It is with great pleasure that I announce the Hamilton Central School Salutatorian and Valedictorian for the class of 2024. These students have done tremendous work throughout their years at HCS, both in the classroom and out. Their dedication to academic pursuits and their active involvement in our school community have continued the tradition of excellence for which our students are known.

Hamilton's class of 2024 Salutatorian is Emilija Morkevičius. Emilija is the daughter of Valerie and Matas Morkevičius, and the sister of Ingrida ('25), Lukas ('28), and Jonas ('32) Morkevičius. She is the 2023 recipient of the St. Michael's Book Award, the RIT Science and Math Award, and the University of Rochester Xerox Award for Innovation and Information Technology.

HCS has been a huge part of Emilija's life so far: running Cross Country and Track, careening down Labrador with Ski Club, editing film clips for Tech Club, debating policy with the Model United Nations, and participating in every aspect of Masquers, from singing and acting in high school shows to helping direct middle school productions. She's also been lucky enough to serve as Senior Class President, Co-Tech Club President, and as a member of Student Council. Additionally, she has enjoyed playing in band and singing in choir, including participating in the NYSSMA solo festival, the All-County Choir, and the Area-All State Choir.

Outside of HCS, she earned second place in the U16 Lithuanian Alpine Skiing Cup, often sang with the St. Thomas Episcopal Church Choir, learned about health care with the Hamilton Hospital Explorer Group, volunteered with Friendship Inn, and worked at the Hamilton Movie Theater. Her favorite memories include traveling to Montréal with Model UN, hiking to the top of Blue Mountain with the girls' Cross Country team, and participating in Mamma Mia!

Emilija offers the following advice to younger students: "Don't be afraid to try new things and branch out!"

She would like to thank her parents for always being there, her siblings for keeping her grounded and in tune with her inner child, her friends for being her partners in crime on years of adventures together, and Millie Franklin for inspiring her to stay curious and share love.

Emilija will graduate in June with a Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation with Honors. In the fall, she will attend Harvard University.

Chloé has participated in varsity soccer and track, competing in both soccer semifinals and track sectionals in 2022 and 2023. She is a member of Ski Club, Tech Club, Masquers drama club, Model UN, Mathletics, Language Club, the Buddy program, and the new Varsity Leaders club. She is currently the vice president of Student Council, a student representative for her class, and the vice president of the National Honor Society. She plays the flute in the HCS band and sings for the HCS chorus.

Chloé has been on the High Honor Roll and received an award for Outstanding Academic Achievement every year at HCS. In 2023, she was awarded Scholar-Athlete of the Year at HCS and the College Board Award for Outstanding Achievement. Chloé was awarded All-County honors for voice for two years and All-State Treble Choir honors in 2023. She was a member of the HCS chorus that was awarded the NYSSMA Bronze Medal in 2023 and a Silver Medal in 2024.

As part of our continuous commitment to fostering a safe and protected learning environment, we would like to announce the **implementation of a new reporting system at HCS.** This system is designed to streamline the process of reporting bullying, harassment, and any safety concerns or disruptive incidents. Our overarching objective is to cultivate an atmosphere where individuals feel comfortable expressing their concerns and sharing information that enhances the safety and well-being of our school community.

The bullying incident and See Something, Say Something reporting forms are now available to all HCS school and community members. This confidential and convenient tool allows anyone to report information about situations that may affect the safety and wellbeing of our school community. We understand the importance of providing a secure and accessible channel for reporting, and this new system will allow reports to be submitted at any time of the day or night.

You can use the reporting forms to bring attention to concerns related to various issues, including but not limited to:

- Bullying
- Harassment
 - Drug or alcohol use/abuse
 - Weapons
- Threats

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Any suspicious activity that may affect the safety of the school community

The safety of our students and staff is our top priority, and your cooperation in utilizing this reporting system will play a crucial role in maintaining a secure and positive learning environment for everyone.

Dear Hamilton Learning Community,

As the school year draws to a close, I am delighted to share the many wonderful accomplishments and events that have made this year truly special at our elementary school. Our students, teachers, and community members have come together in remarkable ways, and I am proud to highlight some of the key initiatives and activities that have taken place.

This year, we successfully implemented the new math curriculum, Eureka Squared. Our students have embraced this engaging and comprehensive program, and we are already seeing significant growth in their mathematical understanding and problem-solving skills.

In grades Kindergarten through 2nd grade, we introduced the New Reading and Writing Units of Study to our phonics program, Fundations. This has provided our youngest learners with a robust foundation in literacy. This initiative has fostered a love for reading and writing, setting the stage for future academic success.

We also transitioned to the Computer Based Testing (CBT) model for New York State Assessments in grades 3-5. This approach to testing has not only streamlined the assessment process but also better prepares our students for the technological demands of the future.

Our intermediate grades have delved into the exciting world of New York State Science Investigations. Through hands-on experiments and inquiry-based learning, our students have developed a deeper understanding of scientific concepts and the scientific method.

One of the highlights of the year was our community common book read of "Fenway and Hattie" by Victoria J. Coe. This shared reading experience brought students, families, and staff together, fostering a sense of community and a love for literature.

