

Our schools add tremendous value to the community. In turn, your continued support significantly impacts how we will prepare our students for the future. Every property owner in the Duneland School Corporation contributes to student success in two ways:

1. Property Taxes


You likely noticed that your property tax bill increased this spring. This is <u>NOT</u> due to school construction projects. Your property value has gone up and your taxes reflect the assessed valuation increase. Figure 1 below outlines a property tax bill for a home assessed at the median in the school district.



The Duneland School Board has prioritized keeping the school tax rate flat (see Figure 2 below).







Note: The average total school tax rate in the State of Indiana for taxes payable in 2023 is \$1.0585.

The money spent on recent K-8 capital improvements was captured from expiring debt used to finance the high school in 1999. As a result, the school corporation was able to address needs at the K-8 buildings without negatively impacting the tax rate.

2. Referendum Tax

Due to the lack of financial support from the State of Indiana, the Duneland Community has supported the school corporation with a twenty-two cents (\$0.22) tax levy originally approved in 2012, and continued in 2019, for the purpose of maintaining the current educational and operational programs in the school corporation. This general operating fund referendum makes up 11% of the district budget and will be considered for renewal in 2026. We are grateful to the Duneland community for partnering with us to help define the skills, attitudes, and credentials students need to excel in a 21st Century workforce.

In 2009, School General Fund levies were eliminated, and the Indiana Department of Education assumed full control of School General Fund funding. In May 2012, voters approved Duneland School Corporation's operating referendum tax rate in an amount not to exceed \$0.2200, which went into effect in 2013 and was renewed in May 2019. Per the 2024 1782 Notice.

Per the 2024 1782 Notice. The estimated total school tax rates for 2025 – 2027 assume (i) the School Corporation's operating referendum is levied through 2027; (ii) the School Corporation levies the maximum operations fund levy, which in 2025 is projected to be 4.0% per HEA 1499, with projected levies in 2026 and thereafter based upon projected maximum levy growth quotients provided by Policy Analytics, LLC; and (iii) estimated debt service levies based upon existing debt service/lease rental payments and assumes the School Corporation utilizes available debt service fund operating balance to manage the total school tax rate. Estimated tax rates for 2025 – 2027 are based upon the 2024 certified net and referendum assessed valuations, with 3.39% annual growth assumed thereafter. Assumes a license excise/financial institutions tax factor of 5.66%, based upon the 2024 1782 Notice. Tax rates per \$100 of net assessed valuation.



GUARANTEED VIABLE CURRICULUM

The Duneland School Corporation (DSC) has made it a priority to establish a Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum (GVC) across all content areas from kindergarten through 12th grade. This initiative ensures that every student in the district has access to a learning experience that emphasizes prioritized standards, an engaging curriculum, and

aligned assessments. DSC proudly celebrates the completion of over 90 courses developed by our dedicated teachers for the benefit of our students.

Moving forward, the district will leverage Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to adjust, add, and remove courses and course content as needed over time. The corporation is committed to supporting collaborative learning communities to ensure that ALL students receive a high-quality, aligned, and equitable education. Duneland's GVC is the product of the hard work accomplished within PLC meetings. The district's commitment to the PLC process also ensures that teachers will continue to have protected time dedicated to designing, developing,





and evaluating lessons and assessments that support the growth of ALL students.

Another key component of the learning continuum is the system by which Duneland monitors student success through the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) process. There are three important pieces to the MTSS system which include the following:

1. Response to Intervention (Rtl): This involves teacher observation and monitoring of student progress to ensure every student is receiving the support needed to be successful.

2. Social Emotional Learning (SEL): This provides students with support and tools that build self-awareness and empathy for others and the world around them.

3. Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS): This includes school-wide incentives to create positive learning environments for students.

The successful creation of courses and the development of the Duneland Guaranteed Viable Curriculum is a true point of pride for the Duneland School Corporation community. It is supported by a Multi-Tiered System of Support teachers and administrators.

EXCEPTIONAL LEARNING

The Department of Exceptional Learning had a great first year as an integrated part of the Duneland School Corporation. We have been emphasizing:

- Increasing student access to the general education curriculum and environment •
- Redesigning programs and services for students with intensive emotional and behavioral needs with the help of a district committee made up of staff from all levels.
- Expanding programs for students with applied skills needs and emotional and behavioral needs so that students can remain in their home school to the greatest extent possible.
- Delivering professional development in co-teaching, verbal de-escalation skills, and trauma informed practices.
- Increasing the level of collaboration between staff at all levels and disciplines.

