Acceptable Use of Computer Technologies, Network Services, and Internet Resources

Purpose

The Guttenberg School District prides itself in preparing students to be active participants in the global community and preparing them for success in life and in work in the 21st century. To this effort, the school district provides computer equipment, computer services, and Internet access to its pupils and staff for educational purposes only. The purpose of providing technology resources is to improve learning and teaching through research, teacher training, collaboration, dissemination and the use of global communication resources.

For the purpose of this Policy and Regulation, "computer networks/computers" includes, but is not limited to, the school district's computer networks, computer servers, computers, other computer hardware and software, Internet equipment and access, and any other computer related equipment.

STANDARDS FOR USE OF TECHNOLOGY

The use of the network and the Internet is a privilege, not a right. Pupils are responsible for acceptable and appropriate behavior and conduct on school district computer networks/computers. Communications on the computer networks/computers are often public in nature and policies and regulations governing appropriate behavior and communications apply. The school district's networks, Internet access, and computers are provided for pupils to conduct research, complete school assignments, and communicate with others. Access to computer networks/computers is given to pupils who agree to act in a considerate, appropriate, and responsible manner. Parent(s) or legal guardian(s) permission is required for a pupil to access the school district's computer networks/computers. Access entails responsibility and individual users of the district computer networks/computers are responsible for their behavior and communications over the computer networks/computers. It is presumed users will comply with district standards and will honor the agreements they have signed and the permission they have been granted. Beyond the clarification of such standards, the district is not responsible for the actions of individuals utilizing the computer networks/computers who violate the policies and regulations of the Board.

Computer networks/computer storage areas shall be treated in the same manner as other school storage facilities. School district personnel may review files and communications to maintain system integrity, confirm users are using the system responsibly, and ensure compliance with Federal and State laws that regulate Internet safety. Therefore, no person should expect files stored on district servers would be private or confidential.

The following prohibited behavior and/or conduct using the school district's networks/computers is susceptible to disciplinary action and includes but is not limited to:

- 1. Sending or displaying offensive messages or pictures;
- 2. Using obscene language and/or accessing material or visual depictions that are obscene as defined in section 1460 of Title 18, United States Code;
- 3. Using or accessing material or visual depictions that are child pornography, as defined in section 2256 of Title 18, United States Code;
- 4. Using or accessing material or visual depictions that are harmful to minors including any pictures, images, graphic image files or other material or visual depictions that taken as a whole and with respect to minors, appeals to a prurient interest in nudity, sex, or excretion;
- 5. Depicting, describing, or representing in a patently offensive way, with respect to what is suitable for minors, sexual acts or conduct; or taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value as to minors;
- 6. Cyberbullying;
- 7. Inappropriate online behavior, including inappropriate interaction with other individuals on social networking sites and in chat rooms;
- 8. Harassing, insulting, or attacking others;
- 9. Damaging computers, computer systems, or computer networks/computers;
- 10. Violating copyright laws;
- 11. Using another's password;
- 12. Trespassing in another's folders, work or files;
- 13. Intentionally wasting limited resources, including printing resources;
- 14. Employing the computer networks/computers for commercial purposes; and/or
- 15. Engaging in other activities that do not advance the educational purposes for which computer networks/computers are provided.

Online Conduct

Any action by a pupil or other user of the school district's computer networks/computers that is determined by school district personnel to constitute an inappropriate use of the district's computer networks/computers or to improperly restrict or inhibit other persons from using and enjoying those resources is strictly prohibited and may result in limitation on or termination of an offending person's access and other consequences in compliance with Board policy and regulation. The user specifically agrees not to submit, publish, or display any defamatory, inaccurate, abusive, obscene, profane, sexually oriented, threatening, racially offensive, or otherwise illegal or offensive material; nor shall a user encourage the use, sale, or distribution of controlled substances. Transmission of material, information or software in violation of any local, State or Federal law is also prohibited and is a breach of the Consent and Waiver Agreement.

Pupils and their parent(s) or legal guardian(s) specifically agree to indemnify the school district and school district personnel for any losses, costs, or damages, including reasonable attorneys' fees incurred by the Board relating to, or arising out of any breach of this section by the pupil.

Individuals violating this Policy shall be subject to the consequences as indicated in Board Policy and Regulation 2361 and other appropriate discipline, which includes but is not limited to:

- 1. Use of computer networks/computers only under direct supervision;
- 2. Suspension of network privileges;
- 3. Revocation of network privileges;
- 4. Suspension of computer privileges;
- 5. Revocation of computer privileges;
- 6. Suspension from school;
- 7. Expulsion from school; and/or
- 8. Legal action and prosecution by the authorities.

