Where Are They Now?

When Catherine (Gagliardi)
Harrison, pictured above, came
to the Cherry Hill Public
Schools as a fourth grade
student at Cooper Elementary
School, she already had
overcome Leukemia and had
developed a keen interest in
nutrition and its impact on
health. She followed that
interest throughout her school
years to land where she is
now: with her own business,
NutriWise

(http://www.nutriwisellc.com/), as a nutrition consultant.

Mrs. Harrison, a 1987 East graduate, also attended Beck Middle School. She recalls the principal at Cooper in the late '70s as "a great man. He was such a lover of learning. He instilled that in his students and I carried that with me all through my school years."

After high school graduation,
Mrs. Harrison earned a BS in
nutritional science from
Rutgers University. She went
on to complete a one-year
internship at New York
Presbyterian/Weill Cornell
Medical Center (formerly
known as The New York
Hospital-Cornell Medical
Center) New York, NY, and
became a registered dietitian in
1994.

Since then, Mrs. Harrison has held various positions related to dietetics and nutrition, from working as a personal chef, to Students included "Respect for Our Veterans" thankyou notes in their week's activities.

In the Cherry Hill Public Schools, work against bullying continues throughout the year. Last June, three of our schools, Cherry Hill High School West, Cherry Hill Alternative High School and Joyce Kilmer Elementary School were designated "No Place for Hate" schools, having completed a year of antibias and anti-bullying programs. We expect more schools to join this list in the future.

home health dietitian, to diabetes educator. She founded NutriWise in July of 2013 and helps clients with everything from medical nutrition therapy to counseling and assessment, visiting clients' homes if they are house bound.

Mrs. Harrison and her husband, also a 1987 East graduate, live with their four children, one of whom is a Cherry Hill West graduate, on the West side of Cherry Hill. One of her children has Type I diabetes, which led Mrs. Harrison to pursue diabetic education and product training.

"My passion is helping people with Type I diabetes," Mrs. Harrison says. "I see a lot of young children with it. It's so important to help them live happy, normal lives."

Mrs. Harrison says she appreciates the foundation the Cherry Hill Schools gave her. She advises students now to "be like a sponge. Really listen to your teachers – they have so much wisdom," she says. "And don't miss class!"

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
