

## **Conferencing Tips for Parents**

The checklists below might help you learn more about parent-teacher conferences and how you, as a parent or guardian, can use the meeting to ask questions that will help your child. It is important to remember that you and the teacher both want the very best for your child. You can help your child by working together as a team. The conference with your child's teacher will be more efficient and productive if you do some preparation beforehand. Below are some steps to prepare for the conference:

#### Talk with your child

Ask your child what his/her strongest and weakest subjects are, and which subjects he/she likes most and least. Ask your child if he/she would like you to speak about anything particular with the teachers.

#### Prepare a list of questions

Preparing a list of questions will help you have a productive conversation with your child's teacher. Prioritize the questions in case you run out of time during the conference. The following questions are examples that will help you learn more about your child's progress in school:

- What are my child's strengths and weaknesses?
- Does my child hand classwork and homework in on time?
- Does my child participate in class?
- Does my child seem happy at school?
- What can I do at home to help?
- Has my child missed any classes other than his/her excused absences?

#### **During the conference**

- Be on time for the meeting.
- End the meeting on time. Other parents will probably have a conference after yours.
- Relax and be yourself.
- Ask the most important questions first.
- Ask for explanations of anything you don't understand.
- Ask your child's teacher for ways that you can help your child at home.
- Thank the teacher.

#### After the conference

- Talk about the conference with your child.
- Talk about the positive points, and be direct about problems.
- Tell your child about any plans you and the teacher created.
- Keep in touch with the teachers during the school year.

## **Understanding the Chain O'Lakes Ecosystem**

Curriculum Highlight—Biology

Last month, Biology students participated in the annual lake sampling survey at the Chain O'Lakes, kicking off their Ecology unit. The activity focuses on the interactions between organisms and their environment, with a central theme of energy flow through ecosystems. By sampling the lake, students gathered qualitative and quantitative data, identifying various organisms and determining their roles in the aquatic food web. This hands-on experience allowed

students to explore how energy is passed through ecosystems, especially the critical role microscopic invertebrates play in the Chain O'Lakes freshwater ecosystem.

Located just a few hundred yards from GCHS, the Fox Chain O'Lakes consists of nine major lakes connected by natural and dredged channels, covering over 29 miles. These freshwater bodies, originally formed by receding glaciers around 12,000 years ago, are part of a vital waterway fed by the Fox River, which eventually flows into the Illinois River. This unique environment provides a home to a variety of microorganisms and larger organisms, including autotrophic algae, diatoms, and desmids that perform photosynthesis, as well as heterotrophic organisms like flagellates and amoebas that feed on others to acquire energy. Plankton, worms, and arthropods such as water beetles and insect larvae also inhabit the lake's sediment.

By studying these organisms and their interactions, students gained insight into the complexity of freshwater ecosystems and their energy flow, further preparing them for the broader topics in their Ecology unit. This annual lab activity offers a unique and enriching opportunity for students to connect classroom lessons with real-world ecological research.



## Cybersecurity

A Top Priority for Our School District

Grant Community High School is making cybersecurity a top priority to safeguard the personal data and sensitive information of both students and staff. Our Technology Department emphasizes that cybersecurity must be integrated into the culture. Cybersecurity doesn't just stop and start with the Technology Department. It involves every teacher, staff member, and student who uses district technology. This approach aligns with Illinois law requiring public schools to implement and maintain reasonable security procedures that meet or exceed industry standards.

#### **Cybersecurity Assessment**

The District recently participated in a Cybersecurity Assessment administered by their cyber liability insurance coverage consulting firm, Secure Halo. This evaluation compared the District against best practices curated by the Learning Technology Center (LTC) and aligned with globally recognized cybersecurity standards. The assessment also included additional best practices to support legislative compliance and provide a solid foundation for cybersecurity strategies. Director of Technology, Tom Furlan, stated "Having an outside firm perform an assessment of our technology readiness is great for our district. There are never enough safeguards to keep our information secure, it's about putting as many layers of protection around us as possible."

