Commencement

Graduation on the turf field at DC's Upper Campus has become a new tradition as a result of the pandemic years when commencement exercises needed to take place outside. Now, the turf field serves as an ideal venue (weather permitting) that allows for larger numbers of guests. More notable, perhaps, is the view. Throughout the service, the graduates are swathed in golden hues as the sun sets behind the campus. They recess out against a backdrop of violet as twilight draws near.

DC's 66th Commencement took place on Friday, May 31, a beautiful spring evening that lent itself perfectly to the outdoor graduation service. Family, friends, faculty, and staff gathered to worship the Lord and recognize the accomplishments of each graduate of the Class of 2024.

Salutatory remarks were given by Audrey McKeaney, who shared, "The most prominent [lesson] from my time at DC, and throughout my life thus far, has been: God is faithful." She spoke about the fears that many seniors have as they anticipate the post-high school years, and how God has delivered her and her classmates from these fears.

Aminadab (AJ) Baker recounted his story of coming to DC as a new student, and how the Lord carried him through a time of anxiety and uncertainty.





"I could really see the body of Christ reflected in the community by how loving and supportive everyone was to each other," said AJ.

Valedictorian, Sidney Petrulis, was the last student speaker of the evening. Petrulis challenged her classmates not to seek after the fleeting desires of the heart, but to focus on and to follow God. "When we seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, all that we need will be satisfied in Him."



MOLLY D'ANTONIO


AP English Literature, Art History

Change Lives

One of the things I've loved most about teaching at DC for the past ten years is that we have the amazing opportunity to engage in real-world issues with our students. We can explore what God is doing around the world and in our communities and join Him in that work. During the fall semester, the first-grade students focused on answering the essential question, "How do books change lives around the world?" We studied several texts and explored the ways children from across the globe acquire books. The students were able to recognize that not all families are able to experience the joys of reading due to lack of access and funds.

As a way to participate in the correction of this injustice, the first graders worked diligently for several weeks to create counting books for children in Kenya through an organization called Neema. were inspired by the book *Moja Means One: Swahili Counting Book* by Muriel Feelings. We selected numbers from one to ten found in the Bible, crafting a page for each number with its Kiswahili and English translation. The students also learned a song to help them learn how to count to ten in Kiswahili. After completing the books, we prayed together for the recipients.

The significance of reading to children daily cannot be overstated. Not only does it lead to enhanced literacy skills, but it also creates better listeners, builds empathy and understanding, and strengthens family bonds. While Neema's childcare workers read to the children during the day, we wanted to ensure that each young mother had the opportunity to read to her child during the evenings and weekends.

Aside from teaching, I have also been actively involved for several years with Neema, whose mission is to provide skills training, counseling, and discipleship to vulnerable young women in rural Kenya. Because of extreme poverty, all the young women in the program have dropped out of school and lack the means to provide for themselves and their families. Neema students are taught dressmaking and entrepreneurship skills that enable them to break the cycle of poverty. About 50 percent of the young women have children by the time they come to Neema.

As our DC students began to work on their counting books for the 20 children currently at Neema, they

In February, Neema's Executive Director Gaëlle Beltran-Grémaud was able to deliver the books to Kenya.

It is our hope that strong bonds will be created and the love of Jesus will be shared when these young women read with their children. It is also our hope that our DC students would discover their unique roles in God's big story through giving them opportunities to love His people.

An Interview *with* Carol Reigner '97, LC Multi-Media and Literature Coordinator

Tell us a little bit about yourself and your job. What does it mean to be a multimedia and literacy coordinator?

I love to read, and I love to inspire the love of reading in others especially children! My deep hope for my students is that they would love God's story, see their place in it, and share it with others.



At DC, I get to teach literacy based lessons as well as library skills. For the multimedia side of my job, I am privileged to teach our students technology. Lessons could range from: what is a cursor, how to use a trackpad, how to search the internet safely, to using Google Slides to make book reviews, coding, or using Google sheets to chart and graph the most popular school genres. Both reading and technology are relevant skills that students need for lifelong learning and success in the world. I am blessed to be able to teach them how to use both to glorify God.

How does library class help foster a love of reading in students across grade levels?

Most students love to listen to books being read aloud. The beauty of library class is that students get to listen and interact with the text. Hearing books from various authors and listening to different genres being read aloud is exciting for students. The exposure to different types of literature, as well as the rich language of literature, helps students find the genres they are most interested in reading. I also love getting to help students find books to check out of the library that they end up enjoying.

Can you describe what the Read-a-Thon is for those that may not know?

