

The Boys' Latin School of Maryland Athletic Hall of Fame 2024

The Boys' Latin School of Maryland is enormously proud of its sports tradition and we are excited to introduce our tenth group of Athletic Hall of Fame inductees. This year, nine new members from the school's past, plus the school's sixth, seventh, and eighth teams are joining the Boys' Latin School Athletic Hall of Fame.

Boys' Latin selects new members to its Athletic Hall of Fame every two years in conjunction with the annual Boys' Latin – St. Paul's home football game. Eligibility for induction is open to all graduates of the school – Brevard Street Latinists and Lake Avenue Lakers - beginning fifteen years after their graduation.

This latest group of inductees is not only a group of fantastic athletes, but also a group of outstanding men. Since BL was such a small school during the early years on Lake Avenue and into the 1990s, most of the inductees were involved in multiple school activities. They were all true student-athletes. Some of them were three-sport athletes and most were involved in extra-curricular activities including school government, the Maroon and White yearbook, and the school newspaper, The Inkwell.

The list of colleges they attended after graduating from BL is impressive; Johns Hopkins University, University of Maryland, University of Virginia, Washington College, Loyola University of Maryland, Cornell University, University of Pennsylvania, McDaniel College, the College of William and Mary, Denison University, Hobart College, Syracuse University, Clemson University, Michigan State University — to name just a few. Most of this year's class of inductees continued their athletic careers in college.

Four of the inductees were the winners of the Alumni Cup for "leadership based on character." Two were recipients of the Hodges Cup for "loyalty and devotion" to the school, one inductee was the recipient of the J. Elwood Peter '34 Cup for "love of his fellow man," two were class valedictorians, and several of our honorees were members of the National Honor Society.

Boys' Latin is immensely proud of all of today's inductees and we thank them for their service to the school. We also want to thank Master of Ceremonies Brandon Gaines '72, presenter Butch Maisel H'09, and all of the inductees' family members and friends for joining the BL community on such a special day.

2024 Boys' Latin School Hall of Fame Inductees

James F. Mosberg '74

Jamie entered Boys' Latin in the fall of 1966 as a fifth grade student, following in the footsteps of his two older brothers, Bill '67 and Steve '71. His fifth grade homeroom instructor was Dyson Ehrhardt. Jamie was a true



scholar-athlete. He was inducted into the National Honor Society as a junior. He was a leader on and off the field. In 1968 as a sixth grader, he was awarded the Frederick A. Hahn Cup for "leadership based on character" and in the upper school he served on the Student Council and Honor Board. His senior year he was the assistant editor of the Maroon and White yearbook. He was a three-sport athlete, a member of the Varsity Club, earning three letters in soccer, two in basketball, and one in lacrosse. He excelled in soccer and was named first team All-Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "C" Conference his junior and senior years by The Baltimore Sun and The Baltimore News American. In his senior season, Jamie scored the only goal with four seconds to go in the game to defeat a talented McDonogh team, 1-0. He served as

co-captain that season and led the team to an 8-3-1 record, at the time the best record ever for a varsity soccer team, and good for third place just two points out of first place. He was a solid reserve for Coach Gelston's basketball teams for two campaigns scoring a combined 91 points. Both years the Laker hoop teams came in second place in the MSA "C" Conference. As a senior, he played in all but one game, averaging around eight minutes per game. His high game was against Lutheran when he chipped in with eight points. In lacrosse, he was a hustling midfielder on the 1974 MSA "A" Conference Division II title team and at season's end was named the team's Unsung Hero. When the season began he was a reserve midfielder, but eventually earned a spot on the first midfield unit with fellow BL Hall of Fame members Mark Dorney and Charlie Stieff. Jamie scored a goal with two assists that season. After graduating from BL, he continued his soccer and lacrosse careers at Western Maryland College — now McDaniel College. In soccer, he earned three letters while scoring eight goals. He led the team in goal scoring his freshman year with four. In lacrosse he played two years under legendary Coach Bill Thomas. Overall he earned four letters and served as captain of the team his junior and senior years. He scored double-digit point totals in each of his four years, including over 30 goals.

