General Information/Athletic Code

I. Philosophy of Interscholastic Activities

Co-curricular activities at Onalaska High School are an integral part of the Onalaska High School curriculum. Participation is a privilege and should elicit great pride in both the student and his/her family. While the number one goal of a school district is to provide an excellent academic experience for all students, co-curricular activities provide unique opportunities for students to promote their mental, physical, social, and emotional development. By providing a strong co-curricular program, Onalaska High School extends the privilege of enriching the mind and body to any student meeting district, Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA), and any applicable governing body's requirements. Co-curricular participants who comply with this code of conduct demonstrate a desire to dedicate themselves to self-improvement as well as to enhance the best interests of fellow teammates, advisors/coaches, and the school. If accepted, this privilege carries certain responsibilities represented in this handbook.

II. Introduction to the Co-curricular Code

The Board of Education of the School District of Onalaska has approved this code to help students, parents/guardians, and the community clearly understand what is expected of anyone participating in co-curricular activities.

Along with this activities code students and parents are expected to attend a mandatory student-parent meeting that will be facilitated by the Onalaska High School Associate Principal/Activities Director at minimum once a year. The purpose of this meeting will be to review and explain the activities code and all of the requirements students participating in these activities must fulfill.

Finally, we encourage parents/guardians to review the contents of this activity code with their children. If you have any questions about the code please contact the activities office so that they can help you understand the contents of this document.

III. Athletic/Activity Code

- A. Duration - The activities code is in effect for the entire calendar year (WIAA Rule).
- B. Pre-Season Meeting - Once per academic year parents/guardians must review information provided by the Associate Principal/Activities Director. Information will cover all of the following, but will not be limited to the items below:
 - Review and explain the activities code and rules of eligibility.
 - Explain the procedure of physical examinations and insurance.
 - Explain the rules regarding distribution, maintenance, and return of activity

- equipment.
 - Acknowledge the possibility of injury as a result of participation in activities.
- C. Activities Participation Agreement - All student participants must submit online verification of documents signed by themselves and their parent(s), indicating they have received the Activities/Athletic Handbook and are aware of the rules, regulations, and policies regarding activity participation.
- D. Physical Examinations/Insurance - Athletes may not practice or participate in interscholastic athletics until the school has proper documentation attesting to:
- Parental permission each school year.
 - Acknowledgment that the School District of Onalaska does not provide accident, medical or dental insurance for student-athletes.
 - Current physical examination by a medical provider.
 - Examinations performed after April 1 of the current year are good for the following two school years. A physical form signed by the physician, parent/guardian, and student is required for the first year of eligibility
 - Example - A student who received a physical examination on April 2, 2018, and turned in a physical form signed by the attending physician or APNP, would be covered for the 2019-2020 school year. That same physical would cover the 2020-2021 school year after the parent/guardian and student complete the online registration.
 - Examinations performed before April 1 of the current year are good for the remainder of that school year and the following school year.
 - Example - A student who received a physical examination on March 31, 2024, and turned in a physical form signed by the attending physician or APNP, would be covered for the remainder of the 2024-2025 school year. That same physical would cover the 2025-2026 school year.
- E. Emergency Medical Information - All participants must complete emergency medical information online before the first practice. Coaches/Advisors will carry this information with them to all competitions. You may register online at <https://onalaska-ar.rschooltoday.com/>
- F. Injury Possibility - Participation in co-curricular activities can result in injury. These injuries could include minor injuries such as bruises or abrasions, muscle strains, sprains, or broken limbs. Although all precautions are taken, catastrophic injury causing paraplegia, quadriplegia, or death could occur.
- G. Concussion and Head Injury/Sudden Cardiac Arrest Information Agreement - Each year, athletes and their parent/legal guardian must sign this agreement online for the athlete to participate in a High School sport.
- H. School Attendance - See page 15 of this handbook for the details explaining school attendance and participation in performances/competitions.

