As I have mentioned before, student voice is an integral part of our successful school district. It's woven into the fabric of our everyday practices in the classroom and in our after-school activities. Our administrators, teachers and staff receive regular professional development training regarding the development of student voice. I hold student Town Hall Meetings three times a year at each of our middle and high schools to listen to students' perspectives on what's going well, and what we can do to improve. Student voice is not to be confused with students running the classrooms or the school district. Rather. it's a school and district culture in which ideas and practices are considered through the lens of the student perspective. Student voice in the Cherry Hill Public Schools has already made a difference in many areas of what we do. A few examples include how we approach teaching science (lab work protocols are now taught in eighth grade, *before* students enter high school), how we are implementing technology and how we are addressing cultural proficiency, equity and character education.

When you go to see *Newsies*, I know you will celebrate the great talents of our student actors (some of whom are pictured above), musicians, stage crew and set designers. I hope you'll also celebrate the show's message: that the voices of traditionally marginalized, abused and undervalued workers – in this case, the newspaper delivery boys of turn-of-thecentury New York City – are finally heard as they come together. The resulting changes from the actual newsboy strike in 1899 resulted in workplace reforms that reached other industries and remain in place today.