The Read-a-Thon is an annual month-long focus on reading that has a different theme each year. This vear's theme was National Parks. Each student and his or her teacher set a reading goal of a certain number of words he or she is supposed to read during the month. As students read a book on their reading level, they take an Accelerated Reader quiz on the book to test their comprehension of the book. The program tracks the words students have read during the Read-a-Thon. When students reach their 25 percent goal, they get a prize. When they reach their 50 percent goal, they get to take part in a celebration walk through the halls where the other teachers and students cheer them on for their hard work. When they reach their 75 percent goal, they get a special coupon to be redeemed in their classroom. At 100 percent, students get another prize. On the final day of the Read-a-Thon, we have a huge celebration day where the Parent Volunteer Organization (PVO) helps plan and execute a day of fun where we move away from traditional learning in the classroom and get to experience some themefilled activities. We end the day with an awards ceremony and a closing skit. This day would not be possible without the hard work of the PVO and the specialist teachers.



Why is the Read-a-Thon important?

The Read-a-Thon has proven to be a great program at the Lower Campus. The students absolutely love it, and they are always so excited to share their progress with me. I get many emails from parents telling me that their child didn't enjoy reading or only read thin books until the Reada-Thon changed that for them. Students grow in their endurance during this time. We also have seen evidence that their fluency, comprehension, and reading level improve greatly during the span of the Read-a-thon.

It was great to see a book fair on the Lower Campus this past fall. Is this something you'd like to host again?

This year we hosted the i55 Book Fair. It was a tremendous success. Both the students and the parents were so excited to participate. i55 is a Christian company passionate about raising up a generation of inspired readers. The name of the company comes from Isaiah 55 which is their focus. This company states: "In today's culture it is difficult for parents and educators to protect students from unwanted knowledge. For this reason we screen our products through the filter of faith." Because of this philosophy, parents felt confident in the books that were displayed for purchase at the book fair. We will be hosting an even bigger book fair next year with this company. I can't wait!

What is your favorite part about being the librarian at the Lower Campus, and encouraging kids to read at DC?

My favorite part of being the librarian at the Lower Campus is getting to know all of the students from PK3 to fifth grade. I love developing a relationship with the students so they know I care about them and want to see them grow in their relationship with God. From here, it makes my job so much easier because as I get to know the students, I get to know their likes and dislikes and can point them to the type of literature that will inspire them to love reading.

What is one of your favorite books to read aloud with students? Or what was your favorite story growing up? My favorite story growing up is still my favorite story today. I love *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe.* Unfortunately, this book is too long to read aloud to my students during library time. Another one of my favorite stories to read aloud is *Big Max.* I love this book because it is fun to read aloud and is a great way to practice making inferences.

Do you have a verse that you live by, or which informs how you teach each day?

Jeremiah 29:13 is one of my favorite verses: "You will seek me and find me, when you seek me with all your heart." It is a great reminder that God is to be my focus and what I strive for, and His love is so great that He allows us to know Him intimately. What a good God we serve! This is the desire of my heart for all of my students at DC. I want them to know and be known by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.




JOY LUDWIG Head of Lower School



What You Are Looking For Is in the Library is a great summertime, anytime book! This is a Japanese book that has been translated to English. The main connection point for each character is the local library, which could be rather mundane, but the author makes it a fun, insightful read, focusing on the joys of living life in community.

This is one of the best history books I have read. The author, who taught history for many decades at UNC and who required this book to be read by his students, writes a short biographical account of each the "modern" presidents from Teddy Roosevelt through Bill Clinton. Of special interest are the numerous and humorous illustrations from each president's era as well as the most significant contributions and failures of these men. If you're not prone to read full biographies of each of these presidents, this author will give you the "bread and butter" for each of these presidents without all the details. "Putting on a musical has gotta be the most fulfilling thing a person could ever hope to do," Detective Frank Cioffi (Nicholas Fanelli-Salazar '24) exclaims to the cast of the show-within-a-show, *Curtains*. Through splashy song and dance, the DC Theatre Department under the direction of Lori French reminded audience members in March that show people are "a special kind of people."

What truly makes DC show people so special is how their performance portrays God's Kingdom: "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ" (1st Corinthians 12:12). There are countless details that need to be "just right" to present a well-polished musical, and many talented teammates who make it happen.

