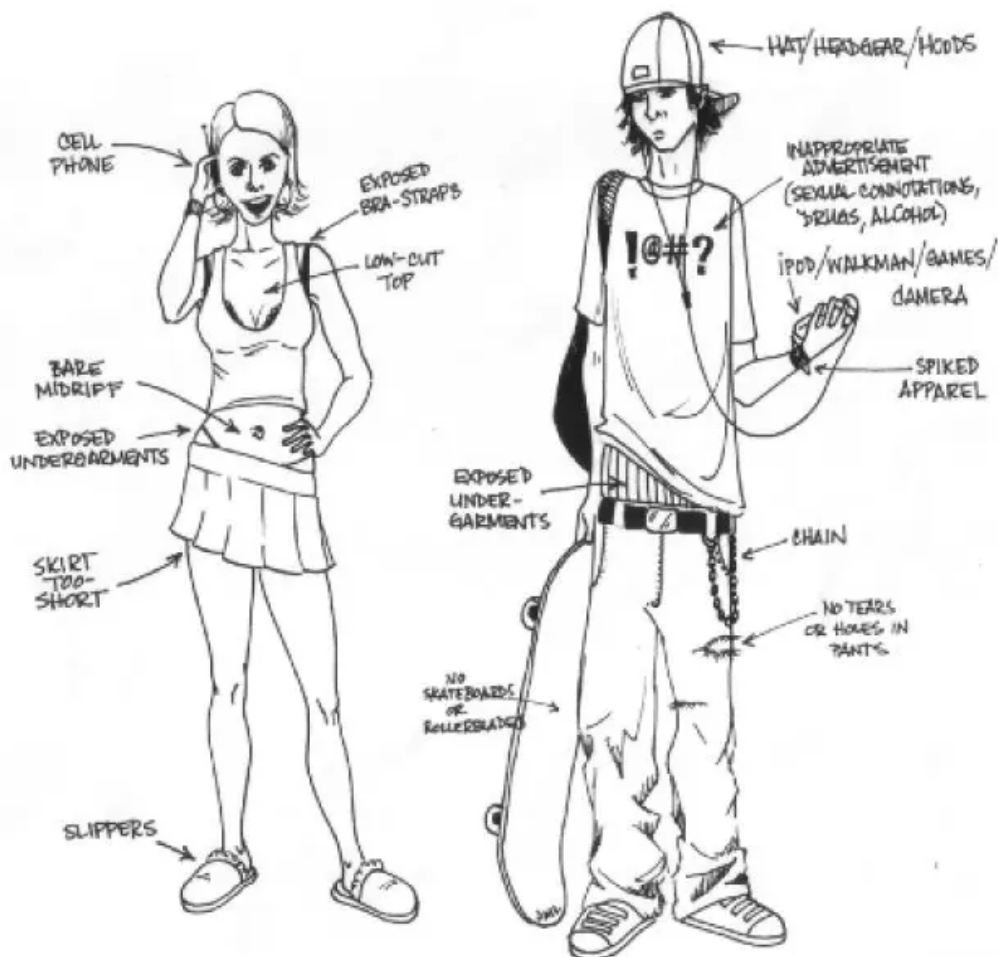
2nd Offense: Student will have to correct the dress code violation, parents will be notified, and the student will be assigned to afterschool administration detention. Additional discipline action will include, but not be limited to OSS and parent conference.

You must follow the instructions of the teacher or administrator regarding your dress. If you fail to do so, you will be written up for insubordination which makes the issue worse. If you feel that your dress was unfairly criticized, you may appeal to the principal.

DRESS CODE

In an effort to maintain a tasteful, academic atmosphere, bare feet, bare midriffs, bare backs, bare shoulders, ragged/shredded clothing, exposed underwear, underwear worn as outer wear, pajama/lounge pants, shirts or hats (caps) with literal figurative references to, or depictions of, illegal activities, sexual activities or performance of bodily functions are prohibited.

Beach and casual attire, such as tube tops, fishnet shirts, tops with narrow straps, backless tops, excessively short shorts/skirts, and sunglasses are also prohibited within the school setting. Shoulders must be covered. The hem of the shorts/skirt must reach the end of your fingertips when arms are down to your sides when standing.



Tardy Policy Expectations

ECCHS Tardy Policy

Students who are tardy to school should report to the main office.

