What's New

The new school year brings new practices and initiatives to our schools. WE are happy to share them.

Now that we have wrapped up our first few days of school, I would like once again to welcome our CHPS families to the 2018-2019 school year! I had the great pleasure of visiting our schools on opening day, as well as yesterday and today. You may have noticed some changes already in place, and I'd like to go over those, as well as some important initiatives that are happening this year.

As I have explained in previous communications, we now employ nine armed Campus Police Officers, all of whom were on hand at their assigned schools on the first day, greeting our children and parents as they arrived. These officers, five of whom are new employees, are committed to building relationships with all of our students, as we all believe positive relationships are a central key to building a safer school environment.

Our administration and staff members also have a strong commitment to positive relationships with our students. Much of our summer professional development focused on the importance of student voice and authentic listening, learning and leading on the part of the adults in our buildings. Additionally, each of our elementary schools has a guidance counselor on staff. Our middle schools have a guidance counselor for each grade level and a student assistance counselor (SAC)/anti-bullying specialist. Our high schools each have a supervisor of guidance and multiple guidance counselors (10 at East and 8 at West) as well as a student assistance counselor (SAC)/anti-bullying specialist. This year, we are adding the STOPit app for use in all of our schools, after having piloted the program last year at Beck Middle School and both high schools. The app allows students anonymously to report incidents of harassment, intimidation and bullying (HIB) to CHPS staff. Please note that the app is not a crisis hotline, but rather a reporting mechanism for HIB behavior. As always, resources for student assistance,

including mental health and substance abuse resources, can be found under the <u>Student Assistance</u> link on the District web site.

Thanks to our increase in funding from the state of New Jersey, we are embarking this year on building new security vestibules at the entrances to Thomas Paine and Woodcrest Elementary Schools, as well as installing interior and exterior security cameras and exterior lighting on each site, modeled after the security prototype at the Barclay Early Childhood Center. We will also be installing interior and exterior security cameras, exterior site lighting, and electronic card access at High Schools East and West this year.

Our plan to continue these security upgrades in all of our buildings is included in our upcoming Bond Referendum. During the Board of Education meeting on September 25 the Bond Referendum Questions will be presented publicly for the first time, and we will discuss our special election date, which likely will be finalized at a Special Action meeting on October 2. I encourage you to stay informed about the bond via the "Bond 2018" button on the District web site. Details regarding the projects and associated costs will be added to the Bond web site upon Board adoption of the referendum questions on October 2. Information also will be available at our Back to School Nights, beginning Wednesday, September 12.

I wish you a restful long weekend, as schools are closed this Monday and Tuesday, September 10 and 11. Be sure to catch up with your children about their first few days of school! I can assure you, our staff and administration saw a great deal of joy, enthusiasm and curiosity among our students this week as they reconnected and made new friends. 
