Our community is a quilt of diversity and positive interaction. Let's all continue to do our part to maintain and celebrate it.

During the past year, I have spoken and shared a great deal about our district feeling that we are one community, one Cherry Hill. The fabric of our community becomes interwoven and representative of the various neighborhoods and developments from which we emerge each morning. We are Kingston and Woodcrest, Old Orchard and Erlton, Kresson Woods and Barlow. Our 19 schools remain the center of our communities, bringing families together at drop off and pick up and for special events, uniting us along a common journey as we watch our children mature. During the past year, I have seen the evidence of the community spirit that exists in Cherry Hill as I have visited our schools and attended community events.

As a school district and as a community, we continue to be enriched by the diversity of our students and our families. Our student body has nearly 2,200 bilingual members; more than 57 languages are spoken in the homes of our students. Religious observances and cultural traditions accentuate the excitement and celebration throughout our community. Our schools have worked with a myriad of outreach programs to educate and to share culture. The annual Hispanic Heritage Month tour by the Latinos at High School West, the yearly Black Broadway production showcasing our students and supported by the Cherry Hill African American Civic Association, Multi-Cultural Day at High School East, and scores of other events highlight the richness in our diversity.

We are a district with students who move in as seniors in high school and students who begin with us when they turn three years old. Our students span the spectrum of development with different learning styles, different needs, and different abilities. Our students and our families are part of the LGBTQ community. Our students live in homes and apartments and town houses that vary in size from 500 square feet to 10,000 square feet. The plan, in response to the results publicized on November 2 of the first round of water testing in October, is outlined in a letter from Dr. Meloche on the District web site.

The first round of testing included Harte, Johnson, Mann, Sharp, Stockton and Woodcrest Elementary Schools, as well as the Alternative High School/Malberg Administration Buliding. The remaining testing of our 12 other schools is scheduled to be completed by December 31. Results will be added to the testing results chart on the District web site as they are received.
