Recently, the recipe was featured in the December edition of the magazine, and we, at the school newspaper, felt the need to share the love and the recipe.

Ms. Beyer acquired the recipe from her grandmother in June of 2104, which features haddock, shrimp, and crab. Ms. Beyer also recently had a Skype interview with Hallmark Channel's Home and Family TV show which featured her recipe.

Listed below is the recipe and instructions needed to make the dish because, as Miss Beyer said on the magazine's webpage, "Why wait, when you can enjoy satisfying chowder anytime?"

Ingredients
3 tablespoons plus 1/4 cup butter, divided
1 pound sliced fresh mushrooms
1/3 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
4 cups half-and-half cream
1-1/2 cups 2% milk

1 pound haddock fillets, skin removed, cut into 1-inch pieces

1 pound uncooked medium shrimp, peeled 2 cups frozen peas (about 10 ounces) 3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese 1 cup lump crabmeat (about 5 ounces), drained 1 jar (4 ounces) diced pimientos, drained 1 teaspoon paprika

Directions

In a 6-qt. stockpot, heat 3 tablespoons butter over medium-high heat Add mushrooms; cook and stir 8-10 minutes or until tender

Remove from pot

In same pot, heat remaining butter over medium heat

Stir in flour, salt and pepper until smooth; gradually whisk in cream and milk

Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook and stir 2-3 minutes or until thickened

Stir in haddock, shrimp, peas and sautéed mushrooms; cook 5-7 minutes or until fish just begins to flake easily with a fork and shrimp turn pink

Add cheese, crab and pimientos; stir gently until cheese is melted. Sprinkle servings with paprika

Yield: 10 servings (3-1/4 quarts)








STUDENT MEETS COMETS
