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# FROM the PRESIDENT

Dear Alumni,

Greetings from the place "Where Young Artists Live, Learn, and Thrive!" If 2023 has been as good for you as it has been for the Governor's School, then I know it's been an outstanding year so far. The energy of the semester has been dynamic from the very beginning and our students continue to excel and achieve both on and off the campus.

We were pleased to open the semester with the Governor's School Choir performing at the SC Statehouse for the second gubernatorial inauguration of Henry McMaster in January. Soon afterwards, three dancers traveled to Winston Salem, North Carolina for the semi-finals of the Youth America Grand Prix Ballet and Contemporary Competition. While one received the silver medal in ballet, another placed Best 12 in the same category. Both were invited to compete in the finals among 200 international competitors, becoming the first two female dancers from the Governor's School to compete at the YAGP finals concurrently.

Our Creative Writing and Visual Arts students continue the trend of dominating the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards with a total of 120 regional honors in 2023. This includes 13 Gold Keys, 50 Silver Keys, and over 50 Honorable Mentions. In March, 10 music students will perform as members of the SC All-State Band while an additional three were selected for the SC Region Bands.

Most recently, we were privileged to host a series of master classes and workshops by visiting artists including Adam Sadberry (flute) and Dr. Paulo Andre Gualdi (piano). As always, we are thrilled to feature alumni guest artists and welcomed Jon Spigner ('09) to teach a ballet class for our junior and senior dancers.



Black Child," by Useni Perkins, and a moving performance of "Lift Every Voice and Sing." Performers gave speeches, read poetry, and shared an unforgettable presentation on the meaning and history of step dancing!



Our Creative Writing Govies had the opportunity to learn from two highly esteemed guest artists this semester—Stephen Graham Jones and Emilia Phillips.

**Stephen Graham Jones** is the New York Times Bestselling Author of "The Only Good Indians."

He has been an NEA fellowship recipient, has won the Jesse Jones Award for Best Work of Fiction from the Texas Institute of Letters, the Independent Publishers Award for Multicultural Fiction, a Bram Stoker Award, and more. He spoke to students about his experiences working with

Marvel, his writing process, and read a few of his short stories.

EMILIA PHILIPS

Emilia Philips is the author of four poetry collections from the University of Akron Press, including "Embouchure," and four chapbooks. During their visit, Philips read from "Embouchure," and gave a craft lesson on lineation and imagery to both our junior and senior students.





Drama students from W.A. Perry Middle School visited

campus in February. After talking about his specialized career in the arts, production team member **Jason Lord** helped students experiment with the tools of the trade. They also explored music, rhythm, and voice in theatre with Drama faculty **Candace Dickinson** and **Jayce Tromsness**.



Tiffany Prasertkul, our Director of Behavioral Health and Intervention Counseling organized a visit with Paws 2 Care during exam week to help students destress. Paws 2 care is a volunteer organization in the Upstate that



provides therapy dog visits to schools, hospitals, and more.

Drama faculty **Ebony Mills** and **Anne Tromsness** led our Fall Teacher Retreat on movement and improvisation this past weekend. Participating teachers learned a series of drama strategies, explored script through improvisation techniques, and utilized movement to harness character.





**Sirui Liu**, principal dancer with the Cincinnati Ballet, led a ballet master class with our juniors and seniors in November. Liu was included in "Dance Magazine's Top 25 Dancers to Watch" in 2017 and is the co-founder of Active Royale, a dance wear company.





Forty-eight Governor's School Creative Writing and Visual Arts students brought home a total of 120 regional awards from this year's Scholastic Art & Writing Awards! These students were selected out of thousands across the Southeast for their artistic achievement, receiving the following recognitions:

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- 13 Gold Keys
- 50 Silver Keys, with one Silver Key in the Art Portfolio category and one for Writing Portfolio
- 57 Honorable Mentions, with four Honorable Mentions in the Art Portfolio Category and one for Writing Portfolio



In January, we welcomed representatives from Foster Victor Wealth Advisors to speak to our students about personal finances. Ashley Cluley and Garrett Hyer

answered dozens of great questions from our students about taxes, emergency funds, managing money as a working artist, and more.

