It is in dire need of a completely new building. The heating and air conditioning system and air circulation/ventilation system are ancient. This is resulting in mold, moisture, condensation, etc. It is a safety concern that is causing staff and students to get sick. It is difficult to regulate the temperature, and some rooms are freezing while others are too hot. Again, this makes learning and teaching difficult. There is also asbestos in the walls. This presents a danger anytime work needs to be done and these areas are disturbed. Attendance is already a concern at this building. There is also not adequate parking. There are not enough workspaces for all of the therapists and itinerant staff. Instruction has been interrupted frequently because of alarms getting triggered because the systems are old and glitchy. Even with the carpets freshy shampooed, your feet will be black if you walk barefoot on it. The toilets leak in the staff bathroom. There is not adequate store for all of the needed materials and curriculum resulting in rooms looking unorganized and crowded. There are used whiteboards layered over chalkboards and cork boards. The portable classrooms are too small for the intermediate students and much time is wasted with them traveling into the building for lunch, specialists, bathroom breaks, etc.	Our community wants to support education. A reasonable increase is expected with the current housing market.

#### **School Boundaries**

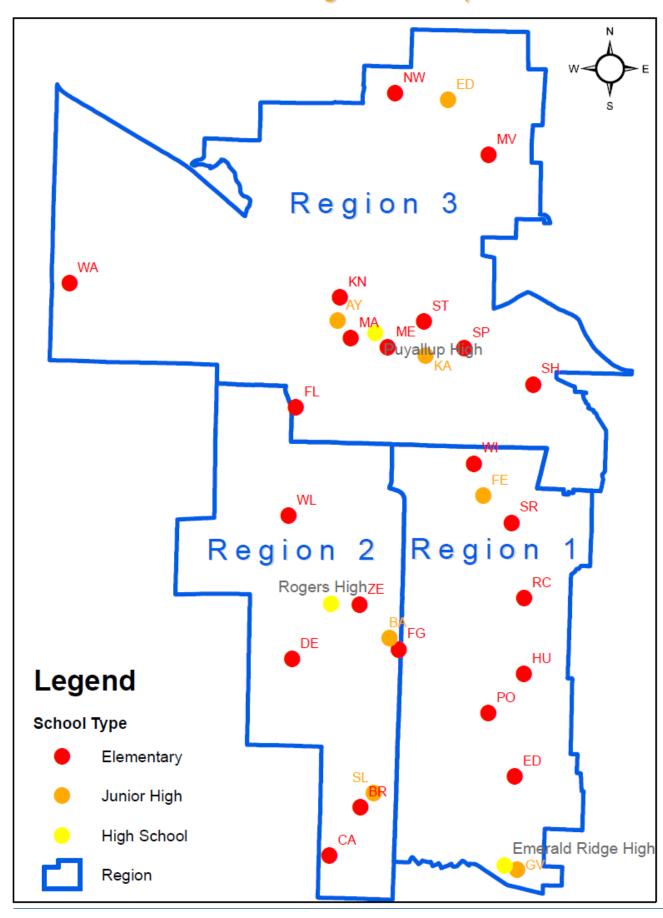
The Puyallup School District Board of Directors approved a package of school boundary changes precipitated from the 2015 Bond construction projects, including a new service area for Dessie Evans Elementary. Overall, the boundary changes, impacted:

- 20 of 22 Elementary schools
- 5 of 7 Junior High Schools
- Minor Adjustments to all three comprehensive high schools.

The boundary adjustments helped "right-size" enrollment (current and projected) to building capacity. The boundary changes were implemented in the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school year.