#### **Key Recommendations**

Based on the assessment results, the District scored very well and is implementing several key recommendations that were provided:

- Investing in impactful security measures to monitor unauthorized devices and users
- Developing a comprehensive prevention and response plan for security incidents and cyberattacks
- Ensuring proper identification, protection, and management of sensitive information

#### **Ongoing Efforts**

The District has proactively implemented several security measures including:

- Mandatory cybersecurity training for all staff
- Multi-factor authentication
- Regular software updates
- Continuous phishing and ransomware training for staff

The main topics covered in district cybersecurity training sessions typically include:

- Creating strong and unique passwords
- Identifying phishing attempts
- Avoiding suspicious links and downloads
- Handling sensitive information securely

Cybersecurity is everyone's responsibility, and together we can create a safer digital environment for our school community.

### John Welter to be Inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame



We are proud to announce that John Welter, a legendary coach and beloved figure in our community, will be inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame - Illinois Chapter this October. This prestigious honor is a testament to his incredible 53-year career in coaching, during which he has guided countless athletes across various programs. A dedicated mentor, Welter was previously inducted into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association (IWCOA) Hall of Fame in 2018 and served as the Grand Marshal of the IESA State Tournament in 2009. His legacy has been recognized locally as well, with inductions into the Grant Community High School Hall of Fame in 2014 and the College of Lake County Hall of Fame in 1994.

Welter's connection to Grant runs deep. A graduate of the Class of 1967, he was an all-state athlete at GCHS, excelling in multiple sports but always carrying a special passion for wrestling. His wrestling journey continued at the College of Lake County, where he earned a National Championship, before completing his undergraduate degree at Northern Illinois University and his graduate degree at Concordia University.

Throughout his 32 years as a public school teacher and over 40 years of coaching wrestling—25 of those years right here at Grant—Welter has led his teams to remarkable success. His coaching career includes two state wrestling championships and the representation of numerous teams and finalists at the state competition level. Even with decades of accomplishments, Welter's dedication to the sport and his students remains unwavering, as he continues to coach and mentor the next generation of wrestlers at Grant.

Welter will be formally inducted during the National Wrestling Hall of Fame - Illinois Chapter Annual Honors Banquet on Sunday, October 6, 2024. The ceremony will take place at the DoubleTree by Hilton in Alsip, IL, located at 5000 W. 127th St. This event will honor Welter's remarkable contributions to the sport of wrestling and his lasting impact on the athletes he has mentored. 

This season the Grant Theatre family would like to invite you to take a trip down the rabbit hole. GCHS proudly presents Lewis Carroll's *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland. ## **Advanced Placement Exam Registration**

AP exams are an important part of all AP courses. This is a standardized test created by the College Board that is administered across the nation and serves as a benchmark in recognizing your student's ability. Although participation in the exam is optional, we do encourage all students to take the exam. With a successful score, college credit or advanced placement may be earned at various colleges through this examination. The examination fee is less than the college tuition for taking this same course.

There is a fee associated with this exam. The total cost for taking each AP exam is \$99.00. The College Board and the State of Illinois also offer programs to subsidize fees for students who receive free or reduced lunch. If this is the case, the exam fee is \$63.00 per exam. If your student receives free or reduced lunch and is paying the reduced exam fee, please contact Mrs. Jones in our Curriculum Office or via phone at 847-973-3800. We will certainly work with individual students and families to make sure every qualified student is able to take Advanced Placement exams.

Students must have a College Board account created and be enrolled in the AP Classroom for that course in order to take the exam. Parents should go to our RevTrak system to pay for the exam(s). RevTrak can be found on the Grant website under the parent tab in the Student fees and payments section.



