THE RED QUEEN

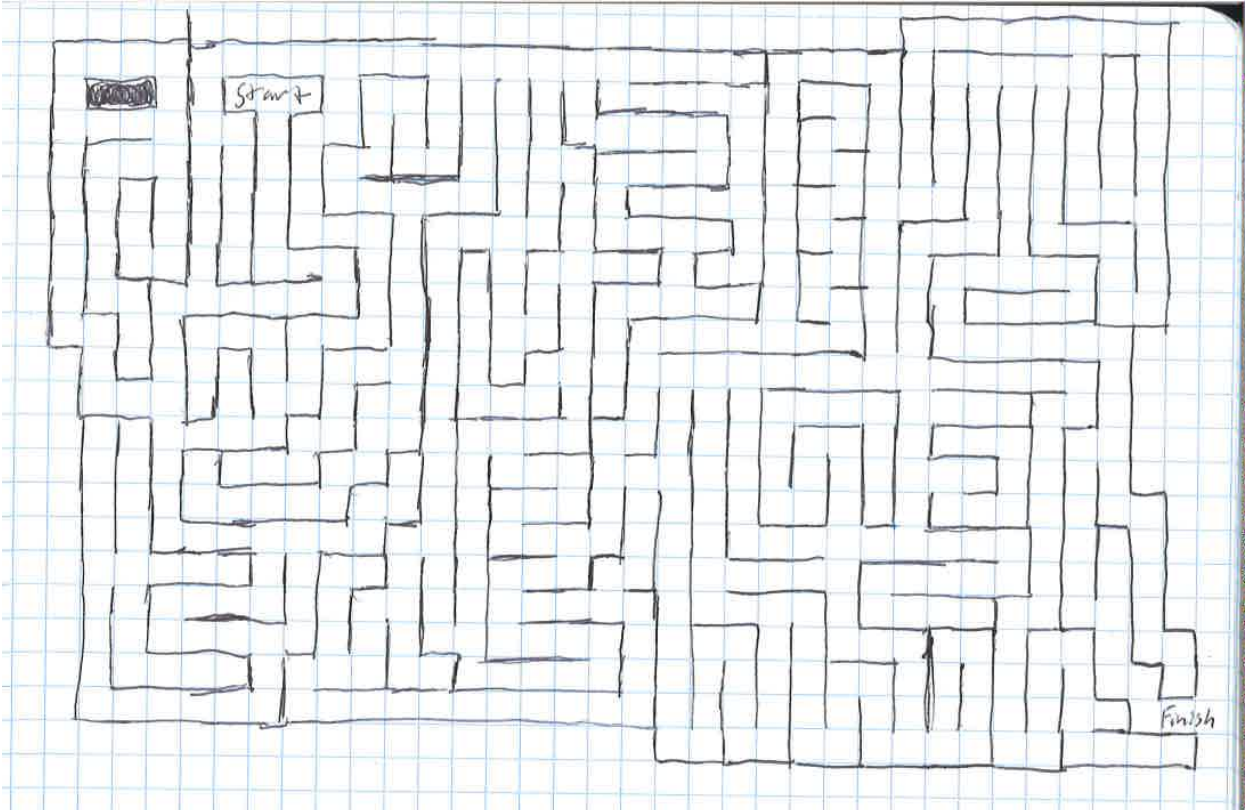

- 1/3 cup chocolate chunks