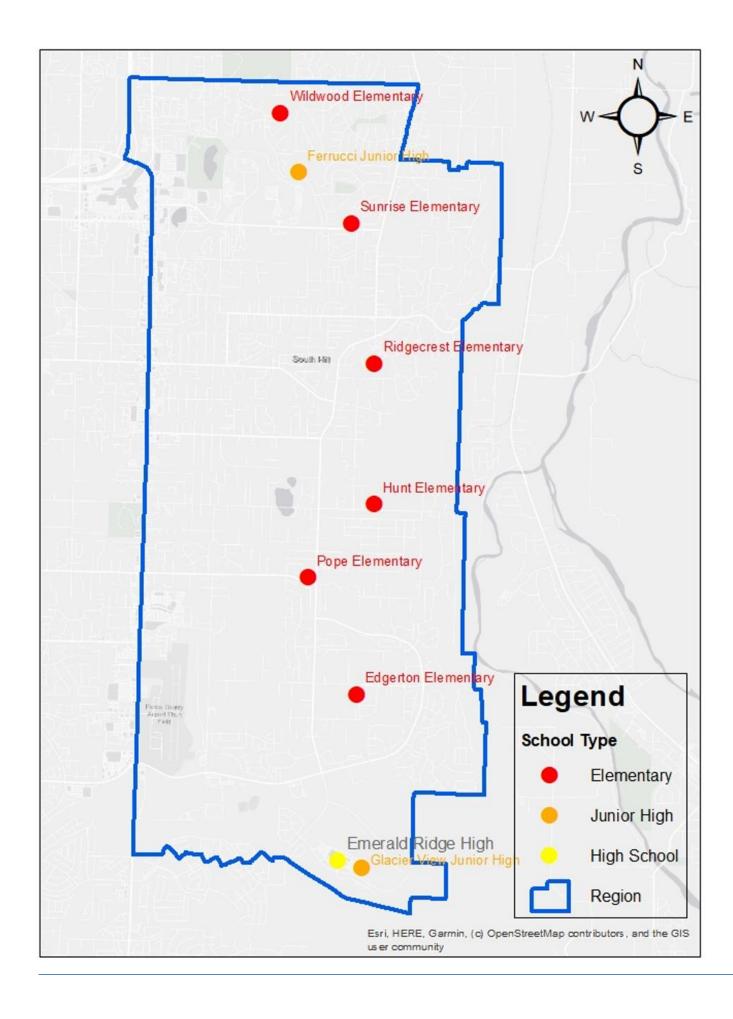


#### PSD Region Map

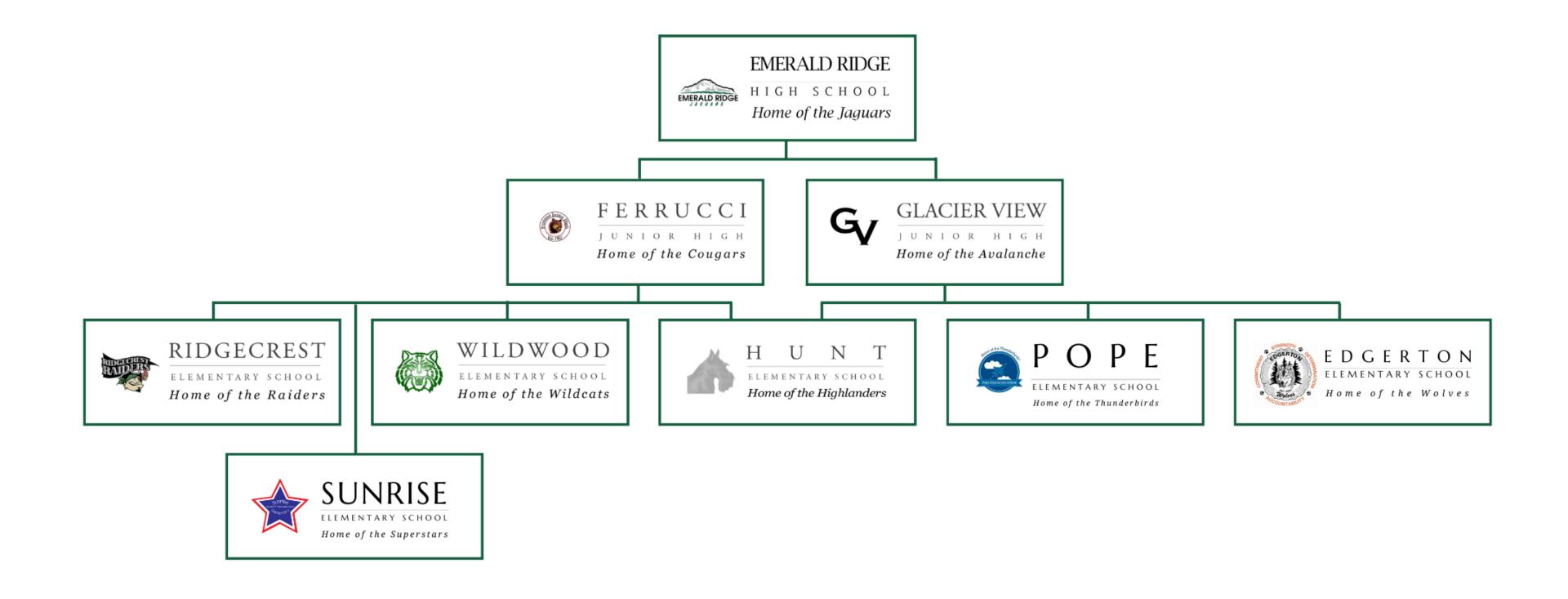

