Where did you go after graduating from Herricks?

I used to tutor my sister when we were kids and I just really enjoyed it. So I think it's just been a lifelong feeling.

I think we have a lot of kids that do thank us here, and they'll visit and bring us birthday treats and remember to say "hi" to us...but for the kids who might not, I hope they'll at least be able to look back fondly at their time here and can confidently say that this was a good place with good people and that they learned great things. I know that Herricks has that kind of environment because I experienced it as a student, which is why I thought "why not keep that going?"

What does being a member of the Herricks community mean to you?

Well, Herricks has always been my home. I lived here—still live here—and I went to school here. I teach here now. I just hope that even the kids who leave the district someday and go live elsewhere can always think of Herricks as their home and as a place where they could be themselves, a place where they were safe, and a place where they loved what they did and learned—just like I did as a student and still do even now.

Where did you go after graduating from Herricks?

So, I went to Searingtown for elementary school—a lot of my teachers are still there. I went to Herricks Middle School and Herricks High School, then after that I went to Queens College for both undergrad and grad school. I got my undergrad in sociology and history and I went back to grad school for early childhood education.

What brought you back to Herricks, specifically?

Working in Herricks was always a dream of mine, since it was a huge part of my upbringing and my education. I connected with and stayed in touch with a lot of the teachers—even ones I never had as a student. Julie Fegan, my second grade teacher, being one of them. So I stayed in touch and I remember calling Herricks constantly as soon as I graduated. I connected with Linda Weiershauser and I remember I would call her every Friday to ask if there were any openings and she'd always tell me to "keep in touch, stay consistent, and be persistent" and, lo and behold, I finally found something part-time in kindergarten. I've been here at Denton ever since.

What does being a member of the Herricks community mean to you?

Being a member of the Herricks School District means not only giving back, but also paying it forward. I was lucky enough to grow up in this district and I was super shy. I've changed a lot since then, but I remember being very closed off and having a lot of anxiety about going to school. I still remember how much the teachers and even the principal made a difference for me. The Searingtown principal Mrs. Lindenauer used to come to all of my school plays, even outside of school hours. She made connections with all of us and I remember how much that meant to me, which is why I feel now that paying it forward is so important—especially for kids that don't have that sense of "home." I always say that our class is like a family, because it really is...the kids spend most of their day in school, so it's so important to me that they feel a sense of belonging.
