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SJR Lacrosse Runs in Tunnel to Towers

On Sunday, September 26th, the St. Joe's lacrosse team participated in the Tunnel to Towers run in New York City. The run was an event to remember those who passed on September 11th, especially the numerous first responders. The race simulated the heroic path one of the firemen took to rescue people, and it raised money for the Tunnel to Tower Foundation.

This run is dedicated to Stephen Gerard Siller, who was the youngest sibling of seven in his family. Early in his life, both his parents passed away, and he was consequently raised by his brothers. Stephen experienced some hardships as a kid, but with loving siblings, he was able to persevere and eventually become a fireman.

On September 11th, Siller had finished his shift at his Brooklyn firehouse. He planned to play golf with his brothers, until he received a call about a plane hitting the North Tower.

He proceeded to enter the city but was stopped at the Brooklyn Battery Tunnel because of security issues. He was determined to help, so he carried his 60 pounds of equipment and ran through the tunnel into Manhattan. After he got through the tunnel, he arrived at the Twin Towers, where he sacrificed his life to save others.

The St. Joe's lacrosse team decided to participate in this event due to this story, and to grow closer as a team. Head Coach Dan DaPonte said, "I think the Tunnel to Towers event will serve as a memorable day for our student athletes. As a teacher, I realize that today's high school students were not alive on September 11th, 2001. As much as they may hear about and learn about 9/11 in school and at home, the coaching staff thought it would be more memorable if they participated in something that would leave a lasting impact on them. I could not be more proud of the boys and families that participated with us. This will definitely be an annual event for SJR."

Coach DaPonte pointed out that the current St. Joe's generation didn't experience these events. We can't imagine or think about it the same way, but going on the run and hearing about the story gave us a better understanding of the horrors that happened that day.

When the team emerged from the tunnel upon reaching Manhattan, there were FDNY and NYPD personnel lining the course. They wore banners with the images and names of the fallen first responders.

This opened the team's eyes to the number of people who lost their lives trying to save others twenty years ago. Seeing firemen running the same event as the team in their full equipment was powerful. Many members of the team and their families visited the 9/11 Memorial after completing the course.

One of our senior captains, Nico Kross, added, "it was a great time with the team, and it was for a great cause. It was a perfect way to get our team to be as one and to honor those who have fallen. Overall, it was a great experience."

The Tunnel to Towers run was more than just a 5-kilometer charity run. It was about bringing thousands of people together to honor the brave people of 9/11. The Tunnel to Towers run was a moving experience, and the funds that were raised supported heroes and their families. The event brought the St. Joe's lacrosse team together and taught them an important part of our country's history that is hard for our generation to fully grasp.

The Zodiac Killer: one of America's most notorious serial killers. The man behind this alias has had this notoriety for over fifty years. The Zodiac Killer was a man who committed multiple murders in the late 1960s and was famous for his complex ciphers that he would send to law enforcement agencies and newspaper offices. To this day, there are still Zodiac ciphers that have yet to be cracked, so there is still information to be acquired.

The Zodiac Killer sent out four ciphers in the late 1960s to early 1970s. At this point in time, all ciphers claimed to be solved, but only two have been recognized as solved by government entities like the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

The first Zodiac cipher was solved on August 7th, 1969, about a week after the Zodiac Killer sent it out to the press. It was dubbed Z 408, because it was a Zodiac cipher that contained 408 characters, or simple letters. One begs the question then, "if it were just simple letters, why are other ciphers yet to be solved?" The answer is that the Zodiac created his own alphabet in tandem with his ciphers. The first one was deciphered by a high school teacher and his wife. One portion of the cipher read:

"I like killing people because it is so much fun it is more fun than killing wild game in the forest."

The second Zodiac cipher was called Z 340 and was sent on November 8th, 1969. This was the second and last cipher to be officially cracked, according to the FBI. It was cracked in December of 2020, but not by anyone professional or a part of the government. It was solved by David Oranchak, a software developer, Sam Blake, an applied mathematician, and Jarl Van Eycke, a warehouse operator and computer programmer. An excerpt from this cipher states:

"I hope you are having lots of fun in trying to catch me... I am not afraid (of death) because I know that my new life will be an easy one in paradise."

