Structured Literacy Module 8: From Plant to Plate

In the last few modules we started our learning with long vowel sounds and consonant digraphs. We learned that in a digraph two letters work together to make one new sound. We also learned that vowels can make their long sound in open syllable words. In Module 8, we will discover brand new phonics patterns. We will start our learning with consonant blends. We will learn about this pattern as both the initial sound and as a final sound. Blends are two letters together, but they still make two sounds. We will also begin learning about vowel consonant e words, which is another way a vowel can make a long vowel sound! It is amazing to see how much these kindergarteners are learning!

Module 8: Focus Sounds

Letter Blends	Examples	
Initial "s" blends	snap, stop, skip	<u>Consonant</u>
Initial "I" blends	sled, flag, club	Blends: 2 letters that
Initial "r" blends	crab, drum, frog, trap	make 2 sounds
2 consonant final blends	lamp, mint, band, fast, left, help, sink	
Long a (a_e)	/a/ as in cape	

Module 8: Word Work Examples

Below you will find a few examples on how to help your child when mapping words with blends. Remind them, blends are different than digraphs, so when they map them, they are two different sounds.



Practice Strategy:

Use the attached picture of a blender to practice joining letters together to make consonant blends. You can use the attached letter cards or magnet letters. Have your child say each individual letter sound and then have them say the sounds they make when together. Example: "st" first they would say /s/, then /t/ and finally /s//t/.



Module 8: Focus Words

All of the words in this Module contain consonant blends. It is important that your child is practicing their blends in order to be successful with reading and writing words. The more confident they feel with blends, the more confident they will be with the new words.

Practice Strategy:

- Practice writing sentences using the word want. Sentence starter examples could be:
 - I want to go...
 - I want to eat....
 - I want a....
- Connect to dramatic play. Have your child make a pretend restaurant. Have them practice asking and ordering using the question, "Do you want... or the sentence starter, I want... It may be extra fun if you add the use of a pretend blender to combine ingredients in a smoothie or milkshake.

Practice Strategy:

- Practice tapping out the sounds in each of the words. It is important for your child to hear that there are more than three sounds in the word.
- Write the words on an index card or piece of paper, have your child practice tapping out the sounds. Extend this activity, by having your child cut the word into puzzles, by cutting out each individual sound.






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Module 8: Consonant Blend Practice