- I. Academic Eligibility - See page 14 of this handbook for the details explaining school academic eligibility and participation in performance/competitions.
- J. Travel - All participants are expected to travel to and from the activities with the team and/or coach when transportation is provided. Participants could be allowed to use alternate transportation by having their parents/guardians complete forms provided by the school district. The school district does not provide transportation to practices.
- K. Wednesday Night Activities - Per School Board Policy 5851, activities on Wednesday evenings will conclude by 6:00 p.m. This includes all team activities, not just practice. Any exceptions must be waived by the District Administrator.
- L. Specific Team Rules - Coaches or Advisors of individual activities may establish more specific rules for their programs with the approval of the administration. Any specific training rules and other regulations set up by individual coaches shall be written, on file with the Activities Director, and available to all members of the squad. Items that may be covered include but not limited to: conduct, actions, appearance, diet, practice attendance, curfew, etc.
- WIAA, Conference, and school rules will also apply to activity participants.
 - Coaches Rules may not supersede National, State, WIAA, conference, or school rules.
 - Notification - Copies of specific rules will be provided and explained to all participants before or during the first practice.
 - Per School Board Policy-2431.01, co-curricular activities are restricted to maximum sizes. Due to these parameters, it is sometimes necessary for teams or groups to make cuts when they are developing rosters. The following guidelines will be followed when cuts are necessary:
 - Before the first evaluation of the participants takes place, an explanation will be given to the participants outlining the expectations and guidelines of the evaluation.
 - Once final cuts have been made, contact must be made with participants that have been cut prior to any posting of the final rosters. This contact must be through a conversation with the individual.
 - Coaches/advisors may limit the number of activity participants to less than the maximum number prescribed at the high school level with administrative approval. Coaches/advisors may not limit the number of activity participants to less than the maximum number prescribed at the middle school level, unless there are a set number of participants based on the number of roles or homerooms. (For example, drama or student council.)
- M. Accumulation of Penalties - Penalties accumulated before completion of middle school will not be carried over to the high school. Penalties at the high school will accumulate.
- N. Equipment - The school attempts to provide both the best and safest equipment. Students are expected to take excellent care of this equipment. The original equipment issued to you must be returned at the close of the season. The care and maintenance

of equipment will be the co-responsibility of participants and the school district.

- Participants are responsible for immediately returning equipment at the end of the season.
 - Students will be held responsible for any lost, damaged, or misplaced gear. Parents are asked to see that students return to school any athletic equipment or towels not purchased by the individual. Fines for the replacement of equipment or uniforms will be assessed when participants lose or do not return equipment that is property of the School District of Onalaska.
 - Fines will be determined by the Athletic Department based upon the replacement cost of the items that are not returned.
 - Individual awards may be withheld if equipment is not returned promptly.
- O. Participation - Conflicts with activity participation shall be worked out with individual students and their coaches or advisors. These solutions must be agreeable to all involved or the participant shall choose one activity. A student may participate in only one school-sponsored interscholastic sport at a time.
- P. Bullying, Harassment, and Hazing - Students who feel they have been victims of bullying, harassment, or hazing, should report the incident to any High School Administrator and/or Coach immediately. Any form of bullying, harassment, or hazing will not be tolerated. Board policies 5517.01 and 5500.02 will be followed when determining action.
- Q. Conflict Resolution Chain of Command - When there is a concern or questions regarding an activity, the school district deems the most effective format to follow to work towards resolving the concerns is through the following chain of command:
Step One: Student and Coach/Advisor talk addressing the concern
Step Two: Student, parent and Coach/Advisor talk about addressing the concern
Step Three: Student, parent and Coach/Advisor talk while the Associate Principal/Activities Director mediates while addressing the concern

IV. Conduct Expectations

- A. Participants shall refrain from conduct, which violates the ideals, principles, and standards of the School District of Onalaska. Students violating these expectations may lose eligibility in activities.
- B. Violations of ethical and behavioral ideals, principles, and standards include negative and/or illegal acts against persons or property, and involvement in acts, which are viewed as contrary to accepted moral and legal standards. These standards include but are not limited to, severe profanity, abusive language, vandalism, fighting, cheating on tests or school work, theft, etc.
- C. When a violation of the conduct rules is suspected, the administrative team will:
1. Review the case.

2. Notify the parents/guardians of the participants and inform them that the participants are implicated.
 3. Determine if certain actions by participants are violations of these conduct rules.
 4. Determine penalties for violations.
- D. The presiding administrator will send the parents/guardians a letter explaining the violation and the penalty. Any student accused of a co-curricular violation may appear before the Co-curricular Council to appeal the decision. The Activities Director must receive a request from the student involved or coach/advisor of the Student involved within one week of the suspension. The Council will rule on each case it hears by a simple majority vote.

