

BRIDGE PERFORMING ARTS

On March 9th, 2016, Remsen High School was visited by the Bridge Performing Arts Ensemble: A performing group with a roster of about 50 gigging musicians who embark on outings of around five to seven people on various instruments. The theme of this year's visit was based on rebellion.

They performed two concerts in the gymnasium in the morning: One for 9-12 music students and another for Jr High. While the theme was rebellion, they performed music that ranged from Bali rhythms to Beethoven, an Italian aria about a daughter rebelling against her father, a song from Rent (the first musical to use actual rock singers instead of Broadway performers), and ended both sets with Rogers and Hammerstein's "If I Loved You" from Carousel, one of the first musical theater productions to introduce background music to supplement dialogue.

After the performances, there were three workshops offered. The Jr Choir took part in a workshop with the percussionist labeled "The Art Of Noise," which was an exploration into different percussion instruments as well as how to use everyday noise to create music. The Jr. Band underwent a workshop called "The Etiquette of Success," which helped them relate the meaning of success to their playing as a band. The 9-12 music students participated in a workshop about music and science where they learned much about what parts of the brain make you feel a certain way when you hear music. - Mr. Malowski


MOVIES



SIBLINGS IN SCHOOL



Sun-Dried Tomato Turkey Burgers

TOTAL TIME: Prep: 10 min. Cook: 15 min.

MAKES: 2 servings

Ingredients

1/2 pound ground turkey

1/2 tablespoon Greek seasoning

2 tablespoons sun dried tomato pesto

2 tablespoons sun dried tomatoes, chopped up

2- 3 tablespoons crumbled feta cheese

1/4 cup sour cream

1 teaspoon lemon juice

1 teaspoon olive oil


1 teaspoon minced garlic

salt, pepper, oregano to taste

whole wheat hamburger rolls

artichoke hearts, optional

roasted red peppers, optional

Directions

Mix the first 5 ingredients together. Let sit.

Mix the sour cream, lemon juice, oil, garlic and spices together. Set aside.

Grease a large frying pan and turn heat to medium. (Or preheat your grill to medium). Form turkey meat into two patties and push an indent in the middle. Cook for 7 1/2 minutes, flip, cook for 6-7 minutes longer.

Place burgers on a bun, top with dip and add artichokes and peppers if using. Yield: serves 2

1 bag frozen turkey meatballs

TO THE SCIENCE LAB!

7TH & 8TH GRADE SCIENCE FAIR

The Remsen Middle School Science Fair was held on Wednesday, March 16th from 1:00 to 2:30 pm. The fair marked the end of months of research and experimentation by students. All 7th grade students, and 8th grade students that elected to do so, chose a topic of interest and performed research and experimentation to learn about the topic in an inquiry based manner. Students then presented the results of their research in the normal format for the scientific community- a poster session. At the start of the science fair, all middle school students listened to introductory remarks from a panel of guest judges that were professionals in the scientific community. The judges celebrated the students' accomplishments in the field of science and shared personal experiences about the opportunities that science had provided them in their professional and personal lives. Students then stood by the posters detailing their experiments as the judges reviewed their research and asked questions. After the judges' results were tallied, the groups with the 5 top scores were separated by only 1 point, and the judges were very impressed with all of the students' enthusiasm and hard work. The top 5 groups, in no particular order, included Jade Dening and Emma Skermont's study on "What is Causing Destruction of Coral Reefs?", Katelyn Griffith's study on "Store Bought vs Home-made Laundry Detergent," Andrew Paige and Jonathan Lawler's study on "Water Wheels," Dakota Darling and Ryan Grave's study on "Distracted Driving," and Railey Ehart and Morgan Jones' study "Save the Bees." These students went on to the Utica College Regional Science Fair on April 2nd, where they competed with other local students from throughout central New York. Congratulations to all students that participated in the science fair.



CHEMISTRY STUDENTS TAKE CHEMISTRY CHALLENGE

Six Remsen chemistry students chose to try out for the US National Chemistry Olympiads (USNCO). UNSCO is an organization with a mission to stimulate interest and achievement in chemistry students throughout the nation, and recognize outstanding chemistry students. As part of that mission, they regularly hold and participate in national and international chemistry competitions. Jordan Brinkley, an Organic and Analytical Chemistry Lab Coordinator at the State University of New York College of Environmental Science and Foresetry (SUNY ESF) and the Central New York Coordinator for UNSCO through the American Chemistry Society (ACS) sent an open invitation to high school chemistry students throughout central New York to try out for this year's national team. Six local students, Rachel Carrock, Ethan Kenny, Jeffrey Klossner, Andrew Rimmer, Nolan Singer, and Daniel Tripoli II, chose to accept that invitation. To try out, students had to take a 60 question exam. If students score well on the exam, they will be invited to SUNY ESF, where their knowledge of chemistry will again be tested. The top ten students identified at SUNY ESF will then be eligible to compete for the US national team in an international competition at the 2016 International Chemistry Olympiad in Tbilisi, Georgia where gold, silver, and bronze medals are awarded to the most successful teams. Even if students don't make it to the international competition, all six students will be recognized by the ACS and receive an award at an educational event in June. They can use this recognition to become Student Affiliates of the American Chemistry Society (SAACS), which can serve as an impressive accomplishment on college applications. Congratulations to these students for taking on an impressive challenge and embracing the opportunity.