We are just getting started, and with the new 2024-2028 Strategic Plan in place, there are a number of other initiatives and projects in the works for the next 3-5 years. There will be additional training for teachers and instructional assistants so that they are better equipped to meet the needs of students; and a greater focus on improving behavioral supports and transition planning for student life after high school.

The Trojan Learning Center (TLC) is an organizational structure within the Duneland School Corporation that includes programs for students age zero to graduation. TLC programs include early childhood, alternative learning (Rise Academy), and Duneland's online school (Northwest Indiana Online School). The TLC Main Office, Early Childhood and the NWIOS testing location are located at 601 W. Morgan Avenue. The entrance can be accessed at Door 9 located in south parking area of the Duneland Administration Center. The alternative learning program for the Duneland School Corporation is located at the TLC Annex Building, 411 S. 5th Street.

EARLY LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Did you know that Duneland School Corporation's Birth-to-School (B2S) initiative is the first of its kind in Porter County? The Duneland Early Learning HUB has been expanding every year since its launch in January 2022.

Unlike traditional preschools, the HUB invites caregivers and children to learn and play together. During the 2023-2024 school year, an average of 200 children and 150 caregivers participated weekly in various HUB activities. The HUB provides a range of free activities, resources, and educational opportunities from Trojan Music & Motion to Young Explorers, Monday through Friday during the school year.

The HUB is free for all Duneland families with children from birth to kindergarten. The HUB believes caregivers are a child's first teachers, learning starts at birth, and children learn best through play. The HUB is all about Helping, Understanding, and Building connections in our community.

In 2023-2024, the Early Learning Center added Developmental Preschool classes for 3-5 year olds with Individual Education Plans (IEPs) and Preschool Speech for gualifying children.



Student Performance - ILEARN Scores

Duneland Schools continue to demonstrate growth and achievement in our overall proficiency on the Indiana standardized assessments IREAD and ILEARN English/Language Arts and Math. On the Spring 2024 English/Language Arts and Math ILEARN assessments. Duneland students ranked in Indiana's Top 10 school districts (public, private, and charter schools).

Purple Star Recognition

All of the Duneland Schools have been designated as Purple Star schools by the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) for their significant display of commitment to service members, veterans, students and families connected to our nation's military.

2024-2025 Family Friendly Schools

Each of the Duneland Schools have maintained their designation as Family Friendly Schools from the IDOE since 2022 and each school has met either the Excelling or Progressing criteria. This state program recognizes schools that excel in involving families and communities in the educational process. The purpose of the program is to focus on addressing the academic. physical, emotional, and social needs of students while providing the needed resources and fostering the active involvement of their families through schools and the community.

National Merit Scholarship Program

Four CHS seniors, Jai Barath, Adrian Dooley, Matthew Haubold, and Payton Whalen, were named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists and all four advanced to finalists in the Spring 2024. Three of the finalists received a college or corporate-sponsored merit scholarship to the college/university of their choice. In addition, two CHS seniors, David McGrogan and Nicholas VanWagner, were named Commended Students in the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program.

2024 Best High School - U.S. News & World

Chesterton Senior High School is a 2024 Best High School, based on rankings that U.S. News & World Report published in April.

2024 Best Public High School in Region

Chesterton High School was voted the 'Best Public High School of the Region' in The Times Best of Region 2024 Competition. This is the 2nd year in a row CHS has been awarded this accolade.

Class of 2024 Rising Stars

Four CHS juniors, Kaitlyn Downs, Quinn Fleming, Alaina McGrogan and Luke Sparks, were recognized as Class of 2024 Rising Stars of Indiana as part of the Indiana Association of School Principals (IASP) recognition program.

Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Distinguished Schools

Bailly, Jackson, Liberty and Yost Elementary; and Westchester Intermediate earned the PLTW Distinguished Program recognition for 2023-2024. WPLTW's recognition program celebrates districts and schools committed to helping students unlock their potential and own their education by increasing student access, engagement, and achievement in their PLTW programs.

Duneland Robotics Teams Advance to State Competition

Duneland Robotics concluded its season with the State Championship at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. Competing were two DSC teams from Brummitt, Liberty Intermediate, Westchester Intermediate and Chesterton Middle School. The Brummitt Elementary GLAM Techs made the finals at the elementary level. The DSC Robotics program has over 200 students participating from 61 teams throughout the district.

CHS Music Receives ISSMA All-Music Total Department Award

CHS is one of 19 high schools in the state to receive this award. This award honors schools that offer a well-rounded music education, and have robust programs where students earn gold ratings in multiple events for band, choir, and orchestra. This is the 2nd year in a row that CHS has earned this prestigious award.

