This past week, January 22-26, was the annual Great Kindness Challenge. Many of our schools, at all grade levels, participated with great enthusiasm. Students at Kingston Elementary collected money to donate to Puerto Rico to help with the challenges remaining from Hurricanes Irma and Maria. A. Russell Knight Elementary started a "kindness wave" of surprise tokens sent to adults which were then "paid forward" across the district. "Kindness tunnels" leading into schools (as pictured above), paper chains of kindness, positive Post-It notes, Crazy Hair Day ("Crazy for kindness"), Pajama Day ("Dreaming of Kindness"), the construction of "Kindness Quilts" and more at many other schools all demonstrated our students' commitment to kindness.

The Great Kindness Challenge *is* great – It gives our students an opportunity to talk about and to focus on being kind. They participate in a week devoted to giving extra attention to how we interact with one another and how we speak, the words we choose to express ourselves. It's wonderful that the kids are talking about it, but I encourage everybody, especially the adults, to talk about it as well. Kindness needs to be a priority for all of us in our everyday lives. One of the things I always try to include in this weekly letter is a reminder about being kind – sharing a kind word and a smile. Some of the challenges that our kids deal with, just before they arrive at school, leave little room for focusing on kindness. Yet so many of them still do. The difference that it makes if an adult or another student smiles back at them as they arrive is absolutely tremendous. As adults, we must remember that. The challenge that I offer you adults is to SMILE at people you come in contact with, and offer a kind word – not just in our schools, but in our neighborhoods and throughout our community.

Among the best parts of my job are the home visits I do throughout the year. As I speak to families, it's clear that people come to Cherry Hill because of the schools, but they stay here because of what the community is. They stay because of the feeling of connectedness, because of the feeling of being valued and being a part of something larger than themselves and their family. We can all make those connections stronger. Speak kindly to the people you see. We are

#### 2018 PARCC Assessment Information Now Available

The PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers) assessment schedule is now set. Assessments will begin Tuesday, April 17, 2018 with high school testing. Middle school testing will begin Tuesday, April 24, and elementary school testing will begin Thursday, May 3.

A full schedule, including make-up dates, is available on the District web site. Additionally, high school graduation assessment requirements for the classes of 2016 through 2021 and beyond are now available on the District web site.



#### Deadline for CHAACA Essay/Poster/Video Contest for Black History Month is February 2

The Cherry Hill African
American Civic Association
(CHAACA) is sponsoring an
Essay/Poster/Video Contest
for Black History Month 2018.
The contest is open to all
public school students in
Cherry Hill, grades K through
12. The essay, poster or
video must depict an African
American who has or had a
distinguished career in STEM
(Science, Technology,
Engineering, and
Mathematics).

There are two sets of contest requirements: one tailored for grades K through 3 and the other for grades 4 through 12.

Three winners will be named in each of six categories. Each winner will receive a monetary prize.

Entrants must follow the guidelines specified by CHAACA. Entries will be accepted until Friday, February 2, 2018. Winners will be recognized at the February 27 Board of Education Meeting. Entries will be displayed at the Cherry Hill Public Library and posted
