Kindergarten News

October

Kindergarten is a busy place! Your wonderful children have been learning the routines and procedures of the classroom as we foster their independence. In language arts, students have been exploring many books to find out how our five senses help us learn about the world. We continue to practice naming letters and the letter sounds. We have been focusing on writing names with one uppercase letter and the rest in lowercase. In math, we will be finishing our first unit on position, length, height, and sorting and moving into our next unit that will include numbers to 5, shapes, and weight. We will also be continuing to learn about fall. Students will be discussing fire safety during the month of October.

First Grade News

Our classes are in full swing and we are very busy! We are learning about short vowel words and words with digraphs (ch, sh, th, wh, ck). We are focusing on sliding through the sounds to increase automaticity. Our goal is to eventually be able to read words automatically without having to segment the individual sounds. We do encourage them to tap out the sounds when writing the words. We are learning about nouns, both common and proper, verbs, adjectives, and how to construct a complete sentence. In math, we are working on adding and subtracting numbers within 10. Children are exploring different tools and strategies such as ten frames, number paths, and number bonds to solve problems. We will be working on using addition to subtract, understanding teen numbers, and adding three numbers. We will continue to work on story problems. We hope you are enjoying this beautiful fall weather! We look forward to meeting with you at October conferences.

Second Grade News

It was a pleasure seeing so many families at Curriculum Night and having the opportunity to share the grade level expectations and curriculum. We feel fortunate to be working alongside parents that are deeply invested in their children's education and encourage learning at home. Homework communication sheets come home with students on Monday, and should be returned the following Monday morning in red folders. These are to record both their reading and their math fact practice.

Second graders are working hard across all subject areas. In math, we are learning strategies to add and subtract within 20. We are also solving word problems by identifying the correct operation and applying fact strategies. We started reading bar and picture graphs and using the data to solve addition and subtraction questions.

In language arts, students continue to focus on the essential question, how does change impact people and nature? We have moved from an informational read aloud to fiction, and will read three more titles to build students' knowledge and understanding. Students continue to focus on developing topic statements and choosing relevant details as evidence to support their ideas in a paragraph. Students are also practicing identifying the subject and verb in complete sentences.

We look forward to discussing each individual child's progress at Parent-Teacher Conferences on October 23rd and 24th.

Third Grade News

It's hard to believe the first month of school is behind us! Students are doing a great job adjusting to the new expectations and procedures in third grade and working hard toward their classroom respect goals. In reading, we have been busy establishing routines and building stamina. We have launched our first unit in Wit and Wisdom about how artists explore the sea. Students have been responding to questions with evidence, learning about elements of art, incorporating grammar knowledge, and working on paragraph structure. Students have begun drafting paragraphs using a topic sentence, evidence, elaboration and a conclusion statement. In math, multiplication and division has been a focus already this year. Students began the year learning to relate addition and subtraction to multiplication and division and the strategies behind problems in order to solve equations in various ways. In social studies, we have started our study of Indigenous People of Connecticut. Happy Fall!


Math News





Shapely Sticks

Twigs are a fabulous resource for making shapes and demonstrating what kids know about their attributes.



- Collect a large bunch of twigs
- . Give ideas for what to make
 - Name a shape (triangle, square, etc)
 - Name a category
 - Quadrilaterals
 - Pentagons
 - Polygons
 - Shapes with 4 angles

Count The Chestnuts

Acorns or chestnuts are a great resource to practice place value.

You will need:

- Baskets or buckets (which will act as 100s, 10s, 1s columns and so on...)
- · Chestnuts or acorns (to throw into the baskets/buckets)

How to run the activity:

- 1. Collect 10 of 3 items from outside (Ex rocks, acorns, chestnuts)
- 2. Designate each item as representing 100s, 10s or 1s.
- 3. Set up and label baskets and assign them a place value 100s, 10s, 1s.
- 4. Shout out a number.
- 5. Child throws acorns or chestnuts into the respective baskets to make up the number.
- 6. Ex. If you shout out 684. Then the child would throw 6 chestnuts in the 100's bucket, 8 rocks in the 10s bucket and 4 acorns into the 1's bucket.
- 7. Adjust the place value for different ages (Ex. Use 2 buckets for younger children to practice two-digit numbers).

THIS MONTH IN MUSIC



Kindergarten

Kindergartners are developing the concept of steady beat!
We're practicing playing the steady beat on drums and
learning about famous Latino drummer Tito Puente. The
students are so excited to apply their skills to instruments!

First Grade

First grade students are exploring creating their own accompaniment for songs and experiencing partwork (multiple lines in a musical piece). We're using a traditional chant "Bate Bate Chocolate" to explore how to make these musical decisions, and learn about a tasty Mexican dish!



Second Grade

Second graders are learning about traditional drumming practices in Cuba through storytelling, drumming, and dancing. Our book "Drum Dream Girl" tells the true story of a young girl who overcame Cuba's taboo against female drummers, and inspired the next generation of musicians!

