# FROM the PRESIDENT

Dear Alumni,

Greetings from the arts capital of South Carolina! I'm pleased to bring you up to date on all that we are doing at the Governor's School as we continue making great strides on the campus and throughout the state. With a great sense of pride, our theme Many Paths, One Community: Govie Unity still guides us as we redefine success and reach new heights for our next phase of artistic and academic growth on the campus and all over South Carolina.

During the last spring semester, our students earned numerous awards and accolades highlighted by the range college and university acceptances for the Class of 2023. The graduating class included 3 students selected for the Palmetto Boys and Girls States, 19 Palmetto Fellows, 5 selections to SC All-State Bands and Orchestras, 5 YoungArts awards, 53 Scholastic National Art & Writing Awards, and 31 inductees into the National Honor Society. The academic year also turned out to be a record-breaking period for the Office of Outreach as we continued to refine and build our capacity to support the entire state of South Carolina. Arts education experiences for SC students and teachers increased for the academic year by 65% for a total of 161,586 individuals (156,014 students and 5,572 adults ) in 42 counties.

The summer of 2023 was one for the record books in many ways with talented students from 35 counties across South Carolina brought each program to capacity. Our young actors, writers, musicians, and visual artists engaged with our world-class instructors for arts-intensive sessions of Arts Odyssey and Academy, while our young dancers were equally engaged in our Summer Dance and Dance Immersion programs. As the result of a partnership in Horry County, our newest summer program, Young Composers Workshop, was launched in Conway on the campus of Horry-Georgetown Technical College attracting new students from three different counties.

You'll be pleased to know that the site visit for reaffirmation of accreditation with the Accrediting Commission for Community and Pre-Collegiate Arts Schools (ACCPAS) was held on the campus on September 24-26. As a part of the accrediting process, the visiting evaluators spent two days observing classes, attending rehearsals, and meeting with various employees. The self-study has been a valuable learning experience for all campus units, as each made significant contributions to the document and process.

After successful summer programs on the campus, the school year opened with 231 students in residence. We're off to a fantastic start and our performance season is in full swing already. We would love to see you at an event on the campus or throughout the state, and our upcoming collaborative performance of Boundless might be the perfect opportunity for your return to campus. Please consider reserving a seat for this amazing musical by Mary Fishburne.

The positivity of the last academic year and the success of many new initiatives has allowed for a level of excitement for the new year that is contagious among students, employees, and parents. As always, I thank you for your continued support of the Governor's School and I look forward to your participation in our Alumni Weekend events later this month.

### 2023 SUMMER PROGRAMS

This summer we welcomed over 500 students to the SCGSAH campus during the months of June and July. Students from 35 counties of the 46 counties in South Carolina filled the campus with energy and excitement. Daily schedules were designed with instruction time throughout the mornings and afternoons. Arts presentations, off campus outings and residential life activities were offered in the evenings.





The Academy program consisted of 144 participants and this summer's curriculum incorporated studio work, self directed studies, lectures and presentations by faculty and guest artists, performance, and off campus field trips.

The two one-week **Arts Odyssey** program sessions served 309 students this summer! While attendees mainly focused in one art area, they also had the opportunity to experience other arts areas in afternoon exploratory sessions, guest lectures and performances.







This year's **Summer Dance** program welcomed 25 rising 7th to 12th grade students to campus for a five week session. The dance students were involved in Monday through Saturday classes designed especially for their age group. Their curriculum included ballet and pointe techniques, jazz, yoga, injury prevention/dance wellness, and African dance/cultural enrichment classes.





Our two two-week **Dance Immersion** programs allowed beginning dancers to explore the world of dance in a fun and supportive environment. This program is intended for students who are passionate about dance, but may not have formal ballet training. This summer's 22 participants explored a variety of classes such as Ballet, Modern/Contemporary, Jazz, Hip Hop, African Dance, Yoga and Pilates.





We introduced a new two-week program to our offerings this summer: Introduction to Filmmaking. In this program aspiring 7th and 8th grade filmmakers worked with a team of industry professionals to produce short films based on their original scripts. During the program, students learned the filmmaking process from start to finish, including how to:

- · Write a compelling scene in screenplay format
- · Work with actors in front of a camera
- · Operate state-of-the-art equipment
- · Block and light a scene
- · Edit film takes
- · Add sound and music to video footage



- While on campus, alumni visitors must always be accompanied by a staff member. When your visit is complete the staff member wil escort you back to the Visitor's Center to check out.