WIAA Athletic Eligibility

Onalaska High School, as a member of WIAA, follows all guidelines and rules of eligibility as described in the WIAA Handbook. These guidelines include topics such as Residence and Transfer, Age, Amateur Status, Attendance and Scholarship, Non-School Participation, and Health and Behavior. A copy of the WIAA Handbook is available in the office of the Activities Director.

The Board of Education recognizes the importance of protecting the privacy interests of the District's students and is committed to safeguarding students' privacy in the locker room facilities.

Co-Curricular Code

Coach/Advisor-Student Relationship

The Coach/Advisor is expected to conduct themselves as professionals and adults in all dealings with students. In this context, the coach/advisor will do everything possible to sustain positive student relationships. The use of sarcasm, ridicule, insults, profanity, belittling statements, or sustained yelling will not be tolerated in the school environment.

Athletic Awards

1. Specific criteria for the awarding of letters in any sport will be determined by the coach before the season. A written copy of the criteria will be on file with the Activities Director and should be available to each athlete.
2. A list of letter winners is to be presented to the Activities Director upon request. (This is usually done as part of the end-of-the-season report but spring sports winners are requested in time for preparation for the Athletic Awards Program). A record of letter awards is kept on file by the Activities Director.
3. A senior all-sports plaque will be presented to all graduating seniors who have earned seven Varsity letters or have participated in ten athletic seasons. Student-athletes cannot earn two letters in one season. (i.e. lettering in boys tennis and lettering as a girls soccer manager)

4. A white letter will be awarded the first time an athlete earns a letter. A metal sports identification insert will also be received at this time. Metal service bars will be awarded for subsequent letters earned. Replacement letters, pins, and metal sports identification inserts may be purchased at cost by athletes.
5. An "Outstanding Senior Athlete of the Year" award is presented to a boy and a girl each spring. The coaching staff and faculty select the winners.
6. The staff gives a special "Coaches Award" each year to an individual who displays an exceptional attitude and the desire necessary to inspire teammates around them. Athletic ability is but one item taken into consideration. Of equal importance are honesty, integrity, determination, effort, and the willingness to listen and learn.

Use of cameras and other recording devices in locker rooms

The Board of Education recognizes the importance of protecting the privacy interests of the District's students and is committed to safeguarding students' privacy in the locker room facilities.

As required by law, the Board establishes the following locker room privacy policy. Please see Board Policy 9151 for further information.

Code of Conduct Violations

Code of Conduct Violations will apply to each student-athlete on a year-round (12-month) basis in all locations, including non-school activities. Violation of the Code will result in penalties, which are consistent with those identified within the Code as determined by the school board and activities director. All Code of Conduct Violations will be cumulative beginning with a student's initial participation on a freshman, junior varsity, varsity reserve or varsity team.

Criminal Behavior

Co-curricular eligibility will follow the WIAA policy for any student charged and/or convicted of a felony. For misdemeanors, if the school district has adequate and competent evidence that the student participated in the offense for which he or she is charged, a penalty may be imposed under this Code before the completion of the criminal proceeding. **If the school district does not have such evidence and the student is convicted of a crime, the penalty under this code will be imposed upon conviction.** In the latter case, the student may continue to participate in his/her activity until resolution of the matter by the judicial system.

Chemical Health Violation

A chemical health violation includes Possession, Use, Buying, Selling, and/or Being Under the Influence of Any Drugs and Drug Paraphernalia: (Note drugs are defined as tobacco, alcohol, illegal drugs, performance-enhancing drugs, or medications without a prescription or use not in accordance to prescription directions.)

Presence in a bar or tavern

Being present or loitering in a bar or tavern without a student's parents/guardian.

Presence at a party

Presence at a party or gathering where alcohol or drugs are being illegally consumed: If a co-curricular participant attends a party where alcohol or drugs are being illegally dispensed, the student must LEAVE IMMEDIATELY. To remain in the presence of this illegal activity shall constitute a violation of the code of conduct.*

Note: Co-curricular participants should encourage as many classmates as possible to leave with them. **The intent of the “presence at a party” is not to deny participation with adult family members in gatherings such as weddings, anniversaries, or other family gatherings.*

Hosts of Parties Lose the Most

There will be a greater consequence for a co-curricular participant if it is determined, who is involved in the organization, facilitation, promotion, or hosting of any gathering or social event where alcohol or drugs were known to be available or used.

