We promise to be a reliable resource for teachers by providing instructional materials, workshops, informational meetings, and program stipends. The Student Activities team is here to support and guide teachers, whether it's on the phone, email messages, or campus visits.

This year's department theme, **We Got You Covered**, reflects the team's commitment to being there for Dallas ISD students and coaches throughout the year from the beginning to the end. - Meals at competitions.
- Student participation incentives.
- Payment of competition registration fees.
- Travel arrangements, transportation, and lodging applicable with advancement to regional, state, and national competitions.
- Training for teachers.
- Stipends for teachers.

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Surveys Design to Improve Overall Experience

More than 22,000 elementary and secondary students and their teachers participated during the 23-24 school year in workshops, tournaments, and various academic competitions sponsored by the Student Activities Department. As a best practice, the department randomly sends out event surveys to get an assessment and suggestions from student and teacher participants.

Through the years, the feedback has guided the department in its planning and implementation practices, resulting in improved systems of operations, more stipends for teachers, and expanded participation opportunities as well as identifying better student preference incentives. Last school year, 921 students and teachers responded to the department surveys that were emailed to them after each event. Here are some of the results and feedback tallied from the surveys.

Participation in Extracurricular Activities

Participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities is a priority for Dallas ISD. In fact, the school leadership team and school board members believe that all students should be involved in at least one extracurricular or co-curricular activity each year. Students have the opportunity to participate in academic competitions, athletics, JROTC, visual and performing arts, and campus-based activities.

All Dallas ISD schools are required to track and document extracurricular participation for students and teachers. From the data collected, an annual report will be generated and given to the Dallas ISD leadership team and school board members to assess the extracurricular participation of individual campuses and at the districtwide level.

Dallas ISD Policies

- An extracurricular activity is an activity sponsored by UIL, the Board, or an organization sanctioned by a Board resolution. FM (Legal)
- Extracurricular activities include public performances, contests, demonstrations, displays, and club activities. FM (Legal)
- The extracurricular activity offerings shall be of sufficient variety and number to meet the wide range of interests and needs of the students. FM (Local)
- A "curriculum-related student group or club" means any student group or club that directly relates to the body of courses offered by the District. FM (Regulation)
- State Board and UIL rules shall govern interscholastic activities. FMF (Local)
- A student enrolled in a district or who participates in an extracurricular activity or a University
 Interscholastic League (UIL) competition is subject to district policy and UIL rules regarding
 participation only when the student is under the direct supervision of an employee of the school or
 district in which the student is enrolled or at any other time specified by resolution of a board. FM
 (Legal)
- A student may be removed from participation in extracurricular activities or may be excluded from school honor programs for violation of organizational standards of behavior of an extracurricular activity or violation of the Student Code of Conduct. FO (Local)

Campus Activity Coordinators

Campus activity coordinators are responsible for tracking and documenting student participation in all extracurricular and co-curricular activities by the three snapshot dates listed. Data will be pulled on each date and a campus-by-campus report will be generated.

The snapshot dates for the year are:

- Friday, December 6, 2024
- Friday, March 21, 2025
- Friday, May 9, 2025

Club/Extracurricular Activity Requirements

- Activities must be approved by the principal.
- Students and teachers should have a choice in participating.
- Students must attend at least nine meeting sessions in the same club to get participation credit.
- Activities should have a set meeting time, calendar of events, membership roster, and attendance sheets documenting participation.
- Activity/club should sponsor at least one event that occurs outside of the set meeting time.
- Activity/club must be posted on your school website.
- Activity/club must have student officers. (6th 12th Grade Only)
- Activity/club should be fun and memorable.
- Activity/club should help students feel connected to the school or part of a team.
- Activity/club should engage participants in student-centered learning.



Categories Defined

Athletics – an organized sport that is sponsored by UIL and/or campus and provides students the opportunity to play on a competitive team with a fall and/or spring schedule of events. EXAMPLES: UIL Sports, Cheerleading, Intramural Sports, T-ball, Etc.