#### THE GREAT HALL COMMISSION: JACOLBY SATTERWHITE

## A METTA PRAYER





From October 2 through January 7, 2024, the Great Hall of the Metropolitan Museum of Art will be transformed by Brooklyn-based multimedia artist Jacolby Satterwhite (Visual Arts, 2004).

Satterwhite has created a large-scale work, comprised of video, sound, music, and performative interventions. Using more than one hundred objects that have been 3-D scanned from The Met collection, combined with images of New York City and its diverse communities, Satterwhite's commission will celebrate the role of the Museum within the city and beyond. The installation will include a series of performances and a soundtrack, which, along with the visual installations, will generate a layered environment within the Great Hall.

The Great Hall has not had an official commission since the 2019 debut of two large paintings by the Canadian artist Kent Monkman. "It's not on a schedule," Museum director Max Hollein told The New York Times. "We only do the Great Hall when we feel it's right."

Hollein also shared that the new commissions were only one part of the Met's effort to center contemporary art. A \$500 million expansion wing for Modern and contemporary work is slated for completion in 2029. Jacolby was also featured in the Biennial at the Whitney Museum of American Art in 2014, and more recently did a commission for the overhaul of David Geffen Hall at Lincoln Center that debuted in October, a video called "An Eclectic Dance to the Music of Time."

#### FROM THE ALUMNI ADVISORY COUNCIL

#### Dear SCGSAH Alumni,

It is hard to believe that we are more than halfway through 2023! As we reflect on the past few months, I hope that each of us identifies an experience, person, or opportunity that has made it incredibly rewarding and worthwhile. Although this could be challenging, please remember Betty White's words: "It's your outlook on life that counts. If you take yourself lightly and don't take yourself too seriously, pretty soon you can find the humor in our everyday lives. And sometimes it can be a lifesaver."

As we inch closer to 2024, the SCGSAH Alumni Advisory Council ("AAC") is proud to begin a new initiative, the 2023 Guest Artists' Fund Challenge. If you recall, the AAC's goals for the year include giving back to SCGSAH and fostering a greater sense of community among SCGSAH's alumni. After learning how SCGSAH's costs have historically skyrocketed for students and families, the AAC decided to set a fundraising goal that is both attainable and impactful for the SCGSAH community.

To that end, the AAC is sponsoring a Guest Artists' Fund for students at SCGSAH. Can you remember any of the guest artists that you met or worked with? Currently, it costs approximately \$3,000.00 to host one guest artist for SCGSAH's students. That amount typically covers travel, lodging, and any food expenses. As SCGSAH alumni, our goal is to raise \$3,000.00 to sponsor one guest artist by December 31, 2023. There are well over 2,000 SCGSAH alumni from the residential high school and thousands more from the founding summer programs. ### **OUTREACH** NEWS

The Office of Outreach has been hard at work for the past few months bringing the arts to teachers and students all over South Carolina! Here's what we've been up to:



Our summer Spark team led drama-based literacy camps in Richland, Florence, Calhoun, Lee, Fairfield, Darlington, Edgefield, and Cherokee counties. Our actor-teachers foster an environment that celebrates and cultivates a love for reading, while students use their newly learned actor's tools to bring books to life. Spark also hosted its first ever Educator Intensive in July at the Columbia Museum of Art. During this three day professional learning opportunity, eighteen teachers received hands-on training in drama-based literacy strategies. They dove head-first into the Spark model and explored techniques to inspire the joy of reading in their own students when they return to their classrooms!

Our Outreach Teaching Artists, Jeff and Daphne, brought our Ignite program to school and community based summer programs throughout the state. During June and July, they worked with nearly 1500 students in Marion, Marlboro, Fairfield, Florence, Edgefield, Georgetown, Horry, Union, Anderson, Charleston, Berkeley, and Greenville counties. These students learned about jazz music through movement and storytelling, discovered SC habitats through landscape painting, developed drawing skills by creating animals and monsters, and explored the media arts through animation, 3-D digital design, and music production.







We're incredibly proud of our impact during the 22-22 school year, delivering over 650 experiences to over 160,000 individuals in 42 counties. Our work for this school year is already well underway as our team gears up for Field Trips to Campus, Guest Artist Visits, and Virtual Backpack Arts Activities. The Office of Outreach is proud to serve the students and teachers of South Carolina and is excited about the upcoming year!
