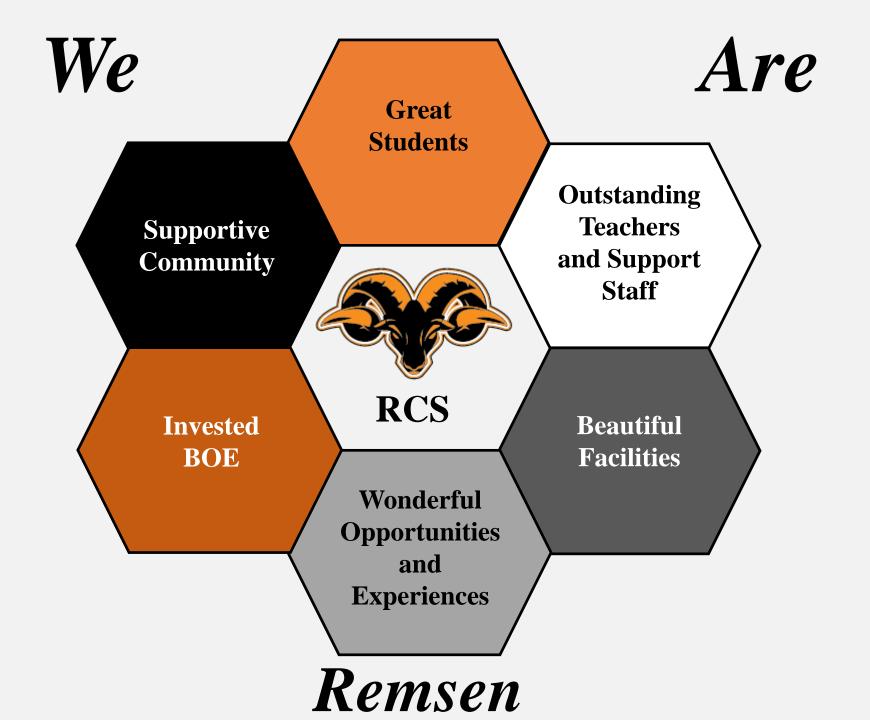

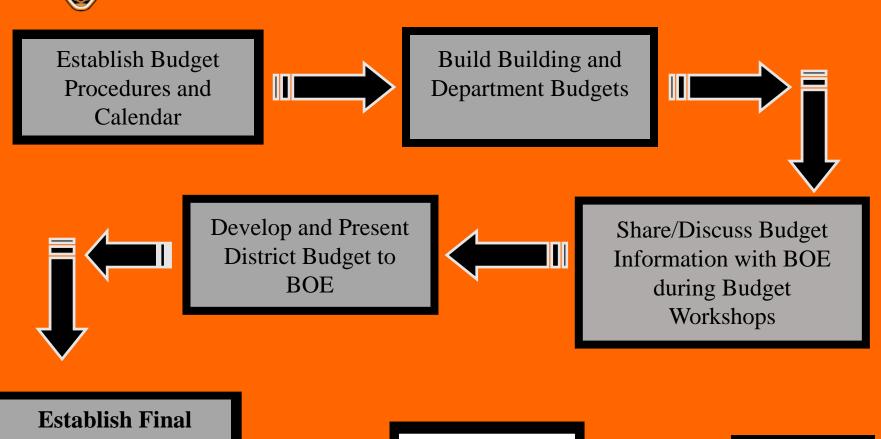

### **Capital**

The capital budget includes costs associated with operations and maintenance of buildings, upkeep of grounds, electricity, heat, oil, water, sewer and telephone services. Funds are also included here for the lease and purchase of buses, payment of debt for capital projects (principal and interest), refund of taxes, and insurance. The final piece of this budget is a transfer to capital for ongoing building improvements.