STUDENT ATTENDANCE

In accordance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A: 38-25, every parent, guardian, or other person having control and custody of a child between the ages of six and sixteen shall cause the child to regularly attend school. The Board of Education requires students enrolled in the school district attend school regularly in accordance with the laws of the State. A student must be in attendance for 165 or more school days in order to be considered to have successfully completed the instructional program requirements of the grade/course to which she/he is assigned.

The New Jersey Commission of Education has stated:

"Frequent absences of pupils from regular classroom learning experiences disrupt the continuity of the instructional process. The benefit of regular classroom instruction is lost and cannot be entirely regained, even by extra after-school instruction is lost and cannot be entirely who miss school frequently experience great difficulty in achieving the maximum benefits of schooling. Indeed, many pupils in these circumstances are able to achieve only mediocre success in their academic programs. The school cannot teach pupils who are not present. The entire process of education requires a regular continuity of instruction, classroom participation, learning experiences, and study in order to reach the goal of maximum educational benefits for each individual child. The regular contact of the pupils with one another in the classroom and their participation in well-planned instructional activity under the tutelage of a competent teacher are vital to this purpose. This is the well-established principle of education which underlines and gives purpose to the requirement of compulsory schooling in this and every other state in the Nation." (Wheatley et al vs. Board of Education of Burlington, 9/23/74.)

A waiver of these attendance requirements may be granted for good cause by the school principal upon recommendation of a review committee, appointed by him/her, and consisting of representative staff. In recommending the granting of a waiver of this attendance requirement, the review committee shall consider the nature and causes of all absences rather than only those in excess of the 10 days. Documentation of the nature and causes of these absences shall be the responsibility of the student and parent. In accordance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 6A: 16-7.6 and for the purposes of this Policy and Regulation 5200, a student's absence from school will be excused or unexcused that counts toward truancy. Students that are absent from school for any reason are responsible for the completion of assignments missed because of their absence.

A student who is absent from school for observing a religious holiday shall not be deprived of any award, eligibility, or opportunity to compete for any award, or deprived of the right to take an alternate test or examination that was missed because of the absence provided there is a written excuse of such absence signed by the parent. Prolonged or repeated absences, excused or unexcused, from school or from class, deprive students of the educational and classroom experiences deemed essential to learning and may result in retention at grade level in accordance with policies of this Board.

Students shall be subjected to the school district's response for unexcused absences that count toward truancy during the school year as outlined in N.J.A.C. 6A: 16-7.6(a)4 and Regulation 5200. Unexcused absences from school or from classes within the school day may subject a student to consequences that may include the denial of a student's participation in cocurricular activities and/or athletic competition. Repeated absences from school interfere with efforts of this Board and its staff in the maintenance of good order and the continuity of classroom instruction and such absences may result in the removal of the student from a class or course of study.

"Chronic absenteeism" is defined in New Jersey's ESSA State Plan as the percentage of a school's students who are not present for 10 percent or more of the days that they were "enrolled" at a school.

I. STUDENT ATTENDANCE POLICY

- A. A total of fifteen (10) unexcused absences per school year (Grades K-8).

 The principal and the teacher(s) involved are required to conduct a conference notifying the parent/guardian that their child has either lost credit for the marking period or the entire year due to a violation of this Attendance Policy pursuant to N.J.S.A 18A:38-25 < New Jersey Compulsory Attendance Law).
- B. If a student accumulates more than the number stated in A (for the year), he/she will receive no credit or a failing grade of sixty (60) for the course. In addition, if a student is absent for 5 unexcused absences within a marking period, he/she will receive a failing grade of a sixty (60) for the marking period for each course that they have 5 unexcused absences for.
- C. Unexcused absences and excused absences shall be defined as follows, as per the New Jersey Department of Education:

Unexcused:

- a. Basic illness without a doctor's note
- b. Truancy and class cutting
- c. Personal reasons
- d. Employment
- e. Family Vacation
- f. Leaving school ill without permission from the school nurse and/or administrators.
- g. Late or excused early from school without a valid reason.
- h. Dental excuse (except for: oral surgery and orthodontist appointment. (A note from the dentist/ surgeon is required)

Excused:

- a. Religious observance
- b. A college visit (up to 3 days per school year for students in grades 11 and 12)
- c. "Take Our Children to Work Day" or other rule issued by the Commissioner of Education
- d. Participation in observance of Veterans Day (N.J.S.A.18A: 36-13.2) or district board of election membership activities
- e. The closure of a busing district that prevents a student from having transportation to the receiving school

According to the terms of Chapter 322, P.L. 1951 regarding pupil absences from school because of religious holidays, the Commissioner of Education, with the approval of the State Board of Education, is charged with the responsibility of prescribing such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of the law.