Academics – a program/ organization that complements the academic curriculum and challenges students to demonstrate mastery of specific skills and knowledge while promoting one or more aspects of a field of study. EXAMPLES: Academic UIL, Chess, Debate, Yearbook, Etc.

Visual & Performing Arts – an organization/club that promotes visual and performing arts while providing students the opportunity to showcase their talents in the arts. EXAMPLES: Art Club, Ballet, Choir, School Play/Musical, Step Team, Etc.

Service & Leadership -

an organization/club that advocates student leadership, volunteerism and scholarship while promoting community engagement and citizenship. EXAMPLES: 4-H Club, NHS, NJHS, PAL, Recycling Club, JROTC, HOSA, Etc.

Avocation – an organization/ club that promotes hobbies outside of classroom work, particularly for pleasure or interest. EXAMPLES: Anime, Arts & Crafts, Board Games, Garden Clubs, Crochet, Etc.

Benefits & Rewards of Extracurricular Involvement

The Student Activities Department provides dozens of creative, fun, and challenging activities for elementary and secondary students. There's something for everyone – from chess, esports, and math and science contests to debate, cheerleading, and much more. Each activity is designed to keep students connected and involved in their campus community.

Participation

- Provides real-life lessons in leadership, teamwork, organization, and time management.
- Provides students with a way to stay active and make new friends.
- Allows students to discover and explore their talents and interests.
- Connects students to their school community.
- Reinforces classroom learning.
- Improves self-esteem and communication skills.
- Enhances academic performance and the overall educational experiences of students.

What the Studies Say

- Nationally, about 80% of all children aged 6-17 participate in at least one extracurricular activity per vear.
- 75% of students who participate in clubs or sports say their schedule is "just right," regarding the balance between classwork and extracurricular involvement.
- Participation in extracurricular activities, in general, appears to minimize the risk of dropping out of school.
- Research conducted by the National Center for Education Statistics found that participation in extracurricular activities has a positive correlation to the student's attendance, GPA, test scores, and expected educational goals.
- Students who participate in extracurricular activities are more likely to have higher academic achievement

Teacher Stipends

All full-time professional employees with a teaching certification, who are selected by principals to serve as a coordinator or academic coach for a program and/or activity sponsored by Student Activities, are eligible to receive a stipend. The amount budgeted for each school varies based on program selection. The stipend amounts allotted for each campus are listed below by campus level.

Stipend payment is based on participation in Student Activities Department sponsored events with the required minimum number of students in attendance at each event. Student attendance less than the required minimum of students will be payable at 50 percent of the stipend amount per event. The minimum number of students per event is determined by the Student Activities Department.

How to Increase Participation: Tips & Suggestions

Essential Requirements for Extracurricular Activities

- Be fun and memorable.
- Help students feel connected to the school or team.
- Engage participants in student-centered activities.
- Have a set meeting time and schedule of events.
- Have officers and provide leadership opportunities for all students.
- Encourage a diverse student population within the activity.
- Allow students to showcase their talents, skills, and knowledge.
- Be optional, allowing the student to choose activities.

Give Members Something to Do

- Give students ownership of the process and outcome.
- Customize activities based on the interests of students.
- Create leadership opportunities.
- Empower students to take responsibility that encourages student decision-making.
- Elect student officers with specific job descriptions.
- Host campus competitions.
- Create a membership committee.

Be Enthusiastic as the Teacher or Sponsor

- Get to know your students.
- Award and praise students for work and accomplishments.
- Give incentives to reward students for participation.
- Announce weekly MVPs and involve students in the process.
- Include social-emotional learning activities such as warm-ups and closures to build team bonds.

Principals: Recruit People to Recruit - Enlist Campus Influencers

- Survey and take nominations from members, faculty, and staff.
- Encourage assistant principals, coaches, and department leads to make announcements during their professional learning community meetings.
- Invite Student Activities coordinators to your campus to answer questions at staff meetings.
- Enlist members who are interested and/or proficient in an activity to coach students.
- Designate the coaches in Oracle.