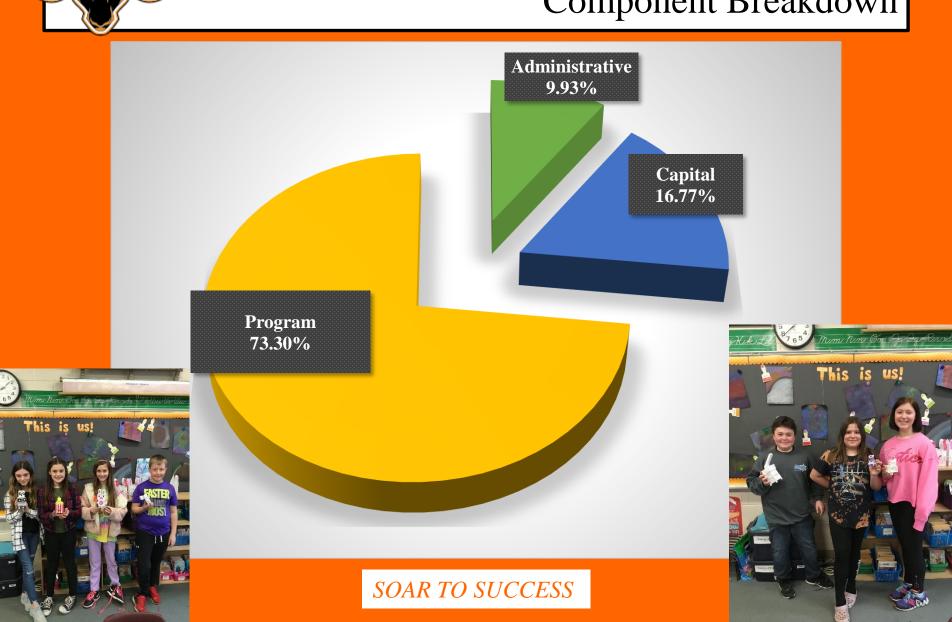
#### **Administrative**

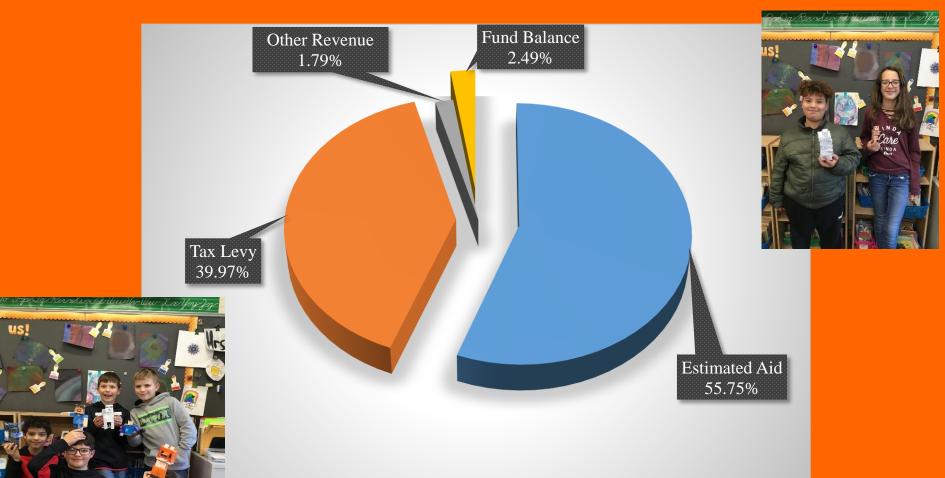

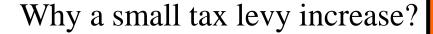

## Student Opportunities Plan Revenue Summary







Even with a small increase in the tax levy (1.00%), the estimated gap between revenue and expenditures is still \$348,914.

A 1.00 % increase in Remsen's tax levy equates to \$55,346.

Operational costs, health insurance, and retirement contributions continue to increase.







# What did we do to help ensure that our 2022-2023 operating budget only increased slightly for next year?

- 1) Remaining fiscally responsible while working to ensure that all of our students receive a quality educational experience.
- 2) Thoughtful planning as vacancies occur to optimize personnel and contain costs.
- 3) Use of American Rescue Plan Grant funds to purchase technology equipment replacements/updates and other eligible program purchases.
- 4) Not replacing an administrative assistant that is retiring at the end of this school year.
- 5) Potential savings realized on new staff hires this summer due to retirements.









### In the Event of a Budget Defeat

Option 1: Keep Same Budget and Vote Second Time

Option 2: Develop a Revised Budget for Voter Approval

Option 3: Adopt a Contingency Budget

#### **Contingency Budget Limitations:**

- 1. Tax Levy no greater than in the last successful budget.
- 2. Removal of equipment.
- 3. Removal of raises for employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement.
- 4. Administrative Component as a % of the sum of Administrative and Program Components no greater than in the last successful budget.
- 5. No public use of school buildings/grounds unless district charges fee that meets or exceeds actual costs.
- 6. No non-emergency capital expenditures

## Big Picture Budget Challenges

The increase in foundation aid for 2022-2023 is only \$150,662. This amount does not come close to covering the increase in operating costs from year to year.