- 1st Tardy – Warning
- 2nd Tardy – Students will be required to take the tardy policy home and have it signed by a parent/guardian
- 3rd Tardy – 2nd Warning
- 4th Tardy – Letter to parent
- 5th Tardy – Administrative Detention: 30 minutes
- 6th Tardy – Administrative Detention: 1 hour
- 7th Tardy – Administrative Detention: 2 hours



School Tardy Due To Late Bus

All students who arrive on a school bus after the 7:55 class start time will be issued a late bus pass from the main office. It is the student's responsibility to obtain this pass and present it to the classroom teacher. **The only excused tardy is for bus riders on a late bus or students with a medical or legal note.**

Excused Pass

Students that arrive to school with a medical or legal note should report to the office upon arrival for an excused tardy pass.

Does traffic and/or car problems count as an excused tardy?

No, traffic and mechanical issues are not excused reasons for tardiness. Be aware that some college courses will count excessive tardies as a full absence regardless of reason. Check your syllabus and plan accordingly.

Cell Phone Policy Expectations

Electronic Devices

CELL PHONES*

Cell Phone Use at School

Students may use cell phones and other electronic devices before 7:55, after 2:25, and during the student's lunch period. Cell phones and other electronic devices are prohibited during all instructional time. Teachers will establish classroom procedures for cell phone and electronic device usage and communicate this information to their students. Phones confiscated by teachers will be turned in to the office prior to the end of the day. The following consequences are in place for a violation:



1st offense: The phone will be confiscated, discipline infraction entered in PowerSchool, and parent notified of the incident.

2nd offense: The phone will be confiscated, discipline infraction entered in PowerSchool. The student's parent or guardian must come to the school to retrieve the device.

3rd offense: The phone will be confiscated, discipline infraction entered in PowerSchool. The student's parent or guardian must come to the school to retrieve the device and the student loses cell phone privileges at any time while on school grounds.

ECHS is not responsible for the loss, damage, or theft of any personal technology devices students choose to bring to school.

ECHS students who violate this policy while in a college classroom will be dealt with at the discretion of the college instructor and HGTC policy.

The unauthorized use of cell phones and other electronic devices to communicate or access information during classes or testing is prohibited. The use of cell phones and other electronic devices in locker rooms or restrooms is prohibited.

The use of audio or video recording capacity of any cell phone and other electronic devices is prohibited in locker rooms, restrooms, or during regular school hours without prior permission from the building administration.

Three learning resolutions boost academic success

The start of a new calendar year is a great time for families and students to review the first half of the school year. How is your high school student doing? Are learning and performance where your teen—and you—would like them to be? If not, it may be time for your teen to make learning resolutions.

Here are three to suggest:

1. **Be in every class on time** every day. Students who consistently miss class or who arrive late, miss out on important information. Teachers don't have time to reteach material every time a student is absent or late.
2. **Read for pleasure.** Teens benefit from time spent reading. Pleasure reading strengthens writing skills, comprehension, vocabulary and

more. According to the most recent report by from the National Assessment of Educational Progress, only 14 percent of students say they read for fun every day. So, encourage your teen to spend time each day reading something enjoyable.

3. **Reduce recreational screen time.** We all spend time on digital devices—whether it's for school, work or socializing. However, students need plenty of screen-free activities in their schedules. Suggest your teen turn off screen devices for at least one to two hours each day, and use that time to read, be active or relax.

Help your teen handle disappointment



Life doesn't always go as planned. Whether your teen earns a bad grade on a test or finds

out that social plans have been cancelled, learning to accept and cope with disappointment is a necessary part of life.

To help your teen bounce back after things go wrong:

- **Ask, "How are you feeling?"** Often, teenagers tend to either overreact or to clam up entirely. Help your teen express disappointment using words.
- **Don't try to fix things.** You won't help your teen learn coping skills. Instead, be sympathetic and supportive: "I'm so sorry that event was cancelled. I know you are disappointed. What else could you do?"
- **Demonstrate coping skills.** It may not be easy to share your personal disappointments. But it's one of the best ways to show your teen how you have learned to cope. "I am so disappointed that I didn't get that promotion," you might say. "I'm going to keep trying."

Since our high schools and program schools operate on a 4 x 4 block schedule, it is crucial that students miss as few days as possible.

