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Summary and Background Information

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund.

The federal ARP statute requires that States reserve ARP ESSER funds for three State-level reservations for evidence-based activities and interventions that respond to students' social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children and youth in foster care, and migratory students.

- Not less than 5 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, activities to address the academic impact of lost instructional time by supporting the implementation of evidence-based interventions.
- Not less than 1 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, the implementation of evidence-based summer enrichment programs.
- Not less than 1 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, the implementation of evidence-based comprehensive after-school programs.

The 2021-2022 enacted New York State budget fully allocated the required SEA reserves as subgrants to 398 LEAs and NYSED has made allocations to two additional LEAs. Specific LEA allocations are detailed in Columns D, E, and F in the **ARP ESSER Allocations Chart** (see also in the Document Library). Please note that these funds are in addition to the *90% LEA ARP-ESSER ALLOCATION* listed in Column C of that workbook and must be budgeted for separately.

As indicated in NYSED's approved **ARP ESSER State Plan**, NYSED has included within this application a list of evidence-based interventions related to each state reserve. LEAs will be required to utilize state reserve funds to implement evidence-based interventions either chosen from the NYSED-selected list or from another reputable source (such as, but not limited to, the What Works Clearinghouse).

**RESOURCES RELATED TO EVIDENCE-BASED REQUIREMENTS.**

LEAs must select and implement evidence-based activities and interventions either chosen from the NYSED-provided list (embedded within each section of the application) or from another reputable source. Selected interventions must fall into one of the four tiers of evidence defined in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Specifically, evidence tiers are defined as:

- **Tier 1 - Strong Evidence:** Supported by strong evidence from at least one well designed, well implemented experimental study (randomized-control groups). Studies show that this strategy improves a relevant student outcome (e.g. reading scores, attendance rates). In these studies, students have been randomly assigned to treatment groups or control groups, so that researchers can speak with confidence that those who participate in the intervention strategy outperform those who do not. These studies meet the What Works Clearinghouse evidence standards without reservations. The studies use large, multi-site samples.
- **Tier 2 - Moderate Evidence:** Supported by at least one well-designed and well-implemented quasi-experimental study (matched groups, interrupted time series, et al.) Studies have found that the strategy improves a relevant student outcome (e.g. reading scores, attendance rates). Students in these studies have not been randomly assigned, but researchers have used statistical matching methods that allow them to speak with confidence that the strategy results in an improved outcome. These studies meet the What Works Clearinghouse evidence

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standards with reservations. The studies use large, multi-site samples. No other studies show that this strategy negatively impacts an outcome.

- **Tier 3 - Promising Evidence:** Supported by at least one well designed, well implemented correlational study with statistical controls for selection bias. There is evidence that this strategy improves a student outcome (reading scores, attendance rates), but that research may consist of correlational studies -- studies that can show a relationship between the strategy and outcome but cannot show that the improved outcome was the result of the strategy. The studies supporting Tier 3 strategies do not have to be based on large, multi-site samples. A strategy that would otherwise be considered Tier 1 or Tier 2, but it does not meet the sample size requirements, is considered Tier 3. No other studies show that this strategy negatively impacts an outcome.
- **Tier 4 - Demonstrates a Rationale:** High-quality research findings or positive evaluation suggests that this will likely improve student outcomes or other relevant outcomes; and there are ongoing efforts to examine the effects of such activity, strategy, or intervention. Based on existing research, the intervention cannot yet be defined as a Tier 1, Tier 2 or Tier 3. However, there is good reason to believe — based on existing research and data — that the intervention could improve relevant student outcomes.

Further information may be found in the **Federal Guidance on Evidence-Based Interventions**. There are a number of resources available that identify research which supports specific interventions. Districts and schools are encouraged to review the various clearinghouses to find programs, strategies, and interventions that align to the needs identified during the needs assessment process. 1) The District had sent out a survey to staff, parents, and community members asking for their input on how to use stimulus funds. This included a list of what the defined uses were, and the ability to check all that they believed the money should be used for, along with the ability to add comments / suggestions / clarifications about the selections.

2) There was multiple conversations at Board of Education meetings surrounding possible uses of the funds.

3) Building leaders met with staff and created committees with stakeholders to discuss the needs of students, and how the District can assist in addressing the impacts of lost instructional time by providing summer learning and enrichment and after school activities.

3. **In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA will support ongoing engagement with parents and families, including engagement related to identified student needs, areas of student gains, and available assistance to families that will support student success.**

1. We have hired two K-12 Directors whose focus is looking at student performance numbers and comparing those numbers to pre-COVID. They meet with building and department leaders to discuss curriculum changes and professional development opportunities for students to assist the needs of students. We are piloting a "Homework Help" after school program. Using data from student performance, we are targeting students falling behind, and having them stay late 2 hours every Wednesday until they start closing

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their learning gaps. This is continuously monitored to find students who begin to fall behind after the start of the year as well.

2. We have brought on additional psychologist and social workers to address the socio-emotional needs of students.
3. We have hired a behavior analyst to assist with the behaviors related to the socio-emotional health of students.
4. We have hired a translator and parent liaison for our non-English speaking family to better assist how to address the needs of ELL students.
5. We have contracted with a vendor called Safe Schools as an anonymous tipline for staff, parents, and community members to anonymously share concerns related to students, instructions, safety, and safeguarding of public funds.
6. We have hired additional teachers to assist with quarantined students to prevent further impairing students education. They also are available to cover classes in the event of teacher quarantines.