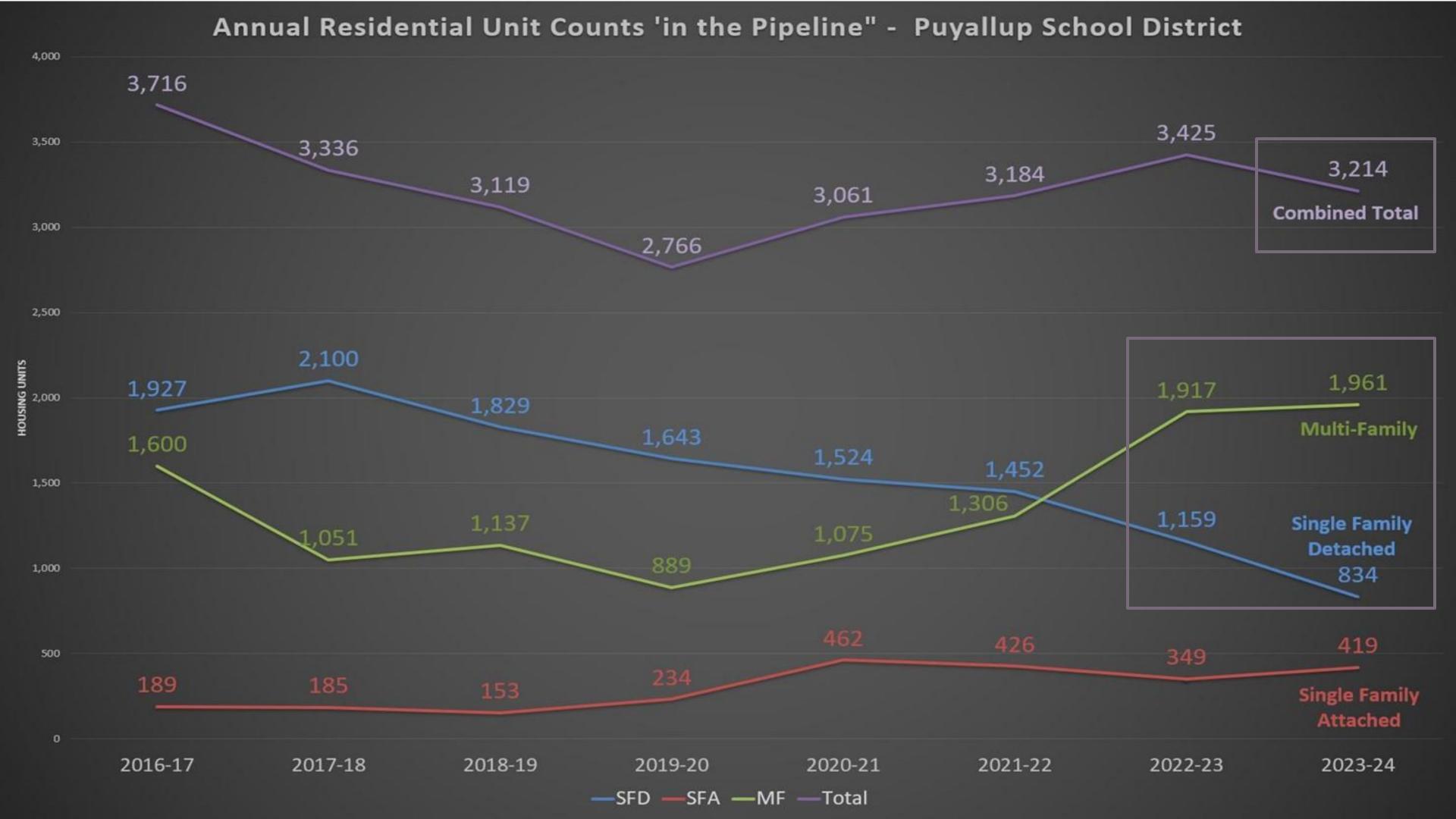
PSD operates under the following grade configurations:

