SHAC Purpose & Goals



Every school district is required by State law to have a school health advisory council (SHAC) of which the majority of members must be parents who are not employed by the school district. The SHAC is annually appointed by the local education agency Board of Trustees.

Texas Education Code Title 2, Chapter 28, Section 28.004





SHAC Purpose & Goals

The SHAC is a group of individuals representing segments of the community and school district which provides advice to the district on coordinated school health (CSH) programming and its impact on student health and learning.



What is Coordinated School Health?




Coordinated School Health is a systematic approach of advancing student academic performance by promoting, practicing, and coordinating school health education and services for the benefit and well-being of students in establishing healthy behaviors designed to last a lifetime.

Fentanyl Awareness- Tucker's Law

88(R) HB 3908

The measure — named Tucker's Law after Tucker Roe, a 19-year-old from Leander who died after taking a fentanyl-laced pill — went into effect in June and also requires Gov. Greg Abbott to designate a Fentanyl Poisoning Awareness Week in public schools.



FENTANYL POISONING AWARENESS WEEK

To educate students about the dangers posed by the drug fentanyl and the risks of fentanyl poisoning, including overdose, the governor shall designate a week to be known as Fentanyl Poisoning Awareness Week in public schools.

Fentanyl Poisoning Awareness Week may include age-appropriate instruction, including instruction on the prevention of the abuse of and addiction to fentanyl, as determined by each school district.

Each school district shall annually provide research-based instruction related to fentanyl abuse prevention and drug poisoning awareness to students in grades 6 through 12.

The instruction required by this section must include:

- Suicide prevention;
- o Prevention of the abuse of and addiction to fentanyl:
- o Awareness of local school and community resources and any processes involved in accessing those resources;and
- o Health education that includes information about substance use and abuse, including youth substance use and abuse.

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MISD meets this requirement by using informational videos and resources provided by our trusted partner, REACH Council, during Red Ribbon Week in October.

- · Health-Related Physical Fitness assessment: Aerobic Capacity (PACER, mile run/walk), Body Composition (BMI), Muscular Strength, Muscular Endurance, Flexibility (curl-up, trunk lift, push-up, sit and reach)
- · Skills assessment: Speed, Agility, Coordination, Balance, Power, Reaction Time