#### Important Deadlines for AP Exam Registrations for Year-Long or Semester One Courses:

- November 4, 2024: Students taking the exams must pay a minimum \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee per test.
- November 11, 2024: AP teachers will verify with all students that exam registration is accurate in the system and pre-registration fees have been paid.
- November 13, 2024: AP Exam registration is finalized. Any exam registrations that do not have the \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee paid by then will be canceled.
- November 15, 2024: Late registration fees or test cancellation fees go into effect. If students sign up for a year-long or first semester course AP exam on this date or after, an additional \$40.00 late fee will be incurred. If a student decides to cancel an exam on this date or after, the student forfeits the \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee.
- March 14, 2025: All exams must have the balance payment paid or the exam will be canceled and the student will forfeit the \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee.
- Second semester AP courses will have a different set of deadlines and will be notified at the beginning of the second semester.

On behalf of our faculty and administration, we would like to wish all of our students all the best as they continue to prepare for these important exams.



## **Seal of Biliteracy**

The next administration of language proficiency testing for the State Seal of Biliteracy is on October 18th! The Seal of Biliteracy is a recognition for students who demonstrate proficiency in English and one or more other languages. When earned, the Seal of Biliteracy will appear on the student's official transcript and diploma. Students who earn the Seal of Biliteracy are also allowed to earn early college credit. All public colleges and universities in the State of Illinois have criteria for how this credit is awarded. Students should reference the college or university website for their criteria about how the specific institution recognizes the Seal of Biliteracy for college credit.

To qualify for the State Seal of Biliteracy, a Grant student must accomplish one of the following to demonstrate proficiency in English:

- Earn a minimum score of 480 on the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing portion of an official administration of the SAT, a 20 on the ELA portion of the ACT, or a composite SAT score of 21 or above
- Earn a minimum score of 4.8 on the ACCESS test
- Earn a score of 5 on the AP English and Language Composition Test
- Earn a score of I-5 on the AAPPL English Test

To demonstrate proficiency in another language, each student must also meet one of the following criteria:

- Earn a score of 4 or higher on the AP Spanish Test
- Earn a minimum score of I-5 on the AAPPL test in the chosen language

Students wishing to earn the Seal of Biliteracy are encouraged to discuss the opportunity with their counselor. The AAPPL test fee varies based on the language selected. # **Xeepitred**

At GCHS, bullying of any kind by any person is unacceptable. All students should be free from worries about being bullied. Students who bully others must be taught other, appropriate ways of interacting with peers. Bullying, intimidation, and harassment diminish a student's ability to learn and a school's ability to educate. Preventing students from engaging in these disruptive behaviors is an important GCHS goal.

Bullying is defined as any severe or pervasive physical or verbal act or conduct, including communications made in writing or electronically, directed toward a student that has or can be reasonably predicted to have the effect of one or more of the following:

- 1. Placing the student in reasonable fear of harm to the student's person or property.
- 2. Causing a substantially detrimental effect on the student's physical or mental health.
- 3. Substantially interfering with the student's academic performance.
- 4. Substantially interfering with the student's ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities, or privileges provided by a school.

Bullying, intimidation, and/or harassment may take various forms, including, without limitation; threats, stalking, physical violence, sexual harassment, theft, public humiliation, destruction of property, or retaliation for asserting or alleging an act of bullying.

This month, all students will learn or go through a refresh lesson on the bullying intervention program we practice at GCHS called <u>Expect Respect</u> and were shown the <u>Expect Respect Video</u>. In addition, all students will be made aware of the <u>Anonymous Report-Bulldogs Against Bullying</u>.

GCHS staff members are asked to respond immediately and compassionately to a student who reports bullying or school violence. After evaluating the situation to determine if an immediate referral is needed, a dean or designee will work with the student(s) to take the report of potential bullying. You will be informed whenever your child is involved in a bullying report. The Board's entire policy may be found on the District's website, <u>School Board Policy-7:180 Prevention and Response to Bullying</u>.