We are determining the needs of social, emotional, mental, and academic needs of students with the confidential tipline for friends of students, parents, community members to inform us of concerns off campus of students. Additionally we have hired more psychologists and social workers to reduce their caseload and have more time to spend one on one with students to get a better understanding of what is happening in their lives. We have ramped up our analysis of data on student performance by adding additional staff to the Office of Instruction to ensure we can address student needs. We have added a translator/parent liaison for non-English speaking families so they are better informed of the opportunities that the school may offer their students.

- The interventions implemented through the 5% State-Level Reserve to address the impacts of lost instructional time must be evidence-based and may include innovative approaches to providing instruction to accelerate learning. In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA selected evidence-based interventions that will address identified student needs. The LEA provided instructional experiences to students in need of academic support in the area of ELA and math through the Summer Academy. Students were identified for involvement through review of data from multiple measures, including norm-referenced assessment (NWEA and AimsWeb Plus), grades, attendance, student progress on intervention plans, and through counselor and teacher recommendation. In preparation for the experience, teachers had 30 hours of planning time to review data and target instruction based on identified skill needs. Three-hundred eighty-one students engaged in this support for three weeks, Monday through Thursday each week.

In addition, English language learners engaged in specialized instruction in the areas of literacy and math, instructed by ESOL certified teachers. As noted above, data from multiple measures were reviewed to identify the target group and skill needs for this summer intervention in literacy and math. Thirty-two students engaged in this support for three weeks, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday each week.

Students with disabilities whose reading levels were at least two years below grade level were provided with specialized reading support by a certified literacy teacher. Seventy-two students engaged in this support for six weeks, Monday through Friday.

Enrichment opportunities were also provided for student enrollment based on interest. Various offerings were provided through a four-week period. Students and their families self-selected to engage in this experience. An unduplicated count of 490 students participated in the summer enrichment program. Transportation for these experiences were provided by families. Also provided as an enrichment experience was the College Camp, where high school students preparing for the college application process interacted with counselors and engaged in workshops to support this post-secondary transition.

Every student who participated in the summer learning and enrichment program was eligible for carry-out breakfast and lunch. Meals packaged for several days for students were available within the school for students.

In addition, every student who participated in the summer intervention programs (summer academy, English as a new language summer academy, specialized reading, and extended school year) were eligible for transportation to and from the program to ensure equity of access.

All summer intervention support in literacy and math is aligned with intervention services provided to students during the 2021-22 school year and funded through ESSA funds (Title I and III, primarily).

Students were identified based on grades and performance in the classroom as students who are falling behind this school year due to learning loss due to closures. Those students were asked to stay after school for 2 hours a week to work in small groups to improve their overall comprehensive of material for each specific subject/content area, depending on the students needs. We are limiting the ratio of 10 students per teacher because research shows that the smaller group setting provides for better comprehension.

The State Reserve funds are being coordinated with other initiatives by addressing learning loss of students by providing them opportunities to close gaps in learning loss through the summer academy program. For students who were able to maintain grade level learning throughout the pandemic, along with the students who needed targeted tutoring in the summer, the LEA offered enrichment opportunities to help address the social emotional needs of students by providing them an opportunity to work closely with their peers with non-traditional activities that promoted the socialization of students. Lastly, we offered a college camp program that helped juniors and seniors learn how to complete college applications including having them write college specific essays that were reviewed by English teachers to assist students in furthering their education upon graduation.

Summer learning programs can offer another opportunity to accelerate learning, especially for those students most impacted by disruptions to learning during the school year. Schools and districts should design programs that work best in the local context and reflect the characteristics that evidence suggests lead to successful summer programs. These characteristics include: programs are voluntary, full-day lasting five to six weeks, include three hours of language arts and mathematics taught by a certified teacher each day, and include enrichment activities and experiences. Research points to the potentially positive benefits of strong summer programs. A longitudinal study of summer programs showed students who participated in the summer programs that were reviewed received some benefits in mathematics; however, students with high rates of attendance who attended programs for consecutive summers experienced the greatest learning gains. The amount and quality of instruction influenced the academic benefit, with the highest benefits to students attending programs with high-quality instruction provided by a certified teacher and high academic time on task.

The LEA provided instructional experiences to students in need of academic support in the area of ELA and math through the Summer Academy. Students were identified for involvement through review of data from multiple measures, including norm-referenced assessment (NWEA and AimsWeb Plus), grades, attendance, student progress on intervention plans, and through counselor and teacher recommendation. In preparation for the experience, teachers had 30 hours of planning time to review data and target instruction based on identified skill needs. Three-hundred eighty-one students engaged in this support for three weeks, Monday through Thursday each week.

In addition, English language learners engaged in specialized instruction in the areas of literacy and math, instructed by ESOL certified teachers. As noted above, data from multiple measures were reviewed to identify the target group and skill needs for this summer intervention in literacy and math. Thirty-two students engaged in this support for three weeks, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday each week.

Students with disabilities whose reading levels were at least two years below grade level were provided with specialized reading support by a certified literacy teacher. Seventy-two students engaged in this support for six weeks, Monday through Friday.

Enrichment opportunities were also provided for student enrollment based on interest. Various offerings were provided through a four-week period. Students and their families self-selected to engage in this experience. An unduplicated count of 490 students participated in the summer enrichment program. Transportation for these experiences were provided by families. Also provided as an enrichment experience was the College Camp, where high school students preparing for the college application process interacted with counselors and engaged in workshops to support this post-secondary transition.

Every student who participated in the summer learning and enrichment program was eligible for carry-out breakfast and lunch. Meals packaged for several days for students were available within the school for students.

In addition, every student who participated in the summer intervention programs (summer academy, English as a new language summer academy, specialized reading, and extended school year) were eligible for transportation to and from the program to ensure equity of access.