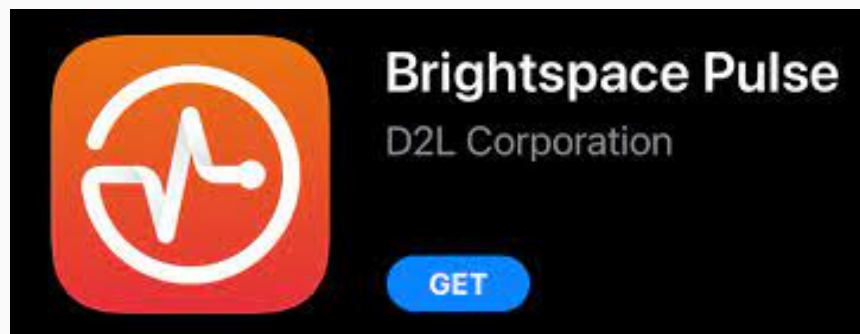

STANDARD RESPONSE PROTOCOL

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

Our school has adopted The "I Love U Guys" Foundation's Standard Response Protocol (SRP). Students and staff will be training, practicing, and drilling the protocol.

COMMON LANGUAGE

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP) is based on an all-hazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. Like the Incident Command System (ICS), SRP utilizes clear common language while allowing for flexibility in protocol.

The premise is simple - there are five specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive." Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff, teachers and first responders. The SRP is based on the following actions: Hold, Secure, Lockdown, Evacuate, and Shelter.

HOLD

"In Your Classroom or Area"

Students are trained to:

- Clear the hallways and remain in their area or room until the "All Clear" is announced
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Close and lock the door
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual



SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"

Students are trained to:

- Return to inside of building
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring everyone indoors
- Lock the outside doors
- Increase situational awareness
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual



LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

Students are trained to:

- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Recover students from hallway if possible
- Lock the classroom door
- Turn out the lights
- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door
- Prepare to evade or defend



EVACUATE

"To a Location"

Students are trained to:

- Leave stuff behind if required to
- If possible, bring their phone
- Follow instructions

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring roll sheet and Go Bag (unless instructed not to bring anything with them, dependent on reason for evacuation.)
- Lead students to Evacuation location
- Account for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.



SHELTER

"State Hazard and Safety Strategy"

Hazards might include:

- Tornado
- Hazmat
- Earthquake
- Tsunami

Safety Strategies might include:

- Evacuate to shelter area
- Seal the room
- Drop, cover and hold
- Get to high ground

Students are trained in:

- Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies

Adults and staff are trained in:

- Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies
- Accounting for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.





STANDARD RESPONSE PROTOCOL

PARENT GUIDANCE

In the event of a live incident, parents may have questions about their role.

SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"



Secure is called when there is something dangerous outside of the building. Students and staff are brought into the building and the outside doors will be locked. The school might display the Building is Secured poster on entry doors or nearby windows. Inside, it will be business as usual.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A SECURE EVENT?

Probably not. Every effort is made to conduct classes as normal during a secure event. Additionally, parents may be asked to stay outside during a Secure event.

WHAT IF PARENTS NEED TO PICK UP THEIR STUDENT?

Depending on the situation, it may not be safe to release the student. As the situation evolves, Secure might change to a Monitored Entry and/or Controlled Release.

WILL PARENTS BE NOTIFIED WHEN A SCHOOL GOES INTO SECURE?

When a secure event is brief or the hazard is non-violent, like a wild animal on the playground, there may not be a need to notify parents while the Secure is in place.

With longer or more dangerous events, the school should notify parents that the school has increased their security.

LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"



A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building. Students and staff are trained to enter or remain in a room that can be locked, and maintain silence.

A Lockdown is only initiated when there is an active threat inside or very close to the building.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A LOCKDOWN?

The natural inclination for parents is to go to the school during a Lockdown. Understandable, but perhaps problematic. If there is a threat inside the building, law enforcement will be responding. It is unlikely that parents will be granted access to the building or even the campus. If parents are already in the school, they will be instructed to Lockdown as well.

SHOULD PARENTS TEXT THEIR STUDENTS?

The school recognizes the importance of communication between parents and students during a Lockdown event. Parents should be aware though, during the initial period of a Lockdown, it may not be safe for students to text their parents. As the situation resolves, students may be asked to update their parents on a regular basis.

In some cases, students may be evacuated and transported off-site for a student-parent reunification.

WHAT ABOUT UNANNOUNCED DRILLS?

The school may conduct unscheduled drills, however it is highly discouraged to conduct one without announcing that it as a drill. That's called an unannounced drill and can cause undue concern and stress.

Parents should recognize that the school will always inform students that it is a drill during the initial announcement.

It's important to differentiate between a **drill** and an exercise. A drill is used to create the "Muscle Memory" associated with a practiced action. There is no simulation of an event; this is simply performing the action. An exercise simulates an actual event to test the capacity of personnel and equipment.

CAN PARENTS OBSERVE OR PARTICIPATE IN THE DRILLS?

The school welcomes parents who wish to observe or participate in drills.
