Hello Tigers and Owls!

Happy fall! The first month of school has flown by! We have been working hard to build community, develop routines, teach and reteach expected behaviors, and grow students' academics. It has been my pleasure to watch your students grow, and I can't wait to continue to do so throughout the rest of this year.

As our school year begins, the staff really works hard to get to know your child/ren. Our teachers are constantly taking the pulse of their class to determine how their students are responding to lessons. Our teachers are skilled at using informal assessments (often observations of and/or discussions with your student) to decide if reteaching and/or enrichment needs to occur. Our teachers group students based on what they see in order to provide them instruction at their skill level.

Another way teachers learn more about your students is through formal assessment data; we are in the midst of the iReady testing window. This diagnostic pinpoints your student's skill level and will set an individualized learning path for him/her based on his/her current skills. We will share this data with you at conferences.

The other very important part of us getting to know your child/ren is your participation in parent teacher conferences. We believe education is a partnership, and we need your support to ensure we do the best we can each day. I ask that you please make parent teacher conferences in October a priority. Your child's teacher will be notifying you soon of your student's conference date and time.

You should have also received a "Got It/Grow It" communication tool attached to a completed piece of your child's work that gives you a quick snapshot of things your student is already doing well on and skills they are continuing to practice.

If you have questions, concerns, or celebrations please do not hesitate to reach out. I want to be your partner in education.

BULLYING

The Appleton Area School District and our staff are committed to providing a safe, secure, and healthy environment that allows all students to maximize their learning potential. Education, intervention, awareness, and prevention exists for staff and students to ensure a learning environment that is free of bullying or intimidation.

The Board of Education and AASD staff consider bullying to be detrimental to the health and safety of students and disruptive to the educational process.

What is bullying?

Bullying is deliberate or intentional behavior using words or actions, intended to cause fear, intimidation or harm. Bullying includes aggressive and hostile behavior that is intentional and involves an imbalance of power between the bully and the bullied and is behavior that is repeated over time rather than an isolated incident.

This behavior may include but is not limited to physical and verbal assaults, nonverbal or emotional threats or intimidation, harassment, social exclusion and isolation, extortion, use of computer or telecommunications to send messages that are embarrassing, slanderous, threatening or intimidating (cyber-bullying).

Bullying may also include teasing, put-downs, name calling, rumors, false accusations, and hazing. Bullying based on sex, race, color, religion, age, national origin, ancestry, creed, pregnancy, marital or parental status, sexual orientation, or physical, cognitive, emotional or learning disability in its education programs or activities is also prohibited by law and <u>Board policy</u>.

In addition, the District prohibits bullying or discrimination on the basis of gender identity and gender expression. Bullying behavior is prohibited in all schools, buildings, properties, educational environments as well as on any school grounds or school buses. This includes any property or vehicle owned, leased, contracted, or used by the AASD such as public transportation regularly used by students to go to and from school and to school-sponsored events.

Students who engage in any form of bullying behavior at school or at a school-sponsored activity, will be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with Board policy. This action may include off campus behavior that causes substantial disruption to the educational environment. Consequences and sanctions for such actions, including retaliating against someone for reporting bullying behavior, may include but are not limited to, parent notification, suspension, expulsion, or referral to law enforcement officials for possible legal action. Student services staff will support the identified victim. The <u>Positive Behavior Interventions and Strategies</u> framework will be utilized to assist and support all students.

What are students learning about bullying and prevention?

The elementary and middle level curriculum provides students guidelines for school wide expectations and social responsibility outside the classroom. Students are taught the Stop/Walk/ Talk response to disrespectful behavior and practice the skills through role play. Stop/Walk/and Talk is a three step response students use to eliminate disrespectful behavior themselves and seek help from an adult if necessary.

Students are also taught how to appropriately respond when they are a bystander or the aggressor and practice these skills in groups. The groups address the issues involved with gossiping, inappropriate remarks,

and cyberbullying in each of the roles. The middle school curriculum also provides guidelines for school wide expectations and social responsibility outside the classroom but places more emphasis on addressing cyber-bullying.

Bully & Incident Reporting

If you think there's a threat to you, a friend, your school, or the community, don't wait. SPEAK UP, SPEAK OUT with an anonymous tip that can bring much-needed help.

The SPEAK UP, SPEAK OUT School Resource Center isn't just for students. Parents and community members can submit a confidential tip when they notice unsafe or risky behaviors that might be putting their child, other children, or the community in danger.

Students, parents, school staff, or any community members can submit a school safety concern or threat via a website, mobile phone application, or toll-free number. We recommend typing in "AASD" into the search field to see all AASD schools.

- You may also make a report using your smartphone by downloading the SPEAK UP, SPEAK OUT app from the <u>Apple Store</u> and <u>Google Play</u>
- or by calling 1-800-MY-SUSO-1 to speak to a resource center analyst.