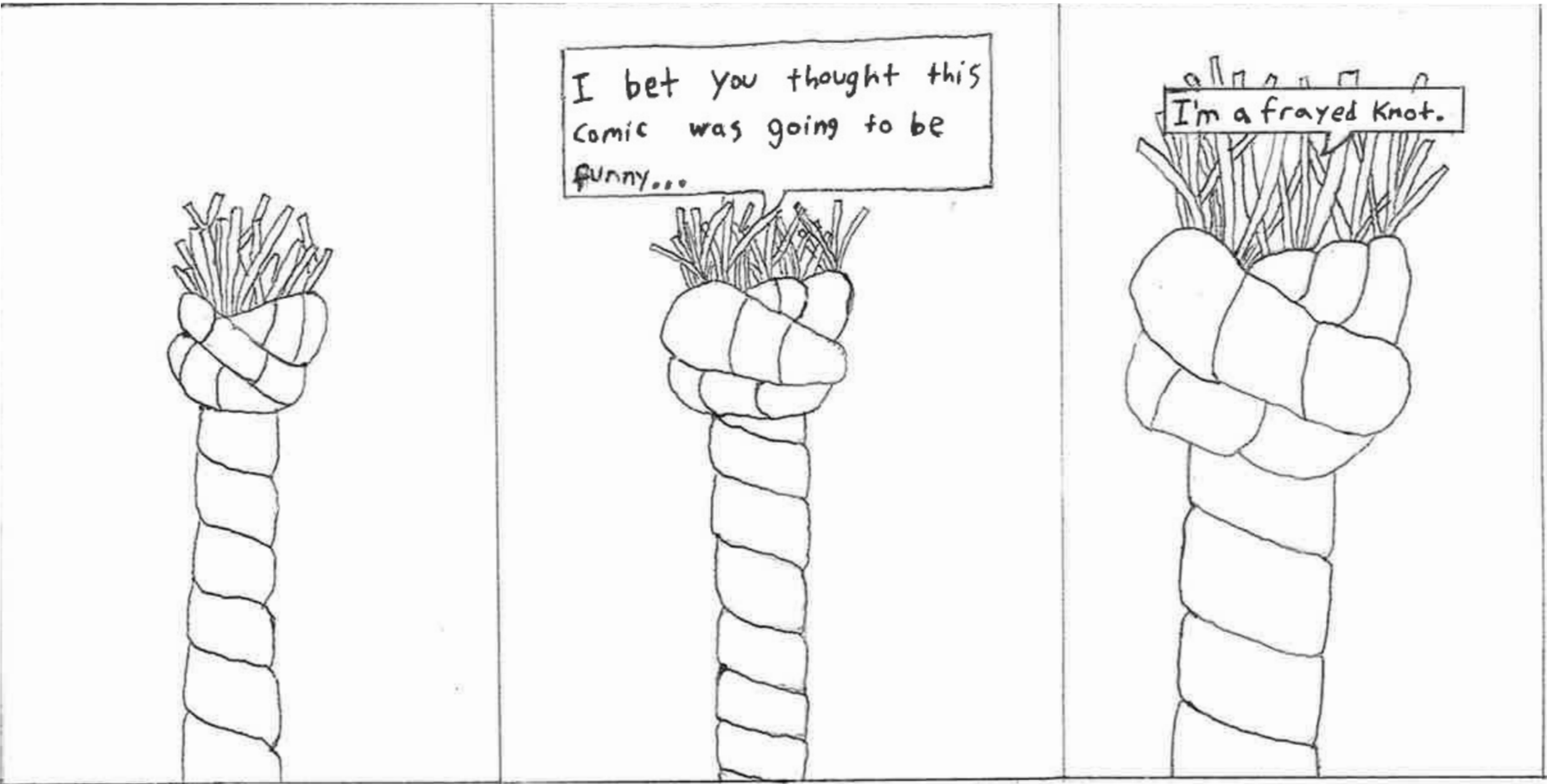

Directions

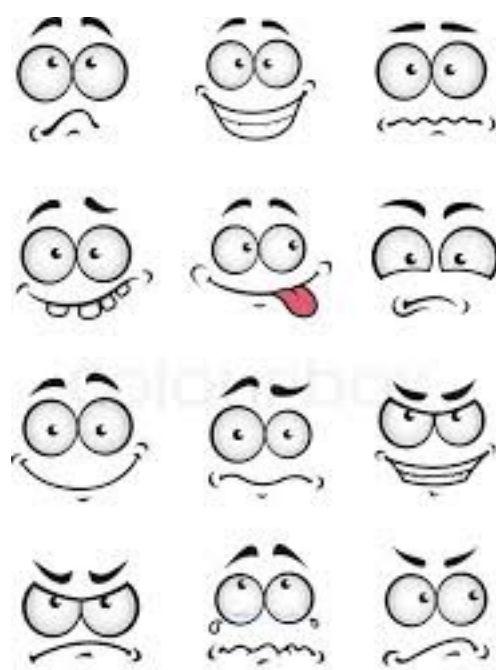