- High School: 10<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> grade

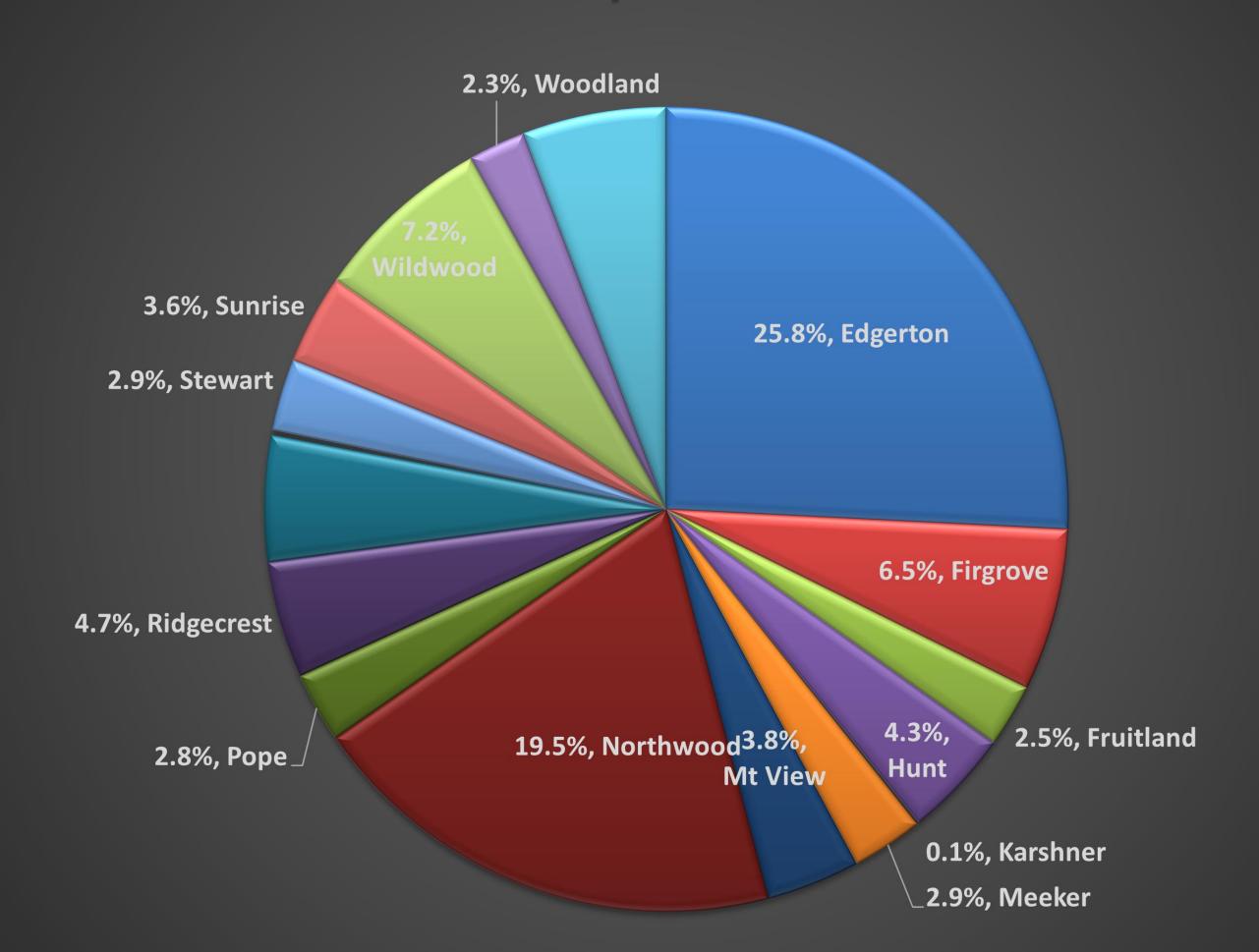

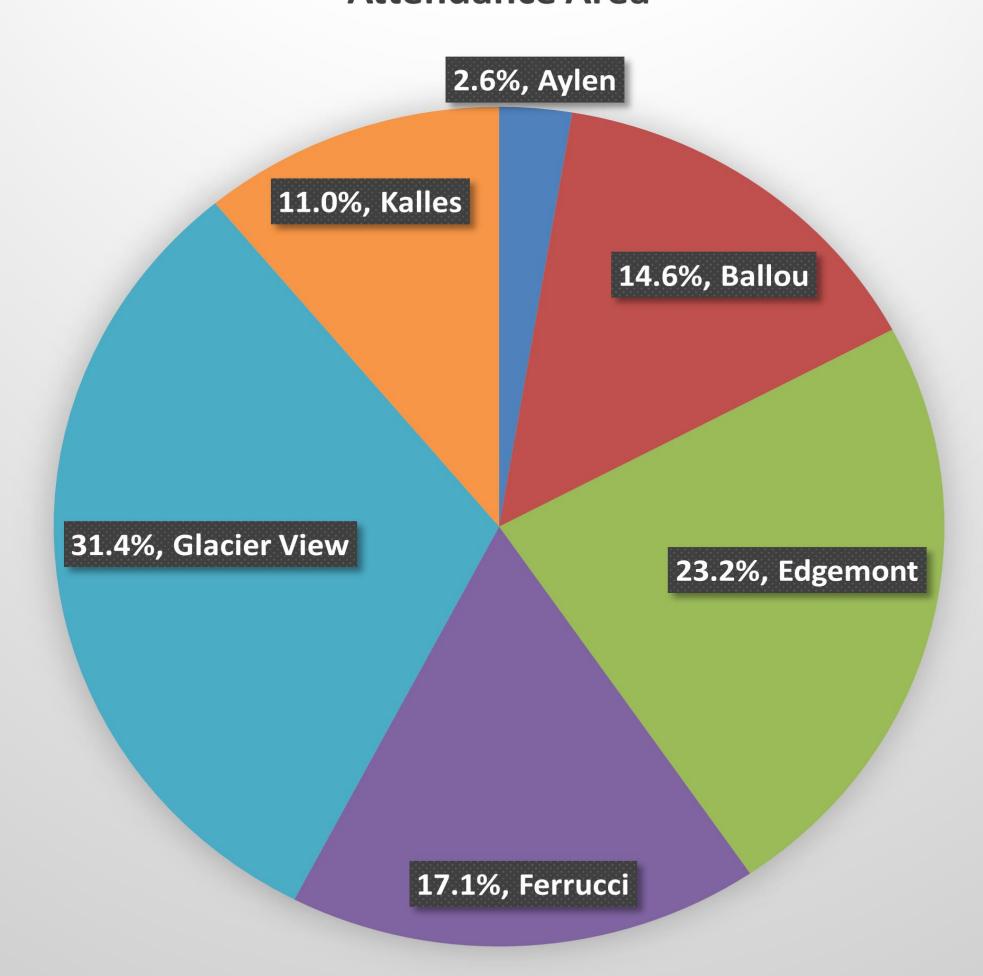