This system can be used to identify not just threats to schools, but also other daily safety concerns students encounter, such as bullying, drug use, self-harm, suicidal thoughts, and more. How do you know if someone might need help? Most SUSO tips fall into one of three categories - click on a category below to learn more.

Resource center staff work around-the-clock to respond to tips and to deploy a response locally by communicating directly with school administrators, law enforcement, and counselors. Learn more here.

Are staff trained?

Staff have participated in Bullying Prevention training. This training focuses on pre-correction of inappropriate behavior, rewarding the use of the three step response, and responding to reports of disrespectful behavior. It is well known that schools are successful when they help children grow academically, socially, and emotionally. For this to happen, it is imperative that we have a safe environment that is supportive and conducive to growth. By setting forth clear social and behavioral expectations, it is our goal to create an atmosphere for learning.

What can parents do?


To be most effective, bullying prevention efforts are the shared responsibility of parents, staff, and community. Parental pride and involvement in the school sets a positive example for children. As adults, we can:

- Teach self-respect.
- Discuss the seriousness and negative effects of bullying behaviors.
- Work together with your child's school to develop a consistent approach to bullying behaviors.
- Set a good example. Children learn more by actions than from words.







Pedestrian Safety Tips for Parents and Children

Whether trick-or-treating or any time out for a walk, here are some tips to keep in mind:

- Accompany Young Children: Always accompany young children as they do not have the skills needed to walk alone until age 10.
- Plan for Older Children: If older children are walking alone, plan and review their route beforehand. Set a specific return time and equip them with flashlights in low light conditions.
- Avoid Distractions: Remind kids about the risks of distracted walking, including texting, using cell phones, or listening to music while crossing streets.
- Use Crosswalks and Stay Visible: Cross streets as a group at the crosswalks and intersections. Avoid crossing between parked cars or in the middle of the block.
- Be Visible to Drivers: Encourage children to stay on well-lit streets and always use sidewalks.

By following these simple tips, we can ensure a safe and enjoyable Halloween for everyone in our community.





HEALTH GUIDANCE FOR GOING TO SCHOOL

Showing up to school every day is critical for children's well-being, engagement and learning.

MAKE SURE TO SEND CHILDREN TO SCHOOL IF THEY ARE:

- Generally healthy and well
- Participating in usual day-to-day activities

CHILDREN CAN EVEN GO TO SCHOOL IF THEY:

- Have a mild cold, which may include a runny nose and/or cough
- Have eye drainage without fever, eye pain, or eyelid redness
- Have a mild stomachache
- Have lice nits. If live lice are found, the guardian will be instructed to remove live lice after the end of the school day.
 - Though they are annoying and should be treated, lice are not a reason to exclude a child from school. (This is consistent with the guidance provided by DPI, AAP, CDC, and DHS.)
- Haven't had a fever for 24 hours and have not taken fever-reducing medicine during that time.

Avoid keeping children at home unless they are too sick to participate. Please see the back of this handout for details. *Note: In most situations, a healthcare provider's note is not needed to return.*



Children may also avoid school due to anxiety. Symptoms may include:

- decreased appetite
- feeling tired
- stomachache
- headache etc.

If you are worried that your child may be suffering from anxiety, talk with your student's Classroom Teacher, the School Nurse, Social Worker, or other School Staff to discuss the challenge and identify what can help your child stay in school.



REASONS TO KEEP STUDENTS HOME FROM SCHOOL AND WHAT NEEDS TO HAPPEN BEFORE THEY CAN RETURN

SYMPTOM	WHEN SHOULD YOUR STUDENT STAY HOME?	WHEN CAN YOUR STUDENT RETURN TO SCHOOL?
Fever	They have a fever of 100.0°F (38°C) or higher.	If they are fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication and are feeling better.
Vomiting and/or diarrhea	If they have vomited or have had diarrhea in the last 24 hours. If their stool is watery, they may not make it to the toilet in time.	Once a normal diet is tolerated for 24 hours and they are feeling better.
Cough	If they have a persistent cough with difficulty breathing or with a fever.	Once they are feeling better and any remaining cough is not distracting to themselves or others.
Rash	If a rash has blisters, is draining, is painful, and spreading and or accompanied by a fever it needs to be examined by a health care provider.	Once the rash has no new bumps, has dried, or they have been cleared for return by your health- care provider.
Sore throat	If they have painful swallowing when drinking or eating along with other symptoms such as a fever or rash.	Once they are feeling better. If they were prescribed an antibiotic by your health-care provider, then they can return 24 hours after the first dose, if they are without fever and feeling better.

If you don't know whether to send your child to school or have specific concerns regarding your child's health, contact your child's Healthcare Provider, local urgent care, or the School Nurse.

If your child has a compromised immune system or is at high risk for complications from common illnesses, please talk to your School Nurse about developing a plan with you and your child's Healthcare Provider to keep your child healthy and safe while attending school.