For instance, a sandbag must drop from the ceiling at the exact moment the theater lights dim. Bryce Cooper '24 and the DC Aerials Team mastered several scenes like this one to enhance both comedy and drama. The costume team met on Friday afternoons to sew fringe on cowboy shirts, size individual belts for plaid prairie dresses, and curate costumes that fit the 1950's time period. Even siblings of cast members



stepped in at rehearsals to assist with major dance lifts, choreographed by Cassie Stinger '24. After four years spent in DC Theatre, she shares, "I have learned that being a part of a musical requires trusting and relying on each other to all work towards one common goal."

The show starred *Mason Davis* as Genie; *Anthony Fanelli-Salazar* as Aladdin; *Ruby Connolly* as Jasmine; and *Jack Ransom* as Jafar.







The second annual Fifth Word Art Fair took place on May 9 as part of the art department's Teaching for Transformation Formational Learning Experience (FLEx). This year-long endeavor was spearheaded by DC's Art Department Chair, Elizabeth Coats '03, and SAIL teacher, Rebecca Pitofsky. FLEx projects encourage opportunities for students to engage in "real work that meets a real need for real people," and provide learners the chance to "live the story" that God has given them. The goal of the Fifth Word Art Fair is to celebrate the beauty of art throughout the world and, more specifically, in our community. The name derives from the fifth word of Genesis 1:1, "In the beginning, God created." The event is designed to support DC's own student artists and other local artists, creating an environment where people can purchase baked goods, handmade jewelry, and other arts and crafts. Proceeds support both the student artists and the charity called Rip Creatives.



During SAIL (Schools of Applied and Innovative Learning) Week, from April 8-12, a group of upper school students headed to the Dominican Republic to serve. The trip took place in partnership with Bold Hope, a non-profit organization based in Pennsylvania, which sends shortterm missionary teams all over the world. In their efforts to "connect communities across cultures and continents to the Glory of God," Bold Hope selflessly strives to "come alongside local ministry partners to provide support for the good work already being accomplished." In the midst of busy school schedules, it is easy to get caught up in frantic activities and neglect how big the world is and how many places are in need of service and support. This spectacular SAIL week trip allowed students to see beyond their typical day-to-day routine, drop everything, and serve.

The robust team of 15 students flew to the Dominican Republic in eager spirits and, for the first part of each day, engaged in numerous projects of service: painting churches, moving rocks, and participating in other building endeavors that had already begun. After this period of physical service, our students helped in ministering to the children of the community, playing sports and games, and showing them the selfless love of Christ. When asked about the importance of service for DC students, Mr. Roberto Irias, Bible teacher and leader of the trip, remarked, "It is a blessing to interact with other cultures and to open our eyes and learn that our culture isn't the only culture in this world; to witness what God is doing in other countries and to see the vastness of God and get us outside of ourselves. God is at work here too. For a student to witness this for the first time is pretty impactful."

The trip was indeed impactful for the students, who came away with a deeper understanding of God's presence in their lives and the lives of the people they were able to serve. Each evening during the trip, the students had time to debrief and discuss the day and the ways they were seeing God work. Sophomore Maryn D'Antonio stated, "My favorite part of the trip was probably the people. You could tell they cared a lot about the work they were doing because they put their whole hearts into it." The kids in the Dominican Republic were also a significant highlight of the trip for most of those who went. The students got to serve the children in a VBS style, playing sports and "just being with them and getting to know them," as junior Ella Irias put it. Traveling and serving in other places is certainly something that DC has been emphasizing more and more and its importance is not missed. Not only do these opportunities provide effective and compelling provisions for other communities, but students are left with a real sense of what it means to serve and impact others in the name of Christ. In regards to the importance of service learning trips, junior Kiley Schmitt aptly asserted they are important as they "show us a new world with new joy. I have never felt so much joy and being there I felt God's presence." More mission trips are certainly something that is on the horizon and display a beautiful use of the SAIL week for our upper school students!





Becca says her "mission is to tell my students about Jesus and I can do that by being an excellent educator. "As we've grown in our walk with the Lord, He's brought us many chances to give, as I'm sure He has for you. However, few of them have been as unique as the EITC program. God's word tells us to 'give to Caesar what is Caesar's' and so we pay our taxes with obedience, though not always with joy. With EITC, 'Caesar' gives us the freedom to redirect our tax payment from our PA state tax bill to DC so that they can provide scholarships directly to the scholarship fund for those who qualify, within the state scholarship parameters.

At first, this seemed too good to be true, and it took some research on my part to trust the process. But as someone who's participated, I can tell you whether it's from personal tax liability or business tax liability, so long as it's in Pennsylvania, you can redirect 90% of your PA state tax liability directly to DC and the other 10% is deductible as any other gift would be.