The third Zodiac cipher, Z 13, was sent on April 20th, 1970. It is the shortest one, being only 13 characters, but can be argued to be the most important. It read, "My name is --," and is followed by 13 characters of the Zodiac's language. It's the simplest of the four, and would be the key to identifying who the Zodiac Killer is.

The fourth Zodiac cipher, Z 32, was sent on June 26th, 1970. Before the 32 characters, the Z32 letter read, "The map coupled with this code will tell you where the bomb is set. You have until next fall to dig it up."

The bomb in reference here refers to a detail in the Z 32 letter, where the Zodiac threatened to blow up a full school bus. French engineer Fayçal Ziraoui believes that he has solved both the Z 13 and Z 32 ciphers. For the Z 32, Ziraoui believes it reads, "LABOR DAY FIND 45.069 NORT 58.719 WEST." These coordinates target a school in South Lake Tahoe, California.

For Z 13, Ziraoui believes that it is a group of jumbled letters, and he was able to handpick "K A Y R" from the group. He believes it references Lawrence "Kane" Kaye, who was a primary person of interest by police, and was singled out as the man who kidnapped Kathleen Johns and her daughter, both of whom are suspected to be victims of the Zodiac.

Now, in October of 2021, a group called The Case Breakers, which is a group of 40+ former law enforcement investigators, military intelligence officers, and journalists that investigate cold cases, believe they have identified the Zodiac. They believe it is Gary Francis Poste, a man who died three years ago in 2018. Due to new forensic evidence and photos from Poste's home, they believe Poste is the man that committed the murders and sent the letters.

Despite this, the FBI has not confirmed the validity of either Ziraoui's or the Case Breakers' works. So, as of this moment, we have potential answers, but no clarity.

So, is the Zodiac Killer truly identified? That is uncertain. His identity may never be confirmed by the government, and this is a reality that people should come to terms with.

There's a little bit of Gawain in all of us. That's my principle takeaway from *The Green Knight*, David Lowery's new adaptation of one of the best-known Arthurian works: the 14th century chivalric romance, *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight*. Those who know next to nothing about the original text or any such legends and are looking for a straight action film might be left a bit disappointed. Other than a brief scene towards the end of the film (that isn't even based in reality), there are no *Game of Thrones*-esque battle sequences, the pacing is sluggish, and there is a rather dense, ambiguous nature to the whole thing, with no shortage of symbolism and entire scenes that can be left up to interpretation.

However, those who are avid fans of Arthurian legends and are somewhat familiar with the original poem should rejoice. *The Green Knight* is one of, if not the best adaptations of an Arthurian legend that remains faithful to its source material, all while adding a new dose of originality and flavor to a timeless legend. Why is it timeless, you might ask? It's timeless because, going back to where I began, we all have a bit of Gawain in us.

As ambiguous as *The Green Knight* may be, one aspect that could not have been made any clearer is the communication of its main theme, which is honor and the ways we can achieve it. You can have all the debates you want about what several characters' motivations and purpose to the film are, but it doesn't really matter in the long run.

What, in my mind, makes the movie so satisfying is the masterful expression of the theme of honor. Gawain's whole journey of self-discovery, revolving around how difficult it is to achieve greatness as a knight, is the means by which Lowery explores the timeless themes of honor, chivalry and the accepted code of knighthood.

The film and Gawain's journey is akin to a classic and quite brilliant coming of age story, one of moral and spiritual development. As Gawain learns about how to be a great knight, so do we. It is at this point where we begin to see the ingenuity in the title. *The Green Knight*, of course, refers to the enigmatic giant who is the catalyst for Gawain's journey.

However, on a deeper level, it could refer to the main character's naivety regarding the realities of both knighthood and being a king. Thus, he is a "green" knight, someone who is lacking training, sophistication and worldly experience. When the title for a film is clear in its meaning and relates back to the themes featured in the work, such is the case here, you know you're in good hands.