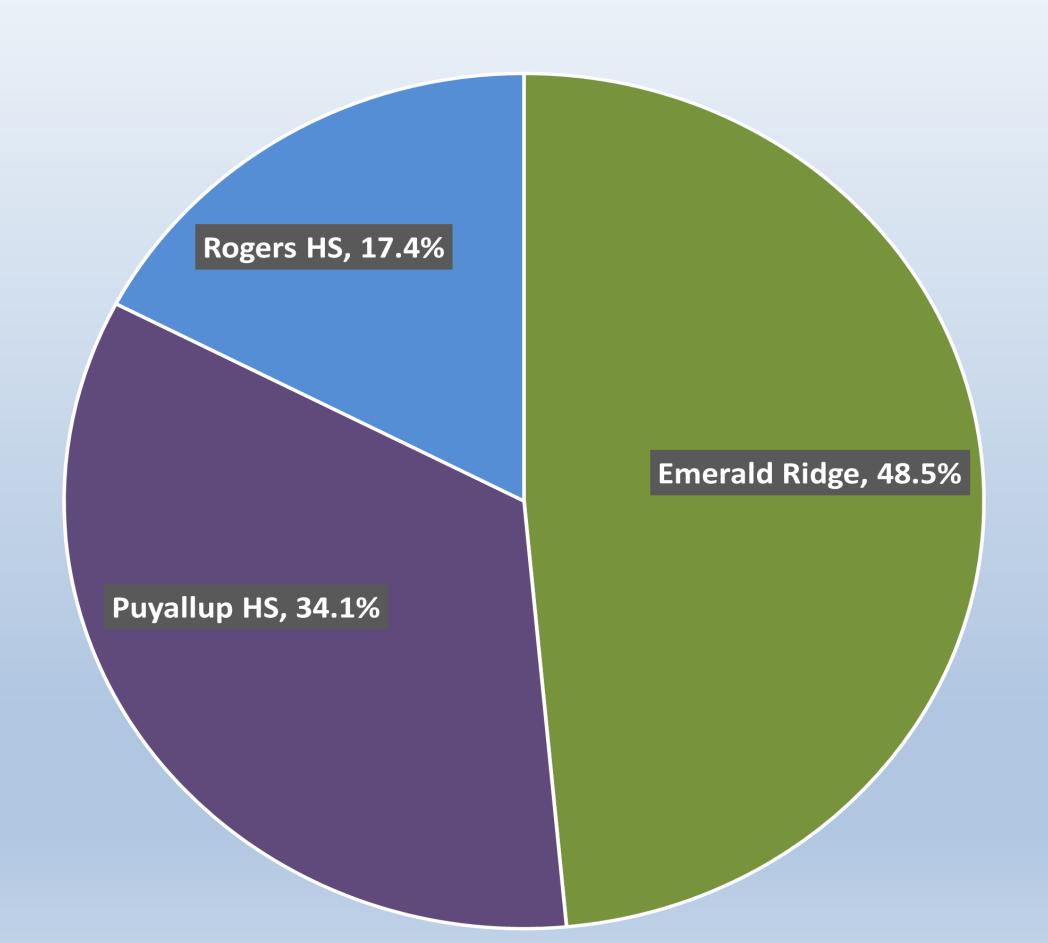
### 2023-28 (5-Yr) New Housing <u>Weighted</u> Student Generation % by Elementary Attendance Area

