Township's "Road Map to Our Future"

Cherry Hill Township continues to be a great partner with the Cherry Hill Public Schools as we all work to become an increasingly sustainable community.

I had the great pleasure this week of attending Cherry Hill Township's rollout of their "Roadmap to Our Future." The Township describes this comprehensive plan as "a blueprint for building a sustainable future and maintaining the vitality of the Cherry Hill Community for future generations." Future generations: the very children who are being raised in our community right now – who are attending our schools, preparing for careers and perhaps are planning ultimately to raise their own families in Cherry Hill. This is an exciting time for our community at large and for the Cherry Hill Public Schools.

The Township's plan is composed of objectives and strategies in five categories, many of which include the involvement of our schools. Among the objective that align with CHPS sustainability efforts are the enforcement of vehicle idling regulations outside of our schools; developing greater availability of safe routes for biking and walking to school; continuing and expanding "green" practices in recycling, energy use, cleaning products, nomow zones, gardening, and more.

Next week, the Cherry Hill Public Schools will conduct a District Green Team focus group to plan for the 2016-2017 school year. As all 19 of our schools are Sustainable Jersey for Schools certified, we are excited to build momentum and expand our sustainability efforts in the classrooms and all around our buildings and grounds. Our philosophy will always be, "We're doing well; how can we do even better?"

Students personalized their efforts by working in honor of young patients currently being treated for cancer. They carried paper cutouts with a description of their "sponsored" child and his/her interests.



Also part of the event was a hair donation stand for the Children with Hair Loss Foundation. Students such as Julisa Rodriguez, pictured above, signed up to have several inches of hair cut off to make wigs for children who have lost their hair because of cancer treatments.

Learning Project Is Big Success

Second grade students at Woodcrest Elementary School recently completed their service learning project, "Buy Books for Better Lives." Early in the year the students read books to learn about the needs of others then brainstormed ideas for the project. Students decided to collect books and organize a school wide book sale to raise money for charity.

They promoted the book sale by making announcements, creating posters, and organizing the 1,600 books they collected for the sale. The students were happily surprised to have raised more than \$1,000.

Following the book sale, each class in second grade researched two charities and created a power point presentation highlighting all six charities. An assembly revealed the grand total and presented information on all six charities to the entire school.

The following day the school community voted for their favorite charity. Cedar Run Wildlife Refuge won by a landslide. The service learning project culminated with a program featuring several animals from the refuge. Finally, the Cedar Run Wildlife Refuge was presented with a check for \$1,178.48.

Not only did Cedar Run benefit from the project, but the remaining 800 books that were not sold were donated to Cayuga Elementary School in Philadelphia.
