

Volunteers Plant School Gardens for Beauty and Community Outreach

May 12, 7 pm Malberg Administration Building, 45 Ranoldo Terrace settled in for the season. In addition to the gorgeous cherry trees lining Chapel Avenue in front of Joyce Kilmer Elementary School and Cherry Hill High School West, you may have noticed that many of our buildings have freshly planted flowers out front – or you may have been asked to help with an upcoming "Beautification Day" at your school or schools.

We believe that a welcoming entry and grounds are an important part of setting a positive tone for our students, their families and our staff as they enter and exit our buildings every day. In addition to improving our buildings' "curb appeal," many of our volunteer gardeners also work on establishing school vegetable gardens this time of year. At the Alternative High School, for example, students not only have planted flowers in the front of the school and in the side entrance window box, but they have transformed the courtyard into a patio and vegetable garden. Vegetables harvested from the garden over the summer will be donated to the Cherry Hill Food Pantry.

Other vegetable gardens are taking shape at Johnson Elementary School, Beck Middle School (with 18 gardens!), Rosa International Middle School and Cherry Hill High Schools East and West. In fact, Beck is looking for parents to help maintain their many vegetable gardens over the summer. Weekend beautification projects spearheaded by our PTAs include last Saturday, May 2, at A. Russell Knight Elementary School, and this Saturday, May 9, at Horace Mann Elementary School. At J.F. Cooper Elementary School, volunteers planted red tulip bulbs last fall in recognition of Red Ribbon Week. Those tulips were in full bloom by the last week of April.

For 1982 Cherry Hill High School West graduate Robin Olin, Cherry Hill truly is "home." Having moved to Cherry Hill as a thirdgrader, Mrs. Olin left the township only briefly early in her marriage. She and her husband soon bought a house in Cherry Hill and chose to raise their family here.

Beck students typically plant cold weather crops like radishes, kale, lettuces, Swiss chard and beets. These vegetables are harvested in June before the students leave for the summer. In the past, students and staff have had salad or veggie parties — often, the produce is donated to local food banks.

In the summer, Beck parents have stepped up to maintain the garden. This year, Beck is expanding this opportunity to all Cherry Hill families especially those in Fox Hollow, Fox Hollow Woods and Rams Gate because they live so close to the garden. This gives the community an opportunity to plant some crops over the summer while maintaining the look of the garden.

The 18 raised beds with mushroom compost available to Cherry Hill families for their use from June 15 until September 8. There is a rain barrel collection system and a water source (in case we run out of rain water) that gardeners may access. The Beck community's only request is that the garden be kept organic; no pesticides of any kind may be used.

School Nurse Day this week, it seems only fitting to feature Mrs. Olin in this month's "Where Are They Now" - she has served as the school nurse at J.F. Cooper Elementary School, for the last 15 years. She is only the second nurse to work at Cooper since the school opened in 1971.

Mrs. Olin's elementary years were spent at Kingston, middle years at Brainerd Junior High School (now Carusi), and high school at West. She went on to earn her bachelor of nursing degree at Tretnon State, followed by a masters in nursing from the University of Pennsylvania. After working for 13 1/2 years in adult critical care and then 10 years in the pediatric ICU department, Mrs. Olin earned her school nurse certificate at TCNJ and took the job at Cooper in January 2000.

Mrs. Olin and her husband, who is not from Cherry Hill, are happily raising their two children here. She remembers her school years fondly. "I had a great group of teachers all the way through," she recalls. "Life was simpler for kids then - there wasn't as much pressure."

The transition to working in the same school district she attended as a student was not difficult.
