

CELEBRATING EXCELLENCE

ACADEMICS*

- Class of 2024 National Merit Finalists were Jack Eugster, Emily Middleton, and Walter Royal.
- National Merit Commended Scholars were Leah Barry, Dexter Benson, Spencer Bowe, Alexander Engle, and Joseph Mariani.
- U.S. Presidential Scholar Candidates were Jack Eugster, Emily Middleton, and Walter Royal.
- For the first time, OHS achieved Platinum level in the Advanced Placement (AP) School Honor Roll, the highest level.
- College matriculation rates continue to be exceptional for all students, with many receiving offers of admission to highly selective schools.
- In the *U.S. News and World Report* "2024 Best High School" rankings, OHS ranked #1 for college readiness (see page 7).
- At the annual OHS junior and senior academic awards event, 94 juniors were recognized for achieving a 3.5 GPA; 108 seniors were named Honor Graduates.
- Junior Book Awards went to: Henry Shafer, Dartmouth; Quinn Martini, Harvard; Ashley Ishaug, Yale; Alex Paulsen, St. Lawrence
- More than \$87,000 in locally raised scholarship dollars were awarded to graduating seniors. Thank you to our generous donors!
- 18 seventh-grade OMS History Day projects qualified for state competition.
- 156 second-grade students shared their passion projects in the annual Schumann Elementary Imagination Fair.

- Henry Shafer was one of 15 semifinalists in the National Student Auditions.

- The OHS Yearbook staff was honored for excellence in Josten's *Look Book 2024* celebrating the best-of-the-best in yearbook design and inclusivity.

ACTIVITIES

- The OHS Student Senate and Well-being Club co-sponsored the second annual "You Matter Week" to support student and staff mental health and well-being.
- Carys Summers served as President of the MN Association of Student Councils.
- Orono Youth in Government participated in the YMCA's 2024 Conference with leaders and presenters: Madeleine Dore, McKenna Monger, Eshaan Ambrose, Hannah Ferber, Simon Forbes, and Ella Palm.
- 86 DECA participants qualified for the state Career Development Conference; from there, 16 students qualified for the International Conference with three students selected to attend the DECA Leadership Academy.
- Orono Speech Team named Metro West Conference Champions for the first time. State qualifiers were Maddie Dore (2nd place), McKenna Monger, Maya Haugen (7th place), Sydney Sloneker, and Oliver Berg (8th place).
- Maddie Dore and McKenna Monger qualified for the NSDA National Speech Tournament.
- In the Stock Market Game, Hayley Aseltine, Dominic Roux, Ethan Weber, and Jackson Von Kaenel placed 4th of 836 teams.
- The OHS Student Voice Club hosted a celebration that combined National Hispanic Heritage Month and Día de los Muertos; they also presented at the National Youth Leadership Conference.
- 34 fifth-grade Math Masters turned in top results, including Leo Phillips' 1st place and Nathan Ratcliffe's 2nd place finishes in the Individual Round. In the Team Round, Linden Hermansen, Nathan Baird, James Vossen, Frank Whiting, and Leo Phillips placed 1st.
- The OMS Solar Boat Team earned two 1st place trophies at the MN Renewable Energy Society Solar Boat Regatta.




The following achievements represent *only a few* highlights from the year, including state-level results in athletics. Through the year, Orono Spartans sent teams or individuals to **22 MSHSL state tournaments**. We celebrate the character, teamwork, outstanding achievements, and remarkable performances along the way. Way to go, Spartans!

ATHLETICS (2023-24 state team, individual qualifiers and special awards)