Third Grade

Third grade students reviewed instrument safety, and learned a stick routine to Jennifer Lopez's song "Let's Get Loud". They're exploring similarities and differences between Hispanic msuicians expanding their knowledge about the singer Selena Quintanilla.

From the Health Office

Vision Screenings:

The State of Connecticut requires vision and hearing screenings to be done on all K, 1st, and 3rd grade students each school year. In the past, students have been screened in the Health Office utilizing the Snellen Chart. Once again this school year the District has partnered with the local Lions Club to provide vision screenings as part of KidSight, a Lions Club community service program. The Lions Club representatives will come to Burr Elementary on a set date to perform the screenings during school hours. The vision screening is done with a device similar to a camera, a quick scan of the student's eyes and a report will be generated. This screening is non-invasive, fast and can detect a number of issues which if detected would require following up with a healthcare professional. There is no cost for this screening. If a discrepancy is noted, parents will receive a note from me with a copy of the report from the scanner recommending further evaluation with a healthcare professional. We are tentatively looking at **Monday, November 4th** for the screenings to be performed. I will be working alongside the Lions Club representatives to assist with a smooth screening day. This is a screening tool, not an eye exam. If your child wears glasses, please be sure they have them on screening day. If you wish for your child to opt out of this vision service, please email me eulizio@rsd17.org by Monday, October 28th.

Lice causes itching and irritation of the scalp. If your child experiences itchiness to their head, examining their scalp for any signs of lice would be best practice. If lice is detected at home, you can reach out to your pediatrician for guidance in regard to products for treatment. Also, pharmacists can be a good resource of current recommended products. If lice is detected at school you will be notified via a phone call. I can offer assistance if you have any questions or concerns during school hours. Included with this newsletter is a flier with some general information regarding lice. This information can be found on the District website *Parent/Guardian* tab.


RSD 17 Procedure regarding head lice is:

- If live lice or nits (eggs) appear on a child, the child's parents will be contacted so treatment can occur.
- After a child has been properly treated at home, the child may return to school.
- To ensure confidentiality, cases of head lice will not be shared with parents or students.

Head Lice 101

What You Should Know About Head Lice



What If My Child Gets Head Lice?

If you suspect your child might have head lice, it's important to talk to a school nurse, pediatrician or family physician to get appropriate care. There are a number of available treatments, including new prescription treatment options that are safe and do not require nit combing. Other things to consider in selecting and starting treatment include:

- Follow treatment instructions. Using extra amounts or multiple applications of the same medication is not recommended, unless directed by healthcare professional.⁵
- Resistance to some over-the-counter head lice treatments has been reported. The prevalence of resistance is not known.⁶⁷
- There is no scientific evidence that home remedies are effective treatments.⁸
- Head lice do not infest the house. However, family bed linens and recently used clothes, hats and towels should be washed in very hot water.⁴
- Personal articles, such as combs, brushes and hair clips, should also be washed in hot soapy water or thrown away if they were exposed to the persons with active head lice infestation.⁴
- All household members and other close contacts should be checked, and those with evidence of an active infestation should also be treated at the same time.⁴

Myths & Facts About Head Lice

Myth: Only dirty people get head lice.

Fact: Personal hygiene or household or school cleanliness are not factors for infestation. In fact, head lice often infest people with good hygiene and grooming habits. 2,3

Myth: Head lice carry diseases.

Fact: Head Lice do not spread diseases.1

Myth: Head lice can be spread by sharing hairbrushes, hats, clothes and other personal items.

Fact: It is uncommon to spread head lice by contact with clothing or other personal items, such as combs, brushes or hair accessories, that have been in contact with a person with head lice.¹

Myth: Head lice can jump or fly, and can live anywhere.

Fact: Head lice cannot jump or fly, and only move by crawling. It is unlikely to find head lice living on objects like helmets or hats because they have feet that are specifically designed to grasp on to the hair shaft of humans. Additionally, a louse can only live for a few hours off the head.¹

Myth: You can use home remedies like mayonnaise to get rid of head lice.

Fact: There is no scientific evidence that home remedies are effective treatments.⁸ A healthcare provider can discuss appropriate treatment options, including prescription products.







The Collaborative Problem Solving® (CPS) approach is owned and developed by Think:Kids (www.thinkids.org/, a program in the Department of Psychiatry at the Massachusetts General Hospital* in Boston, MA. The CPS approach is an evidence-based, trauma-informed method of responding to challenging behavior that promotes the understanding that people with challenging behavior lack the skill - not the will - to behave; specifically, skills related to problem-solving, flexibility, and frustration tolerance.

Unlike traditional models of discipline, the CPS approach avoids the use of power, control, and motivational procedures, and instead focuses on collaborating with the young person to solve the problems leading to challenging behavior and building the skills they need to succeed
