I also appreciate when those who disagree with a decision express their point of view in a respectful way.

Each day, decisions are made in the Cherry Hill Public Schools which will not make every single community member happy. I will offer the perspective that, while you may not agree with a certain decision or practice, there are a number of avenues to make your voice heard. You may choose to call or email us, to submit a "Quick Question" on our web site or to watch the Online Lunches with the Superintendent. You may attend and speak at Board of Education Committee, Work Session and Action Meetings. You may even schedule a meeting with me. Whatever avenue you choose, I ask you to remember that decisions are made based on civil dialogue, and the most important consideration in our decisions is the effect on our students.

A social media conversation can devolve quickly, and the conclusions drawn from such threads can be completely erroneous, akin to the childhood game "Whisper Down the Lane."

So as changes occur in our community – and they will continue to, on a regular basis – let's remember that our response is a reflection of who we are. Words matter. Disagreements are healthy, but only when they remain reasoned and respectful.

We are all lifelong students, learning as we go. I encourage the adults and students in our community to continue to respond to change in productive way, whether helping facilitate it or helping refine it.

Great Kindness Challenge Kicks off in CHPS Next Week

Several Cherry Hill schools will participate in the Great Kindness Challenge during the school week of January 23-27, 2017. Students pledge to perform as many acts of kindness as possible, choosing from a 50-item checklist. As part of this year's Great Kindness Challenge, schools will raise money to help build a new school in Pakistan.

"Kind Coins for Pakistan" is a global service project with the goal of building a fully equipped six-room school for approximately 200 students, ages five-12. Bret Harte Elementary School and A. Russell Knight Elementary School are among the schools participating in the coin collection effort. Additionally, a Harte third grader is organizing the effort to sell bandannas at lunchtime to raise money for the Alicia Rose Victorious Foundation, which helps children with cancer.

Kindergarten Registration and Middle School Open Enrollment Dates Now Available

Kindergarten/first grade registration for children entering public school for the first time begins on March 7, 2017 at the Malberg Administration Building, 45 Ranoldo Terrace. Children must be 5 years old by October 1, 2017 to be eligible for kindergarten. It is not necessary to bring your child to register. Specific dates and times for each school are available on the **District** web site.

Information meetings for 5th grade students and their parents will take place in late January and early February. Parents and students are recommended to attend the session at their sending school and at Rosa International Middle School. Dates and times of the