The 1977 Football Team

The 1977 football team finished the season with a perfect 9-0 record. Led by Head Coach Ridge Warfield H'11, the team is arguably one of the best in the history of Boys' Latin football. It was the school's first 11-man



undefeated football squad in 13 years and the last Laker varsity football team to do so. The team had an incredibly gifted backfield; Tim Daly at quarterback, Seamus Gilson at halfback, Steve Dubin at fullback, along with flanker Brad Glaser. The offense averaged over 21 points per game. Gilson became BL's first runner to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season. The offensive line was strong — with Donald Obrecht at tight end, tackles Doug Cann and Chris Cosby, guards Ken Frontain, John Mutscheller, and Tim Michel, and center Greg Poulos. The defense was small, but incredibly tough, led by Ned Ensor, Brian Recher, Tom Henderson, Fred Anastopoulos, Kevin

Gavin, Kirk Greffen, and Craig Lewis. Coach Warfield always said that two-way lineman Tim Michel was the toughest pound-for-pound football player he ever coached. During the season, the Laker defense surrendered just 35 points, including four shutouts against Severn, West Nottingham, St. James, and Pallotti – an average of less than four points per game. Gilson ran for over 100 yards in eight of the nine game<mark>s inclu</mark>ding a 193 yard day on 33 caries against St. James. Just prior to the rivalry game against St. Paul's, BL barely won its eighth game, 6-0, over Pallotti setting up the title game against the Crusaders. On a sunny, but chilly day, the Lakers traveled to Brooklandville for the Tri-County Independent League championship. Both teams came into the game with identical 4-0 league records. BL played its worst game of the year, fumbling the ball six times, three of them lost, and throwing an interception. Gilson scored the first points of the day on a 61-yard off-tackle run. Brad Glaser scored the two-point conversion and later scored the second Boys' Latin TD on a fumble recovery in the endzone. BL led 14-12 late, but fumbled the ball back to St. Paul's with over seven minutes to go, giving the Crusaders a chance to win the game. SP drove to the BL six yard line, but was eventually stopped short of a first down giving the Lakers possession of the ball and allowing them to run out the clock, ending the game, securing the two-point win and the Tri-County League title. At the conclusion of the season, Daly, Gilson, Glaser, Lewis, Michel, Ensor, Recher and Poulos were all named to the All-League first team. Six members of the team along with Coach Warfield are members of the BL Athletic Hall of Fame.

Richard B. Grieves '78

Dicky arrived on campus as a sophomore. He was a three year Laker and a two-sport athlete earning two letters in football and three in lacrosse. He was a back-up halfback and defensive back on the 1977 unde-



feated football team. He is arguably one of the finest assist players in the history of Boys' Latin lacrosse. He played attack in high school and one year of attack in college before being converted to midfield. Lacrosse was where he shined the brightest at BL. As a sophomore and junior he was a back-up attackman. His junior year his playing time increased and he ended the season with nine goals and three assists. By his senior year he was a starter for Coach Warfield. He led the entire Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) in scoring with 53 points and in assists with 37, while playing in all of BL's games – just 13 that season. He played on two Laker teams that lost in the MSA "A" Conference title games his junior and senior years. As a senior, Dicky was clearly one of the best feeders in the state. In eight of BL's

13 games he assisted three or more goals per game. Against St. Mary's he had four assists and had five assists against both Loyola and St. Paul's. In a 23-11 win over McDonogh in May of 1978, Dicky assisted on eight of the goals — one of the highest one game assists totals in BL lacrosse history. In the 11-10 1978 MSA championship loss to Gilman, Dicky had a hand in half of the Laker scores with a goal and four assists. At season's end, Dicky won the coveted Ehrhardt Award in lacrosse for team spirit. He was also named Honorable Mention All-Metro by both The Baltimore Sun and The Baltimore News American. Dicky continued his lacrosse career at Washington College and became one of the best midfielders in Sho'men history. In his four year stay in Chestertown, Dicky had a total of 120 goals and 91 assists. His teams went to the NCAA post-season three times, including the 1982 team that lost the Division III championship game, 9-8, in overtime, to Hobart. Dicky scored two goals in the heartbreaking loss. Twice he was named first team Division III All-American and after his senior year was named by the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) as the Division III Midfielder of the Year and selected to play in the annual USILA North-South game.

