Collaborations throughout the state have further extended the impact of the Governor's School as we fully engage our mission with the students and teachers of South Carolina. In the Office of Outreach, our multi-district Spark program effectively grew a summer artist-in-residency experience into a year-round arts-integrated program using drama techniques as a catalyst for literacy. Statistically significant results have determined the outcomes to be cutting-edge not only for arts education, but for reading at the elementary level, and this revolutionary effort has the potential for being one of the most significant learning initiatives in ensuring substantial academic progress in the history of our state's public education system.

If you haven't already done so, I encourage you to make a special effort to stay connected with us for the next several months, as our 25th Anniversary is just around the corner. A full calendar of performances and events will comprise our year-long celebration featuring many special guests and partners who have been instrumental in the success of the Governor's School over the years. 


Testing season arrived in April, so we gave our Govies a special study break with the help of **Paws 2 Care Therapy Dogs**!

Kristen's notable publications and presentations include: Correlating Perceptual and Spectral Aspects of Chiaroscuro in Singing; In-Person or Virtual: Assessing the Impact of COVID-19 on the Teaching Habits of Voice Pedagogues; That's What He Said: Gender Bias in the Fundamental Models of Sound Perception; and in 2017, she presented a TEDx Talk titled, Talking about Talking: The Science of the Voice. Kristen has a particular research interest in the intersectionality of gender studies and voice science, and through her work, she hopes to foster a more equitable, transparent, and diverse world of singing. With a passion for contemporary repertoire, her notable solo performances include the role of Estelle in Musto's opera Later the Same Evening, and the contralto solos in the world premiere of LaRosa's oratorio Joshua. Kristen's affinity for musical collaboration has led her to performances in venues such as Carnegie Hall, Washington National Cathedral, and Duke Chapel, and she is particularly honored to be a founding member of the service-oriented vocal ensemble Servire.

She holds a Master of Music degree in vocal pedagogy from the New England Conservatory of Music and a Bachelor of Music degree in vocal performance and German studies from Furman University. She is an active member of the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS), Pan American Vocology Association (PAVA), and Voice Foundation, and serves on the NATS Boston Board as Vice President where she continues to advocate for inclusion, diversity, equity, and accessibility in the field of singing. Through her work with Servire, community organizations, and her own research and teaching, she aims to facilitate constructive dialogue and work alongside her community to foster social change.



Vicki Nooe (*Music*, '04) is a music director and collaborative pianist in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and currently Lecturer at University of Texas Arlington. She is a proud alumna of the South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts and

Humanities, Southern Methodist University, and Boston University. She has worked with Dallas Theater Center,

Theatre Arlington, WaterTower Theatre, Lyric Stage, and other local theatres. She teaches courses in musical theatre musicianship and musical theatre history at UTA. Vicky is passionate about equipping theatre artists with the practical music skills needed to succeed as musical theatre artists. She has previously taught in music departments at Dallas Baptist University and Southern Methodist University and worked as a vocal coach at Boston University's Tanglewood Institute. I do not believe I would have ever taken a path in life that led to opening my own business, Polkadot Entertainment, without what I learned at Governor's School.

Governor's School instilled in me a desire for excellence and lit the fires of curiosity within me. I thank Governor's School for making me into a life-long learner with an understanding that there will always be more that is unknown than known. This nurtured in me a desire to understand rather than judge which has been immeasurably valuable in relationships of all kinds. It helped me form a motto I try to live my life by, which is, "Move with Love toward Understanding".

As a student, our time at the Governor's School is brief, yet profound. Each experience is so specific to each student. The faculty and staff are really the spine. I am forever grateful for the faculty and staff, our educators and caretakers, that go above and beyond each day to nurture the student as an entire being; not just their talents and skills but their hearts and minds - their being.

DEAR GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL ALUMNI COMMUNITY,

My name is Kevin Human, the new Film Instructor here at SCGSAH. This is a role that I take on with extreme gratitude and respect. Because I know how high the bar is - it was set by you! And I thank you for that; it's part of my motivation to ensure I'm doing everything I can to make the new Film program worthy.