Coordinator & Coaches: Attract and Retain Attention - Do Something to Be Seen & Heard

- Set up information tables with student demonstrations: play chess or a video game, cheer, rap a poem, act a scene, sing a song, etc.
- Post Ask Me About (Event) stickers or Did You Know? posters.
- Utilize morning announcements or advisory periods to spotlight different extracurricular activities.
- Host a membership interest meeting at the beginning of the year.
- Personalize notes and invitations to students who are selected for the activity.
- Create a campaign: Ask "Student Name" about "Club Name."

Tell Your Story and Grow - Tweet, Post, Tag & Announce It

- Promote clubs, activities, and accomplishments via word of mouth and announcements.
- Embrace technology and connect on social media platforms: Facebook, Flickr, Instagram, Snapchat, Threads, Twitter, Twitch, YouTube, etc.
- To showcase your victories and achievements, display trophies, banners, etc.

Academic Competitions: An Overview

Academic UIL - Grades 2-12

The University Interscholastic League provides 23 high school and 17 elementary and middle school academic competitive events that challenge students to think critically while complementing the academic curriculum.

Cheer - Grades 4-12

Cheer creates and promotes school spirit while encouraging quality performance and high academic standards. Through the development of spirit and cheer technique, the cheerleaders will encourage their student body and their community through support in the promotion of athletic events and activities.

Chess - Grades K-12

The districtwide chess program provides students the opportunity to showcase their problem-solving and critical thinking skills at school and chess tournaments.

Debate - Grades 5-12

The partnerships with the Dallas Urban Debate Alliance and Debate Able provide Dallas ISD secondary and elementary school students the opportunity to participate in competitive academic debate formats.

Decathlon - Grades 9-12

Academic Decathlon is a theme-based, ten-event scholastic team competition wherein students match their intellect with students from other schools.

Destination Imagination - Grades K-12

Destination Imagination motivates young people to look for the challenges in life and see them as opportunities for growth. DI inspires students to solve problems and to search for creative solutions.

Esports - Grades 4-12

With weekly practices and tournaments, students will be able to improve their skills and develop a sense of community and involvement at school and in the esports community.

Link Crew - Grades 9-12

Link Crew is a group of elite high school juniors and seniors who organize the freshman orientation and provide yearlong mentoring and support to the underclassmen, improving their overall first-year experience in high school.

Lone Star Challenge - Grades 4-6

Lone Star is a theme-based, four-event scholastic team competition wherein fourth, fifth, and sixth-grade students match their intellect with students from other schools.

Pentathlon - Grades 6-8

Academic Pentathlon is a theme-based, five-event scholastic team competition wherein sixth, seventh, and eighth-grade students match their intellect with students from other schools.

Student Publications - Grades 6-12

Student publications supported by Dallas ISD are secondary yearbook and high school newspaper programs. Members of student publications are charged with producing yearbooks and newspapers that showcase their design, writing, and photography skills.

Texas Math & Science Coaches Association - Grades 3-12

Involvement in the Texas Math and Science Coaches Association invitational meets and state competitions provides students the opportunity to practice UIL math and science contests through grade level and team competitions.

Academic Decathlon (Grades 9-12)



Nine-member high school teams complete 10 exams in the subject areas listed below. Each team is made up of three Honor students (3.8 – 4.00 GPA), three Scholastic students (3.20 – 3.799 GPA), and three Varsity students (0.00 – 3.199 GPA).

The 2024-2025 Theme: Our Changing Climate

ART

The curriculum will an introduction to environmental and environmentalist art.

ECONOMICS

The curriculum will cover fundamental economic concepts, microeconomics, and macroeconomics and will include the economics of climate change.

LITERATURE

The curriculum will include critical reading, one long work of literature, and selected shorter works with a focus on environmental literature. The long work of literature will be Solar Storms by Linda Hogan.

MATHEMATICS

The curriculum will cover an overview of permutation and combinations, algebra, and statistics.

MUSIC

The curriculum will explore music and the natural world.

SCIENCE

The science topic will be an introduction to environmental science.

SOCIAL SCIENCE

The social science topic will focus on climate change in the past and present.