Michael T. Colt '84

Mike first arrived on Lake Avenue in the fall of 1975 as a fourth grade student. His senior year he served as the president of the Athletic Council and the Spirit Club. In athletics, Mike had the reputation as a hustler



and an intense competitor. "He's one of the greatest competitors I've ever been associated with," Head Lacrosse Coach Bob Shriver told The Baltimore News American. "He hustles. He's aggressive. He's a winner. He does the dirty work for the team that doesn't get noticed." Overall, Mike earned six varsity letters – three in basketball and three in lacrosse. He was captain of the lacrosse and basketball teams his senior year. In basketball, Coach Gelston relied heavily on him at center to not only score points, but to also rebound. However, Mike was only 6'1" so he had to use his quickness and hustling play to succeed, almost always playing against taller opponents. Mike started as a junior and senior. His junior year he scored less than five points per game, but his senior year, he averaged 9.3 points per game and just under eight rebounds per contest, including

three games where he achieved a double-double. His high game that season was a drubbing of Wilde Lake where Mike scored 18 points and snagged 11 boards. In his three year Laker basketball career Mike tallied 401 points for Coach Gelston. In lacrosse, as a senior, he was named first team All-Metro midfielder by The Baltimore Sun and The Baltimore News American. He was the co-captain of the team and helped lead the Lakers to the Maryland Scholastic Association's (MSA) "A" Conference Division I title, an overall record of 15-2, and a berth in the MSA title game against Loyola, a game the Lakers lost to the Dons, 8-6. BL finished the season ranked as the second best team in the area. He had just 19 total points on the season, but it was his work on securing ground balls and his tenacious defense that made him one of the best midfielders in the league. After the season ended Mike was selected to play for the MSA squad in the All-Star game against the Metro All-Stars. He scored two goals for the winners. He won the Coaches Cup for Teamwork and Leadership his senior year. As a junior, Mike won the Phyllis Miller Unsung Hero Award. After graduating from Boys' Latin, he continued his lacrosse career at Loyola College, earning four letters and scoring eight goals and four assists. However, he averaged over 44 ground balls per season including 73 in 1987, an average of 6.6 ground balls per game.

The 1986 Soccer Team

The 1986 soccer team is unquestionably BL's greatest soccer team ever. The team was loaded with talent and led by All-Metro performers Steve Nichols, Michael Thomas, Doug Sharretts, and Jeff Ulehla. Nichols and Ulehla collectively scored 32 of the team's 57 overall goals and assisted on 16 other goals. Thomas led the squad in



assists with 11. The 1985 team tied for the Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "B" Conference crown with Severn and Head Coach Butch Maisel knew the '86 team had the potential to improve on the previous year's performance. Maisel told the media he would be "very disappointed" if the team did not make it to the title game. His team had depth and the offensive fire power that also included players Orlando Orsino, Andy Maus, and Andy Siegel, but Maisel knew the key to success would be his "rock" defense led by Sharretts, Mike Lutz, Jason Morton, and his goalkeeper Jeff Cicone. With Maisel at the helm, the team defeated every opponent on the schedule and ended the campaign with a perfect 16-0 record. The season started with two out of

conference games. In the first contest, the Lakers defeated MSA "A" Conference power Loyola, 2-0, and then Towson Catholic, 4-0. In the first league game, BL defeated Severn, 2-1. BL ran through the schedule defeating St. Paul's, Spalding, Arlington Baptist, Friends, Mt. Carmel, Park, City, Poly Lutheran, and McDonogh. Five of the victories were shutouts. The Lakers were somewhat flat in the final regular season game against St. Mary's. The Saints took a 2-1 lead at intermission, but BL scored the only goals in the second half to win the game, 3-2. The win clinched the regular season title and gave the Lakers the number one seed in the four-team playoffs. In the semifinals, Boys' Latin hosted Friends and defeated the Quakers, 3-1. Lindsay Hargrave was the hero of the day scoring two goals and assisting on a third tally. His assist to Stuart Schwartz with over 12 minutes in regulation put BL up, 2-1, and in front to stay. Severn defeated St. Paul's in the other semifinal game setting up a Laker-Admiral final to be played at Essex Community College. Nichols, with two goals, led the Lakers to a 5-2 win over Severn and the championship. Ulehla, Siegel, and Josh Pomles also tallied goals for the winners. Orsino and Hargrave each had an assist. At season's end, The Baltimore Sun named Butch Maisel its Coach of the Year. The Lakers outscored their opponents 57-13 and recorded seven shutouts. Cicone finished the season with 73 saves in total, allowing just over a half goal average per game, while the offense scored over 3.5 goals per contest. Nichols, Ulehla, along with Sharretts, Lutz, Thomas, and Coach Maisel are all inductees of the BL Athletic Hall of Fame.

