FROM the PRESIDENT

Dear Alumni,

Greetings from the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities. With countless memories of a year that challenged our innovation and creativity like never before, I am pleased to say that we are back on the campus and ready for all that awaits us in the 2021-2022 academic year. We were quite fortunate to open the semester on time in August and we expect to remain in-person for the entirety of the school term.

Prior to the opening of school, we were also quite fortunate to resume in-person summer programs on the campus in June. Students from over 30 counties throughout the state joined us for two sessions of Arts Odyssey and Summer Dance along with a full two-week session of the Academy program. Although enrollment was limited to accommodate single-person housing assignments for most students, participation was robust and students excelled in all art areas.

The start of the fall semester has been extremely productive as we welcomed 137 new students to the Governor's School community. Through our efforts in re-establishing the full range of activity in the arts and academics, there is a renewed sense of excitement throughout the halls and studios. The new school year has presented many unique opportunities for what we know will be a great year, but also unique challenges as we seek to provide a safe campus environment as the pandemic continues.

We were also pleased to announce that the Office of Outreach has received a \$3.7 million grant from the SC Department of Education and SC Arts Commission to expand the Spark: Inspiring Tomorrow's Readers Through Drama initiative over the next three years. With this award, we will grow Spark from a summer artist-in-residency program to a year-round arts-integrated network of partnerships with thirty Title I schools across the state. The grant will embed actor-teachers with school staff to integrate drama and story into the daily curriculum, the after-school curriculum, and the summer Read to Succeed intensives.

We would love to see you at a performance or presentation in the near future as we gradually reopen the campus this semester. I thank you for your continued enthusiastic support of the Governor's School and I look forward to your participation in alumni events in the very near future.

Anne's commitment to arts education and passion for the theatre is evident in the work she does in and out of the classroom. A veteran actor and director, she regularly works in regional professional theatre in addition to her role as the Drama Instructor for the ARMES Program and Theatre Foundations teacher at the Fine Arts Center. She has served as lead teacher for the SC Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities IGNITE program, a summer intensive in creative process for middle school students, and as a teaching artist for the Metropolitan Arts Council's SMART ARTS initiative. For the past six summers, she has worked with SCGSAH and the SC Arts Commission, developing SPARK!, a program using theatre arts integration to build literacy skills and motivate reading in elementary students in Williamsburg and Jasper counties. As teacher of the year, Anne will be in the running for the South Carolina teacher of the year.

Continuing her ongoing involvement with SCGSAH, we welcomed Anne back to campus as our guest speaker for our Founders Day celebration. On October 8 students and employees gathered for an internal ceremony to honor those whose vision and outstanding efforts led to opening our state's premier residential high school for the arts. Anne shared with the group how her experience as a student in the Governor's School's Honors Program helped shape her as both an artist and arts advocate.

ABOUT I-ALLY

Founder & CEO, Lucinda Koza

I-Ally, a platform to provide access to resources, solutions and support for the growing population of millennial caregivers.

In 2018, my father suffered a debilitating stroke. I happened to be in town because my mother had gotten married the day before (irony). I went to meet my dad for lunch and instead I met a ghost. I rushed him to the ER. He couldn't speak. He had aphasia, so he knew what he wanted to say but couldn't find words; vascular dementia, and it was touch and go for a little bit. I spent 5 nights in the hospital with him. I didn't leave that floor to shower or eat. I kept expecting someone to show up and take over, to say "you've done enough, it's okay now." That never happened. In fact, even though I begged, sobbing on the phone with my two siblings, using every tactic from wailing like a banshee to bribery for them to come and help me, they both just said no. No explanation. So, there I was, devastated, alone, young, yet I was going to have to make decisions about his life, healthcare, and potentially his death. No one asked me if I was okay. I became power of attorney and healthcare proxy and gained access to his finances and became privy to the information that he had just filed for divorce from his thenwife a few days prior. My shock lasted for months, no doubt; but one day, it just dawned on me -- there has to be others out there like me. There has to be other young people who have been thrust into this circumstance. We just aren't connected!

Upon doing research I found there are 65 million unpaid family caregivers in the United States alone, and over 25% are millennials. I knew then, that if we cannot depend on the government or healthcare systems or even our own families to help us, then we can at least depend on each other. We can have each other's backs; we just need to be connected by a dependable technological platform. With that, I began building I-Ally.

TIME'S UP, an organization that works toward equity in the workplace and in policy for women in several areas, came out with a manifesto called Care is Infrastructure, adding "TIME'S UP is dedicated to reimagining caregiving as a critical basis for building a more equitable and inclusive economy." Subsequently, they formed the TIME'S UP Care Economy Business Council, announcing that "a coalition of 200+ businesses across industries has come together to join our Care Economy Business Council to reimagine our nation's caregiving infrastructure." I couldn't join quickly enough. I needed to be a Founding Member of the TIME'S UP Care Economy Business Council because for the first

time, someone was taking the words right out of my mouth.