2023-2024 Theme: Humanity and Technology

- TAG and Rangel took first place at the regional meet in the small and medium divisions respectively.
- At the regional competition, teams from TAG, SEM, Business, Lassiter, and Rangel qualified to compete at the State Academic Decathlon State Finals.
- SEM team placed second overall in Texas in the small division. For placing second in the state competition, SEM team members received a \$900 scholarship each.
- During the awards ceremony, 38 medals were won by Dallas ISD students: 10 golds, 17 silvers, and 11 bronzes.
- The decathletes from the four schools were awarded more than \$15,000 in scholarships at the state tournament.



Academic Pentathlon (Grades 6-8)



Nine-member middle school teams compete in five exams in the subject areas listed below. Each team must consist of three students form each GPA category: Honor (3.8 - 4.00), Scholastic (3.2 - 3.799, and Varsity (0.0 - 3.199).

The 2024-2025 Theme: Our Changing Climate

The Academic Pentathlon theme parallels the high school Academic Decathlon program. Each student experiences team and individual competition in five events: literature, mathematics, fine arts, science, and social science.

The 2024-2025 novel will be *Melt* by Ele Fountain.

The five-event academic program strives to foster greater respect for knowledge, promote wholesome inter-school academic competition, and to further develop student communication skills.

Academic Pentathlon is uniquely designed to include students with a wide variety of academic abilities.

Cheer (Grades 4-12)



The Dallas ISD cheer program provides elementary and secondary students the opportunity to participate in a variety of activities that not only promote school spirit but encourage quality performance and high academic standards. Cheerleaders encourage and promote school spirit by attending

and performing at sporting events, pep rallies, school assemblies, competitions, parades, and other special events and ceremonies.

Throughout the year, cheerleaders attend district-sponsored camps and clinics that are designed to teach teamwork, leadership, and cheering skills and techniques. Dallas ISD's annual Cheer Showdown workshop and Regional Cheer Challenge competition prepare high school squads for the UIL State Spirit Championships.

Cheer Showdown is a district-sponsored pre-UIL event that is structured to mimic the UIL Spirit prelims in which the schools experience the look and flow of the state championships. At the Spirit Competition, cheerleaders compete in three categories: crowd leading, fight song, and band dance.

Cheer Challenge provides cheerleaders the opportunity to perform before judges and the public. Top teams receive gold, silver, and bronze medals. All participating high school teams advance to the UIL State Spirit Championships.

Chess (Grades K-12)



TThe districtwide chess program provides students the opportunity to play the game of chess in a safe competitive environment. Students will have the opportunity to compete with their peers on their campus and at the Dallas ISD tournaments.

- Campus Chess Program requires a minimum of 10 members.
- The program is available to students in grades K-12.
- Students meet and play chess for a minimum of one day per week or four days per nine weeks grading period.
- Students will have the opportunity to attend club meetings and practice for competitions throughout the school year utilizing both on-campus scheduling and virtual platforms such as ChessKid.
- Chess supplies will be provided to chess coaches as needed.
 Coaches are responsible for managing and storing all chess supplies.
- For students to participate in tournaments, coaches will verify that students are academically eligible to compete.
- Student Activities will provide transportation to district events. The coaches are responsible for completing all field trip paperwork and meeting deadlines.

Elementary Debate (Grade 5)



Fifth graders from across the Dallas ISD will participate in debate workshops, scrimmages, and districtwide tournaments. The elementary debate program is designed to enhance students' critical thinking and public

speaking skills through thoughtful, persuasive, and civil arguments. Participation is limited to 50 elementary schools. Each campus can have up to 12 members in their debate club.

Debate Coach Responsibilities:

- Build and coach a team with a minimum of six fifth graders.
- Supervise weekly practices with students in preparation for debate tournaments.
- Prepare students to research conflicting viewpoints on the topic, participate in group discussions based on facts and critical thinking, and choose a stance and write an argument for presentation.
- Attend coach workshops and meetings as scheduled.
- Participate in all Dallas ISD-sponsored elementary debate workshops and tournaments.
- Attend tournaments and remain on site until the competition is over.