The law provides that:

- A. No pupil who is absent from school because of religious holiday may be deprived of any award or of eligibility or opportunity to compete for any award because of such absence.
- B. If a pupil misses a test or examination because of religious holiday, he/she must be given the right to take alternate test or examination.
- C. To be entitled to the privileges set forth above, the pupil must present a written excuse signed by a parent or guardian.
- D. A student will have five (5) school days to submit a doctor's note after he/she returns to school.
- E. Students have a responsibility to make up work regardless of the reason for their absence. Teachers have an obligation to assist pupils in making up class work missed for credit except for work missed as a result of an absence due to truancy or cutting.
- F. A student absent for one to three days must have a note signed by the parent on the return to school following the above absence.
- G. A student with an unexcused absence on a given day will NOT be permitted to participate in any after school activity (athletic games or practice, dances, plays, chorus, clubs, etc.)
- H. Attendance will be taken in every class even if the regular classroom teacher is absent. Any absence from such class will be recorded as unexcused and "cut"

The following levels of intervention have been adopted by the Guttenberg School District to promote regular attendance are for all students regarding excused and unexcused absences:

Level 1 (3 Days): Any student who accumulates three days absent will have a letter sent home from the school and or be notified via a phone call by the attendance officer. Parents must sign the letter and return back to the school promptly. The letter will be recorded in the student's file.

Level 2 (5 Days): Any student who accumulates five days absent will have a phone call home and a formal letter sent home from the school. In addition, parents must meet with an administrator and the administrator will inform the parents that any further absences will result in a meeting with the Principal. Attendance of the student will be reviewed and the importance of daily attendance of school will be discussed. Formal letter sent home must be signed and will be kept in the student's file.

Level 3 (7 Days): Any student who accumulates seven days absent will have a phone call home, formal letter sent home from school, and a meeting with the principal. The principal will inform the parents that any further absences will result in referral to summons to truancy court.

Level 4 (10 Days): Any student who accumulates ten or more days absent, the school will require the parent or guardian to physically come to the school building with their child and sign their child into school daily with a member of the school office staff present for a period of 10 days.

Level 5 (15 Days): Any student who accumulates fifteen or more days absent will be issued a summons to truancy court. The parent or guardian must appear to truancy court or a warrant will be issued for the parent. Parents may be subject to fines in truancy court.

II. CUT POLICY

- A. A cut is defined as an absence based upon a deliberate decision by a student or group of students not to attend class without prior administrative approval.
- B. A student shall receive an "F" for the work missed on the day of the cut.

First: (1) cut = 1 day (in - school) suspension.

Second (2) cut = 1 day (out of school) suspension; parent conference.

Third (3) cut = 3 days of (out of school) suspension; parent conference.

III. TRUANCY

Truancy is an absence from school without parental knowledge or more than (3) cuts during a school day.

First (1) Truancy = Saturday detention.

Second (2) Truancy = 1 day suspension; parent conference.

Third (3) Truancy = 2 day suspension; parent conference.

More than three (3) = student and parent (s) will be charged in either Municipal Court or County Court.

IV. SUSPENSION

Students who are suspended for one day will be readmitted the following day after suspension.

Students must report to the Principal's Office for readmittance slip when returning from suspension. This slip will indicate to the faculty that the student is allowed to return to class.

Suspension can either be In-School or Out-of-School depending on the circumstances. Parental contact and notification will be administered for either of these consequences.

LATENESS

Students late to school after 8:25 am must obtain a late pass from the Lateness Monitor or the Main Office. All students are required to report to school no later than 8:25 am and must be in their classrooms by 8:30 am.

Grades K-5

On the third late a phone call to the parents/guardian will be made.

On the fifth late student will be given a lunch detention and a parent meeting will be required.

On the tenth late grades Kdg. - 2 will receive a Morning Detention and grades 3rd - 5th will receive an afternoon detention.

Failure to appear to detentions and/or being late to detention will result in another added morning detention.

Any late after the tenth will result in parents being required to sign in their child every day in the main office.

Grades 6-8

On the **third late** students will receive a morning detention and a phone call home to their parent/guardian.

On the **fifth late** students will receive a morning detention, be required to attend On Course (lunch tutor program), and receive a phone call home to their parent/ guardian.

On the **tenth late** students will receive a phone call home to their parent/ guardian requesting a meeting with their parents and an administrator and an afternoon detention.

Any **late after the tenth** will result in a Saturday detention and the requirement of parents to sign in their child every day in the main office.

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

To support a safe, healthy environment centered on the social emotional needs of students, the Guttenberg Board of Education maintains high expectations for student behavior. Zero Tolerance Tiers:

- Tier 1 Low-level offenses of Zero Tolerance, as deemed by the administration will be a meeting with the principal.
- Tier 2 Mid-level offenses of Zero Tolerance, as deemed by the administration will be a meeting with the Superintendent.
- Tier 3 High-level offenses of Zero Tolerance, as deemed by the administration will be a Board of Education hearing.