For Veteran's Day, we held a ceremony recognizing



the service of the veterans within our school community and nationwide. Drama junior Jakai Norfleet spoke about the history and impact of this day before introducing Resident Life Coordinator Tarnisha Thomas, who has been serving for six years at Joint Base Charleston as a Staff Sergeant in the U.S. Air Force Reserves, 560 RED Horse Unit.

She shared her experience in the military and how it has allowed her to be part of something bigger than herself.

In February, the Dance Department welcomed 2009 alum **Jon Spigner** to teach a ballet class to our junior and senior dancers! Since graduating from the Governor's School, Jon joined Hong Kong Ballet as a Corps de Ballet member in 2010 and was named Coryphée in 2014. He has danced featured roles, including Puss in Boots in Cynthia Harvey's "The Sleeping Beauty," Fritz and Spanish Doll in Terence Kohler's "The Nutcracker," White Rabbit and Tweedle Dee & Tweedle Dum in Septime Webre's ALICE (in wonderland), and more.





It was a pleasure to host Mena Mark Hanna, general

director of Spoleto Festival USA, and David Platts, executive director of the South Carolina Arts Commission, in February. While on campus, they toured our facilities, met with campus leaders and observed classes.



Student ambassadors had the opportunity to share examples of their work with our special guests as well.

Students from the Governor's School had a film screening at the **Reedy Reels Film Festival** in February. A collaborative project by Visual Arts Seniors Midori Brown, Caris Kulbok, and Jessica Hamilton was featured along with a solo project by Hamilton. An animation reel featuring work by more of our students was also available for viewing at the festival.



Dancers Valen Reyes, Sarah Swoope, and Natalie Sevel traveled to Winston Salem, North Carolina, to attend the International Youth America Grand Prix Ballet and Contemporary Competition's semi finals. Reyes, who is a sophomore, competed against all seniors and received the Silver in the Ballet Category. Sevel placed Best 12 in the Ballet Category. Swoope received a score of 98 out of 100 for one of her modern dance performances. Both Reyes and Sevel were also invited to compete in the finals amongst 200 international competitors! It is a historic first at the Governor's School to have two female dancers compete at the YAGP finals.




# CAMPUS WIDE THEME A New SCGSAH Tradition

















# ALUMNI IN THE SPOTLIGHT REBEKAH LYONS



Rebekah Lyons graduated from the SC Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities as a Dance major in 2015. Although she has lived in several states, she grew up in the Conway, South Carolina area. Rebekah's love for dance started at the young age of four, but it soon grew to be a life-long passion, and ultimately a career through dancing and teaching.

Prior to attending the Governor's School she trained at Myrtle Beach School of Performing Arts, Coastal Dance Center, and Litchfield Dance Arts Academy. She attended summer dance intensives through Atlanta Ballet, Richmond Ballet, Charlotte Ballet, and the Draper Center for Dance Education in Rochester, New York. Prestigious instructors she trained with include Fiona Fairy, Sasha Yapparov, N'Jelle Gage, Dusty Button, and Duane Cyrus. Before attending the Governor's School, she trained under Liza Mata, Karen Mata, Christie Karavan, Linda Butler, and Ilka Doubek through their respective local studios. In 2012, she earned distinction in the Youth America Grand Prix competition for her modern dance

solo choreographed by Carolyn Bolten and for her "Queen of the Dryads" ballet variation under the instruction of Ilka

Doubek. In the summer of 2013, she received the honor of performing the lead role in Duane Cyrus's modern dance choreography for Charlotte Ballet's summer dance intensive.

Upon her graduation from the Governor's School, Rebekah was offered two opportunities to join professional ballet companies. Richmond Ballet offered her the opportunity to join as an apprentice in the summer of 2015. However, she decided to take a trainee offer with Ballet Magnificat, a traveling Chrisitan ballet company based in Jackson, Mississippi. After dancing full-time for a year after Governor's school, she decided to start her undergraduate studies at the College of Charleston to pursue a career in education.

