Dear RCSD Community Member,

Each September, just before the start of school, all of our teachers, staff members, and administrators gather in the Performing Arts Center (PAC) at the High School for "Opening Day." Everyone listens to a few remarks to kick off the year and gather our collective focus before heading to the schools to prepare for students to arrive the next day. I want to share what I spoke about this year.

This summer, I spent time looking at what is changing in the education landscape. As I shared last year, New York State has been re-examining what our graduates need and how the education system should change in order to be more equitable and to best prepare students for life beyond high school. That work has progressed and it appears that



significant changes will be coming, particularly at the secondary level around how students will meet graduation requirements. These long-standing requirements are expected to shift, adding more flexibility and options for project-based assessments rather than the currently required Regents exams.

The State has developed what it calls "A Portrait of A Graduate," which it considers the desired outcomes for all New York State high school graduates.

They include being a:

- Critical Thinker
- Innovative Problem Solver
- Effective Communicator
- Global Citizen

Students should also possess:

- · Literacy Across the Content Areas
- Social Emotional Competence
- Cultural Competence

How does this align with what we have been doing in Rye? I think extremely well! Anyone who has ever come to a Board meeting or watched one online knows that we spend a lot of time thinking about and talking about <u>The Rye Commitment</u>. It's the guiding force behind everything we do. One of the "promises" in The Rye Commitment is to our students, and it goes like this:

TO STUDENTS:

We will provide the necessary support for you to receive an education that helps you become socially responsible, caring citizens who can think critically, communicate effectively, collaborate, and creatively solve problems in a diverse global environment.

For us as a school district, the coming changes to the graduation requirements and newly defined core competencies will challenge all of us to "think again" about how we provide our students with the necessary skills and dispositions to fulfill the promises in The Rye Commitment.

Think Again...And Again

Every year, at the beginning of the school year, I give every employee in the school district a book. *Think Again: The Power of Knowing What You Don't Know* by Adam Grant is this year's selection. Published in 2021, the book is a #1 *New York Times* bestseller and a *New York Times Book Review* Editors' Choice, I have Assistant Director of Athletics Al Mercado to thank for bringing it to my attention last spring. I read it then, but shared it with my colleagues just this year.

As educators, we are all about learning. This book is about having the mental muscle and yes, courage, to question what you think you know and re-learn. While it may sound like a hard read, Grant's writing style is very compelling and chock full of real-life situations. For example, to explore interpersonal rethinking by destabilizing stereotypes, he examines the deep divide between New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox fans!

For me, one of the best parts of the book was the third section, which focused on "creating communities of lifelong learners" by depolarizing our divided discussions and teaching students to question knowledge.

Grant is an organizational psychologist and professor at The Wharton School. He is a popular TED's speaker, his talks having been viewed more than 25 million times. He has a podcast called "WorkLife with Adam Grant. He has been recognized as one of the world's ten most influential

management thinkers, named to the "Fortune's 40 Under 40" list, and has received scientific achievement awards from the American Psychological Association and the National Science Foundation. Adam received his B.A. from Harvard and his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan, and he is a former Junior Olympic springboard diver.

One reviewer put it this way: If knowledge is power, knowing what we don't know is wisdom. Something for all of us to think about!

Eight Rye High School seniors were named National Merit Scholarship Program Semifinalists in mid-September. The students earned the recognition by scoring well on the PSAT/NMSQT test taken during their junior year. Of the over 1.3 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools nationwide who took the test, more than 16,000 were named semi-finalists. They have an opportunity to continue in the competition for approximately 6,870 National Merit Scholarships worth almost \$26 million.