The 1987 Basketball Team

The 1986-1987 basketball team is one of Coach Hugh Gelston's best and most memorable teams. The Lakers' Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "B" Conference record was 19-2 and its overall record was 23-5. Of its



five losses, the team beat four of the teams in subsequent games later in the year. The Lakers, winners of the MSA "B" Conference Division II, finished the season on a 14-game winning streak and faced Gilman School, the Division I winners, in a best of three series to determine the champion. The team lacked overall height, but had a dynamic backcourt led by point guard Michael Thomas and shooting guard Brian Kowitz. Kowitz led the team in scoring with 17.7 points per game. Thomas added 11.9 per contest along with leading the team all year long in assists. Forward Peter Klingelhofer scored just under 10 points

per game. (Klingelhofer joins his father Carroll as a team member Hall of Famer. Carroll was a member of BL's 1961 HOF Basketball team.) The team's leading rebounder was David Hurley, who averaged seven boards per game. Gilman had a huge size advantage - a 67" center and a 6'5" forward - while the Lakers were the better shooters and the quicker of the two teams. The first game of the championship series was played at BL. The Lakers outscored Gilman in each of the first three periods, including going 9 of 11 from the field in the third period, to take an 11 point lead going into the final quarter. The Greyhounds put on a gallant comeback, but eventually lost the first game by a single point, 52-51. Two days later the teams met at Gilman. The Greyhounds dominated the first half and led by 18 points midway through the third period. The deficit was too much to overcome and the Lakers lost, 63-49, setting up the deciding third game to be played at Loyola College's Reitz Arena. Coach Gelston knew he had to slow the tempo down and force Gilman to shoot from the outside in order to win the series and the title. BL set the tempo and played the game exactly how Gelston planned. At intermission, the score was deadlocked at 19. BL took a 33-31 lead going into the final stanza. With just 25 seconds left in the game, an offensive charge was called against <mark>Gilma</mark>n with the Hounds <mark>winni</mark>ng by just a point. BL got the ball over the timeline and called time out. There were now 20 seconds remaining in the game. With just eight seconds on the clock, Brian Kowitz hit a baseline jumper to give the Lakers the lead. Gilman inbounded the ball and a desperation shot was off the mark giving Boys' Latin a 39-38 victory and the MSA "B" Conference championship – BL's first in eight years, Kowitz and Thomas along with teammate Derrick Robinson and Coach Gelston are all members of the BL Athletic Hall of Fame.

Kurt B. Owen '88

Kurt entered Boys' Latin as a freshman in the fall of 1984. He was a true scholar-athlete. A member of the National Honor Society starting in his sophomore year, he was the co-valedictorian of his senior class in



1988 and a class officer. His freshman year he won the Ryland O. Chapman History Award. As a sophomore, Kurt won the Daughters of the American Revolution Award for Good Citizenship. His junior year he was awarded the Yale Alumni Association of Maryland Scholarship Award for personifying the virtues and characteristics exhibited by Benjamin Franklin. And in his senior year he was awarded the Excellence in Physical Science Award and the Boyd F. Winkelblech Award for Excellence in Math. He was a member of the Athletic Council starting his junior year. Kurt earned a varsity letter his senior year in cross country and was a four year letter winner in wrestling. As a freshman, Kurt won his 100-pound match to start the Lakers huge 33-24 upset win over

number one ranked Mount Saint Joe. He won titles all four years wrestling in the prestigious Tatnall School Wrestling Tournament. He became just the third Laker to win a Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) wrestling crown his sophomore year in the 98-pound weight class, defeating his Mt. St. Joe opponent in the title bout, 9-5. The Lakers placed eighth that year in the MSA tournament. He was later named to The Baltimore Evening Sun's All-Metro wrestling team – a first for a BL wrestler. His junior year, he was a tri-captain and came in second place in the MSA's 115-pound weight class, losing the title bout, 11-7, and helping BL capture sixth place in the tournament. As a senior, Kurt was again tri-captain of the team and placed third in the MSAs in the 126-pound class helping the Lakers to a fourth place finish in the year end MSA wrestling tournament. After graduating from Boys' Latin Kurt attended The College of William and Mary.