Providing care for the sick or aging is a significant, and organic, part of life that our society has tried fiercely to stomp into submission. Confronting the concept of caring for our ill and elderly means we must also confront a handful of other realities:

- Ill, differently-abled, and elderly people exist, have a voice, and a point of view. If we don't respect the sick or elderly in our society, we certainly won't respect those who care for them.
- Caregiving should not fall on the shoulders of one person. This is why caregivers suffer from burnout and sometimes even die before their loved one does. Healthy caregiving comes from a community. It takes a village. Many hands make light work. The problem? We don't live in communities anymore. We don't share the work of life's struggles. We are isolated.
- We don't plan for the future as people, as families, and as governments. So, when things happen, we are surprised by them, and do not know what to do. Money was not saved so now a son and daughter go into debt, potentially ruining their financial future all because their father did not want to have an uncomfortable conversation. The daughter decides to leave her job, as her boss makes her feel like her caregiving circumstances are "a personal"



problem," allowing her no flexibility with remote work options or shifting hours. Another woman dropped out of the economy in her prime earning years. It's become an epidemic.

I-Ally's potential users were already on the internet and social media telling their stories, searching -feeling isolated and unsupported. Society's image of a caregiver is someone who, already retired, has had time to plan for their parent's decline and has support systems in place. For a millennial, caregiving is potentially traumatic, financially ruinous, and detrimental to their health, which is why community and support is absolutely necessary. The most important part of I-Ally is that we help users create a roadmap for what the future will look like.

This testimonial from an I-Ally user says it all:

I'm 29, and my mom was diagnosed with cancer two years ago. Last year they cleared her and put her into remission. Which was great considering everything that was 2020. Unfortunately 2021 has been harder for me personally, as it saw my moms cancer come back with a vengeance.

It has been a really rough journey. I remember initially finding I-ally and asking for help because I was so lost on what to do. My aunt was supposed to step in, and never did. And my brother flat out told me he couldn't help. Which, in itself, was soul wrenching, cause it's my brother... needless to say I was overwhelmed, confused, hurt, and of course still trying to process through that my mom was dying.

Luckily, people suggested getting hospice involved, and other home health on I-ally. And good gosh. Y'all are angels. Cause my life has been so much easier since we have had hospice helping.

It's still hard at times, cause hospice isn't 24/7. And home health can only stay so long. I also don't expect it to be as smooth as it is as she get closer to her time. But, we now have a schedule and my work has been pretty good about me working from home when I need to. I guess I'm actually still in the middle of my caregiving journey. But you guys have already helped me so much. I know I can come here if I need it again.


MAEGHAN HOBBS Contemporary Dance Instructor

EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES

THROUGH ART

Empowering Communities Through Art (ECTA) came to be one evening at the dinner table. Reynaldo Hill (Executive Director) and Jessica Key (Artistic Director) were speaking about their experiences in the arts, and the many difficulties and challenges that halt others from being able to explore their creativity through the means of art education.

Through this discussion, they also spoke about the lack of access to quality art education throughout most communities in the U.S, and the imbalance of pedagogical training alongside technical ability in the artistic space. This was when ECTA was born. The organization's mission is to provide a new alternative to traditional arts education by putting an equal emphasis on pedagogical training as well as artistic talent, and to bring the arts to communities that are traditionally overlooked by engaging with them through performances in unconventional venues.

Early in their music journeys, Both of ECTA's founders discovered that the only way to pursue the arts was to go far beyond their own communities, as the resources were not available locally. When he was in middle school, South Bronx native Reynaldo Hill had to travel across state lines to New Jersey every weekend for violin lessons and to Manhattan for orchestra rehearsal, which was extremely tiring when combined with his daily school commute. Jessica Key left her hometown of Aiken, South Carolina to go to the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities in Greenville in order to pursue music fully, which was three hours away from her childhood home. Both of them also had to transfer high schools to pursue their crafts in more depth. These experiences represent sacrifices and burdens some must undergo to pursue their passion when resources that should be available to all are not available locally.

From this, it was determined that ECTA should have instructors in communities nationwide, and also accommodate students who feel more comfortable studying remotely. This will allow us to achieve our goal by positioning us to be reached any time, anywhere.

2021 SUMMER PROGRAMS

Return to Campus



This summer we welcomed 297 students to campus to participate in a fantastic Govie experience! While the enrollment number is lower than in previous years, it was the best way to maintain CDC protocols while still making an on-campus experience available to participants. Safety protocols such as optional face coverings, hand washing, social distancing, single occupancy housing (as much as possible) stayed in place for all summer programs. So that we could reach as many students as possible, a day student option was also created for local participants that weren't yet comfortable residing on campus.

Through a lot of employee feedback we reconfigured this second year of Arts Odyssey to better serve our rising 8th and 9th grade students. Students had instructional time throughout the morning and afternoon with longer breaks in between. We incorporated additional evening instruction hours, opportunities to participate in other arts areas and more off campus social activities. Students had a full, challenging and FUN week on campus. This year's two one-week programs served 171 students from 21 counties.

Our Academy Program consisted of 86 participants and will continue to serve rising 10th graders from 24 counties all over the state. The curriculum incorporated studio work, library research projects, field trips, lectures, and presentations by faculty and guest artists. This rigorous two-week experience was incredibly rewarding for its participants and gave them a better understanding of what attending the high school would be like.

This year's Summer Dance program consisted of two two-week sessions for rising 7th to 12 grade students chaired by Thomas Shoemaker. 40 participants were involved Monday through Saturday in classes designed specifically for their age group. This summer's curriculum included ballet and pointe technique, African dance, cross training, jazz, yoga and hair and make-up workshops.
