BCSD Facts

Dr. Rodriguez named 2025 SC Superintendent of the Year by the SC Association of School Administrators (SCASA) and a top 25 Superintendent to Watch by the National School Public Relations Association (NSPRA)

In 2023, BCSD implemented unprecedented salary increases for teachers moving BCSD's ranking from 53rd to 1st in the state for starting teacher salary.

BCSD continues to maintain a Aa1 credit rating from Moody's Investors Service. This outstanding rating allows the District and taxpayers the benefit of low interest rates on school bonds



What Does Operations Do Well?

Community Engagement: The department actively involves the community at multiple levels in the planning process for school facilities, employing mechanisms such as Community Project Review Committees (CPRC), Citizens Led Oversight Committee (CLOC), and design reviews with School SIC, ensuring that local voices are heard and valued.

Transparency and Accountability: There is a commitment to accountability to the community, exemplified by the annual publication of the Facilities Master Plan book, which provides clear and transparent reporting on the department's activities and progress. The CLOC and CPRC are public meetings with all minutes, presentations and videos online.

Construction Management: Leveraging Comprehensive Facility Planning, BCSD has successfully constructed new facilities to accommodate the rapid growth in one of South Carolina's fastest-growing regions. Delivering projects on time and under budget.

Highly Competent Team: The Operations Department boasts a professional, efficient, and effective staff dedicated to managing facility-related tasks.

What Does Operations Do Well?

Reliable Planning: The department consistently offers trusted and dependable projections for facility planning, ensuring that long-term strategies align with community needs and expectations.

Safe transportation: Each year, we safely transport <u>10,946 students</u> to and from school, covering a total distance of <u>1,530,000</u> miles.

Contracted services: To optimize efficiency, affordability, and accountability, we contract out our Custodial, Maintenance, and Ground services.

Funding Facilities Needs

There are only 3 ways to fund capital improvement projects in South Carolina:

- 1. A Referendum passed by a majority of the voters for specific designated capital projects
- 2. 8% Funding which allows for the District to borrow up to 8% of the assessed value of the property in the county
- 3. Impact fees assessed for areas experiencing growth to finance the impact the developments create on support services and facilities. Can be used for schools, fire departments, etc.

8% PROJECTS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS (CIP)

We employ a strategic approach to life cycle replacement planning, which enables us to proactively prepare for the replacement of a wide range of systems in both our schools and support buildings. A <u>Facility Condition Assessment (FCA)</u> conducted in 2022, rigorously examined the age and condition of various systems, and guides which projects are prioritized for funding

Referendum - History



BCSD went 11 years without successful passage of a bond referendum (2008-2019)



In 2019 Beaufort County voters approved the school district's \$344M bond referendum – the largest in the district's history and the first in over 11 years



In 2023 Beaufort County voters approved another school bond referendum for \$439M with 72% voter approval Bond Referendum

CPRC 2019

In 2019, interim Superintendent Dr. Berg appointed a committee to make recommendations on facilities projects. This committee reviewed facility condition assessments, heard from safety/security experts, talked with community planners, and visited schools in the district and other school districts.

Putting in over 1500 volunteer hours this CPRC prioritized a list of over \$629M of projects Their recommendations resulted in the \$344M bond referendum in 2019 overwhelming approved by the public with >70% approval

CPRC 2023

In December 2022, Superintendent Dr.
Rodriguez appointed a committee to again
make recommendations on facilities projects
This committee reviewed all projects
recommended by the previous committee that
were not on the final referendum list
They also reviewed the 2022 facility condition
assessment results, heard from district staff,
Town of Bluffton planning staff, other experts
on the potential projects
Putting in over 900 total volunteer hours, the
CPRC 2.0 prioritized a list of over \$980M of
projects

Their list resulted in the Board moving forward in a \$439M bond referendum going to voters November 7, 2023

Building Trust and Accountability Citizen Led Oversight Committee (CLOC)

The CLOC is an independent group of volunteers who monitor all referendum building projects, schedules, budgets and expenditures.

The committee serves as an independent watchdog by monitoring projects and spending and then reporting directly to the public and the Board of Education.




Permitting for projects

- New school construction and major renovation projects are approved through the SC Dept of Education – Office of School Facilities (OSF) who acts as our building permitting agency
- District must follow local permitting processes for storm water management, conservation, and other requirements.
- Beaufort County faces challenges to projects and permitting are due to coastal hurricane zones, and earthquake zone requirements that other districts more in-land districts in South Carolina do not face
- Permitting can cause schedules to slip.

Construction Management @Risk (CMAR)


- The hiring of architects and contractors for small and large projects must adhere to all procurement rules of BCSD and South Carolina
- The District mainly uses the CMAR as a delivery method which entails a commitment by the Contractor (CM) to deliver the project within a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) which is based on the architect's construction documents and specifications. This methodology requires the architect and contractor to work closely with the district to make the GMP



Design Process

- Procure architect/design services
- Pre-Design/ Programming
 - what's needed what type of space and sizing
- Schematic Design (SD)
 - Addressees Adjacency and Scale
- Design Development (DD)
 - site plan, floor plans, sections, elevations, and details
- Construction Documents (CD)
 - written and graphic documentation for bidding and building the project
- Bidding and Construction Administration



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
Process Flow Chart