Destination Imagination (Grades K-12)

Destination Imagination (DI) teams have a maximum of seven members for competitive teams and nine members for Rising Stars teams. DI motivates young people to look for the challenges in life and see them as opportunities for growth. It inspires students to solve problems, search for creative solutions, and work cooperatively with others.

2024-2024 Challenge Summaries

Technical Challenge: Breaking Point

The Technical Challenge prompts students to complete tasks by using engineering, research, strategic planning, and related skills.



- Design and build assembly equipment and destruction equipment.
- Use the assembly equipment to create a stack of items.
- Use the destruction equipment to disassemble and/or destroy the stack.
- Create and present a story about a character who lacks something important and attempts to gain it.
- Create and present two Team Choice Elements that show off the team's interests, skills, areas of strength, and talents.

Engineering Challenge: High-Wire Act

The Engineering Challenge asks students to explore and apply engineering skills and tools to design and build solutions for specific applications.



- Design and build a transporter that will be tested during the team's Presentation.
- Complete weight transport tests to test how much weight the transporter can carry along a tournament-provided cord at various angles.
- Create and present a story in the style of contemporary circus.
- Include a daring display and an ensemble spectacle in the Presentation.
- Create and present two Team Choice Elements that show off the team's interests, skills, areas of strength, and talents.

- Create and present a story in which a character who is located on a planet other than Earth thinks they are alone but discovers that they are not.
- Include technobabble in the story.
- Design and build a device and/or effect that demonstrates what the technobabble describes.
- Include a scientific demonstration that shows the science behind why a specific phenomenon of the planet happens and/or exists.
- Create and present two Team Choice Elements that show off the team's interests, skills, areas of strength, and talents.



Fine Arts Challenge: Less Is More

The Fine Arts Challenge helps students develop acting and creative skills through artistic media, theater arts, scriptwriting, and prop design.

- Create and present a story about how something small and/or simple can create a big impact.
- Include a focal character in the story.
- Include an emotional moment in the story.
- Design and create a minimalist set.
- Create and present two Team Choice Elements that show off the team's interests, skills, areas of strength, and talents.



Improvisational Challenge: Are We There Yet?

The Improvisational Challenge is all about research, spontaneity, and storytelling. Teams receive topics and quickly produce skits.

- Create and present an improvisational skit about a traveling character.
- Research locations and show the character's route between a starting location and an ending location.
- Research modes of transportation and incorporate one into the skit.
- Include a seeker and a detour in the skit.



Service Learning Challenge: This or That

The Service Learning Challenge is designed to engage students in public service that addresses real-life community issues.

- Identify, design, carry out, and evaluate a project that addresses a need in a real community.
- Create and present a story about a character who must make a critical choice.
- Include at least two potential outcomes and a complication in the story.
- Include a device that completes two different tasks from the same initiation in the Presentation.
- Create and present two Team Choice Elements that show off the team's interests, skills, areas of strength, and talents.



Destination Imagination (CONTINUED)

Early Learning Challenge: Weather Together

The Rising Stars for Early Learners Challenge offers simple experiences with the creative process, and it gives young kids (preschool through 2nd grade) a place to work together and make new friends.

- Research different kinds of weather.
- Create and present a play about a character learning about a kind of weather for the very first time.
- Include a teacher character and a special weather activity in the story.
- Design and create a weather costume and a weather special effect.
- Create and present one Team Choice Element that shows off the team's interests, skills, areas of strength, and talents.



Instant Challenge

All teams will have the opportunity to solve an Instant Challenge. These challenges require teams to engage in quick, creative, and critical thinking.

In a world with growing cultural connections, increased levels and types of communication, and a new need for real-time teamwork and problem-solving, the ability to solve problems quickly is becoming increasingly critical.

- Each team will be asked to solve an Instant Challenge.
- The team must think on their feet by applying appropriate skills to solve problems in a short period.
- Instant Challenges are performance-based, task-based, or a combination of the two.
- Although each Instant Challenge has different requirements, all Instant Challenges reward teams for their teamwork.

 Instant Challenges are kept confidential until it is time for teams to solve them.

