The Head of School

ur theme for the 2023-2024 school year was *shalom*, or peace. When we picked the theme back in late June 2023, we did it with intention, seeing it as an appropriate landing pad after the tumult and challenges of the Covid years. It took on a whole new meaning after the events of October 7, 2023. We all have been praying for peace, but with the ongoing threats in Israel and upticks in antisemitism around the world and domestically, especially on college campuses, *shalom*—as defined as the absence of war or strife—is not something we can readily expect any time soon.

Nonetheless the theme of *shalom* was highly relevant to how we felt about our school and our community this past school year. *Shalom* in Judaism means more than just the absence of war or strife; it means finding a state of serenity and harmony. I felt it at every event we had as a community during the school year—the Israel fundraisers hosted by Brawerman families, the vigils, the guest speaker sessions, the *Yom* commemorations at the end of the school year, and the meetings with our families and faculty. When we were together, we felt differently. We felt peace; we felt *shalom*. We were more serene; we were more harmonious.

It is of course not enough that Brawerman be a place for our families to come together during difficult times. We have to be an outstanding school, and the Brawerman educational program is as strong as it has ever been. We are fortunate to have an ideal mix of passionate teachers to make up our faculty, loaded with teachers who have 20 plus years of experience, many mid-career educators, and a handful of newer teachers in their first few years of teaching. Keeping our talented educators and attracting new faculty continues to be an area that we are focused on, and, with the support of our parents' generous giving and the support of the WBT Board of Trustees, we have continued to make competitive compensation for new and returning faculty a top priority. This is an area that will require ongoing attention as the new teacher pipeline has been shrinking, and it is an area that Temple leadership and Lare laser focused on.

Under the authentic and warm leadership of our Director of Admissions Lindy Goldberg, the last several years of enrollment have had robust application pools and the most selective admissions processes in the history of the school. Lindy's work, along with strong advocacy from our parents, has created an admissions

process where there have been growing numbers of families who make us their first choice school. This is a reflection on not only the quality of our programs, but also on the quality of our community. Families want to be here, where the sense of purpose and belonging are so strong.

Part of Brawerman's strength comes from being a part of Wilshire Boulevard Temple, which provides us the leadership and resources to perform at the highest levels. I have the pleasure of working closely with the Temple leadership team that includes Senior Rabbi Steve Leder, Incoming Senior Rabbi Joel Nickerson, Executive Director of Education Naomi Reem, Executive Director Donna Nadel, Wilshire Boulevard Temple Board President Scott Edelman, and the Chair of the Education and School Governance Committee Claire Goldsmith. These Temple leaders not only serve our school and Temple well, but they also push me and the Brawerman administrators to be better leaders, and I am grateful to be part of such a powerhouse team.

Part of that Temple strength is the clergy who are involved in the schools. At our grade level coffees earlier in the school year, parents had the opportunity to meet the Wilshire Clergy who have a classroom presence where they build real connections with our students. Our Rabbis and Cantors provide students an opportunity to connect with a clergy member, the *Torah*, and text study in a powerful manner. This is where those Jewish roots are being grown, where Jewish knowledge is being expanded, and where Jewish pride is blossoming.

Brawerman is a place where students graduate as proud and knowledgeable Jews, and we have been doing it for 25 years. From the day this school was founded under our first head of school Nadine Breuer, we have ended every week the same way, singing arm in arm to the song *Hashkiveinu*. This tradition is the very essence of who we are, and we have been doing it here since 1999.

The Hashkiveinu prayer is usually recited at night before bedtime as a call for a peaceful, protected night of rest. It calls on God to provide a shelter of peace over you as you sleep. We sing this on Friday afternoons during our Kabbalat Shabbats before students head home for the weekend. Every Brawerman student knows that this is the ritual that brings closure to the school week and signals the start of Shabbat. When we bring alumni together, this is what we sing together. When our Grade 6 students stand on the bima for the last time before graduating, this is the moment we cry together. And when I look around the room when we sing Hashkiveinu each week at Shabbat, it's palpable how it fills us all up with feelings of purpose, belonging, connectedness, and ultimately, peace. We live in difficult times, but I am grateful to be able to live it with you, and with Brawerman as our Shelter of Peace.