The Administration assigns morning detention to students in grades kindergarten through third grade who have been referred to them by a staff member for violation of school rules and regulations. Morning Detention is held before school from 7:45 am until 8:15 am on Monday through Friday. Students will be given a letter to bring home and be given at least 24-hour notice prior to the date of the detention. The parents of the students are responsible for bringing their children on time to detention. If detention is cancelled or a student is absent, students are expected to attend the next scheduled detention unless otherwise noted by an Administrator. If there is an emergency or a valid excuse to miss detention i.e. doctor's appointment, it is the parent's responsibility to inform the Administrator prior to the detention.

Lunch Detention

Any teacher or administrator can assign a lunch detention. Lunch detentions are for less serious discipline offenses and the student cannot sit with their class during their lunch period.

Teacher Detention

A teacher can assign their own after school detention, however a teacher detention cannot exceed 29 minutes in length. If a student fails to report to a teacher detention, they will be referred to an administrator and be given an administrative detention.

Administrative Detention

The Administration assigns administrative detention to students who have been referred to them by a staff member for violation of school rules and regulations. Administrative Detention is held after school from 3:15 until 4:15 on Tuesday through Friday. Students will be given a letter to bring home and be given at least 24-hour notice prior to the date of the detention. Extracurricular activities do not excuse any student from attending detention. Students are responsible for showing up on their own, on time to detention. In the event that detention is cancelled or a student is absent, students are expected to attend the next scheduled detention unless otherwise noted by an Administrator. If there is an emergency or a valid excuse to miss detention i.e. doctor's appointment, it is the student's responsibility to inform the Administrator prior to the detention. If a student cuts an administrative detention, the student will be assigned one additional detention.

Saturday Detention

During the year, students may be assigned a Saturday detention as a more serious consequence for violating the code of conduct. Parents will be notified and given sufficient notice when a Saturday detention is assigned. Saturday detention is held from 8:15 am until 12:15 pm. All students must report to the front of the building in the approved school uniform and must be signed in and out by a parent or guardian. Students are expected to comply with all school rules while attending Saturday detention and must complete all assignments. If a student is late, out of uniform, displays behavioral issues or fails to complete their work in Saturday detention, they will be assigned an additional day of Saturday detention.

In-School Suspension

The In-School Suspension program was designed to hold students accountable for their behavior and their school assignments while they remain in school after having committed a violation of the Guttenberg Board of Education Policies. Students must report to school at 8:25 am and be signed in by a parent via the main office. Teachers will provide the student with enough work to complete for the duration of the day. During ISS, students' behaviors will be monitored to ensure a safe environment.

Out-Of-School Suspension

The most serious infractions to the code of conduct may result in out-of-school suspensions. When a student is assigned out-of-school suspension (OSS), the parent/guardian will be contacted and must pick up their child from school within a reasonable amount of time **the same day**. The student will remain out of school until the return date specified by the Administrator. All efforts will be made to provide the student with work from his classes. At no time should a student who is suspended be outside the immediate area of the school or on school grounds. After the 5th day of OSS, arrangements will be made to provide the student with homebound instruction until the student is remitted back into the school. Unless noted, parents/guardians are required to accompany their child the day they are to be readmitted to school. *Any student who receives OSS will be automatically placed on social restriction for two weeks.

PRIDE PROGRAM

The Anna L. Klein P.R.I.D.E. program is dedicated toward infusing character education and reinforcing positive social qualities in our students and serves as a compliment to the Points System outlined above. It is based on the core belief that when students demonstrate P.R.I.D.E. and are visibly recognized for it, they can truly make a positive impact on the school community. The five components of the P.R.I.D.E. program remain as follows:

P erformance: Students perform to their best ability every day and face challenges with a strong, positive outlook.

R esponsibility: Students take responsibility for themselves, their actions and the environment around them.

I nitiative: Students are self-aware of the needs of the community and are motivated to act in the best interest of others.

D etermination: Despite challenges, students are determined to never give up and be a positive force in our school.

E xcellence: Students strive to achieve academic, social and personal excellence as demonstrated by their actions.

Students who embody the tenants of the P.R.I.D.E. program will receive recognition and reinforcement through rewards for their positive behavior. In addition, those students will also be invited to the P. R. I. D. E. ceremony to honor their accomplishment and these take place at the conclusion of the first, second and third marking periods.

HALLWAY PROCEDURES

In order to maintain student safety, students in grades Pre-K-4 will be escorted by their teachers to and from their classes throughout the day. Students who leave the classroom are required to sign out of the classroom and have a pass in their possession.

