What are walking Talking Mocks?

Students perform the exam with teachers leading the students through the exam paper. Together they underline command words and the teacher explains how to identify what the question is asking and provides advice on exam technique. Teachers model how to complete the questions and how to manage time. Students will also complete answers to the exam questions. It will support students to understand how to approach answering exam questions and support them to interpret the questions.

PARENT FINES FOR MISSING SCHOOL: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Under the new national framework, all schools will be required to consider a fine when a child has missed 10 or more sessions (5 days) for unauthorised reasons.

From August 2024, the fine for school absences across the country will be £80 if paid within 21 days, or £160 if paid within 28 days.

This rate is in line with inflation and is the first increase since 2012.

In the case of repeated fines, if a parent receives a second fine for the same child within any three-year period, this will be charged at the higher rate of £160.

Fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action like a parenting order or prosecution will be considered and the parentipe by the academy.

If you're prosecuted and attend court because your child hasn't been a of up to £2,500.

Caution!

We have recently had some reports of near-misses at collection/drop-off times.

Please find a safe place to park while collecting/dropping off, and ask your child to exit/enter the car on the pavement side of the road, reminding them to be cautious and only cross the road at the traffic lights or designated points.
