This is the 16th year WPS has partnered with the Wichita Public Library for this event.</p> <p>Magnet Schools of America Recognition Contact(s): Jesse Milne, Phyllis Cottner</p> <p>Every year, Magnet Schools of America (MSA) selects a handful of schools from hundreds of applicants to receive their Merit Award of Distinction. The Merit Awards are based on adherence to MSA's five pillars of magnet schools which are Diversity, Innovative Curriculum and Professional Development, Academic Excellence, High-Quality Instructional Systems, and Family and Community Partnerships.</p> <p>This year, WPS had three buildings receive an award for Merit School of Distinction! Brooks Center for STEM and Arts won the award for the second time while Earhart Environmental Magnet and McLean Science and Technology Magnet both won for the third time.</p> <p>In addition to the Merit Award of Distinction, which is the second highest honor from MSA, the organization also bestows a Merit Award of Excellence to a very exclusive and elite class of magnet schools. Through 10 years of applying for these MSA distinctions, no WPS school had ever won the coveted Excellence category until last year when Mayberry Cultural and Fine Arts Magnet received it.</p> <p>This year not only did Mayberry achieve Excellence again but was joined by Hyde Leadership and International Studies and Allison Traditional Magnets as the best of the best magnet schools in the nation.</p>

<p>Proposals for Closing Schools, Boundaries, and Reassignment</p> <p>Appendix 1 <i>(continued)</i></p>	<p>Susan Willis, Chief Financial Officer, briefed the Board. At their July 31, 2023, regular meeting, the Board of Education received information regarding the district's facility conditions, needs, and enrollment forecasting. On October 2, 2023, the Board approved retaining Cooperative Strategies, LLC, for the purposes of facility master planning services. Cooperative Strategies subsequently reported back to the Board on December 11, 2023, regarding the state of the district's various facilities. This report considered the age of each building, deferred maintenance, and historical and projected enrollment trends.</p> <p>At that same meeting, the Board approved a five-year strategic plan for the district. This strategic plan was developed in collaboration with district students, staff members, and community partners through online surveys, public meetings, and expert contributions. The strategic plan is intended to chart a path forward for the district through the 2028-29 school year.</p> <p>Thorough surveys and various feedback tools were employed with staff, students, and community to set priorities around initiatives to retain after pandemic relief funding ends in September 2024. Input revealed a desire to do what is best for district students. Staff voiced specific concerns about job cuts, salary freezes and possible loss of student social emotional and behavior supports in the classroom. The feedback emphasized a priority for appropriate staffing, and an acknowledgement that cuts in services and programs are necessary to keep teachers and other staff members.</p> <p>At the January 22, 2024, regular meeting, district staff projected the need to reduce expenditures by \$42 million to balance the 2024-25 budget. This is due to declining enrollment since 2016, specifically the 5% drop in enrollment following the COVID-19 school shutdown of 2020, and the expiration of COVID-19 pandemic relief funding. Through non-school budget cuts, attrition, and administrative reassignment, expenditures were reduced by \$9 million, but \$33 million in spending reductions are still needed.</p> <p>After receiving this information, the Board charged administration with identifying potential building closures. On February 12, 2024, administration identified the following buildings: Hadley Middle School, Jardine STEM and Career Explorations Academy Magnet Middle School, Clark Elementary School, Cleaveland Traditional College and Career Readiness Magnet Elementary School, Park Elementary School, and Payne Elementary School.</p> <p>The Board subsequently voted to schedule a public hearing for February 29, 2024 and directed staff to publish a notice to comply with Kansas law. The Wichita Eagle published the notice in Appendix 1a of this agenda on February 14 and February 18. This hearing provided for extensive public comment on proposed school closings, and an opportunity for the Board of Education to discuss and respond.</p>
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<p>Proposals for Closing Schools, Boundaries, and Reassignment</p> <p>Appendix 1 <i>(continued)</i></p>	<p>The Board also held public listening sessions on February 21, February 22, and February 26. These listening sessions provided additional opportunities for public dialogue beyond the minimum requirements of Kansas law. During these meetings, boundary adjustment proposals for all recommended closing and welcoming schools were shared. It was also during these sessions that the public was given the opportunity to provide feedback on all the boundary proposals included in the recommendation.</p> <p>The complete presentation is included in the archival copies of this BOE Agenda and Minutes. This presentation was for the Board's information.</p> <p>At approximately 8:45 p.m., Board President Reeser announced a ten-minute break.</p> <p>At approximately 8:55 p.m., Board President Reeser reconvened the meeting.</p> <p>Ms. Albert (Ms. Hedrick) moved the Board approve Resolution 2024-01 found in Appendix 1b affecting the following schools: Hadley Middle School, Jardine STEM and Career Explorations Academy Magnet Middle School, Clark Elementary, Cleaveland Traditional College and Career Readiness Magnet Elementary School, Park Elementary School, and Payne Elementary School.</p> <p>The motion passed 5-2, with Mr. Vuong and Ms. McCray-Miller voting no.</p> <p>At approximately 10:10 p.m., Ms. Stabler left the meeting.</p> <p>Fabián Armendáriz, Director of Operations, briefed the Board. School boundary changes are necessitated by closing six attendance centers. New attendance boundaries prioritized the following: minimal system disruption; minimal feeder pattern changes; proximity to closed schools; building capacity; enrollment projections; and minimizing student crossing major roads and highways.</p> <p>The complete presentation is included in the archival copies of this BOE Agenda and Minutes. This presentation was for the Board's information.</p> <p>Ms. Albert (Mrs. Bond) moved the Board approve Administration's final boundary proposal effective August 1, 2024. The recommended proposal includes boundary adjustments for five middle schools (Hamilton, Marshall, Mead, Pleasant Valley, Wilbur) and ten elementary schools (Allen, Beech, Caldwell, Harry Street, Irving, Lawrence, Linwood, Stanley, Washington, Woodman).</p> <p>The motion passed 6-0, with Ms. Stabler absent.</p>

FutureReady Centers: Manufacturing and Healthcare Report	<p>Timothy Hamblin, Director of Career and Technical Programs, and Eric Shipman, Principal of the FutureReady Center, briefed the Board. Within our district we have two FutureReady Centers (FRCs): one is designed to teach WPS students about careers in manufacturing, the other to teach and prepare WPS students for careers in the Healthcare industry.