Trent H. Carter '90

Trent entered Boys' Latin in the fall of 1987 as a sophomore. A Laker legacy, he is the son of BL Athletic Hall of Fame Class of 2008 inductee, Bob Carter. He and Bob are one of the few father-son combinations



to both win Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "A" Conference lacrosse championships for BL. (Bob in 1964 and Trent in 1988.) Trent was a leader on and off the field. As a senior, he was a member of the Student Government. In athletics, he earned six varsity letters; three in football and three in lacrosse. In football, as a junior he was named All-Tri County first team as a defensive back helping his Laker team defeat archrival St. Paul's, 13-8. His senior year, Trent served as one of the team's captains and led the Lakers offensively and defensively again earning first team All-Tri County honors. At season's end he represented BL in the MSA/County All-Star football game. In lacrosse, although he did not score much, he was a ground ball middie and one of Coach Shriver's leading midfield-

ers. Shriver described Trent as a "classic two-way midfielder" who could play exceptionally well at "both ends of the field" – a rarity in today's game of lacrosse. Trent was named second team All-Metro in lacrosse his senior year. At the annual athletic awards ceremony in the spring of 1990, Trent won both the Coaches Cup for Teamwork and Leadership and the Never Quit Award. After graduating from Boys' Latin, Trent continued his lacrosse career at Hobart College, where he played on two of Hobart's Division III National Championship teams. He has continued to stay involved in lacrosse coaching at the high school level in Florida. He has earned numerous recognitions throughout his lacrosse coaching career, including Coach of the Year by Naples Daily News from 2012 – 2016 and U.S. Lacrosse Coach of the Year in 2014. Since 2017, he has been the Head Coach of the Canterbury School of Fort Myers, Florida, with an overall record of 83-42. He also serves as the school's Associate Athletic Director.

G. Kelby Gelston '90

Kelby was a twelve year Laker legacy, the son of former Head Basketball Coach, Athletic Director, and member of the BL Athletic Hall of Fame Class of 2008, Hugh "Snuffy" Gelston. As a student, Kelby




worked on the Maroon and White Yearbook his senior year and was a Class Officer his junior year. He earned five varsity letters; three in basketball and two in lacrosse. He was his father's point guard for three seasons, a starter for two seasons, and was known for his excellent ball handling and passing. He is arguably one of Coach Gelston's finest point guards ever. As a sophomore he led the Lakers in three-point shooting at 42%. As a junior he was named 2nd Team All-Conference, while averaging 9.3 points per game and just under three assists per game. He shot 44% from the floor and 39% from beyond the arc. As a senior, he was the floor general for the 12-1 (27-4 overall) Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "C" Conference Champions. Earlier in the year, Kelby was named to

the Laker Invitational All-Star team and at the conclusion of the season was named All-MSA Honorable Mention, averaging 12.5 points, and just under four assists per game during the campaign. His consistency showed his senior year when he shot 42% from the floor and 40% from 'downtown.' The Lakers lost to St. Paul's in the Independent School Tournament by a point, 43-42, and had the opportunity to avenge that loss when the two schools met for the MSA "C" Conference title at the Baltimore Arena. Kelby led the Laker attack brilliantly, scoring 10 points while controlling the tempo of the game in the 57-52 win over the Crusaders. BL ended the year ranked 19th in the region by The Baltimore Sun. Kelby ended his basketball career as a Top 20 All-Time scorer for Coach Gelston at #15 with 691 points scored during his hoops stint. In lacrosse he was a back-up goalie for Coach Shriver for two years. After graduating from BL, Kelby continued his lacrosse career playing Division I ball at Michigan State University.

Phillip Booker III '93

Phil came to BL in the fall of 1989 as a freshman in high school. He was the classic three-sport athlete, earning letters in football, basketball, and baseball. He is arguably one of BL's best athletes ever. He was in-



volved in various extra-curricular activities while in high school, including giving back to the school as a member of the Admissions Club. Overall he earned nine varsity letters, four in football, two in basketball, and three in baseball. In football he was an outstanding wide receiver and safety. As a junior he was the top receiver in the Tri-County league. His senior year, he was the leading receiver and a tri-captain of the team. He ended the season with 29 catches for over 500 yards and was again named to the All Tri-County first team. He still has one of the longest TD receptions in school history - a 75-yard reception. In basketball the 6'3" forward/center led the Lakers in scoring and rebounding his senior year and after his three year hoops career was over, he was one of Coach Gelston's Top Ten

all time scorers (#10) with 816 total points. In baseball, Phil was one of the most versatile players in the program. His sophomore year he batted .487 and helped the Lakers to a record of 11-5 and into the playoffs. Phil almost single-handedly advanced the team to the championship round, but his homerun and 2-3 effort at the plate was too little and BL was eliminated, losing the playoff game, 4-3. He led the team again in hitting his junior year. His senior year, he helped the team attain a 12-3 overall record and the Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "B" Conference title. In the title clinching championship game, Phil went 2-4 with four runs scored and two RBIs in the huge 17-10 victory. He was the team's second leading hitter and named a second team All-City selection as an outfielder and first team All-MSA "B" Conference by The Baltimore Sun. He excelled in the classroom as well and was Boys' Latin's Scholar Athlete selection in 1993. After graduating from BL he attended the University of Maryland.