Growing up, I always knew I was a filmmaker (or more precisely, a sequentially linear visual storyteller), but being from the small town of Pelzer, SC, I had no idea how to make that into a life, and I didn't have the resources to guide me. I figured it out, but it took a long time. A very... Long... Time. Today, I am an active screenwriter and producer, with a feature out now and two projects filming this year, along with a script under option that is being packaged. I take great honor in the opportunity to build a program that will provide young filmmakers of our home state with opportunities and resources that I wish I'd had.

The Film program will focus on narrative filmmaking. The curriculum will start with a foundational understanding of the cinematic arts before students progress to advanced techniques in audio, cinematography, directing, editing, and screenwriting. We'll do a deep dive into all phases (development, pre-production, production, and post), and we'll explore future-facing techniques like virtual production. But the core of it all is storytelling.

With today's cameras and tech, it doesn't take too much to make a film look good. But it takes an immense amount of work, along with a deep understanding of oneself and the world around us, for something to be good – or at least, worthy of an audience's attention. We'll ask ourselves what stories we are telling and why. We'll analyze those stories, beat them, break them, love them, and repeat. We'll discover how those stories can best be told through the cinematic arts. And then we'll make some cool* stuff.

Starting a program from scratch is daunting to be sure. We will need gear (cameras, lights, grip, computers, and more). Additional faculty. And there are space considerations. We're sharing space until Film can find a permanent home, and -- plot twist -- this is creating opportunities for collaboration with other departments which I am excited to develop. We do have some precedent with the short film collaboration between Drama and Creative Writing, currently in its third year. Historically, students in those departments have collaborated on an accelerated timeline to produce two short films in the Spring under the mentorship of guest director (and Drama graduate) Liza Bennett with support from local production crews. Film is excited to continue this tradition and extend the process to fully encompass an authentic production experience for our students.

It's no secret that professional film and TV production is no longer limited to Los Angeles. Atlanta is one of the top five cities by soundstage square footage in the world. North Carolina has seen a resurgence in its film industry. And perhaps most importantly, the industry is growing right here in South Carolina. I've been busy meeting with local filmmakers and other stakeholders to make sure that SCGSAH is right in the thick of things as the local industry continues to develop. When students graduate from our Film program, they will be competitive applicants at the country's top film schools, but they will also have the skills and network needed to crew on a set right here in SC if they so choose.

I'd love to connect with any of our alumni in the industry who are interested in supporting our new program and its students. They're a diverse group with a wide variety of backgrounds and a shared love for film. It's my privilege to be developing an innovative cinematic arts curriculum that will serve them and many other young filmmakers of South Carolina for years to come.

THERE AND BACK AGAIN: A GOVIE'S JOURNEY

In April, something really exciting and wonderful happened. I was offered and accepted a job with the Governor's School for the Arts & Humanities. I joked to my family that, after attending the Summer Program in 2002 and then the Residential Program from 2003-2005, this was the third time I'd been accepted to the Governor's School. I was shocked to find that it still left me feeling as excited and full of possibility as it did when I was a teenager.

My Governor's School journey began well before my first Summer Program audition, way back in 1999. I had to write a persuasive paper for my 7th grade English class and I chose to write about why I wanted to attend the newly opened, arts-centered residential high school that I had seen on the news. I don't remember how I did on the paper, but I do remember the seed being planted that there was a place where kids like me could learn to hone their talents and that place was just a stone's throw from my middle school. It was a seed that took deep root and flourished.

