

Dear parents,

Learning Sight Words is crucial for your child's success as a reader. Many Sight Words can't be sounded out (decoded). Therefore, they must be memorized. Sight Words also represent some of the most common words in written language.

Students will encounter them over and over daily, so mastery of them will help students in fluent reading. How can you help master Sight Words?

This packet contains 220 Sight Words with pronunciation in English and a blank space for meaning in your native language. Practice one page every night until the student has memorized all the words on that page. Repeat the process with the next page of words. Daily practice will help your child become a better reader.

Tips for teaching sight words

- 1. Look for them in books. Draw a child's attention to a word by looking for it in children's books. You can start with Dr. Seuss's books as they contain a lot of them! Repeat exposure, pointing a word out, and talking about it provides a much better introduction than simply giving a child a list of terms to learn.
- 2. Help children use them. Teaching children to use sight words in their writing, whether it be through illustration, spelling drills, or repetition on a keyboard. A word can be written in isolation or as part of a basic sentence.