Cyber Image Policy

Any identifiable image, photo, or video that implicates a co-curricular participant to have been in possession or presence of alcohol and/or drugs or portrays actual use, or out-of-character behavior or crime, shall be confirmation of a violation of the code. Since there is no way to establish a timeframe for when or the location of where the image was taken, it shall be a responsibility that the co-curricular participant must assume. It must also be noted that there may be persons, who would attempt to implicate a co-curricular participant, by taking such images, to place them in a situation where they might violate this code standard. This is our rationale for demanding that our co-curricular participants not place themselves in such environments.

A. Eligibility

1. Academic Eligibility - First-quarter, first-semester, third-quarter, and second-semester grades will be used to determine eligibility.
 - A student is ineligible if he/she has received more than one failing grade and/or incomplete in the latest grading period. This ineligibility shall be for a minimum of 15 scheduled school days and nights beginning with the day the office provides the activities director with the grade printout. A student may regain eligibility by meeting the academic standard between the 16th and 20th day of ineligibility.
 - Students with incomplete grades will regain eligibility immediately if incompletes are made up within two weeks. Extenuating circumstances must be approved by the administration.
 - The academic standard is defined as no more than one failing grade or incomplete.
2. A student may erase a second-semester ineligibility status by making up failures during the summer months.
3. A student who is enrolled in any state-approved Special Education program and receives no usual grade for such courses, may be eligible if he/she is making satisfactory progress in

his/her total school program as indicated by his/her IEP.

4. Eligibility for fall activities will be based on passing grade requirements in the previous school year's second semester period.
5. Seniors/Students who graduate at semester are no longer eligible for interscholastic participation.

School Attendance - Students must be in school and participate in class on the day of a performance/competition or practice to be eligible for that day's activity.

- Students with a medical excuse may participate if the absence is excused by the administration and provided the student is in attendance for at least half of the scheduled school day. (Written verification may be requested from physician/dentist)
 - Students with a family emergency may participate if the absence is excused by the administration.
 - Students' attendance marked as "Personal" or "Parent Choice" for more than half the scheduled school day may not participate that day.
 - Students attending a college visit may participate that day provided they show proof of the visit and/or have made prior arrangements with the attendance office.
 - An unexcused absence(s), truant(s) or multiple tardiness, during a season, will be reviewed by the coach/advisor, activities director, and administration and will result in suspension from the next contest, performance, or event.
 - When students are marked unverified, they can participate. If it is concluded that they were truant, the result will be suspension from the next contest, performance, or event.
 - Participation in a co-curricular activity is not an excuse for less than full school attendance the following day.
 - Students who receive a citation for truancy will be subject to penalties determined by the administration that may range from no penalty to the maximum that is suspension through graduation.
6. If a student is suspended from school for any reason, this suspension shall include any practices, performances, and competitions that occur during this time. This includes in-school suspension. It shall be at the prerogative of the administration, if the student receives an out-of-school suspension, to determine the eligibility of the student to participate in their next event.
 7. It shall be the coach/advisor or administration's prerogative to suspend any student from a squad whom they consider a demoralizing influence or a detriment to the objectives of that activity. A student may not be removed from a squad without the approval of the Principal or Associate Principal.
 8. Home School Student Participation: Home school students are eligible to participate in co-curricular activities as stated under 2015 Wisconsin Act 55. The Onalaska School Board allows home-based private educational program pupils residing in the school district to participate in interscholastic athletics or extracurricular activities on the same basis and to the same extent as pupils enrolled in a public school district. Home-based private educational program pupils must provide the school board with a written statement that the pupil meets the school board's requirements for participation in interscholastic athletics

based on age and academic and disciplinary records. No person may provide a false statement, and the school board may not question the accuracy or validity of the statement or request additional information. A school board may charge participation fees to a home-based private educational program pupil participation in a district activity on the same basis and to the same extent as these fees are charged to pupils enrolled in the district.

B. Tobacco, Alcohol and Controlled Substance Violations

All suspensions will be rounded up if they result in a fraction.

Groups I and II

1. Level I

- A. Use, possession, purchase or personal sale of alcohol, tobacco, drug paraphernalia, electronic cigarettes or any controlled substance will result in suspension for one-third of the season's contests/performances and required participation in a district-approved drug/alcohol/tobacco education program. If a student is involved in multiple Group 1, 2, or 3 activities, it will also result in suspension for one-third of each season's contests/performances (e.g. Show Choir and Basketball, or Dance Team and National Honor Society).
- B. Attendance at events or parties where alcohol or controlled substances are being illegally used by minors will result in suspension from the next scheduled Co-curricular activity. Students who make a reasonable effort to remove themselves from such a situation will not be considered in violation.
- C. The suspended individual will be expected to practice during this suspension and finish the season in good standing.