Rebekah completed dual degrees at the College of Charleston and graduated in the Spring of 2020 with a Bachelor of Science in Early Childhood Education, a Bachelor of Arts in Dance, and an additional literacy endorsement. She also earned a Dance K-12 teaching



certification for SC public schools. During her freshman year at the College of Charleston, she started her own business incorporated as an LLC to offer dance enrichment opportunities to local Charleston schools. She saw that many schools did not have the personnel and/or resources to provide quality dance education to students. To remedy this, she offered ballet, modern, jazz, and ballroom dance classes to elementary-aged students in the Charleston area. She taught dance to over a hundred students in public and private schools throughout her four years at the College of Charleston. Notable schools include Charleston Day School, Meeting Street Academy, Charleston Progressive Academy, and others. She also taught dance to students of all ages and experience levels at Ballet Academy of Charleston. While at the College of Charleston, she performed in several main stage shows through the College's Dance Department.

Currently, Rebekah works as a reading interventionist for elementary students in Darlington County, South Carolina. Prior to this, she spent two years as a second grade classroom teacher in Macon, Georgia. While in Georgia, she taught dance for Middle Georgia Youth Ballet. She moved back to her home state of South Carolina to be closer to her fiancé, Adam, and family. Rebekah graduated with her master's degree in Educational Leadership in August 2022 through Kennesaw

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State University, and is now certified to be a K-12 school principal. She plans to go into school administration after a few more years of teaching. Rebekah is currently enrolled to start her Ph.D. in Educational Law through Liberty University. Ultimately, she aspires to go into Educational Policy to help improve South Carolina's schools. She plans to use her experience as a classroom teacher, reading interventionist, and future school principal to guide and inform policy decisions at all levels. Her well-rounded arts education from the Governor's School along with her dance background continue to influence her in the classroom, and may ultimately help shape her future decisions as a South Carolina policy maker.

It's easy to get hyper-focused and overwhelmed as you are devoting yourself to your art area and keeping up with academic classes. - **16. What are your hobbies?** Other than my love for dance, I enjoy creative writing, yoga/aerial yoga, CrossFit workouts, spending time with my cats, shopping, and teaching!

Griffin sat down with South Carolina Voyager to talk about his journey as an artist and how his creative process connects with his everyday life.


#### **JASMINN JOHNSON (DRAMA, 2012)**

### **OUTREACH**

The Office of Outreach has been hard at work bringing the arts to teachers and students all over South Carolina! Here's what we've been up to:

Here at the Governor's School, we are excited to have the service learning program Connecting Arts Through Service (C.A.T.S.) acting as the student arm of our Outreach programs. C.A.T.S. is designed to help students explore their service interests and teaches them to investigate, plan, and carry out projects in their local communities. C.A.T.S. also helps match students with opportunities to volunteer with partner organizations encouraging them to reflect on and learn from their service experiences.



In the Fall, C.A.T.S. students partnered with Stone Academy in Greenville during their Book Fair week to read to 1st through 5th grade classes. This was a fantastic opportunity for mentorship for

C.A.T.S. has an ongoing partnership with The SC

Children's Theatre, which is within walking distance of campus. Our students volunteer at their productions throughout the year! This winter, C.A.T.S. was excited to participate in the



2022 JDRF Walk to Cure Diabetes, helping pass out drinks and snacks and cheering on walkers as they reach Fluor Field.



In November and December, a group of C.A.T.S. members organized a donation drive in partnership with Mental Health America. In just two weeks, these students collected 206 toothbrushes and 22 tubes of toothpaste for Operation Santa,

which were donated to adults living with chronic mental health conditions in the Greenville community.

C.A.T.S. students were excited to dive into Arts Advocacy again this year! In January, members led a postcard writing activity during House Meetings. They also discussed the why and how of advocacy during our January C.A.T.S. meeting and prepared to write letters to their legislators during Arts Advocacy Week in February.

On March 22, C.A.T.S. students will participate in a clubwide Day of Service. Members will travel to three local organizations, selected by the club based on personal interests, and spend the morning volunteering. After returning to campus, students will participate in group reflections and will have the opportunity to share their experience through an art form of their choice.
