

BOE Committees Work for Public, with Public

In addition to their monthly Work Sessions and Action Meetings, the Cherry Hill Board of Education conducts a series of committee meetings on a monthly basis, open to the public.

(BOE) conducts open Work Sessions and Action Meetings, allowing designated time during each meeting for public comment, more BOE work is open to public observation and discussion at its committee meetings.

Our <u>nine Board members</u> divide their time among five committees:

- Business & Facilities
- Curriculum & Instruction
- Human Resources
- Policy & Legislation
- Strategic Planning

Each of these committees is chaired by a Board member, and includes three other Board members in addition to members of the Administration. The committees meet on a monthly basis to monitor progress toward the BOE's annual goals, to learn about work underway throughout the District and to recommend moving presentations forward for full Board review. When committee members' questions are answered to reasonable degree, work is brought before the full Board for further discussion, questioning and consideration for implementation. Special committees may be created for special assignments, and are dissolved upon completion of their assignments. Details on the workings of School Boards in New Jersey may be found on the New Jersey School Boards Association web site.

Public input is an important part of the committees' process. Right now, two topics of particular interest to the public are the middle school curriculum at the Curriculum & Instruction Committee meetings and a proposal for turf fields at the high schools, funded in part by Cherry Hill Township, at the Strategic Planning Committee meetings. As a result of public comment, the middle school curriculum discussion will be broadened to include subcommittees which will include parents. The BOE also welcomes continued public comments regarding the turf field proposal, which you may view by clicking here. The only committee meetings not consistently open to the public are Human Resources meetings, because of the confidential nature of the issues discussed. 

On Wednesday, March 11, fifth graders across the Cherry Hill School District finished their first week of PARCC testing. Bret Harte Elementary School decided to celebrate their success.

Our technology team members began planning for PARCC and related projects in 2013. Preparing for PARCC involved the efforts of our entire team of 15 over the past 6 months. "I couldn't even begin to come to a specific hour count for PARCC, as we approached many of the PARCC technology requirements as yearround and district technology enhancement opportunities, such as increasing Internet Bandwidth, which would also meets the network demands of the PARCC test," says Marc Plevinsky, assistant director of technology for the District.

The technology team also provides continuous technical help and troubleshooting advice for the duration of the testing period. The first two weeks have run smoothly overall, with some minor technical issues. All parties involved in the assessments anticipate even fewer glitches in the final weeks of testing.

"It wasn't that long ago that the majority of our technology was wired and on a desk," says Marc Plevinsky, assistant director of technology. "Today we couldn't imagine our schools without WiFi and "BYOD" (bring your own device) – our program where students and staff can connect their personal devices to the district network to access the Internet."

Fun fact: WiFi is not wireless! To support BYOD and district computers on WiFi, our district WiFi network includes over 550 access points strategically placed throughout our buildings connected with well over 15 miles of cable just for WiFi Access Points.

The technology department supports everything from computers, printers and network equipment, to servers for a variety of district systems with data for district and state reporting. They constantly refine the services and tools available for our students, staff and community to improve communication and efficiency. In classrooms, they work closely with our curriculum and building administrators to match the needs of the classroom with technology tools that will be easy and reliable to use.

Whether they're models of iPads, apps or a new instructional software tool, new technologies are launched regularly in the