We had the privilege of working with Cornelius Minor for teacher professional development. His expertise and passion for improving student engagement have inspired our teachers to create more dynamic and interactive instructional lessons, greatly benefiting our students.

Our students showcased their musical talents in elementary chorus, band, and orchestra concerts. Additionally, the Elementary Musical "Finding Nemo" was a spectacular success, highlighting the incredible dedication and creativity of our young performers.

Career Day was a memorable event, with parents and community volunteers sharing their professions and inspiring our students to explore various career paths. Wellness Day, also supported by community volunteers, emphasized the importance of physical and mental well-being through a variety of activities and workshops.

Family Science and Family Technology Night provided opportunities for families to engage in interactive and educational activities together, while Screen-Free Week encouraged students to unplug and explore alternative forms of entertainment and learning.

The Global Day of Play was another highlight, promoting unstructured play and creativity among our students. This day reminded us all of the importance of play in the development of social and cognitive skills.

Junior and Senior FFA

In the beginning of May, Hamilton Junior and Senior FFA members attended the 99th New York State FFA Convention in Buffalo, New York! Not only did we have members competing in numerous competitions at states, but we also had two members move on to the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana in October! Our Junior Quiz Bowl team, consisting of 8th grader Bre Hoke, 7th grader Sena Etefa, and 6th graders Kiley White and Dora Palmer, moved on to the quarter finals for their competition! Junior FFA members had to answer questions regarding FFA and general agriculture in a head to head tournament contest which is held annually at the New York State FFA Convention! Junior Breanna Craven competed in the Discussion Meet competition, and contributed to a conversation about autonomous equipment and drone technology challenges for farmers and ranchers. The Discussion Meet is an activity designed to build crucial skills in young, active agriculturalists. By participating, members build basic discussion skills, develop a keen understanding of important agricultural issues and explore how groups can pool knowledge to reach consensus and solve problems. This event is based upon the rules and standards of the Farm Bureau's Young Farmer Discussion Meet Event. Senior Stephanie Bernard competed in not one, but two competitions at the state convention! She first gave her speech about Food Insecurity and Food Security in the Senior Prepared Public Speaking competition and placed 4th overall. During the Prepared Public Speaking Leadership Development Event (LDE), members will write and deliver a six to eight-minute speech about a current agriculture-related topic. Members research a topic of interest and then put together a creative, informative speech. The speech is then presented to a panel of judges, who score the student based on the

speech's content, composition and delivery. She then competed in Senior Extemporaneous Speaking and chose the topic of the importance of agricultural education in elementary school.

During this event, participants draw from 18 agricultural topics then select three of interest. From those



three, a member selects the topic of their speech and has 30 minutes to prepare using five resources. Participants then present a four to six-minute speech on their topic to a panel of judges. After their speech, members answer five minutes worth of questions on the topic they just presented. Congratulations to Stephanie on a very successful last state convention! Stephanie also placed first in her proficiency! Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through supervised agricultural experiences, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Stephanie's SAE is poultry (chickens), where she raises and cares for 10 free-range chickens and sells her eggs at the local farmers market and to local community members! Stephanie gets to go to the National FFA Convention with her proficiency award and compete against winners from all over the country. And finally, Breanna Craven will be moving on to the National FFA Convention in the fall for the Talent competition! She competed in the Talent CDE and placed first and got to perform her song in front of more than 2,000 people twice! Look out for Bre in Indianapolis!







A Message from the Director of Pupil Personnel Services

Hello Hamilton Families,

As we navigate the importance of social-emotional learning and understanding anxiety, I wanted to share some valuable resources and tips to support your child's well-being, especially during the summer months.

- 1. Encourage Open Communication: Create a safe space for your child to express their feelings and concerns. Listen attentively and validate their emotions, letting them know it's okay to feel anxious or worried at times.
- 2. **Practice Mindfulness and Relaxation Techniques:** Introduce simple mindfulness exercises or relaxation techniques to help your child manage stress. This could include deep breathing exercises, guided imagery, or progressive muscle relaxation.
- 3. Establish Routines and Structure: Consistent routines can provide a sense of stability and security for children. Set up a daily schedule that includes time for play, relaxation, and social interactions, as well as regular bedtime routines to ensure adequate rest.
- 4. Limit Exposure to Stressful Situations: Be mindful of your child's exposure to stressful or triggering situations, such as excessive screen time, news coverage of distressing events, or over-scheduling activities. Encourage breaks and outdoor play to balance screen time.

- 6. Be the Role Model Your Children Need: It has been said that our children are mirror images of who we are. If they see us practicing the above tips, they will be more likely to do the same.

After an incredible 32 years of dedicated service, Mrs. Miller, our beloved 1st-grade teacher, is retiring from HCS. While she leaves us to spend more time with her family, gardening, and antiquing, her impact on our community will be everlasting.

Mrs. Miller joined our district 32 years ago with a passion for education and a heart full of love for her students. Throughout her tenure, she fostered a love of learning in hundreds of students, inspiring them and witnessing their growth as they journeyed through our school. Remarkably, she often experienced the full circle of her influence as former students returned to her classroom, not as students, but as parents to a new generation of young minds.
