# Rigor of Student's Academic Program

To contextualize the depth and challenge of a student's coursework for colleges, Winchester Thurston School categorizes each student's academic rigor on the Secondary School Report as: College Preparatory, Demanding, Very Demanding or Most Demanding.

## **Discipline Reporting Policy**

Students must truthfully disclose disciplinary violations on college applications. Upon request from colleges, WT reports incidents from grades 9-12 resulting in probation, suspension, or expulsion.

<u>School Overview</u>: Established 1887; Pre-K-12 independent, coeducational, college preparatory day school in Pittsburgh, PA. 100% of graduates typically attend four-year colleges/universities in the United States and abroad.

<u>Campus and Enrollment</u>: Lower, Middle, and Upper Schools in the Shadyside neighborhood of Pittsburgh, near Carnegie Mellon and University of Pittsburgh. -685 students (Jr. Pre-K-12), 300 in grades 9-12

<u>Distinguished Curriculum: Real-World Connections and Innovation:</u> Winchester Thurston's curriculum emphasizes educational innovation, rigorous academics, and real-world connections. Students engage in community-oriented learning while developing college-level skills. The program focuses on complex problem-solving, critical analysis and communication, creative thinking, and independent research. This approach prepares students to tackle multifaceted ideas and apply knowledge to real-world challenges.

Joan Clark Davis Center for Interdisciplinary Learning: Opened in 2023-2024, this facility enhances project-based and community-based learning, fostering collaboration across humanities, engineering, arts, and sciences. It also expands the school's renowned City as Our Campus program, connecting students with diverse mentors from Pittsburgh's academic, cultural, scientific, non-profit, and business sectors.

# Winchester Thurston School Academic Program Notes (Class of 2025)

Winchester Thurston's <u>rigorous, college-preparatory curriculum</u> encourages juniors and seniors to pursue their interests through <u>diverse</u> <u>topics-based and project-based courses</u>. Grounded in the credo "Think also of the comfort and the rights of others," WT's evolving academic offerings foster an equitable and inclusive learning environment. This approach <u>develops individuals of strong character prepared for the demands of a changing world</u>.

#### **Graduation Requirements**

- -Transition to Semester Calendar (2023): Credit counting changed, but diploma requirements remain similar.
- -Students are expected to take at least 5 core courses annually.
- -Most exceed this baseline, either maintaining 5 (maximum 6) core courses throughout high school or doubling up in one discipline after completing requirements in another.

#### **Academic Schedule**

-Block Schedule: 5-day, A & B week with 80-minute core courses on alternating days.

# **Grade Reporting to Colleges**

- -First-quarter grades: Available upon request in mid-November
- -First-semester (mid-year) grades: Late January
- -Final grades: Mid-June

#### **AP Course & Exam Policy**

-AP exams are optional for all students enrolled in an AP course.

### **Independent Projects**

-Seniors may design a semester-long, credit-bearing project with a faculty mentor in any discipline, exploring interests beyond standard offerings.

#### **AP Course Phase-Out**

From 2022 to 2025, Winchester Thurston is replacing AP offerings with advanced, mission-aligned courses. These new courses maintain AP-level rigor while allowing for deeper exploration and expanded interdisciplinary opportunities. As a result, in 24-25, certain AP classes previously available to seniors have been replaced with alternative advanced courses. Changes are noted in the below department sections. This transition reflects WT's commitment to providing challenging, innovative curricula tailored to our student's needs and aligned with our educational philosophy, ensuring seniors continue to have access to high-level coursework that prepares them for college and beyond.

#### **English, 4 years**

- -11th and 12th-grade topic courses match AP English Literature & Composition rigor
- -AP English Language & Composition replaced in 23-24 by "The Art of Persuasion: Advanced Topics in Rhetoric and Composition"
- -Topic-based courses vary annually

## **Mathematics, 3 years**

- -Advanced Statistics and Data Science (AP Statistics-level rigor)
- -Most Rigorous courses:
  - -Advanced Topics in Mathematics (3-year rotation): Differential Equations (22-23); Discrete Mathematics (21-22, 24-25); Multivariable Calculus (23-24)

#### **World Languages & Cultures, through Level 3**

- -Requirement: 2 years minimum in Upper School (if entering at Level 3+)
- -Languages: Chinese, French, Latin, Spanish
- -Advanced Seminars:
  - -Replace AP World Language courses
  - -Maintain AP-level rigor
  - -Feature rotating topics for continued study

## Computer Science, 1 year (2 semesters)

- -Most Rigorous Computer Science course: Algorithm Design -AP Computer Science A phased out in 23-24, replaced with
- Computer Languages & Structures.

## Malone Schools Online Network (MSON)

- MSON offers academically challenging courses to motivated 11th and 12th-grade students, enhancing WT's curriculum.

While these classes don't fulfill WT's graduation requirements, they are graded and appear as additional credits on the WT transcript, providing students with opportunities to explore advanced and specialized topics.

## History & Social Sciences, 3 years

- -U.S. History requirement: 9th grade Multicultural America
- -11th and 12th-grade topic courses match AP U.S. History rigor
- -AP U.S. History phased out in 23-24, replaced by diverse topic courses
- -Class of 2025: last to take AP European History as sophomores (22-23)
- -Topic-based course offerings vary annually

## Science (Lab-based), 3 years

- -Course Sequence: Physics (9th) → Chemistry (10th) → Biology (11th)
- -Advanced Courses:
- -Most AP/Advanced courses share the same block
- -Biotechnology (AP Biology-level rigor)
- -Advanced Chemistry (replaced AP Chemistry in 23-24)

## Arts (Performing & Visual Arts), 1 year (2 semesters)

- -Wide variety of courses available
- -Performance Ensembles
  - -Pass/fail
- -Do not fulfill graduation requirements
- -AP Art History phased out in 23-24; no full-year replacement in 24-25

# Grade Level Seminar, 4 years (pass/fail)

-This required four-year program focuses on academic skills, social-emotional learning, and physical health and wellness. In December of junior year, the seminar transitions to a College Counseling focus, supporting students through the college search, application, and matriculation process.

## **EE Ford Educational Leadership Grant**

Winchester Thurston School received a 2023 E.E. Ford Educational Leadership Grant, becoming only the second school to receive this award twice. The grant will fund a transformative, multi-week, project-based summer experience rooted in WT's City as Our Campus program.

This initiative, developed in partnership with other Pittsburgh area schools, aims to deepen community impact and provide students from WT and public schools with access to innovative learning experiences beyond the traditional school year and classroom setting.
