Sharp Elementary Marks Patriot Day with Music and Reflections

Elementary School experienced democracy in action on National Constitution Day September 17 when they ratified a Constitution of their own.

The process started in early September the classroom with the Kilmer teachers. Each class was given the task of developing a list of 3-5 rules based on the students' hopes, dreams and goals for the school year. Kilmer's 4th and 5th grade teachers selected 3 students from each of their classes to serve as delegates.

On September 11, the delegates met as a group for the first time to review the rules created by all K-5 classrooms. The delegates were given the responsibility of reading over all of the rules and finding common themes and ideas. From those rules, students and teachers created one school-wide list. The delegates liked the idea of the acronym BRAVE and wanted the rules to fit into that acronym. "Kilmer Cubs are B.R.A.V.E." stands for the first words in each of the school rules:

Be kind and caring.

Respect yourself, others, and the school environment.

Accept and celebrate classmates' differences.

Cherry Hill High School East senior Sarah Whitty is making a name for herself beyond the East community with her artwork. Sarah's drawing of Pope Francis, originally created for the web site of her parish, The Catholic Church of St. Mary, has been chosen by the Diocese of Camden for use on its web site and social media leading up to the Pope's Philadelphia visit on September 27. Sarah's work also attracted the attention of the Cherry Hill Sun.

"I've been drawing for as long as I can remember," Sarah says. Formal lessons started when she was about six years old, and she has enjoyed art all through her years in the Cherry Hill Public Schools.

"Many of my teachers have been incredibly supportive of my artwork," she notes. "

Out of all of her teachers, Sarah says, her sophomore English teacher, Mrs. Susan Fox, was "very invested and supportive of my work. Sometimes I'll still see her around the school and she'll ask to see the latest art I've created."

Sarah's mother, Rita Whitty, gave her the original assignment to create artwork to help promote the Pope's upcoming visit via the web site of her home parish. Mrs. Whitty is the webmaster for the parish. Sarah chose to use

Elementary School observed Patriot Day with their traditional annual assembly on September 11. The assembly included music and reflections about the day and what it means.

In preparation for Patriot Day, fourth and fifth grade students were given a writing prompt at the beginning of the school year:

President Barack Obama said, "In the face of impossible odds, people who love this country can change it." What changes would you like to happen in this country and how would you make them happen?

Students completed the writing prompt and submitted it to Principal Ric Miscioscia a week before the assembly. A small group of students was selected to read their work at the Patriot Day Assembly.

The school-wide assembly included reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and singing The Star Spangled Banner. Mr. Miscioscia gave a brief speech on why our country observes Patriot Day. Students then observed a moment of silence. Taps were performed by student trumpet players, pictured above.

Following the student essay readings, the entire student body sang You're a Grand Old Flag, My Country 'Tis of Thee, and America the Beautiful.
