Praise Good Choices


Reinforce Positivity: Praise your child for responsible online behavior.

Keeping Pace with Educational Trends

Turner County's Participation in the Teaching and Learning Summit

In a commitment to staying abreast of the latest educational trends, several Turner County employees recently attended the Teaching and Learning Summit organized by the Georgia Department of Education. This event provided a platform for educators to explore the latest resources, strategies, and legislative updates across various K-12 content areas.

English Language Arts (ELA) Focus

Participants delved into Georgia's new ELA standards, emphasizing the significance of professional learning to facilitate a seamless transition to these standards in the upcoming academic year.

Mathematics Strategies

The Mathematics session concentrated on implementing the state's K-12 Mathematics Standards with fidelity. Initiatives like the Georgia Numeracy Project were highlighted to bolster student interventions.

Science and Social Studies Innovations

New resources from GaDOE Inspire were introduced, designed to enhance standards-aligned instruction and encourage inquiry-based learning within Science and Social Studies.

Advancements in Computer Science

Sessions on Computer Science showcased innovative tools and teaching strategies aimed at boosting student engagement and success in this rapidly growing field.

Leadership and Student Support Initiatives

Key sessions covered aspects of school leadership and student support, including strengthening Tier 1 instructional practices and understanding Georgia's Multi-Tiered System of Supports. The use of digital tools for collaborative learning, as well as guidance on Early Intervention and Gifted Education programs, was also discussed.

Focus on Literacy and School Climate

The summit featured sessions on literacy, dyslexia, school climate, and the recruitment and retention of effective educators, underscoring ongoing efforts to enhance educational outcomes and foster a positive learning environment across Georgia's schools.

Turner County's participation in this summit reflects a continued dedication to educational excellence and innovation, aiming to benefit both educators and students alike.

District Staff and Academic Coaches Conduct Classroom Observations

Working in pairs, they gained valuable insights from various grade levels, focusing on enhancing teaching practices and student engagement.

- **?Effective Questioning**: Evaluating techniques that prompt critical thinking and student responses.
- **Classroom Management**: Assessing how teachers maintain organized, respectful, and productive learning environments.

This collaborative approach allowed for shared perspectives, identification of strengths, and the provision of constructive feedback to support continuous improvement in creating effective learning environments.

Exploring the Cave of Altamira: 4th Grade GATE Archaeology Unit

Under the guidance of teacher **Suzi Mathis**, 4th-grade GATE students embarked on a fascinating study of the Cave of Altamira as part of their archaeology unit.

This exploration offered insights into the Paleolithic Period, including:

- Paleolithic Art: Discussion on the unique paints used during that era.
- Historical Dating: Understanding how experts determined the cave's age of over 13,000 years.

• Artistic Techniques: Learning about the cave's low ceiling paintings, some just two feet high, leading to students experiencing painting under tables to mimic the cave conditions.





This hands-on project serves as an example for students, who will soon select and present their own research topics, such as Stonehenge, Easter Island Moai, and King Tut's Tomb. Over the next several weeks, students will engage in independent research, culminating in presentations that showcase their findings and creativity.

5th Grade Science Explores Volcanoes and Earthquakes!



This engaging project helped meet the Georgia Standards of Excellence while keeping students actively involved in their learning.




Lesson Highlights:

- Food Chains and Webs: The class explored food chains and food webs, learning about the diets of various organisms.


Model Creation

VERIFY INFORMATION'S CREDIBILITY

BEFORE SHARING: CONSULT OFFICIAL SOURCES LIKE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION. LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT, OR REPUTABLE NEWS OUTLETS.

AVOID SPREADING RUMORS OR UNVERIFIED INFORMATION DURING EMERGENCIES TO PREVENT PANIC AND SUPPORT OFFICIAL RESPONSE EFFORTS.

PROTECT PRIVACY:

BY NOT SHARING PERSONAL INFORMATION OR LOCATIONS OF STUDENTS, STAFF, OR FIRST RESPONDERS DURING ACTIVE SITUATIONS TO ENSURE SAFETY.

BE AWARE OF TIMING:



IN FAST-CHANGING SITUATIONS. INFORMATION CAN BECOME OUTDATED QUICKLY. ALWAYS CHECK THE TIMESTAMP OF POSTS AND SEEK RECENT UPDATES FROM OFFICIAL SOURCES.

REPORT SUSPICIOUS CONTENT: IF YOU



Exploring Heat Energy with 8th Grade Science

In Y**oshi Williams's 8th-grade class**, students have been diving into the fascinating world of heat energy, conduction, and convection. With the support of Turner County 4-H, they participated in a STEM lesson to enhance their understanding of these physical science concepts.



Hands-On Learning with Water Experiments

Using food coloring in hot and cold water, students observed that cold water, being denser, sinks, while hot water rises due to its lower density. This experiment allowed students to relate science to personal experiences, like noticing temperature differences in a pool or bathtub.





Connecting Science to Current Events

As extreme weather events like hurricanes, floods, and tornadoes capture national attention, a tropical storm in the Gulf of Mexico provided a timely context for learning. Understanding the science behind these phenomena helps deepen students' comprehension.

Understanding Convection and Conduction

Students explored how the sun's energy heats the Earth unevenly, causing air movements and changing weather patterns. They learned that in convection, portions of a fluid become hotter or colder, resulting in movement. Air behaves similarly, with uneven heating causing air movement and weather changes.

Integrating Scientific Skills

The 4-H lesson also emphasized observing, predicting, applying, and communicating physical processes, reinforcing key scientific skills.