Esports (Grades 4-12)



Since starting as a pilot program in August 2019, esports has sparked mania and excitement among student gamers in Dallas ISD. Just like traditional sports, esports requires teamwork, critical thinking,

communication, collaboration, creativity, and leadership among every team member to be successful. Students in grades 4-12 are eligible to participate in their schools' esports clubs, leagues, and tournaments.

Dallas ISD provides participating schools with coach stipends, gaming consoles, controllers, gaming laptops, refurbished desktop computers, and other incentives. Students have the opportunity to learn and play games including Rocket League, Smash Bros., Fortnite, and Mario Kart.

The freshman transition program provides members of the freshman class with support and guidance to improve their overall first-year experience in high school.

Four elements of a yearlong Link Crew program:

Academic Follow Ups: These are designed to educate and inspire freshmen throughout the year, as well as give them specific tools needed to be successful in high school

Social Follow-Ups: These are designed to continue the Link Crew connection and foster a feeling of safety and security for the ninth graders.

Leader-Initiated Contacts & Structured Leader-Initiated Contacts:

Link Leaders are called upon to step up on their own to contact ninth graders throughout the year. Structured contacts are ones that leaders do with the coordinator's instruction, guidance, and supervision.

Link Leader Development & Meetings: These are regularly scheduled meetings where the Link Crew Leaders are educated, celebrated, informed, and motivated to be better mentors.

Texas Math & Science Coaches Association (Grades 3-12)



TMSCA invitational meets are held on Saturdays at various locations throughout the state. Competitions focus on enhancing the following UIL events.

MATHEMATICS:

High School Level

60-question, multiple-choice exam designed to test knowledge and understanding in the areas of basic mathematics, Algebra I and II, geometry, trigonometry, math analysis, analytic geometry, precalculus, and elementary calculus.

Elementary/Middle School Level

50-question, multiple-choice exam consisting of numeration systems, arithmetic operations involving whole numbers, integers, fractions, decimals, exponents, order of operations, probability, statistics, number theory, simple interest, measurements, and conversions.

NUMBER SENSE:

High School Level

10-minute, 80-question mental math test covering all high school mathematics courses. Shortcuts need to be developed and practiced to compete and finish the test.

Elementary/Middle School Level

10-minute, fill-in-the-blank test which students must complete without doing calculations on paper or a calculator. Erasures and mark outs are not permitted. Concepts covered include but are not limited to addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, proportions, and the use of mathematical notation.

CALCULATOR APPLICATIONS:

High School Level

30-minute, 70-question test comprised of mathematical problems that are solved with a handheld calculator.

Elementary/Middle School Level

30-minute, 80-question test comprised of mathematical problems that are solved with a handheld calculator. Calculations may involve addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, roots, and powers.

35-question, multiple-choice exam with an emphasis placed on the knowledge of scientific fact, the understanding of scientific principles, and the ability to think through scientific problems.

Coach Responsibilities:


- Read & accept coaching responsibilities as outlined in coach agreements.
- Attend training, meeting, and competitions as scheduled.
- Recruit, build, and coach a team with at least the minimum student participation requirement for designated academic competitions.
- Verify all students are academically eligible to compete in the competition meaning they must be passing all classes.
- Submit the required paperwork by the requested deadlines of the competition.
- Sponsors must have student emergency contact information in their possession at the site of the event/competition.
- Register student contestants using the designated registration system for each contest.
- Complete all field trip paperwork required by the campus and district.
- Arrange transportation at least 21 days before the contest date.
- Adhere to district policy regarding at least one adult chaperone for every 10 students for school-related trips.
- If your students use their own transportation, please stay on site until the last student is picked up.
- Make sure all volunteers complete the online volunteer application at https://dallasisd.voly.org/.
- Adhere to the department's "no reimbursement" policy regarding all expenses relating to academic competitions.
- Maintain documentation of student participation in academic competitions via activities.dallasisd. org
- Keep attendance and membership rosters of each activity.
- Keep an inventory and store all materials and equipment purchased by the Student Activities Department. (Materials and equipment are property of the campus.)