D. Andrew Sharretts '93

Andy joins his brother Doug (Class of 2018) as an inductee into the BL Athletic Hall of Fame. Andy came to BL in the fall of 1988 as an eighth grade student. He was an old school three-sport athlete, earning nine varsity



letters; three in soccer, three in basketball, and three in lacrosse. He started all three years on the varsity soccer team on the defensive side of the field for Coach Butch Maisel. Andy played forward in basketball and ended his hoops career as a Top 30 scorer for Coach Gelston with 489 total points. Many times, the basketball Lakers relied on Andy's outside scoring. In lacrosse, Andy served as one of the team's tri-captains his senior year. He helped the Lakers win three consecutive Division II Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "A" Conference lacrosse titles. He was a big strong midfielder and was Coach Shriver's leading scoring middie his sophomore and junior seasons. Coach Shriver described Andy as one of the MSA's best midfielders. His junior year he scored 10 goals and had 17 assists and was named an honorable mention All-Metro midfielder by The Baltimore Sun.

His 1992 Laker team only lost two games all year – both by one goal to league champion St. Paul's. His senior year, he led the entire team in scoring with 41 points (28 goals and 13 assists.) At the conclusion of his senior year, The Baltimore Sun wrote that Andy "was the chief cog in the wheels of the Laker transition game" while naming him to the 1993 first team All-Metro and All-City teams at midfield. He was also named a high school All-American his senior year, one of just five players in the MSA to be given the honor. He also represented the MSA in the annual All-Star game between the MSA and the Metro All-Stars. During Andy's three years as a starting midfielder, BL had a cumulative record of 43-9 (83%.) Andy continued his lacrosse career at Syracuse University. He earned four varsity letters at Syracuse and was a member of the 1995 NCAA Division I National Lacrosse championship Orange team.

C. Ridgely Warfield H'11 Coach

Ridge taught and coached at Boys' Latin for 13 years and his impact on BL student athletes is immeasurable. He was the head coach of the varsity football and lacrosse teams for five years, from 1975-1979. A native



of Baltimore and a graduate of St. Paul's School, Ridge was named an Honorable Mention Lacrosse All-American as a defenseman in 1967, while playing for the University of Virginia Cavaliers. Ridge first came to BL in the fall of 1967 as a history teacher and assistant varsity football coach. Through the years he settled in as a fixture in the middle school, teaching and coaching middle school athletics. He led the varsity football team to an overall record of 27-14-2 (66%) in his five years at the helm, including the 1977 Tri-County championship team. That team was BL's last undefeated football team. In lacrosse he led the Lakers to an overall 53-24 (69%) record including guiding BL to three consecutive Maryland Scholastic Association (MSA) "A" Conference lacrosse title games in 1977, 1978, and 1979.

On the junior varsity level, Ridge led Boys' Latin to three consecutive MSA lacrosse titles in 1972, 1973, and 1974. The 1972 championship was BL's first JV lacrosse title since 1949. He was loved by his students and players. Charlie Stieff '74 wrote, "[Ridge] was the best coach I ever had. [He] could really motivate players and knew his x's and o's." Phil Federico '75 wrote, "He loved his boys." Stuart May '75 wrote, "Mr. Warfield was my 7th grade history teacher and intramural coach. He was a great man in every way." Brent Dempsey '74 added, "They don't come any better as a coach or a man. Ridge was a big influence in my life." Wayne Birely '75 said about Ridge, "[He was] the greatest motivator and always had a smile when I would see him. He really meant a lot to a lot of us." Bob Shriver, who first was a varsity lacrosse assistant under Ridge wrote, "Back in the day when Ridge taught at Boys' Latin, one always knew Ridge was in the building. Whether he was teaching, talking to some kid, or sending an ill-mannered student on a run around the baseball field, [it was a pleasure] to witness a master at his craft. Ridge and his friend Dick Working H'10, who he taught and coached with, were both royalty in the coaching and teaching professions." Ridge was named an honorary alumnus at the 2011 Homecoming celebration.