CARE OF SCHOOL PROPERTY

Students causing destruction to school property will be reported to the school administration. The parent or guardian shall be liable for the amount needed to repair or replace the damage.

RESTROOMS

Students are permitted to use the bathrooms when issued a pass by a staff member. Students should use the bathroom closest to their classroom unless there is an unusual circumstance, which would preclude them from using the closest bathroom. Students are not permitted to use the bathroom during the two-minute passing time between classes. Any student violating this rule is subject to disciplinary action.

LOCKERS

During the first days of school, homeroom teachers will provide students with a locker. Lockers do not have locks on them, except for those students that occupy lockers in the new building. Outside locks are not permitted, but the school issues locks to students if need be. It is strongly encouraged that students do not store valuables in their lockers. **The Guttenberg School District is not responsible for lost or stolen items. Students are only permitted to go to their locker before homeroom,**

before lunch, and at the conclusion of the school day unless given explicit permission by the classroom teacher. Any student found at their locker outside of the outlined times is subject to disciplinary action.

CAFETERIA PROCEDURES

Students in grades K-5 will be brought in to the cafetorium and picked up at the end of the period.

Students in grades 6-8 will come to lunch on their own. An administrator or security officer will be stationed on the third floor at the start of the lunch period and will follow the students as they make their way to the cafetorium.

If a teacher wants a student for any reason during the lunch period, he/she must provide the student with a pass.

No more than 2 girls and 2 boys will be permitted to use the restroom at one time. If a teacher sees more than 2 girls or 2 boys using the restroom during the lunch periods, those students will be detained and the main office will be informed.

Most of our discipline problems originate in the cafetorium and outside during the lunch periods. Many of these incidents carry over in to the classroom in some way. It is our hope that these changes will help to maintain order, keep the cafetorium clean and reduce the number of negative incidents that occur.

CELL PHONES/ELECTRONICS

It is recommended that all electronics, including cell phones, be left at home. However, if your child does bring these items in, they are required to be stored in their locker. If a student is caught with his/her cell phone out or on their person, it will be taken away, and the parent or guardian will be required to pick up the cell phone during school hours. If a student refuses to relinquish their cell phone to a staff member, the student will be disciplined and the parent will be contacted. **Please** remember that the Anna L. Klein School is not responsible for any cell phones/electronics that are lost or stolen.

LATENESS TO CLASS

Any student reporting late to class must present a pass. A teacher may issue corrective discipline, but repeated lates may be reported to the grade level administrator.

Anna L. Klein Student Dress Code Policy

Shirts

- Allowed:
 - o **Navy-blue**, cotton-blend polo shirts with the Guttenberg School District insignia (available in short or long sleeve styles).
 - o **Gold** T-shirts with the Guttenberg School District insignia for Physical Education classes or any school spirit wear featuring the Anna L. Klein School name.
- Not allowed:
 - o Guttenberg sports/recreational shirts and/or North Bergen sports/recreational shirts.

Pants

- Allowed:
 - o **Blue**, **black**, or **gray jeans**. <u>Must</u> be worn at the natural waistline.
 - o **Khaki** or **black** slacks. Must be worn at the natural waistline.
 - o **Blue**, **black**, or **gray** sweatpants. <u>Must</u> be worn at the natural waistline.

- For physical education, <u>only</u> **blue** sweatpants with the Guttenberg School District insignia are allowed.
- o **Khaki** or **black** skirts can be worn at the natural waistline.
 - Skirts must be 2 inches above the kneecap.
- o **Black** or **white** tights and leggings may be worn <u>underneath</u> skirts in cold weather but not as a substitute for pants.

Not allowed:

- o Ripped, teared, or jeans with holes will not be permitted.
- o Leggings (including flared), jeggings, tights, spandex, yoga pants, or biker shorts will not be permitted.
- o Pants with designs, words, large logos, or images will not be permitted.
- o Skirts above the knee will not be permitted.

Shorts

- Allowed:
 - o **Blue**, **black**, **grey**, or **khaki** shorts. <u>Must</u> be 2 inches above the knee.
 - Blue, black, grey, or khaki athletic shorts, cargo shorts, and/or jean shorts. Must be 2 inches above the kneecap.
 - o Only allowed to be worn in September, May, and June.
- Not allowed:
 - o Ripped, teared, or shorts with holes will not be permitted.
 - o Biker shorts, spandex, yoga, or tight shorts will not be permitted.

Sweatshirts

- *Allowed*:
 - o Only school spirit wear sold by Anna L. Klein school clubs.
 - o Spirit wear <u>must</u> say "Anna L. Klein School" or "Mustangs".
- Not Allowed:
 - o Guttenberg sports/recreational sweatshirts and/or North Bergen sports/recreational sweatshirts. Any other sweatshirts, including those that say "Guttenberg".