Dev Patel as Gawain handles the evolution of his character

with just the right amount of subtlety. The transition of his character from an ignorant coward to an honorable man is not jarring or glaring, but rather a gradual transformation. As the film progresses, he realizes just how much he really wants to be faithful to the code of knighthood and succeed in being worthy of honor. It is this view of honor that Gawain ultimately grasps that brings a sense of universality to the tale.

Everyone wants to be worthy of honor, not just a knight. While we may all have that desire, most importantly, we all have to learn at one time or another that one cannot cheat one's way to gaining honor, akin to when Gawain wears the magic sash. Sometimes, doing the truly honorable thing isn't easy. The journey to that realization in this wonderful film is a thrilling adventure, with an emphasis on masterful execution, inspiring cinematography, excellent acting, and thematically sound material that has and will continue to endure throughout the ages. No matter what, legends never die.

The morning of June 6th, 2021, will be a day that the Green Knight family will always remember. The previous evening, after the Class of 2021 graduation ceremony, somebody set fire to the stage on the Coach Tony Karcich Field. A day that should have been a celebration for the Class of 2021 turned into a sad and confused weekend.

Nobody believed that someone would do this; as a school community, we hoped it was some kind of accident. However, he Bergen County Arson Unit investigated the scene and concluded that the damage was indeed caused by arson.

We took a hit, but in typical Saint Joe's fashion, we got right back up and realized that it was time to rebuild and come together even more as a community.

Our athletic department and administration considered any possible next steps. Should we patch up the burnt section? Should we replace the entire field? Since this field had its ninth football season of use coming up, and the field was set to be replaced every 10 years, the decision was made to replace the entire field.

It was a challenge to completely renovate the entire field by August 28th, which was when the Green Knights football team was set to take on Good Counsel of Maryland. After planning and coordinating with the turf company, everyone realized that the timing was going to be tight, but it would hopefully be done on time. team's home opener.

The new Assistant Athletic Director, Ms. Sharon Kozuch, played a key role in expediting the process. The turf began to be laid down in late August, and the field was completed and ready for the football team's opening game against Depaul Catholic on September 11th. Father Vincent D'Agostino blessed the new field before this game began. Tony Karcich and his family were also invited to attend this game with a few friends and alumni.

Now the planning had to begin. The SJR development office, led by Tony Karcich (for whom the field is named), began to raise funds for the new field. Insurance helped the funding process, but there was still work left to be done. A construction team was assembled, and the design of the new Coach Tony Karcich field was proposed.

The key changes that were made from the old field included the yellow end zones, a new logo of a shield with the Vir Fidelis on it, and the location of the SJR name on the field.

On the twentieth anniversary of September 11th, the Green Knights took the field against the DePaul Catholic Spartans. The boys in green ran onto the field ready to deliver a show to fans, most of whom haven't been to the games since 2019. This game was their first home game at Tony Karcich Field after a fire burned parts of it in early June. A 9/11 pregame ceremony was held to honor those who lost their lives that day. Unfortunately, St. Joe's was unable to secure the victory and lost 17-0 to DePaul Catholic.

The theme for the game was 9/11, as shirts saying "Never Forget" were sold to students. The funds raised from the sale went to the McCarthy '86 Memorial Scholarship, which was meant to financially assist incoming freshmen. The scholarship was named after Rob McCarthy '86, a SJR alumni who was killed at the World Trade Center on 9/11. McCarthy left behind a wife and a son at the time, who were present on hand for the football game's coin toss. On display, outside the merchandise shack, was a flag gifted by one of McCarthy's classmates, United States Air Force Pilot Patrick Ober '86.

A pregame ceremony was held at 12:45 to honor the nearly three thousand victims of 9/11. On the field was a pipe/ drum combo by the DEA's Brendan Hogan and Bergenfield Fire's Kevin Schade. A color guard consisting of Hillsdale's BSA Troop 109 Jack Laux '24, Aidan Huvane '25, and Eagle Scout Fintan Henry '23 was also on the field during the pipe/drum combo. The Montvale Fire Department had a truck parked at the field in support of the school, courtesy of Michael Cintineo '06 and Daniel Demarest '07.

