First up is Mrs. Janet Hung, parent of a first grader and a fifth grader at James Johnson Elementary School, located at 500 Kresson Road:

"Being a product of the Cherry Hill school system myself, I wanted my children to have a similar educational experience. My family and I love the sense of community and family that Johnson has given us.

"My children are excited to get on the bus to begin their day at Johnson, and hop off the bus with just as much enthusiasm to tell me about their day. They are filled with wonderful stories about the announcements the office has made, upcoming PTA events, what their friends had for lunch, what they did at recess, and every detail imaginable.

"Johnson is very parentvolunteer friendly. When my oldest was in kindergarten, I started volunteering. When my youngest began 22, 2015, School Age Child Care (SACC) Day.

SACC students at the Harte location displayed luminaries they made to represent the "Lights On" aspect of the event. They eagerly participated in making homemade "slime" after the presentation portion of the program.

SACC is a tuitionsupported program sponsored by the Cherry Hill Board of Education. The program operates before and after school programs in each Cherry Hill elementary school from 7 - 8:45 am and 3:30 - 6 pm. It also provides Extended Day Child Care (EDCC) for kindergartners. 
Paine, for example, held an assembly with the themes, "Be More Awesome!" and "Love Others!" A slide show of the assembly is posted on Paine's Instagram account.