### <u>Caution</u>

NYS is relying on temporary federal fiscal relief and temporary tax increases to fund the budget...this reliance for the overall state budget may create a fiscal cliff.

## Capital Outlay 2022-2023

Continue to Include \$100,000 Capital Outlay Project Each Year (Building Aid = 83.5%)

Responsible Facilities and Maintenance Planning

Actual District Cost After Aid = \$16,500

Scope = Elementary Lockers/Floor Work





## Capital Outlay 2022-2023







Scope = Elementary Intermediate Wing Locker Replacement including reconstruction of soffit, painting, and new rubber base molding. New lockers will be increased in width to 12 inches and be changed to double tier. Each locker will be three feet tall. Changing to double tier while increasing the width will allow students to have more room widthwise to fit boots and coats while ensuring that we will have an adequate number of lockers for students in the future. We will also plan to replace flooring in the teacher center, library work room, and CSE office.



## **Bus Proposition**

Two 66-Passenger Buses at a cost not to exceed \$253,018 less trade in value.

## What do you think are or will be the most pressing issues facing education in general or Remsen Central School?

Balancing the needs of the students and those of the community simultaneously is the number one challenge facing all school districts, including Remsen.



### On the Ballot – What will we be voting on?

#### BUDGET PROPOSITION 1 To adopt the annual budget of the Remsen Central School District in the amount Purchase of two (2) 66 passenger school buses, at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$253,018.00 less trade-in value, if any, and that such costs, of \$13,986,284 for the fiscal year 2022-2023 and to authorize the requisite portion. thereof to be raised by taxation on the taxable property of the District or so much thereof as may be necessary shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$253,018.00 shall be issued, or the school district may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the school district to finance the purchase in that method.

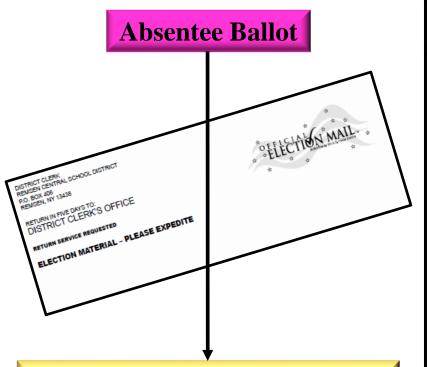

### Can I Vote By Absentee Ballot?

Residents who will not be in the area on May 17, or who are unable to vote in person (including for COVID-19 reasons), may apply for an absentee ballot at the Remsen Central School District Office. If the absentee ballot is to be mailed to the voter, the application must be submitted at least seven days prior to the vote. If the absentee ballot is to be picked up by the voter in person, applications will be accepted until May 16. Absentee ballots must be returned to the district clerk no later than 5:00 PM on May 17.



# Voter Qualifications



#### To Vote, You Must Be:

A citizen of the United States

At least 18 years old

A resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the date of the meeting when the vote is held

Qualified to register for or vote at an election in accordance with the provisions of section 5-106 of the Election Law

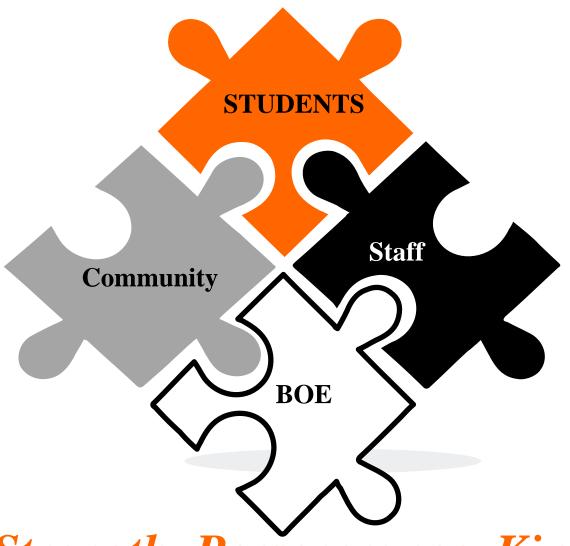