2. Level II

- A. Use, possession, purchase or personal sale of alcohol, tobacco, drug paraphernalia, electronic cigarettes or any controlled substance will result in suspension for one full season's contests and participation in a district-approved drug/alcohol/tobacco education program.
- B. This suspension could be reduced to one-half season contests if the individual takes part in an assessment program at the expense of the student-athlete. If a student is involved in multiple Group 1, 2, or 3 activities, it will also result in suspension for one-half of each season's contests/performances (e.g. Show Choir and Basketball, or Dance Team, and National Honor Society). Attendance at events or parties where alcohol or controlled substances are being illegally used by minors will result in suspension from the next scheduled Co-curricular activity and required participation in a district-approved drug/alcohol/tobacco education program. Students who make a reasonable effort to remove themselves from such a situation will not be considered in violation.
- C. The suspended individual will be expected to practice during this suspension and finish the season in good standing.

3. Level III

- A. Attendance at events or parties where alcohol or controlled substances are

being illegally used by minors will result in suspension from the next scheduled Co-curricular activity and required participation in a district-approved drug/alcohol/tobacco education program. Students who make a reasonable effort to remove themselves from such a situation will not be considered in violation.

- B. Use, possession, purchase or personal sale of alcohol, tobacco, drug paraphernalia, electronic cigarettes or any controlled substance will result in suspension for one calendar year.

Group III

1. Level I

- A. Use, possession, purchase or personal sale of alcohol, tobacco, drug paraphernalia, electronic cigarettes or any controlled substance will result in suspension from all meetings and activities for nine weeks and required participation in a district-approved drug/alcohol/tobacco education program.
- B. Attendance at events or parties where alcohol or controlled substances are being illegally used by minors will result in suspension from the next scheduled co-curricular activity. Students who make a reasonable effort to remove themselves from such a situation will not be considered in violation.

2. Level II

- A. Use, possession, purchase or personal sale of alcohol, tobacco, drug paraphernalia, electronic cigarettes or any controlled substance will result in suspension from all meetings and activities for one calendar year and participation in a district-approved drug/alcohol/tobacco education program.
- B. This suspension could be reduced to one-half calendar year if the individual takes part in a district-approved assessment program.
- C. Attendance at events or parties where alcohol or controlled substances are being illegally used by minors will result in suspension from the next scheduled co-curricular activity. Students who make a reasonable effort to remove themselves from such a situation will not be considered in violation.

Groups IV and V

Group IV and V Co-Curriculars are not regulated by the Activities Code. Teachers /advisors of these groups may establish their own rules and regulations for these organizations. These rules and regulations must be written, approved by the administration, and distributed in written form to the members of these groups.

C. Enforcement of Activities/Athletic Code

- 1. Enforcement of the co-curricular code will be based on the following:
 - A. Self-admission
 - B. Violations reported to the school by law enforcement officials.
 - C. Violations reported by the media.

- D. Violations reported by teachers or coaching staff members, parents, students, members of the community or other school officials. These reports of violations must be written and signed by the person witnessing the violation and presented to the Principal, Associate Principal, or Activities Director.
 - E. The administrative team may conduct an investigation based on reasonable suspicion of a code violation. Parents will be notified of the findings and outcome of the investigation.
2. Any student accused of a co-curricular violation may appear before the Co-curricular Council to appeal the decision. A request from the student involved or coach/advisor of the student involved must be received by the Activities Director within one week of the suspension. The Council will rule on each case it hears by a simple majority vote.
 3. The School District of Onalaska Activities Council shall consist of the high school principal, school resource officer, one high school coach/advisor, one high school staff non-coach, one high school guidance counselor or social worker, and one school board member. The Activities Director or high school administrator shall preside but not vote. Alternates shall be provided so the coach or advisor of the student involved does not serve on the council. The council may mitigate the consequence/suspension within WIAA minimums.
 4. Parents will be notified by letter of violations and suspensions as soon as possible.
 5. A record of violations will be kept by the Activities Director.
 6. If an athlete commits a code violation during the sports season he/she is participating in and out of the activity due to an injury/doctor excuse, the athlete can serve his/her suspension simultaneously.