Checklist for Overnight Trips

- Adhere to registration deadlines.
- Provide a complete list of participants to Student Activities that includes the student, coach, chaperone's gender, school identification, and grade.
- Conduct parent meeting for students who are participating in the overnight trip. Make sure to include proof/documentation of the parent meeting when submitting the field trip request.
- Submit a transportation request for principal and district to approve.
- Submit an I-Expense report via Oracle for meals for students, coaches, and chaperones (Cash Advance Steps will be provided upon the director's approval).
- Request \$35 per day (student or teacher).
- Use only for meals that are purchased at restaurants, including fast food establishments.
- Remember snacks from grocery and convenience stores are not covered in meal allowance.
- In-state sales and hotel-occupancy taxes will not be reimbursed by the District (Provide businesses with the District's Texas Sales Tax Exemption Certificate).
- Handwritten tips or gratuities will not be considered for reimbursement by the District.
- Report competition results to Student Activities.
- Complete a reimbursement expense report via I-Expense within 10 days after the competition using the Cash Advance Reconciliation Steps (Available upon the director's approval.)
- Scan and attach all receipts to the report.
- Hand deliver the remaining cash to Treasure Services in the Administration Building, 9400 North Central Expressway. (Get a receipt for the remaining cash and upload it to the expense report.)



Guidelines for Overnight Trips

- Student Activities will pay registration fees and arrange lodging, transportation, and meals for students, coaches, and chaperones for overnight trips.
- Adhere to department "no reimbursement" policy regarding all expenses relating to academic competitions.
- Follow District and campus policy regarding field trips, cash advancements, receipts, tips, sales taxes, and agendas.

Policy Overview Guide

Extracurricular & Co-curricular Activities

- An extracurricular activity is an activity sponsored by the UIL, the Board, or an organization sanctioned by a Board resolution. FM (Legal)
- The extracurricular activity offerings shall be of sufficient variety and number to meet the wide range of interests and needs of the students. FM (Local)
- A "curriculum-related student group or club" means any student group or club that directly relates to the body of courses offered by the District. FM (Regulation)
- State Board and UIL rules shall govern interscholastic activities. FMF (Local)

Student Participation

- A student enrolled in the Dallas ISD or who participates in an extracurricular activity or a UIL competition is subject to District policy and UIL rules regarding participation. FM (Legal)
- A student shall be allowed in a school year a maximum of ten extracurricular absences not related to post-district competition before state and a maximum of two absences for state competition. FM (Local)
- No student will be penalized in any way or excluded from any activity of the organization because of failure to perform on Sunday or other Sabbath or religious holy day or any other good reason. FME (Regulation)
- A student enrolled in extracurricular activities must meet the No Pass/No Play requirements for eligibility to participate. A student must receive a grade of 70 or better in any course for eligibility purposes. FM (Legal), EIA (Regulation)
- A student may be removed from participation in extracurricular activities or may be excluded from school honors for violation of organizational standards of behavior of an extracurricular activity or violation of the Student Code of Conduct. FO (Local)
- Schools may not charge fees for field trips required as part of a basic education program or course. FP (Legal)
- Students involved in UIL competition above the UIL-district level that requires an overnight trip shall have their expenses paid by District. FM, FMG
- Students should, whenever possible, be transported in school or chartered buses. Vans can be used if they meet the requirements of the Transportation Code. FMG (Regulation)

Field Trips

- All field trips must be submitted electronically for approval.
 FMG (Regulation)
- In-county field trips sponsored by Athletics, JROTC, Student Activities, Visual and Performing Arts, and Computer Science and Technology only require the principal's approval via District's electronic platform. FMG (Regulation)
- Overnight and out-of-county field trips (including Districtsponsored field trips) require approval from School Leadership. FMG (Regulation)
- A plan for medical emergencies and a security plan for monitoring rooms during the night to ensure the safety of participants must be submitted for overnight trips. FMG (Regulation)