We are facing an existential moment in time-for Israel and for Jews. Brawerman has always been important. We needed Brawerman before; we need Brawerman now; and we will need Brawerman forever. *Am Yisrael Chai.*

STUDENT COUNCIL

The 2023-2024 school year had over 50 students from Grades 4-6 join Student Council and run for elected positions including Treasurer, Secretary, Vice President, and President. Led by co-advisors Adena Loewenthal and Nicole Schoneman, members formed various committees from Spirit Week to Bake Sale! This year we also saw the addition of the Charity and Donation Committee. This committee was founded by students and rooted in our tikkun olam values. Throughout the vear, this committee worked together to raise over \$2,000 in bake sales and Brawerman Teddy Bear sales, which was then donated to support the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) in Israel. We are so proud of all our Brawerman leaders accomplished as they collaborated and planned to bring their ideas into reality.



DEBATE

Brawerman's Debate Team competed in their very first tournament during the 2023-2024 school year and took home multiple wins! Debate is a mix of writing, research skills, public speaking, and analytical thought. Our debate students spent months learning how to argue both for and against multiple topics, such as the electoral college and whether or not tipping and college tuition should be eliminated. Our students provided assertions, reasons, and evidence while simultaneously arguing against and refuting their competitors' main ideas. We could not be more proud of our inaugural Brawerman Debate Team for setting such a high bar in both poise and performance!

STEAM NIGHT

The 2023-2024 STEAM Night was a huge success and was enjoyed by the entire Brawerman community. The evening featured Brawerman teachers, UCLA's Tau Beta Pi Engineering Honors Society students, Parker Anderson Enrichment, and ReDiscover Center. Guests made elephant toothpaste, weaved yarn, and erupted lemon volcanoes on Leder Playground while the courtyard was filled with short-burst science activities. The chapel was active with young scientists experimenting with hexbugs, radial symmetry, ink tiles, Isaac Newton color disks, lava lamps, squishy circuits, invertoscopes, dash robots, and geopanes. Young doctors stopped by the Teddy Bear Hospital to wrap wounds, wear stethoscopes, and take temperatures. Students honored Israel by making *Am Yisrael Chai* bracelets for themselves and their loved ones. It was an incredible community-building event where our students and their families got to discover the wonders of science, technology, engineering, art, and math.















BLAZE ATHLETICS

The 2023-2024 school year was a huge success for Brawerman Blaze athletics. Our fall, winter, and spring seasons had over 200 student athletes representing Brawerman. Our athletics philosophy—fostering good sportsmanship, skill development, and fun—shined throughout all seasons. The fall season had our Grades 4, 5, and 6 co-ed flag football teams go a combined 24-4. The winter season saw our three basketball teams go a combined 28-4, including an undefeated season for our Grade 4 boys! Lastly, our two co-ed soccer teams had a combined record of 11-4. Coach Barry, Coach Kamer, and Coach Levenson were proud to coach our athletes as their actions embodied respect for teammates, opponents, and officials. Go Blaze!


GRADE 4

SACRAMENTO

Grade 4 had an exciting time watching history leap from their textbook to real life with a trip to Sacramento. Students donned their hard hats and explored the mines of the Mother Lode in the Gold Bug Mine, watched the hammer hit the anvil at a blacksmith shop, panned for gold, and learned that gold was extracted from quartz. Students explored Old Town Sacramento, including an underground archaeological site that showed how the streets were raised to protect the city from devastating flooding. After a stop at the California State Railroad Museum to learn about the building of the railroad and explore old-fashioned locomotives, students ended the day by climbing aboard a horse-drawn wagon to tour the town. The Sacramento trip is the first overnight trip at Brawerman, which marks a critical turning point in students' development, maturity, and independence.













ASTROCAMP

Grade 5 students had a stellar time enhancing their scientific knowledge and personal growth by attending an overnight, three-day trip to Astrocamp. Astrocamp is an exceptional outdoor science school program designed for students to explore the principles of physics and astronomy in a fun and interactive way. Some highlights from the trip include using lights and lasers to learn about the light spectrum and experiencing the thrilling Skyscraper ride. Students gazed at the stars using high-powered telescopes and observed the sun through a special telescope. Students also participated in a late-night scavenger hunt where they worked together to find clues and complete challenges. Overall, this trip was an excellent opportunity for Grade 5 students to broaden their scientific knowledge, build their independence, and bond with one another.