Time at the Summer Program (back when it was still at Converse College) only served to strengthen my resolve. Before I knew it, I was preparing for an audition for the Residential program and shortly after, packing a trunk full of black clothes and diction books and a mammothsized Riverside Shakespeare. The next two years proved to be a rollercoaster of learning how to be serious about theatre and performance. I learned to speak like I was from nowhere. I learned to take criticism and use it to implement change in my performance. Maybe most importantly, I learned that sometimes people are just plain wrong about you and you have to listen and thank them for their input, and then just do what feels right. It was all hard work but, to quote *A League of Their Own*, "the hard is what makes it great."

After graduation, I moved to New York City to attend the Stella Adler Studio of Acting as part of their evening conservatory program. My full load of academic and arts work at Governor's School left me well prepared to spend my days working my 9-to-5 as a copywriter for an arts nonprofit and my evenings back in studio blacks rehearsing scenes and doing text analysis. It was here that I realized that not all arts schools are created equal. I found myself scratching my head at how my Govie drama studio had been head-and-shoulders more advanced than my adult conservatory courses. Though the big name alumni and teaching philosophy were what had lured me to the Adler Studio, I wound up falling back on my Shakespeare and voice and speech work from Governor's School more often than not. Even this far from home at a renowned conservatory program, nothing could really hold a candle to the education I received at SCGSAH.

In 2009, I moved back to the Upstate and by 2011, I was directing theatre full time. Now at the reigns of a theatre company operating out of a converted Depression-era school building in Fountain Inn, I spent the next 5 years directing mostly classic musicals, but I took some risks and exposed our little town to Thornton Wilder and Kaufman & Hart and even Shakespeare when I could (ask me about fascist, heavy metal Julius Caesar sometime). I watched a generation of kids come up through our company and helped them prep for college auditions and wound up serving as the Artistic Director of the venue by the end of my time there. It took this portion of my life to make me realize that I'd been through all those years of acting school, not because I was supposed to be an actor, but because I needed to know how to communicate with them. I was supposed to be a director.

Then, in 2016, something else exciting and wonderful happened. My wife, Mackensie, and I welcomed not one, but two babies into our family. My priorities came into focus with stunning clarity and suddenly, I was struggling to find my work fulfilling. With these newborn twin daughters at home, the prospect of working tech week for a show suddenly seemed unimaginable. It quickly became obvious to me that something had resoundingly replaced the theatre and the "love of the show." Now, all I wanted was to spend all the time in the world with them.

After bowing out of the theatre in 2017 (pun absolutely intended) and seeking the home life security of a 9-5 schedule, I wound up fixing iPhones, first for an authorized repair center, then for Apple itself. I tried on the "hat" of corporate work and...I did not like it. Coming from such a community-driven background, a cultivated corporate sense of belonging ultimately rang false for me. Despite the extensive company culture training provided, the unshakable feeling of being a cog in a giant, multinational machine just wasn't my style.

I searched around for a while for something that fit, then discovered something that very much did:



Governor's School was hiring for a public relations position. Not once had I considered working in a school, much less the one I'd graduated from, but the job description was seeking someone with the eclectic skillset I'd acquired over my career as a copywriter, creative lead, and administrator, and revolved around telling the story of a place that meant the world to me. Returning to the school for interviews was an emotional awakening of memories I had taken for granted. I was reminded of a simple truth: I loved this place. I met my best friend here. I learned how to take responsibility for myself here. Around every corner of the campus, I was flooded with fond memories. It felt like coming home.

I'm now about a month into my third stint at SCGSAH and my favorite thing about being back is the sense of belonging. Currently, my creative endeavors are all in the non-professional realm (writing, practicing my saxophone, sweating it out in my blacksmith shop) and I haven't been near a stage in guite some time, but I'm beyond thrilled to be working in the arts again in a support capacity. I am fortunate enough to be behind the scenes, bolstering the efforts of a place that nurtured me so well and supplied me with not only an education, but a sense of who I am, what's important to me, and what I am capable of.

If you had told a 17-year old Zac that in 20 years, he'd be back at SCGSAH with a "staff" badge around his neck, he'd have laughed you out of the room. Now, on the other side of two-decades of change and growth, I can't imagine myself anywhere else.