Sponsors & Chaperones

- Sponsors and coaches are responsible for knowledge of and compliance with rules for eligibility and participation. FM
- At least one adult chaperone for every 10 students for schoolrelated trips. FMG (Regulation)
- Make sure all volunteers complete the online volunteer application at https://dallasisd.voly.org. FMG (Regulation)
- Chaperones are responsible for student safety and stay with students and monitor their behavior for the entire field trip. FMG (Local)
- Water activities (including swimming, boating, and water skiing) that do not have a certified lifeguard on duty at all times are prohibited. FMG (Regulation)
- Employee reimbursement, if any, will occur within ten business days after the final receipt of all adequate documentation by the Accounts Payable Department. DEE (Regulation)

Parents

 A parent is entitled to full information regarding the school activities of a parent's child except as provided by Education Code 38.004 (regarding child abuse investigations). FM (Legal)

Student Publications

- The District's educators shall exercise editorial control over the style and content of student speech in school-sponsored expressive activities so long as their actions are reasonably related to legitimate pedagogical concerns. FMA (Legal)
- All publications edited, printed, or distributed in the name of or within the District schools shall be under the control of the school administration and the Board. FMA (Local)

 - Attendance at the DISD Coaches' Workshop and Virtual Meetings at \$250
 - Compete in the DISD Invitational Meet with at least 9 students at \$250 *
 - Compete in at least 6 Middle or High School TMSCA Invitationals and/or TMSCA Online Meets at \$250 each.
 - Qualify, compete and attend the TMSCA State Competition \$500
- Teams must consist of a minimum of 9 student competitors. *
- · Stipend is available to two coaches or may be split among multiple coaches
- Stipends will be payable in split payment format after each level has been completed and recorded.
- Stipend competition documentation due dates will be strictly adhered to and stipends will be payable based on the provided timeline.
- High School TMSCA Invitationals may be substituted with Student Activities approval for UIL competitions and results based virtual meets.
- Teams that qualify and attend the state competition are eligible for a \$500 stipend to be paid following the state competition.

^{*} Stipend payment is based upon participation in Student Activities Department-sponsored events with the required minimum number of students in attendance at each event. Student attendance less than the required minimum number of students will be payable at 50% of stipend amount per event as determined by the Student Activities Department.



UIL SUPPLEMENTAL PAY COACH AGREEMENT

FULL-TIME PROFESSIONAL EMPLOYEES WITH A TEACHING CERTIFICATION WILL BE CONSIDERED ELIGIBLE FOR THE UIL COACH STIPEND WHO:

- 1. Oversee and coach UIL participants
- 2. Provide students the opportunity to attend club meetings and practice for competitions throughout the school year utilizing both on-campus scheduling and at-home virtual platforms such as Zoom and Teams
- Adhere to Dallas ISD health safety guidelines and protocols, including but not limited to social distancing, wearing masks, washing and sanitizing hands, and avoiding person-to-person contact
- 4. Submit all required paperwork by the requested due date
- 5. Maintain documentation of students participating in UIL Academics
- 6. Attend district UIL competitions
- 7. Sign Professional Acknowledgement Form for UIL coaches
- 8. Communicate 3-week regain eligibility forms with campus colleagues and/or students as necessary for students participating in academic extracurricular activities
- Verify all students are academically eligible to compete meaning students are passing all classes
- 10. Adhere to all district policies, including at least one adult chaperone for every 10 students for school related trips
- 11. Sponsors must have student emergency contact information in their possession at the site of the event/ competition
- 12. Make sure all volunteers complete the online volunteer application at https://dallasisd.voly.org/
- 13. For any trips occurring overnight, please make sure to include proof/documentation of having had a parent meeting.

ANNUAL STIPEND (\$50-\$100 PER EVENT, PER GRADE LEVEL)

(Available for Elementary, Middle, and High School UIL Coaches)

- Elementary & Middle School UIL Coaches A stipend of \$50 per contest, per grade level being coached is applicable to coaches that coach and have students compete in District Academic UIL competitions.
- High School UIL Coaches A stipend of \$100 per contest, per grade level being coached is applicable to coaches that coach and have students compete in District Academic UIL competitions.