BOSTON

Grade 5 spent five fulfilling days learning, growing, and exploring the historic city of Boston. One of the trip's highlights was visiting Plymouth to explore the Plimoth Patuxet Museum, where students entered the world of the indigenous and colonial people who lived, worked, and built communities along the exact shores in the 1600s. Another student favorite was a visit to Salem. Students visited the Gallows Hill Museum, where they were transported back in time for a theater performance inspired by the Salem Witch trials.

Other experiences included walking through the Old North Church, visiting Paul Revere's house, riding a duck boat through Boston Harbor, going to the Edward M. Kennedy Institute for the United States Senate, and spending time at Lexington and Concord. Students even attended a Boston Red Sox game at Fenway Park, where they made it onto the jumbotron! Grade 5 ended their jam-packed week with a meaningful moment at the New England Holocaust Memorial. The Grade 5 Boston trip was an incredibly memorable experience for all who participated.

GRADE 6

ISRAEL WEEK

When the class of 2024's Grade 6 trip to Israel was canceled following the atrocities of October 7, Brawerman made it our mission to create a meaningful alternative Israel experience for students. Led by Elhanan Brown, our Israel Engagement Specialist who



flew in from Israel for the week, Grade 6 students from both Brawerman West and East experienced the next best thing to traveling to Israel: spending a week of school immersed in Israel-related learning and experiences. Students made hand-dipped candles inspired by the city of Tzfat, participated in a drum circle akin to those at the Bedouin tents, negotiated at a "shuk" for Israeli treats, dug for archeological treasures, and learned about the diversity of Israeli society. Throughout Israel Week, students fostered a meaningful connection with and deep love for Israel. Even though they did not get the chance to physically leave the country, students still had the opportunity to cultivate relationships with each other, across campuses, and with their Jewish homeland. Brawerman looks forward to taking the Class of 2024 to Israel in the future.







NATIONAL PARKS

In lieu of going to Israel this year, Grade 6 embarked on a weeklong adventure to Utah and Arizona to explore our beautiful National Parks. Students hiked the majestic canyons at Bryce Canyon and the Grand Canyon and enthusiastically floated down the Colorado River where they passed Horseshoe Bend, looking at 1.1 million-year-old cliffs. The last stop was Sedona, where students were blessed to have the entire magnificent sanctuary of the Jewish Community of Sedona and the Verde Valley as their Brawerman prayer space. With journals in one hand and prayer books in the other, students reflected on their incredible journey—not just on the trip but also on their collective years at Brawerman—as they looked through the prayer book for a poem or prayer they connected with. The National Parks trip was an inspiring cumulative experience for our students, full of breathtaking sites and spiritual connections.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Romy Harari

How did your education at Brawerman help solidify your connection to Judaism and Israel?

My education at Brawerman helped me nurture a deep and connected relationship with my Jewish identity. Beginning at a young age, I was able to participate in Jewish traditions and rituals such as keeping *Shabbat* every Friday and observing each



Jewish holiday. Brawerman helped not only to create the foundation of my role in the Jewish community, but also to foster and grow my Jewish identity.

How have you advocated for Israel since October 7?

Since October 7 I have been a part of many charity drives that help raise funds for the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) and the innocent civilians in Israel. I have also continued my work in educating younger generations of the atrocities that transpired during the Holocaust through the David Labkovski project. Rabbi Ben-Naim invited me to speak to Grades 4-6 Brawerman students about the project on *Yom HaShoah* this past school year, which was a meaningful and full-circle moment for me.

Can you share about the Ellie Lainer Youth Leadership Award that you won?

The Ellie Lainer Youth Leadership Award in Holocaust Education is presented to a student who demonstrates leadership and commitment to Holocaust education. I was fortunate enough to bring the David Labkovski Project to my school, Harvard-Westlake, and lead a meaningful assembly with approximately 700 people for *Yom HaShoah*. I was able to share my knowledge of the Holocaust through a survivor's art pieces and share the messages of life, survival, tolerance, acceptance, and the importance of bearing witness to history with my peers.

What is a key takeaway you took from your time at Brawerman?

A lesson I have taken with me from my time at Brawerman has been the character trait of being a *mensch* and upholding the *Mensch* Code. This has taught me to go through life with a mindset of not only respecting others, but also providing care, empathy, and support to those in my community who need it.