- Orono earned the national designation, "Unified Champion School."
- Boys Cross Country finished 4th at State.
- Girls Cross Country qualified for State for the first time as a team, finishing 12th.
- Football went to State for the second time in three years.
- The MFCA Class 4A Individual Academic All-State honors went to Victor Ruhland and Brady McPherson.
- Brady McPherson was awarded the National Football Foundation Honorable Mention Scholar Athlete award and a MSHSL Most Valuable Teammate.
- Orono Football earned the Gold Award for team GPA from the Minnesota State High School Coaches Association.
- Boys Soccer finished second in State.
- Girls Swimming & Diving had the best team results in school history: Metro West Conference Champions, True Team Section Champions, True Team State Champions, Section Champions, and State Championship Runner-Up.
- Girls Swimming & Diving Coach Mark Seguin named Class A Coach of the Year.
- Ashley Ishaug was the ExCEL winner.
- MSHSL Triple A Award Winners were Lila James and Victor Ruhland.
- Boys Swim and Dive placed 5th at State.
- Alpine Ski State competitors were Jack Shideman, 3rd place; Fletcher Stoen, 7th place; and Jonathan Burns, 16th place.
- Nordic Ski State competitors were Walter Holmes & Johnny DiPrima, 3rd place; Erica Kazin, 6th place; Drew Hutori, 25th place; and Sindri Bonner, 42nd place.
- Girls Hockey took third place at State.
- Girls Hockey Asst. Coach Claire Bjerke was Class A Coach of the Year.
- Boys Swimming & Diving State qualifiers were Justin Barry, Eli Fish, Owen Gagne, Ben Mitchell, Stewart Royal, Walter Royal, Mitch Volk, and Bjorn Jaenchen (Diving). Top 5 State finishes were: 3rd place in the 200 Medley Relay (Volk, Gagne, W. Royal, Barry); 4th place in the 100 Fly, Walter Royal; 4th place in the 200 Free Relay (W. Royal, Volk, Fish, Barry).
- Brady McPherson competed at State in Wrestling.
- Jazz and High Kick Dance Teams earned 2nd and 5th places at State, respectively.
- Boys Hockey was the State Tournament Consolation Champions.
- Boys Basketball has gone to State for the last two consecutive years.
- Nolan Groves set a new Boys Basketball single-game scoring record with a 50-point performance.
- Grace Bickett was the 2024 Athena Award winner (hockey, soccer, and golf).
- Anthony Perrill and Quinn Martini won State Tournament Doubles Runner-Up. Hugh Perrill qualified in Singles.
- In Girls Golf, Nora Benson and Ava Hanneman qualified for State. Ava finished 3rd in her 4th appearance.
- Dylan Kringen qualified for State in Boys Golf with a top 15 finish.
- Boys Track & Field State competitors: Victor Ruhland (2nd, 100m); Owen Chapman (8th, 1600m; 6th, 3200m); relay team of Johnny Skoog, Gabe Hallen, Charlie Gronholz, Owen Hirt (2nd, 4x800). Also competing were Luca DeCubellis, Dane Heinen, and Trevor Stundahl.
- Girls Track & Field State competitors: relay team of Alivia Uselding, Taylor Walsh, Sindri Bonner, Ryanne Andreen (8th, 4x800), and Mila Bailey in the 200m.
- Boys and Girls Lacrosse had remarkable seasons, advancing to the Section semifinals.
- Girls Lacrosse Head Coach Jane Kolar named 2024 MSHSL Coach of the Year.

SERVICE

- 1,500 pounds of food was collected for the WeScare Hunger food drive.
- OMS Unified program and Where Everyone Belongs (WEB) promoted a hat, mitten, glove, and coat drive.
- 374 hours of service and volunteer work was completed by 13 Youth in Action students.
- 13 students volunteered to assist community members with technology assistance through the Tech Buddies program.
- Orono staff donated \$4,000—with a special donation from Orono PTO—to purchase food for 70 families during the holiday season.
- OMS students took mini field trips to Stonebay of Orono Senior Living to engage with residents, play games, and build community.
- Student mentors volunteered over 540 hours in SPARKS, the after school mentoring program.
- The Orono DECA program raised \$5,000 for the Troncones School District in Mexico.
- The second annual Senior Service Day was organized by OHS National Honor Society leaders.
- The Unified Polar Plunge fundraiser raised \$27,481 for Special Olympics Minnesota.



- Orono Community Education's annual Wellness Expo greeted more than 850 attendees who engaged in activities, informative displays from wellness providers, and the Empty Bowls fundraiser.

Orono's Future-Ready Students

Orono High School leads Minnesota in all indicators of college readiness

In fall 2023, Orono High School (OHS) was placed on the **Advanced Placement (AP) School Honor Roll at the Platinum Level** based on 2022-23 student achievement. The Honor Roll recognizes schools that have done outstanding work to welcome more students into AP courses—some beginning in 9th grade—and support them on their academic pathway. College-level rigor in AP courses prepares students for post-secondary pursuits by building essential skills and confidence. AP courses also allow students to study topics of interest in depth. We are proud that Orono students are challenging themselves, and finding success, through appropriate levels of rigor!


In late spring, *U.S. News* released its latest “Best High School” rankings based on six weighted indicators: college readiness 30% • state assessment proficiency 20% • state assessment performance 20% • underserved student performance 10% • college curriculum breadth 10% • and graduation rate 10%.

On indicators of **college readiness**, *U.S. News* ranks **Orono High School at the top of traditional high schools in Minnesota** (weighted 30% in rankings). College readiness is, “the proportion of seniors who took and earned a qualifying score (3+ out of 5) on at least one Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate exam.” Current rankings are based on data from the OHS Class of 2022 with 233 students. At nearly 68%, the college readiness indicator looks at the percentage who


took (77%) and earned a qualifying score (65%) on at least one AP exam, the highest percentage among our neighboring and comparative districts. OHS also came out on top in **college curriculum breadth**, defined as the percentage of seniors who took and earned qualifying scores on *multiple* AP exams. Looking at the Class of 2023, the exam passing percentage held steady at 66% with an outstanding 86% of the class completing at least one AP course and a total of 92% enrolled in academic programs that could lead to college credit.

It is important to note that several agencies, including *U.S. News*, include statewide assessment proficiency and performance in overall ranking calculations. While we honor choice for our families and recognize the test-optional shift, we have found over the last several years that **too many students are opting out** of Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs). With our high school juniors this past spring, the opt-out percentage for MCA Math was nearly 31%.

As a data-driven organization, Orono Schools values the MCA metrics that help us evaluate individual student needs and develop collective, continuous improvement efforts. This school year, we plan to take even greater steps to partner with our families and school community to encourage full participation on state test days. This way, our MCA data will more accurately reflect the academic excellence of Orono students.