### 2023-28 (5-Yr) New Housing Weighted Student Generation % by High School Attendance Area



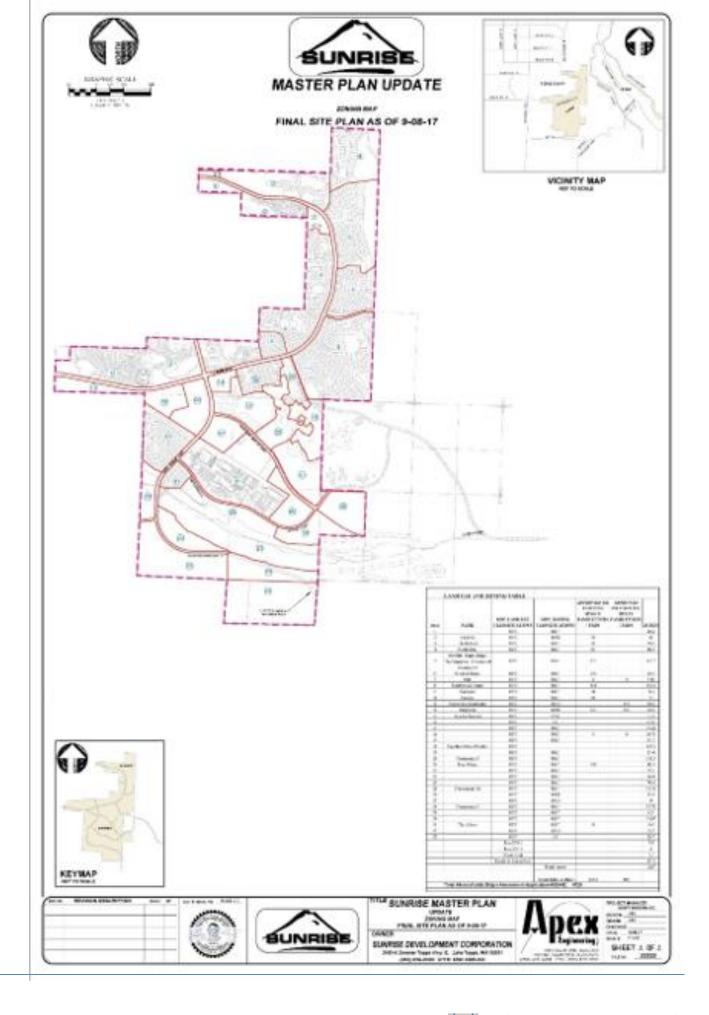

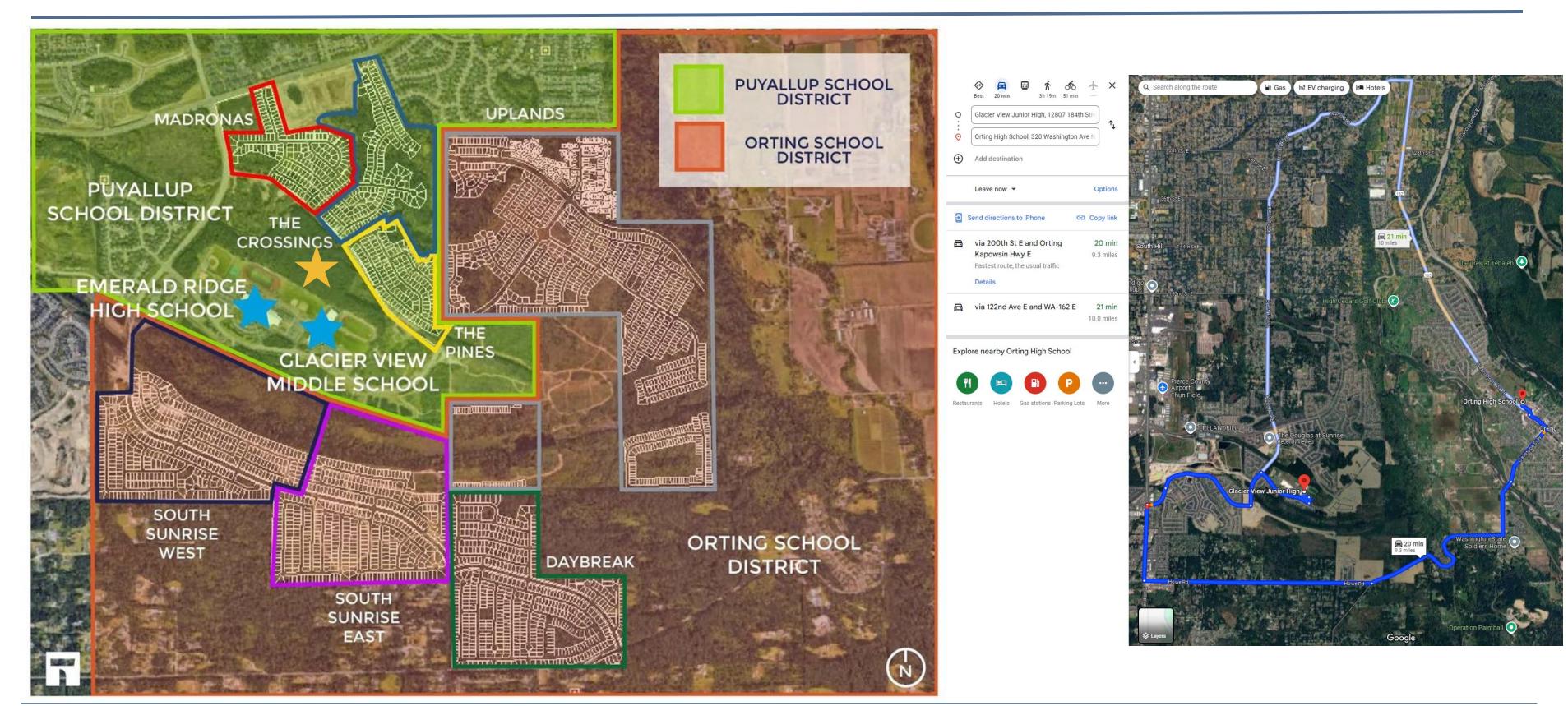

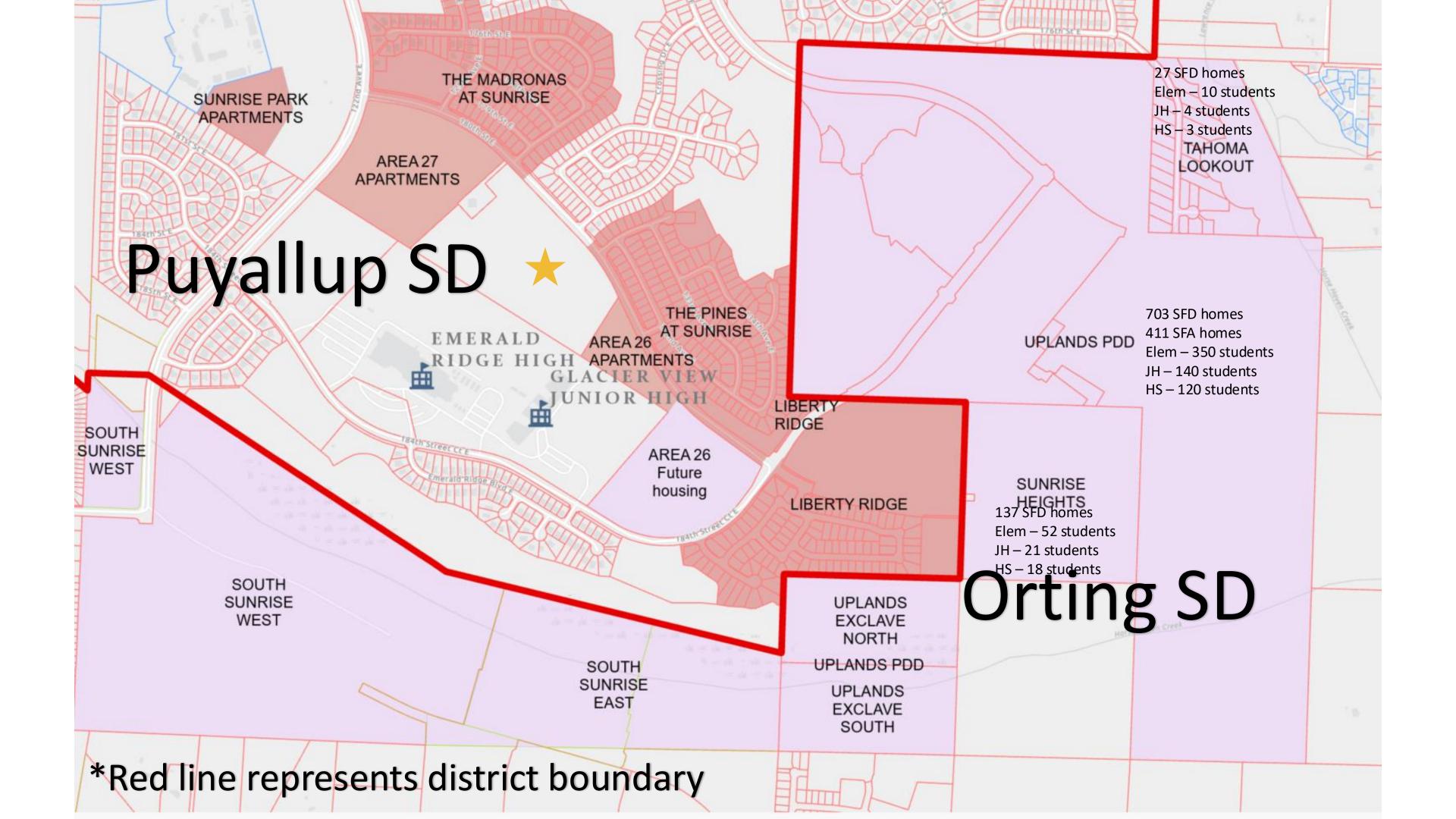




#### Orting / Puyallup SD boundary

# Transfer of Territory by Petition (RCW 28A.315.195) — Citizen Initiated Petition

- Petition must be signed by 50% +1 of the registered voters residing in the territory subject to the petition.
- Petition submitted to Puget Sound Educational Service District.
- School districts must negotiate and reach an outcome within 90 days from receiving notification of the petition.
- A mediator may be requested by either district.
- If affected school districts cannot agree on the petition, the school district in which the citizens
  reside must contact PSESD in writing a request a hearing before the Regional Committee.
