2018 PARCC and General Assessment Information Available

The PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers) assessment schedule is now set. Assessments will begin Monday, April 16, 2018 with high school testing. Middle school testing will begin Friday, April 20, and elementary school testing will begin Thursday, May 3. Middle school will test one unit per day. The elementary school schedule has been extended for two days.

A full schedule, including make-up dates, is available on the District web site. Additionally, high school graduation assessment requirements for the classes of 2016 through 2021 and beyond are now available on the District web site, as is a full calendar of all assessment dates.