Show Choirs

CHS Show Choirs had an outstanding 2024 competition season. The Sandpipers were 2-time Grand Champions and 3-time First Runner-Ups. The Drifters were 3-time Champions of Division and 2-time Division Runner-Ups. The Show Choirs band, The Business, earned four Best Band awards. The lowest any group placed the entire season was second.

Speech & Debate Hall of Fame

Former CHS teacher and Speech and Debate Coach, Carol Biel, was selected as a 2024 National Speech & Debate Association Hall of Fame Inductee for the state of Indiana. Election to the National Speech & Debate Association Hall of Fame is the highest honor for any high school speech and debate coach.

Japanese Olympiad Team Wins State Championship

CHS won the state championship in the second-year division, and placed third in the third-year division at the Japanese Olympiad of Indiana at Ball State University in Muncie. CHS has now won the Japan Bowl/Japanese Olympiad state championship 23 times along with three national Japan Bowl championships and one national runner-up.

Cheer

The Cheer squad competed in the National High School Cheerleading Championship and placed 7th overall.

Girls Golf

The Girls Golf team advanced to state for the first time since 2016 and had a final IHSAA State Finals finish of 18th place.

Boys and Girls Cross Country

Boys Cross Country Senior Evan O'Connor; and Girls Cross Country Senior Ali Sierazy and Freshman Jessica Martin qualified and competed in the IHSAA State Finals.

Boys Soccer

The Boys Soccer team won as DAC Co-Champions.

Boys Tennis

The Boys Tennis team won both the DAC and IHSAA Sectional Championship. The team went undefeated in conference play to repeat as DAC Champions for the fourth consecutive year, and won as Sectional champs for the third consecutive year.

Gymnastics

In Gymnastics, CHS Freshman Sammie Boster finished her season in the IHSAA State Finals in 11th place in the All Around.

Wrestling (Boys)

The Boys Wrestling team won the IHSAA Sectional Championship. Senior Hayden DeMarco finished his season with a 46-1 record and an IHSAA Sectional, Regional and Semi-State Championship along with a State Runner-up Finish in the 132 pound weight class.

Girls Swimming and Diving

The CHS Girls Swimming and Diving team had a successful season that included another DAC Championship along with an IHSAA Sectional Championship. The season culminated in a 14th place finish at the IHSAA State Finals this year. The 200 Yard Medley Relay team of Adalyn Laughner, Annmarie Easter, Anna Wheele & Peyton Ostertag also made the podium at the IHSAA State Finals with 7th place (top ten) finish.

Senior Lucas Lauzon, the 200 Medley Relay team (Adalyn Laughner, Annmarie Easter, Anna Wheele and Peyton Ostertag) and 400 Free Relay team (Peyton Ostertag, Tegan Werner, Anna Wheele and Adalyn Laughner) were selected to the All American Team.

Boys Basketball

In Boys Basketball, Senior Tyler Parrish was selected to the Indiana High School All-Stars team.

Baseball

The Boys Baseball team, under the direction of first year coach John Bogner, captured the IHSAA Sectional Championship. Sophomore Rob Czarniecki had an outstanding high school baseball season that culminated in a selection to the Indiana High School Baseball Coaches Association All-State Team as an outfielder.

Boys Track & Field

The CHS Boys Track and Field team earned two medals at the IHSAA State Meet. Junior Kieran Barnewall placed 3rd in the state meet in the 110 meter hurdles and Junior Owen Edlen finished in 8th place in the shot put.

Girls Track & Field

In Girls Track & Field, Sophomore Kenedi Bradley earned a 5th place finish at the IHSAA State Finals for the 100 Meter Dash.

Girls Tennis

The Girls Tennis team were repeat DAC Champs and won the IHSAA Sectional Championship for the fourth consecutive year.

Boys Golf

The Boys Golf team advanced to the state meet for the second year in a row with a final IHSAA State Finals finish of 14th place.

Dance

The Dance team finished its second full season with many accomplishments at the Regional, State and National level. The CHS competitive dance team placed as Runner-up in the AAA Kick regional and state finals. The Jr. Ensemble took the state championship and the Small Ensemble placed as Runner-Up. Individually, there were several state finalists including a Runner-Up finish by Junior Level Soloist Vanessa Vega; and a 4th and 10th place finish by Senior Level Soloists Olyvia Clark and Adele Megaro, respectively. At Nationals, the team placed 4th in Medium Varsity Kick and 8th in Media Varsity Team Performance.