Footwear

- Allowed:
 - o Sneakers, dress shoes, closed-toe shoes, boots, and UGG Tasmans.
 - Shoes must be securely fastened.
- Not allowed:
 - o Clogs, Crocs, flip-flops, bedroom slippers, slides, and any shoes without a back.
 - o Shoes with straps on the back.

Dress downs/Holidays

- Allowed:
 - o Students must follow the dress code requirements for that day/week.
 - o If the dress down requirements only address one part of the uniform, students <u>must</u> wear their regular uniform for the other part.
 - (Example: "Wear a pink shirt to celebrate breast cancer awareness." Students should wear a pink shirt and school uniform pants.)

- o If a student chooses not to participate in the dress down, they <u>must</u> follow the regular dress code and wear their school uniform.
- On Halloween, costumes must be appropriate for school and fit properly.
- Not allowed:
 - o Any clothing and/or shoe wear that does not follow the dress down or regular dress code.
 - o On Halloween, real/fake weapons and costume masks are not permitted.

Sizing

- Clothing must be sized to fit the student. Pants should fit appropriately and should not be too tight or too loose.
- Shirts should be appropriate in size and should not extend below the hip.
- Skirts and shorts <u>must</u> be
- Undergarments should not be visible.

Headwear

• Students may not <u>wear or carry</u> hats, hoods, sweatbands, bandanas, scarves, facemasks and/or sunglasses while in the school building unless a school event has been approved by the principal.

Transfers/New students

• All transfer students have **two weeks** from the day of enrollment to purchase and begin wearing school uniforms.

2nd offense	 Grades K-2: Lunch detention Grades 3-8: Administrative detention *The school secretary will notify the parent/guardian, who will be required to bring in the student's uniform. The student will return to class until their parent/guardian arrives. This will also be documented on the uniform violation form.
3rd offense	 Grades K-2; two consecutive days of lunch detention and a morning detention Grades 3-8; two consecutive days of administrative detention and a Saturday detention *The school secretary will notify the parent/guardian, who will be required to bring in the student's uniform. The student will return to class until their parent/guardian arrives. This will also be documented on the uniform violation form.
Note(s):	 Student violations will be recorded in a school-wide Google Sheet, accessible to teachers for tracking dress code infractions and offense levels. The student's violation record will be maintained for your records. The cleaning, care, and replacement of school uniforms are the responsibility of parents and/or guardians.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE

The Board of Education recognizes that a pupil's right of privacy may not be violated by unreasonable search and seizure and directs that no pupil be searched without reason or in an unreasonable manner.

Teaching staff members are charged with the responsibility of maintaining order and discipline in the school and of safeguarding the safety and well-being of the pupils in their care. In the discharge of that responsibility, a teaching staff member may search or request the search of the person or property of a pupil as authorized by this policy, with or without the pupil's consent, whenever he/she has reasonable grounds to suspect that the search is required to discover evidence of a violation of law or of school rules. The extent of the search will be governed by the seriousness of the alleged infraction, the pupil's age, and the pupil's disciplinary history. Except in exigent circumstances, an intrusive search of a pupil's person or intimate personal belongings shall be conducted by a person of the pupil's gender.

The Board acknowledges the need for the in-school storage of pupils' possessions and shall provide storage places, including desks and lockers, for that purpose. This section of the handbook serves as written notification of students that inspections of their lockers, desks, and other storage facilities on school district property may be conducted. The school Principal or designee is directed to conduct, without further notice, the regular inspection of such facilities provided to pupils for the storage of property. Except as required by urgent circumstances, a request for the search of a pupil or a pupil's private possessions will be directed to the Building Principal or designee who shall, whenever feasible, first request the freely offered consent of the pupil to the inspection. The Superintendent shall be notified of the proposed search of a pupil's person or intimate personal belongings. Whenever possible, a search will be conducted by the Principal in the presence of the pupil, the pupil's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) or a representative of the parent(s) or legal guardian(s), and a teaching staff member other than the Principal.

A search prompted by the reasonable belief that the circumstances are urgent and pose an immediate threat, will be conducted by any teaching staff member with as much speed and dispatch as may be required to protect persons and property. The Principal shall be responsible for the prompt recording in writing of each pupil search, including the reasons for the search; information received that established the need for the search and the name of the informant, if any; the persons present when the search was conducted; any substances or objects found; and the disposition made of them. The Principal shall be responsible for the custody, control, and disposition of any illegal or dangerous substance or object taken from a pupil.

HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION & BULLYING (HIB)

PURPOSE

The Board of Education prohibits acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying of a student. A safe and civil environment in school is necessary for students to learn and achieve high academic standards. Harassment, intimidation, or bullying, like other disruptive or violent behaviors, is conduct that disrupts both a student's ability to learn and a school's ability to educate its students in a safe and disciplined environment. Since students learn by example, school administrators, faculty, staff and volunteers should be commended for demonstrating appropriate behavior, treating others with civility and respect, and refusing to tolerate harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

DEFINITION

"Harassment, intimidation, or bullying" means any gesture, any written, verbal or physical act, or any electronic communication, as defined in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-14, whether it be a single incident or a series of incidents that:

- 1. Is reasonably perceived as being motivated by either any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or a mental, physical or sensory disability, or by any other distinguishing characteristic;
- 2. Takes place on school property, at any school-sponsored function, on a school bus, or off school grounds, as provided for in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-15.3;
- 3. Substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students; and that

- a. A reasonable person should know, under the circumstances, that the act(s) will have the effect of physically or emotionally harming a student or damaging the student's property, or placing a student in reasonable fear of physical or emotional harm to his/her person or damage to his/her property; or
- b. Has the effect of insulting or demeaning any student or group of students; or
- c. Creates a hostile educational environment for the student by interfering with a student's education or by severely or pervasively causing physical or emotional harm to the student.

Schools are required to address harassment, intimidation, and bullying occurring off school grounds, when there is a nexus between the harassment, intimidation, and bullying and the school (e.g., the harassment, intimidation, or bullying substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students).

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Sexual harassment includes verbal, nonverbal, or physical contact of a sexual nature with the purpose or effect of intimidation and/or creation of a hostile or offensive educational environment. This includes any unwelcome advances, suggestions, or requests of a sexual nature.

REPORTING PROCEDURES & EXPECTATIONS FOR ADDRESSING HIB

Students who experience, witness, or learn of a HIB incident are responsible for reporting it promptly to a staff member. Concerns can be reported to an administrator, the anti-bullying specialists (Ms. Berinstain, grades K-2; or Mr. Borghi, grades 3-5; or Ms. Sinning, grades 6-8), a counselor, school nurse or any other available staff member. Staff members will then communicate the report to the administration. Parents are also encouraged to inform staff of HIB-related concerns as soon as possible. Individuals have a responsibility to prevent HIB when possible.

HIB CONSEQUENCES AND REMEDIAL ACTION

Students involved in HIB will be referred to administration for appropriate consequences based on the behavior that caused the HIB and/or remedial action. Potential results of HIB may include but are not limited to, parent meetings, counselor check-ins, corrective instruction, mediation, behavior management plans, schedule changes, removal from class etc. When possible, HIB offenders will also be responsible for restitution.

TUTORIAL/PROGRAMS & SERVICES

The purpose of tutorial is to provide students with extra help if they are struggling n their studies. Each teacher is required to hold one tutorial session once a week. The timing of the tutorial is at the discretion of the teacher and may be held either before school or after school. It is strongly recommended that students attend tutorial.

In addition to tutorial, there are many other programs available to further enrich or help students. These programs are as follows:

AIM High-After school program that promotes reinforcement of LAL skills.

TESOL-After school program that assists our ELL students.

On Course-Tutoring program at student lunchtime is designed to offer help for students struggling in specific content areas.

PROMOTION/RETENTION POLICY

The Anna L. Klein School's promotion/retention policy for grades K-8 is outlined on the following pages. As with any district policy, a teacher should consult the principal if a question concerning such should arise.

GUIDELINES FOR PROMOTION / RETENTION

KINDERGARTEN

In order for a child to be promoted into the first grade multiple measures will be used. The child must be able to:

- Print full name (print first and last name)
- Recognize, print and recite the alphabet in and out of sequence (lower/upper case/letters)
- Properly form upper and lowercase letters
- Distinguish all beginning and ending sounds
- Recognize grade level site words
- Read independently at grade level D/E
- Count to 100 by ones and tens
- Count forward beginning from given number
- Write numbers from 0 to 20 correctly
- Represent a number with a written numeral ranging from 0-20
- Demonstrate fluency for addition and subtraction within 5
- Describes measurable attributes of objects (length, height)
- Classify and sort objects into categories
- Uses geometric terms to identify shapes
- Describe relative positions of objects as "above, below, inside, etc."
- Compare numbers (greater than, less than, or equal to)
- Listen to others and take turns speaking
- Make relevant contribution to conversations
- Speak and express thoughts, feelings, and ideas clearly

If a child is unable to complete all of these guidelines, it is an indication of a possible retention.

If the Bilingual / ESL child is unable to complete four or more of these guidelines in English or in his/her native language, there is a possibility that he/she may be retained. Aside from these guidelines, all standardized test scores, teacher recommendations, and classroom performance will be taken into consideration.