Kickoff was at 1:00 PM. The Spartans received the ball first. Not much action went on for most of the first quarter, until DePaul running back Tyler Brown rushed for a 14-yard touchdown. After a successful PAT (point after touchdown) by Brown, the Spartans led 7-0 at the end of the first quarter. Nobody scored during the second quarter, leaving De-Paul Catholic with a 7-0 lead at the end of the first half. In the third quarter, Brown kicked a 17-yard field goal, giving the Spartans a 10-0 lead. During the fourth quarter, DePaul quarterback AJ Rodriguez passed the ball to wide receiver Marshawn Ferguson for a 2-yard receiving touchdown. After another successful PAT by Brown, the Spartans secured a victory and shut out the Green Knights 17-0.

SJR quarterback Luke Henrich '23 recorded 45 passing yards on 8 completions and 21 attempts, along with -3 rushing yards on 9 attempts. Wide receiver Kenyon Massey '24 recorded 5 rushing yards on 2 attempts. Running back Yasin Willis '24 recorded 16 rushing yards on 5 attempts. Running back Luke Tucci '23 recorded 2 yards on 3 receptions and 0 receiving yards on 3 receptions. Wide receiver Jayden Wimberly '22 recorded 34 receiving yards on 4 receptions. Outer linebacker and strong safety Jack Smiechowski '22 recorded 1 interception.

In total, SJR recorded 45 passing yards and 8 completions on 21 attempts, 20 rushing yards on 19 attempts, 58 receiving yards on 8 receptions, and 1 interception.

After the game, defensive player Jimmy Mullen '23 was interviewed:

Q: How did you think the game went from your stance?

A: Offense played well. Defense played well. We both played our hearts out, we did what we had to. Stuff happens, and that's the end of the game, so we gotta pick up and worry about next week.

Q: The defense was great for most of the game, but had a couple of mishaps. What do you think you guys can do, as well as the offense, to learn from this week and use for the next game?

A: Everyone should just do what they have to do, execute, and we'll be fine. We just gotta run the ball hard, pass the ball, play pass and run, and we'll be fine.

The Green Knights took the field on September 25th to play the Pope John Lions at Pope John XXIII High School in Sparta, New Jersey. After losing 17-0 two weeks ago to the DePaul Catholic Spartans, SJR defeated the now 1-4 Pope John 31-5, improving to a 2-2 record.

Kickoff was at 1:00 PM. To begin the scoring, quarterback Luke Henrich '23 threw the ball to outside linebacker and strong safety Jack Smiechowski '22 for a three-yard receiving touchdown. After a successful PAT attempt by kicker Marcos Ruiz '23, SJR led 7-0 to end the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Ruiz kicked a twenty-eight-yard field goal, giving the Green Knights a 10-0 lead. Later in this quarter, running back Luke Tucci '23 ran for a twenty-eightyard rushing touchdown. After another PAT made by Ruiz, St. Joe's led 17-0. Unfortunately, the chance of a shutout was gone when Lions kicker Jack Morgese kicked a twenty-fouryard field goal, leaving the score at 17-3 by the end of the first half.

During the third quarter, Tucci ran for another twentyeight-yard rushing touchdown. After Ruiz made another PAT, SJR led 24-3. Later in the third quarter, Henrich threw the ball to wide receiver Donovan McKoy '23 for a twentyfive-yard receiving touchdown. With another PAT by Ruiz, the Green Knights led 31-3 at the end of the third quarter. In the fourth quarter, a punt was blocked in the end zone and recovered by Pope John for a safety, ending the game with a 31-5 win for St. Joe's.

Henrich had 63 passing yards, 2 touchdowns, and 7 com-

pletions on 10 attempts, along with 25 rushing yards on 4 carries. Quarterback Joseph Stern '22 had 12 passing yards and 1 completion on 2 attempts. Quarterback Ryan Cunningham '24 had 0 passing yards and 0 completions on 1 attempt, along with 4 rushing yards on 1 carry.