Children enrolling from non-public schools or day cares must follow these guidelines:

- 1) Interview child and parent
- 2) Must take district assessment test
- 3) Must submit records / reports / information from previous school.

After reviewing the results of the above criteria, a determination to place the child in K / Grade 1 will be made by the screening committee including the guidance counselor with a final review by administration.

Grade 1 and 2

- 1. A failure to attain a passing final average of 70% in reading, language arts **or** math will result in either summer school or retention.
- 2. Failure in any other of the two major subject areas science and social studies a tutor will be recommended.
- 3. All retentions will also have to attend summer school. Borderline students who received RTI services are strongly urged to attend the summer school enrichment program.
- 4. Attendance at a summer enrichment program will be mandatory for students receiving a borderline (70 75) in any major subject.

Due to the fact that each student is an individual, careful consideration will be taken. Academic performance, effort and the ability to succeed in grade three will be decided by the classroom teacher with the guided suggestion of the student's ESL teacher if necessary.

1. Failure to attain a final average of 70% in any major subject (Reading, Math, Language Arts) will result in summer school or retention. (Attendance at a summer school is **mandatory**)

- 2. Failure to attain a final average of 70% in two minor subjects will result in retention.
- 3. Attendance at a summer enrichment program will be mandatory for students receiving a Borderline (70 75) in any major subject.
- 4. Promotion of transitional Bi-Lingual students and ESL students will depend on a joint agreement between the Supervisor of BL/ESL and classroom teachers as each student will be considered on an individual basis due to different abilities and constraints.

GRADES 4 - 6

I. Academic Requirements

Pupils in Grades 4 - 6 are to work diligently toward the goal of promotion. However, in the event that subjects are failed, the following procedure will be enforced.

- A. Any student failing any academic subject will be required to go to summer school.
- B. Any student failing three or more academic subjects will be retained and will also attend summer school.
- **C.** Any student failing <u>any special subject</u> will be required to complete the project assignments (according to guidelines) during the summer. These assignments will be due in the school office no later than July 31st.
- D. <u>Failure to make-up any academic or special subjects will result in retention.</u>

- B. School detentions, suspension, expulsion;
- C. Collaborative evaluation by the staff.

The final decisions shall be made by the Chief School Administrator.

Students and parents/guardians shall be given advance notification of these criteria to help ensure a successful school year.

GUIDELINES FOR JUNIOR HIGH AND GRADUATION

I. Academic Requirements

Pupils in Junior High are to work diligently toward the goal of graduation. However, in the event that subjects are failed, the following procedure will be enforced:

- A. Any student failing any academic subject or any special subject will not be permitted to participate in commencement exercises.
- B. Any student failing any academic subject will be required to go to summer school.
- C. Any student failing three or more academic subjects will be retained and will attend summer school.
- D. Any student failing any special subject will be required to complete project assignments (according to guidelines) at the conclusion of the trimester in which the student failed or during the summer. These assignments will be due no later than July 31st in the school office.
- E. Failure to make-up any academic or special subjects will result in retention.

- B. School Detentions; Suspension; Expulsion;
- C. Collaborative evaluation by the staff.

The final decision shall be made by the Chief School Administrator.

Students and parents/guardians shall be given advance notification of these criteria to help ensure a successful school year.

Early Release of Students Procedure

The early release of students during the school day is an important safety issue. Therefore, the following procedures must be followed:

- A release of students' form must be completed and signed by a parent/guardian
- This form will include the name, address, phone number, etc. of the parent/guardian, immediate family member or emergency person that the child may be released to
- An early release form will be signed by the responsible person and a form of identification will be Photostatted and attached to this form
- A note from the parent / guardian sent to teacher one day prior to early dismissal.

The main office will maintain these forms.

<u>Dismissal Procedures</u> 2024-2025

An orderly and safe dismissal procedure is an important part of a student's routine. The Anna L. Klein School dismissal for grades kindergarten through 3rd grade is at 3:09 pm and for grades 4th through 8th dismissal is at 3:14 pm.

- A dismissal form must be completed and signed by a parent/guardian in grades pre-kindergarten to grade three
- Students in pre-k to grade three will only be dismissed to the indicated family member/emergency pick-up person
- The teacher in charge will dismiss students in grades four thru eighth at the assigned exit

Below please find designated dismissal areas for all grade levels:

- Pre-Kindergarten Faculty Parking Lot
- Kindergarten front courtyard on 69th Street
- Grades 1 and 2 ramp and faculty parking lot next to the playground
- Grade 3 on 69th Street sidewalk nearest to the corner of Hudson Avenue
- Grade 4 Hudson Avenue original gym door
- Grades 5-8 New Building Front Entrance (Hudson Avenue)
